



AVOID SPREADING OF DISEASE

Precautions That Should Be Observed by Those Afflicted With Tuberculosis.

All persons who are intimately associated with cases of active pulmotious about the proper disposition of tubercular sputum. Such sputum should always be received in cups containing a five per cent solution of lysol or carbolic acid, or, in the absence of these, milk of lime. Paper back and short rounded end. A dou-ble ruffle, widening toward the back, is devotees give a rather wide berth. cups, made especially for this purpose, may be used and subsequently burned. Soiled handkerchiefs and cloths should be immersed for one hour in lysol or carbolic acid (five per cent) and then boiled before they are handled. The patient should be provided with a set of dishes for his exclusive use, and these should be kept by themselves and boiled thoroughly after each meal. Remember that tuberculosis is a preventable disease, but that its control can be accomplished only by the strictest observance of sanitary precautions.

Granting of Charter by Henry VIII. Was Celebrated in London on May 20.

London.-On May 20, 1514, King Henry VIII, who was the virtual founder of the British navy, granted a charter to the corporation of Trinity House, and on May 20, 1914, the brethren of the corporation celebrated the 400th anniversary by holding a banquet, to which the leading members of the government and of the opposition were invited.

The corporation of Trinity House has been unfortunate in the matter of fires. Their establishment in Water Lane suffered in the great fire, for, ac-

Mrs. Briley lives with her son, Dr. Nelson Briley, seventy-five, a colored veterinary. She was born in bondage on a Virginia plantation in 1779, the same year George Washington died, she says. Her own father, Tom Dawson, on whose plantation she was born Ky., and when she was but eleven years old she was taken to a Kentucky plantation, away from her mothor and associates.

"My old daddy promised me half the \$300 he got when he sold me, but I never seen any of the money or him again," she said. "I was christened twice, the first time Dawson and the next time Newhouse. I was married three times and I outlived them all

more than 40 years." Mrs. Briley dearly loves her pipe and smokes incessantly, often arising in the middle of the night for an extra pipe or two. "No, it don't hurt me," she said, "but it does me lots of good and makes me live longer. I like pop, too, and drink a bottle whenever
