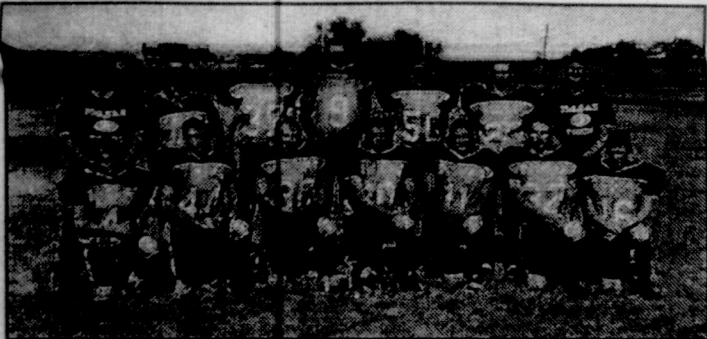

McLean Tigers Win District Championship, Follett Panthers Next

The McLean Tigers came out victorious for the season and sent their opponents home early five games in a row due to the 45 point rule.

McLean will also go on to Bi-District play against Follett after earning the title of District champs. The game will begin at 7:30 p.m. on Friday night at Miami.

Chris Hauck, had six completions for 162 yards and six touchdowns.

Aaron Rice completed one pass for 31 yards and a touchdown.

Brett Montgomery had one completion for 25 yards and one touchdown.

Aaron Rice had 12

carries for a total of 159 yards and one touchdown. Frankie Sparling had four carries and one touchdown. Brian Fuller and Brett Montgomery also added yards for the Tigers for a team total of 208 yards rushing on 19 carries and two touchdowns.

Brett Montgomery had five receptions and 174 yards and five touchdowns.

Chris Hauck connected on a 25 yard pass for a touchdown. Brian Fuller also added to the board as well as Frankie Sparling with a touchdown reception each.

The final score for the

night was 66-16 in the third quarter.

"I'm so proud of our young men this year. Last time McLean was district champs was six or seven years ago. It is quite an achievement," stated head coach James Burch. "We open bi-district with Follett. Follett is very well coached and run the spread formation very well. They will be a very tough opponent. These young men draw a lot of strength and emotion off our very strong fan base. So get out to Miami Friday night and cheer on your Tigers!"

City of McLean Council Clarifies McMinn's Termination Circumstances

The City Council of McLean met in regular session Monday, November 8, 1999 in the City Hall. The meeting was called to order by the Mayor and opened with an invocation by Sam Haynes at 7:00 p.m. with the following members present: Bob Martin, Mary Dwyer, Sam Haynes and Charles McClendon. Kendra Birchfield and Jim McDonald were absent.

Others present were Fred Smith, Toni Bohlar, Allen Mixon and Tom Trostle.

The minutes of the November meetings were approved.

All motions were unanimously approved unless otherwise stated.

No action was taken on the Employee Retirement Plan since David Haynes was not in attendance.

Grant Works was tabled until next month when the representative could be here.

A public participation meeting was held concerning the drinking water report. There were no comments from the citizens in attendance.

Tom Trostle came before the council to inform them that nearly all of the street signs were unreadable and that he would like the job of repainting them. Since this item was on the agenda, the council skipped to that item.

The council informed Mr. Trostle that the City has been in the process of talking with the county in getting new signs made and using trustees to do it. The Mayor will talk with Jim

McDonald to see if he can see where we stand on this process. They also instructed Fred to find out how much it would cost to order new signs made.

Alan Preen had come before the council last month to ask if they would consider closing Boyett Street to through traffic. Although Mr.

Preen was not at this meeting, the council decided it was not feasible to close the road or place a No Through Traffic sign because the street is a through street and because there are City utilities in the street. A letter to that effect will be sent to Mr. Preen.

The council voted to transfer \$240.00 from the General Fund to the Fireman's Retirement Fund to pay the annual pension payments to the retired firemen or their spouses.

Mary Dwyer asked Fred Smith about the City's Christmas decorations this year. He informed her that we still had the ones from last year and that they were in good shape. Mrs. Dwyer is going to check with the Chamber of Commerce and see if they can get the businesses downtown to light up their windows for the holidays.

The state passed a new law in September, HB 1777, dealing with how the municipalities collect franchise fees from telecommunication companies. There will be several different options that they can use. The council voted to go with the state average option and if there is a choice to choose categories, the city would choose all category 1 lines, or 95% category 1 lines and 5% category 2 lines.

The council voted to approve the tax roll for 1999. A copy is on file at the city hall.

The Mayor called for executive session at 7:35 p.m.

Discussion was held concerning description of past termination of an employee.

The meeting returned to open session at 7:50 p.m.

The council voted that after more consideration they have decided that the more accurate description of Chris

McMinn's termination to be the following: Mr. McMinn was hired for a particular job, of hauling road material from I-40 road construction to McLean, that job responsibility had ended, so therefore his job had ended.

The council voted to pay the current bills.

The meeting adjourned at 8:00 p.m.



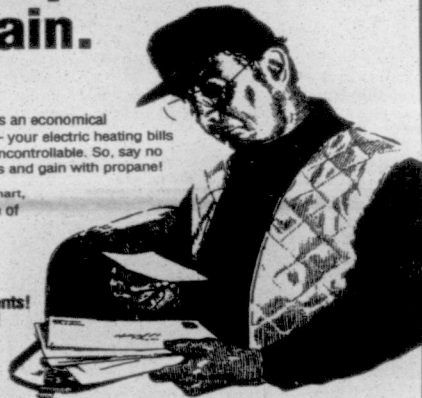

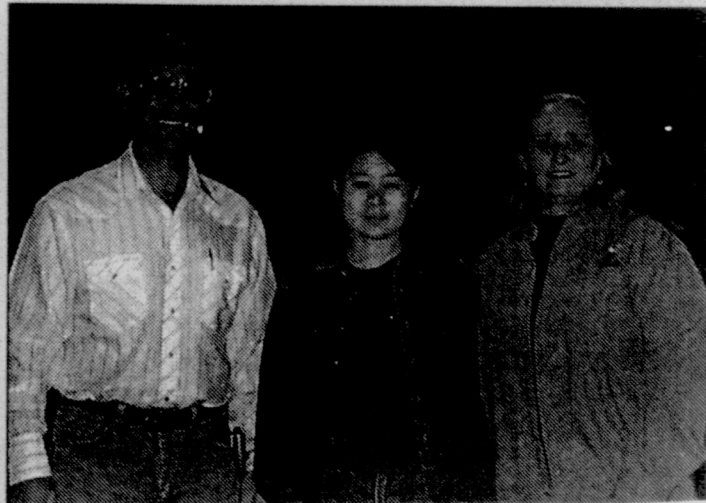
The Tigers earned 11 first downs and Higgins earned 2. The Coyotes punted twice averaging 36.5 yards.

Football players, cheerleaders and band members were escorted on the field by their parents as a summary of their high school careers was announced.

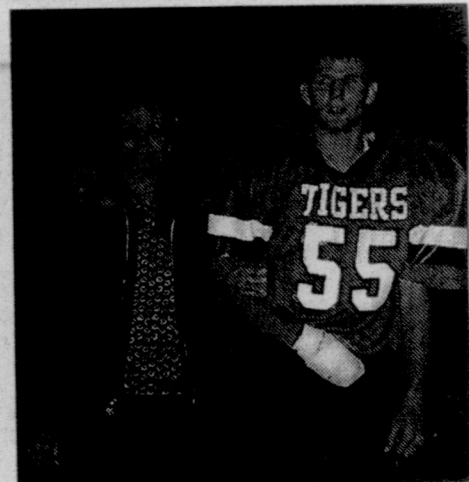



No action was taken on a PANAL resolution seeking the court's support of a mediator for that group and Pantex. The county attorney and judge will present the court with a resolution stating what the county will be supporting in the affidavit after additional research is acquired.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Barbara Cosper reported that 54.67% of the tax collections have been received as of October 31, 1999.

The court discussed policy changes for county employees. A workshop will be held with a representative from the Texas Association of Counties attending to counsel the commissioners on amendments to the policy handbook.

Court adjourned until November 22, 1999.
