State Capital News

Texas' 62nd Legislature is prepared to settle down to serious business after hearing recommendations of Gov. Preston Smith as to priority duties. Legislature's first week was spent largely in organizational preliminaries. However, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes named a full state committee roster, and a sub-panel of the Senate appropriations committee began hearings on the budget.

Lawmakers were reluctant to talk much about where they would find up to \$850 million in new taxes until they heard the governor's plan. Smith's message to lawmakers was set for the day after his inauguration. Second term inauguration.

Meanwhile, bills piled up in hoppers of both houses during the "lull." Among them is the \$7.5 billion all-funds biennial budget draft prepared by the Legislative Budget Board. It would require an estimated \$576.4 million in new revenue, and that was regarded as a minimum.

House Speaker Gus Mutscher was elected to a second term without opposition. Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon was unanimously selected as Senate president pro tempore -- an honor which carries with it the privilege of serving as governor for a year, probably next April.

Proposed constitutional amendments already introduced would lower the minimum voting age to 18, remove the \$80 million a year welfare spending ceiling, provide four-year terms for state officials and call for annual legislative sessions.

Hundreds of bills already have been submitted. Some of the major ones would require drivers to have liability insurance before they can get a driver's license or auto plates set up an independent Texas Air Control Board; split the Parks and Wildlife Department; allow individuals to bring anti-pollution suits, and abolish recognition of common law marriages after 1971.

WELFARE CRISIS GROWING
Lieutenant Governor Barnes warned Senate budget writers that emergency funding is necessary to prevent some welfare allocations from running out together.

DRAFT CALL SET
February draft call for Texas is 1,185 men, an increase of 280 over January.

Selective Service Director Col. Melvin Glantz said inductees will be called from the extended priority selection group and the first priority selection group, for 1971.
First priority selection group is made up of registrants born in 1951, currently classified in Class 1-A, 1-A-O or 1-O.

REPUBLICANS ON MOVE
Texas Republicans named Dr. George Willeford Jr. of Austin as their new state chairman and began laying their plans for joining in campaigns of President Nixon and Sen. John Tower in 1972.

GOP leaders insisted the appointment of Democratic former Gov. John Connally as secretary of treasury enhances chances of both Tower and Nixon. Tower predicted he will win and said he doesn't care who the Democrats run against him.

Committee actually did not back up all the complaints of Chairman Louis Dugas Jr., Orange County district attorney.

Historical Committee Names Released By County Judge

The official appointment of members to the Gray County Historical Survey Committee has been announced by County Judge Don Cain. The county survey committee, which implements the state marking and preservation program in this area, will cooperate directly with the State Office of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee in Austin.

Tracy D. Cary of Pampa will be chairman of the group. Other members are Joe W. Shelton, Mrs. Fred Thompson, Mrs. Raymond Harrah, Mrs. George Ingram, Mrs. Florence Jones, Mrs. Lynn Boyd, Mrs. J. C. Pattillo, Mrs. Katie Vincent, Mrs. J. R. Holloway, all of Pampa, Mrs. Vera Back, Mrs. Alice Short Smith, John C. Haynes, Evan Sitter, of McLean, Mrs. Marvin Hall of Alameed, Mrs. Alma Seitz of Miami, and Mr. and Mrs. Luther Welburn of Lefors.

"Goals for the Seventies," a comprehensive historical preservation plan drawn up by the State Survey Committee, will provide the focus for county committee activities. It encompasses a wide range of objectives and programs.

County Judge Don Cain commented, "The committee has been appointed at this time so that they may make plans for the coming two years, 1971-72. He also pointed out that the overall purpose of the committee's work is the development of local history as a scholarly resource and a tourist attraction. "County survey committees work with local historians, county commissioners courts, and tourist-related organizations to insure the preservation of history for future generations of Texans," he said.

Enrollment Up At F. Phillips College

The enrollment at Frank Phillips College in Borger is showing more than a ten percent increase at the end of the second day of regular registration over the same period of the 1970 enrollment. On Friday, Jan. 15, 540 students had enrolled as compared with 488 at this time last year. The college administration expects that this increase will be greater before the final day of registration.

There are indications that the spring enrollment will reach 600 students which will be the largest spring semester enrollment in three years. This increase is attributed to several factors including that there are more transfers from other colleges, fewer mid-term transfers from Frank Phillips College enriched curriculum, and an intensified public relations program.

The last day to register for the spring semester at Frank Phillips College is January 29. No one will be admitted to a Monday, Wednesday, and Friday class after February 1, or to a Tuesday and Thursday class after February 2, unless they have written permission from the Academic Dean. Classes began on Monday, Jan. 18 at 8:00 a.m.

14 Accidents On Gray Co. Rural Roads In Dec.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 14 accidents on rural highways in Gray County during the month of December, according to Sergeant J. L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, seven persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$8,995.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the calendar year of 1970 shows a total of 242 accidents resulting in 12 persons killed, 147 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$214,760.00.

"Operation Motorcade" which was in effect during Christmas and New Year's holidays recorded 101 traffic deaths as compared to the estimated 37. Ten of these traffic fatalities occurred in the Lubbock region in the following counties: Cochran, Crosby, Parmer, Swisher, Wichita and Wise which had one fatality each with Dallam and Potter Counties having two fatalities each.

The Patrol Supervisor reminded all motorists to think about the more than 30,000 people that have been killed in Texas traffic accidents during the last 10 years, and to join the drive to reverse this alarming trend of traffic deaths by strict observance of traffic laws and rules of defensive driving.

Gray County Officials Appoint Board Members During Meeting

Appointment of Hospital Board members and members of the Airport Board, as well as continuing maintenance of the White Deer Lands Co. Museum, highlighted a lengthy meeting of Gray County Commissioners yesterday.

The long session moved through a 21-item agenda at rapid pace. Discussions covered a wide field of topics.

The highly informational meeting was addressed by Wes Langham, Hospital Administrator, Gene Barber, County Surveyor, Tracy Cary, representative of the Historical Society, and Jack Back, County tax assessor-collector.

Bills were paid, and commissioners approved Welfare and treasurer's reports.

Salaries for county employees were fixed at the 1970 rate, and a move to grant Judge Don Cain to leave the county from time to time was seconded with all commission members giving an assenting vote.

Right-of-way progress on the Loop 171 which will connect State Highway Junction, 152-60 with Highway 70 were discussed. Precinct 2 Commissioner Don Hinton reported to the court that all land owners involved had been contacted, and advised that he would have a report of progress after Feb. 1.

The Price Road gutter and paving project which was approved by the State Highway Department was discussed. The court was advised by Barber that the State would pave the road after right-of-way and gutter and drainage responsibility had been determined by the county.

Board appointments made by the court include Hospital Board members Fred Neslage, Dr. R.M. Bellamy and Ben White. Lefors Airport Board members appointed were Milo Carlson and George Cree Jr.

According to previous collection periods, Back stated that the building and grounds will be made in the future.

Tracy Cary, speaking in behalf of the Historical Society, reported that the building was in excellent repair, compliments of the M.K. Brown foundation, and expressed his appreciation of the cooperation of Gray County in assuring the continuation of the foundation's program of establishing an archives for the area.

Wheat Pasture
Available wheat forage for grazing is the lowest since 1966 according to Jan. 1, WSDA reports. In the high plains and rolling plains of Texas only 36 percent of the seeded wheat acreage had sufficient growth to pasture. This compares with 68 percent last year. These are the lowest percentages since records began. It showed 43 percent in Oklahoma & only 14 percent in Kansas.

Human Brucellosis
In 1947 there were 6300 cases of undulant fever in man in the U.S. This was before or about the time a National program for the eradication of Brucellosis (Bang's disease) in beef cattle got underway. The cases of undulant fever in man has dropped his steadily and in direct proportion to the number of counties in the U.S. that have been declared modified Brucellosis free through the clinic for shots.

S. W. Bell To Expand Facilities In McLean

Further expansion of telephone facilities in McLean is scheduled during 1971, George Newberry, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, said this week.

Newberry said that a job scheduled to be started here this year will extend cable facilities to bring improved and expanded service to the rural areas south of McLean and to convert service lines to regular telephone lines in the area.

"This project is aimed at helping the telephone company keep up with the increasing communications needs created by our growing city," Newberry said, "and telephone growth is a good indicator of a city's overall growth rate."

For example, Newberry said there were 788 telephone in McLean at the end of 1960. In December of 1970, there were 1,108 telephones in the city, an increase of more than 28% in the decade. A total of 33 telephones were gained in 1970.

"It appears that the number of telephones will continue to climb and expansion will remain a way of life here for quite awhile," Newberry said. "We expect to have 1,240 telephones here the end of 1974."

He noted that McLean residents dialed 4,085 calls on an average business day in November, a 28% increase over the 3,192 average during November, 1969.

He said Southwestern Bell has announced plans to spend a record \$14.1 million on land, buildings and equipment this year in the San Antonio administrative area, of which McLean is a part. The area covers roughly the western half of Texas.

New Conservation Program

The Secretary of Agriculture has announced the new Rural Environmental Program (REAP) for 1971, emphasizing a broad attack on the environmental problems created by the Nation's farming operations. Announcement of the new program, formerly known as the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP), permits resumption of the Federal cost-sharing of various beneficial conservation practices with farmers, but under a restructured program in line with modern day needs to better both the on and off-farm environment. It makes farmers partners in the venture between the Federal government and State, City and local governments to deal with the pressing problems of pollution.

"The restructured program will be used to help preserve our environment, demonstrates good environmental enhancement practices, and return more public benefits at less public cost," Secretary Hardin pointed out.

Although the specific level of funding for 1971 has not been determined, the 1971 program will be funded, and the Congress will be requested by the Administration to provide funds for the 1972 program.

Emphasis on the farm side will be those practices contributing the most to the improvement of conditions for both the general public and farmers. Major considerations in authorizing cost sharing of any practice installation will be the resulting public benefits such as pollution abatement, enduring soil and water conservation recreation, wildlife, and open spaces as well as the degree of permanency achieved. As a result, the practices offered under the new program have been structured to provide enduring benefits, significant pollution control, and enhancement of the environment for all.

Under this program the Federal government will pay about 50 percent of the cost of practices that provide only temporary benefits will be available only under certain circumstances and at a reduced level of cost-sharing.

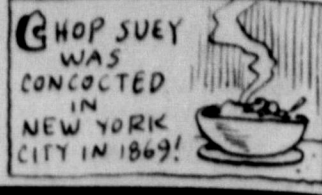
The program will be run in each county by locally elected farmer committeemen. Under Federal and state guidelines,

the committeemen will select the practices best suited for meeting the needs of their area, determine which farm land needs treatment, and within the county's allocation of funds fix the amount of cost sharing

to be provided each farmer. This program will reflect changes by the President and consistent with a House-Senate conference report, will make provision for continuance of 1970 program practices and

procedures at the option of county committeemen. The program will be administered by the ASCS office under the U.S. department of Agriculture. Details of the local program

will be announced when they are received. Information on dates for sign-up and requests will be furnished when known. Don't take up two parking spaces.

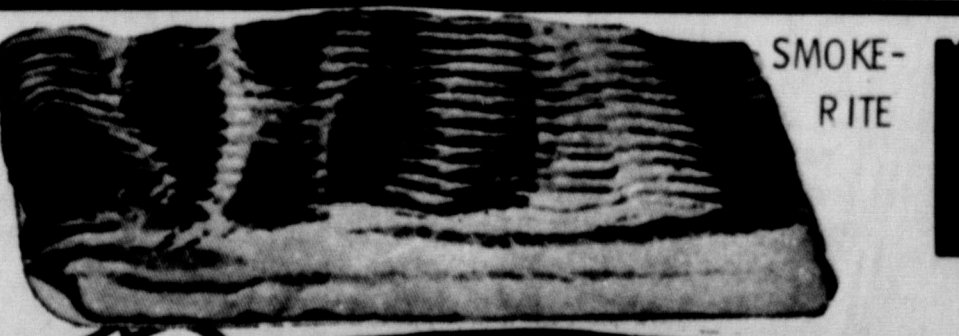
