



In accordance with the foregoing petition the town council of the town of McLean, Texas, did at a regular session thereof. held on the 12th day of November, A. D. 1909, order an election to be held within the corporate limits of the said town of McLean, to determine whether or not Horses, Mules, Jacks, Jennetts and Cattle shall be permitted to run at large within the corporate limits of the town of McLean, Texas, from the 15th day of October to the 15th day of March following, of each year. Now therefore, I, C. S. Rice, Mayor of the said town of Mc-Lean, Texas, by the authority in me vested, do hereby order an election, to be held at the office of J. L. Crabtree, in the town of McLean, on the third Saturday in December, the same being the 18th day of December. A. D. 1909, for the purpose of determining whether or not Horses, Mules, Jacks, Jennetts and Cattle shall be permitted to run at large within the corporate limits of said town from October 15th to March 15th following, of each year.
