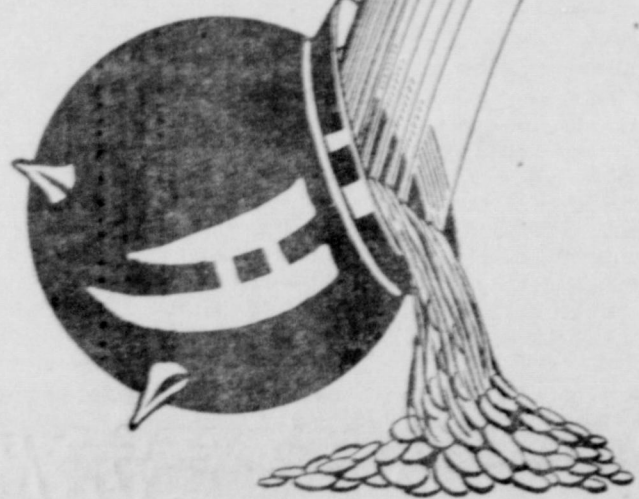

He was against his gravel wagon, and the several tons of dirt and large clods crushed him down against the wagon box which was made of 2x6's, covering him completely up and all of the wagon except the tops of the wheels and broke a good portion of the bed. O'Loughlin, who was passing soon after the accident noticed the team standing and the wagon covered, and on investigation could hear the groans of Mr. Kent and aid was soon coming.—Miami Chief.

Clarendon Boy Sees Service in Many Climes

Wherein Texas Law Takes Precedence of Federal Law

Austin, May 15.—The provision of the federal prohibition law which allows physicians permits for six quarts of liquor in a year will not be followed in Texas because the Texas prohibition laws do not provide for such permits, according to a decision reached at a conference between Clifford G. Beckham, federal prohibition officer for Texas, and the State Attorney General. The state law, under the agreement, is regarded as superior to the federal law.

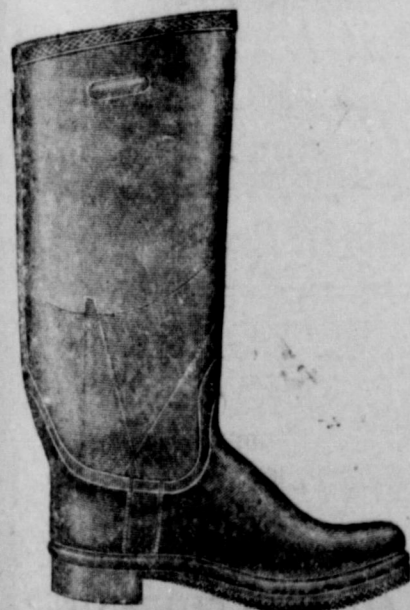
New Oil and Gas Paper at Amarillo

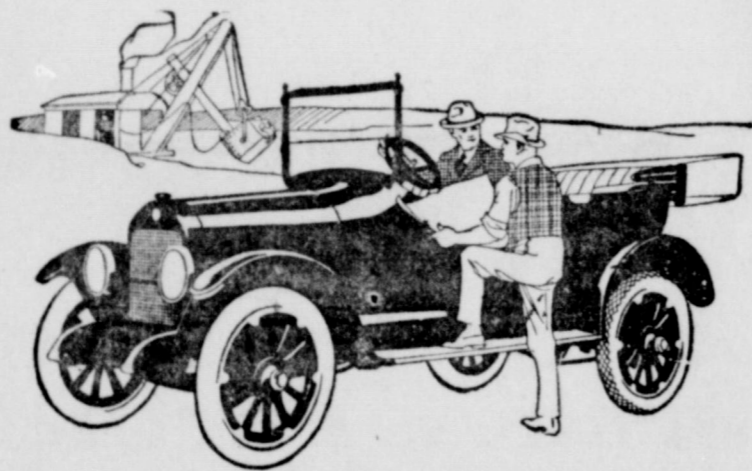

The Debate That Broke Up in a Fight

Wish I could attend just one more old time country debate like we used to have on Cave Creek. If I do say it myself, Cave Creek used to have some rattling good debaters. No one gazing into my modest, handsome face today would ever dream that once upon a time I was a famous debater. But I was. I began my career as a debater at the tender age of fourteen and reached the zenith of my fame four years later, or about the time the whisker bumps began to appear upon my chin.

I was not only an eloquent debater, but sometimes violent and frenzied and in my zeal to win the verdict had been known to bust my suspenders and rip my breeches in a most grievous manner. One of the most violent debates I ever took part in was the night we discussed at the Cave Creek school house the subject of the setting hen or which is entitled to be called the mother, the hen that lays the egg or the hen that hatches it. As far as I know, that question has not been settled even to this good day. If you think it has, just spring it on a crowd of men and boys and see how they will scrap over it. The night we argued it on Cave Creek it broke up in a fist fight and kept the people of Cave Creek divided for several years. I championed the cause of the setting hen and drew vivid pictures of the great self-sacrifice, patience and long suffering of the setting hen as compared to the hen that laid the egg. I certainly was severe on the shiftless society hen that was too proud and haughty to hatch her own eggs but gadded about with a lot of gay roosters and had a good time in general while her own dear sister was doing the family hatching. With a burst of eloquence I reached the peroration in my speech that caused my collar to work up over my ears, and amidst the deafening applause of the audience I told of the hardships, courage and devotion of the hen that set twenty-one long, weary days and nights on a nest of eggs that her high faluten sisters had laid and were too lazy to hatch, and for no greater reward than to be a step-mother to a nestful of fuzzy chickens.

The close of my speech was dramatic in the extreme and the audience was visibly affected. These were my closing words and they were remembered on Cave Creek for many years afterwards: "Mr. President, honorable judges, ladies and gentlemen, who among you would not shed his or her last drop of blood in defense of his or her title to mother of a brood of chickens that he, she, her or him or it had been squatting over for three long weeks?"

I cast a triumphant glance over the audience when I sat down and knew good and well that Bill Jenkins, my ignorant opponent, who was to follow me, could never answer my persuasive logic; and, he and I being of the same age and each of our sweethearts being present, I was proud he was to follow me.

Bill saw he couldn't answer me with logic and intelligent reasoning, so he employed the low, coarse tactics of ridicule. Just to show how coarse and unrefined he was, the very first thing he said when he arose to oppose me was, "I shore hope Joe will get over that speech he has been yelling and whooping out to us and has not busted a blood vessel or tore any of his insides loose in his fool efforts to prove that any darn thing that happens to hatch an egg ought to be called its mother." He said, "I hain't got no desire to be the mammy of a brood of chickens but if Joe wants to be the mammy of a brood of chickens and scratch for bugs and worms and cluck to them it is no one's business but his. A hen ain't got much sense and Joe might make a real smart hen." He closed by saying, "You folks who believe Joe would make a real good hen rise to your feet." The two men fought for hours atop a bluff, so history records, until finally Poe tripped the Indian, knocked him senseless with Big Foot's own tomahawk and threw him into the Ohio river.
