It is tru that he hasn't the capacity to operate oil fields, run saw mills and preach the Gospel all at the same time successfully but he knows some things and is gener ally doing the best and righ things. The writer of the above pro bably has some grounds for the assertion that money can be saved by buying from a mai order house-in fact such is often the case. But the main issue, the wisdom of buying your supplies in Chicago, we very much doubt, even taking it from the standpoint of the far mer. Suppose, for instance, the farmer should buy all his sup plies by mail and pays expres or even local freight charges on it. What would he lose on shipment of flour or lumber

Another thing, suppose your rocer was located a thousand liles away and you get short of
lard or flour or some other necard or flour or some other nec-
essity. Where would you turn essity. Where would you turn for a suoply? Retail merchan dising is a benefit to the farmer or other citizen from the fact
hat he carries all the thing hat he carries all the things you need and you can buy as much as you may want or can pay for at a time and as often as you like. If you buy a spoiled ham or musty flour you return You can force the money back. You can force the home man to give you the best. Can you do
this with the man a thonand his with the man a thousand miles away? If you should take your patronage from the retail man how long would it be until dozen big mail order houses in as many foreign cities would ontrol the retailing of all mer chandise, and then how long would you have the cut prices hey are now offering? Would hey continue this philanthropic rice making? Hardly. The eliminating of the retail tores would be the means putting millions of men out of employment and there would be but one recourse for them-the arm. Say you put four million nore men to farming. There would be an enormous increase in the output of all farm crops and a corresponding decrease in onsumption. Then where could the price of cotton go, or corn, or any other product Who would buy your butter and ggs and your spring chickens Would you send Sears and Roebuch a dozen eggs and reques them to mail you a pound of coffee in return? In case you had no eggs would you drop them a card and ask them to mail you a pound of coffee and ou would pay for it next fall? There are many reasons why farmer or other citizen should trade with the home merchant There are also many reasons town should make soine arrange ments to handle all the products of the farm.
