HOMES FOR FARMERS PLENTIFUL

McLean is situated in the southeast corner of Gray county, one of the four banner counties of the Panhandle (Collingsworth, Wheeler, Donley and Gray) and has a population of about 1000 people. The town is situated on the main line of the Rock Island from Tucumcari, N. M., to Memphis, Tenn., connecting her with the large markets of the country by direct route.

Climate

The climate is as fine as could be desired, the average summer temperature being 73 degrees, while that of the winter season is 47 degrees, making the climate at no time during the year uncomfortable. The altitude is about 2600 feet. Another feature of the climate is the fact that at no time during the hottest summer weather are the nights oppressive, there always being a cool breeze which makes them delightful.

Schools

She has an independent school district with a special tax of fifty cents on the one hundred dollar property valuation, which will provide abundant funds for the best school system in the state. The fact that there were over five hundred pupils enrolled during the last scholastic term shows the popularity of her educational advantages.

Society

The town has no saloons, pool halls, gambling houses nor other obnoxious institutions of any character. There are four church buildings of ample proportions to meet the demands and the necessity for a jail is absolutely unknown. In fact, the town offers every advantage to the man who is looking for a home where he can raise his children in a moral atmosphere, minus the many snares and vices that abound in the larger cities and towns of the country.

Available Land

This county is composed of nine hundred sections of land, making 576,000 acres, about eighty per cent of which is good tillable soil of a rich sandy loam, some dark and some light, all of hich is as rich as can be found anywhere in the southwest, and holding moisture it is unsurpassed in any section of the United Barkeites. There are at present about 500 men farming in this counnaking an average of 1000 acres to the man, while 100 acres is all that can be properly cultivated. Figured on a basis of 200 acres to the family there is room in this county for 2,500 famihes. This land ranges in price from \$5 to \$15 an acre, with a reasonable valuation where there are improvements.

Rainfall

The average annual rainfall for the period covered by the government bureau at this place is about 26 inches, distributed in months as follows: January .63, February .13, March .47, April 2.18, May 1.14, June 5.87, July 3.91, August 5.99, September, 1.39, October 3.35, November .43, and December 1.32. These figures are taken from the official weather report and show that the main rainfall comes during the growing season, which is from May to September, inclusive. This report is not compiled from the records so far in 1909 as the seasons have been backward and the rainfall very light, crops making only about one-half the usual yield. However it is authentically stated by honest men of the community who have farmed this land for the past twenty years that there has been but one failure in that time, a disaster that befalls every known section of the globe on occasion.

Crops

All crops adapted to the temperate zone thrive here, but the root crops probably are the most prolific, such as Irish and yam potatoes, peanuts, beets, onions, etc. Watermelons and cantaloupes grow as fine as they do in any part of the world and the flavor developed is absolutely unsurpassed. Corn is the staple crop, making an average yield, the county over, of about thirty bushels to the acre. Cotton is not advisable from the fact that there is too much rain during the growing season and the nights are too cool. Wheat, oats and millet are especially productive and kaffir corn, milo maize and sorghum never fail. All kinds of garden crops grow in profusion. It is said of this soil that it responds quicker and with more certainty to fertilizing than any in the state, making truck gardening not only profitable but sure.

Fruit

This section is the natural home of all temperate zone fruits and there has been but two fruit failures in the past twenty years. All varieties grow in profusion and a full grown orchard will clear at least \$100 per acre with less work than in any other portion of the state. There is an opportunity for vast fortunes in this section with fruit.

Markets

McLean has as a market Amarillo on the west (with 15,000 people and constantly growing) a distance of 72 miles, and Oklahoma City on the east (with 40,000 and growing faster than any other city in the world) a distance of 200 miles. This assures us a market for everything that can be grown in this section.

In Conclusion



RUSSIAN ILLITERACY.

There hardly could be a stronger condemnation of autocracy than the record of illiteracy of the Russian empire. Seventy-five per cent, of the recruits for the army, in which service is compulsory, can neither read nor write. Newspapers are published, not for the masses, but for an educated minority. The principal paper in the capital of the empire has a circulation of only 33,000 and others with an international reputation have only about one-third that many subscribers. With these facts before us there is no room to wonder at the backwardness of the Russian empire and no one can fail to perceive why it has typified mere brute strength in the affairs of the world and was feared for that reason alone until the giant was laid prostrate by the intelligence of a smaller and physically weaker nation. Were czardom the benevole t institution that its beneficiaries and advocates would have the world believe the people of Russia would not be sunk in such depths of ignorance as is shown by unimpeachable records. If Russia is to have the place among nations to which its population and area entitle it vastly more money will have to be spent on schools.

The new commissioner of immigration at Eilis Island is doing good service to the immigrants, not only by finding employment for many of them or directing them to eligible localities in which to settle with their families, but also by guarding them from the machinations of designing persons. He has refused to admit to the station or to Ellis Island the representatives of immigrant homes and employment bureaus which are obviously run for private gain and have in many instances preyed upon the ignorance and the confidence of the new arrivals. This is good work by the commissioner, and his vigilance should not be relaxed, for the abuses which he has abolished for the moment would quickly spring up again if given

Although the battleships Alabama, Maine, Kentucky and Kearsarge are Many a man attributes his business comparatively new additions to the mission for heavy repairs, which in the case of the Maine in particular will amount almost to reconstruction. In addition to work on her hull, the Maine will have to receive a new battery of boilers. The rapidity with which battleships become worn and obsolete is surprising to those who have been imagining that navies built of steel are good for many decades of service with little expense or repairs. The truth is that these big ships must be undergoing protective "tinkering" all the time, from the date of launching until that of final retirement.

"A girl in her 'teens doesn't know her own mind, and cannot know the heart of the man she marries at that age." Such is the sage contribution of the dowager countess of Cardigan to a discussion now in progress in London as to the ideal age for marriage. The text of the discussion was the dictum of a western girl, who broke her engagement on the ground that "no woman should marry before she is 25." Certainly no woman and no man should marry before arriving at physical maturity. This is reached at different ages by different individuals. As a rule it is a grave error for people in northern climates to marry before they are of legal age.

HOW TO SAVE LAUNDRY WORK

Hints on Clothing for the Woman of Limited Means with Family.

For the woman of limited means who desires many changes of attire for herself and family, the laundry in summer and autumn will be a source of expense or a heavy tax on her physical strength if she does the work herself.

One woman's personal experience has found the seersuckers and cotton crepes so much in vogue this season to be great savers of money and labor.

A cotton crepe waist may be a very elaborate affair, made of imported goods, ornamented with hand-embroidery and Irish lace. As so many women embroider well and are adept at making Irish lace, the cost of a waist in their case would be only the material, while for its future well-being washing only is necessary.

Cheaper crepons make serviceable every-day waists, while seersucker of pure white or white with a colored stripe will make work dresses, underskirts and aprons.

Rompers for children may be made of this same serviceable material. Crepon also makes excellent negligee shirts.

There is a strong prejudice against unironed clothes, which, if overcome, would lighten the housekeeper's bur-

Stockings and knit underwear do not need ironing. Taken from the line they have a fresh, wholesome country scent, which is wholly lost after the clothes are ironed. With the larger pieces of a washing sent to a laundry as "flat work," stockings and underwear worn unironed and seersucker and crepon used for dresses and shirt-waists a housekeeper would see a visible reduction of expense and a saving of health and strength.

USE FOR THE OLD SHEETS

Thrifty Housewife Tacks Them Up in Closet to Protect Her Best Gowns

When I find that an old sheet has become too worn to turn or use in any way, explains a thrifty housewife, I take it to tack up in a closet behind my best gowns. Another may have brass rings sewn on the side at intervals and the rings slipped over small nails driven in above the hooks on which the gowns are hung. Many people use carico or chintz curtains for this purpose, but to me a sheet always has the appearance of being much cleaner, while the gowns are protected from dust. I have several old linen sheets, which have been cut in half, seed!" and when packing a trunk I find these convenient in which to do up one or two light gowns.

Potato Soup.

Five potatoes, one onion, four slices of bacon cut very thin, a pint of milk. a dessertspoonful of Worcestershire sauce, a tablespoonful of flour, one tablespoonful of butter, a teaspoonful of salt, half a saltspoonful of black pepper and a dash of cayenne or paprika. Pare and dice the potatoes. Slice the onion and the bacon and fry together until brown. Put the potatoes with the bacon and onion into a deep saucepan and cover with boiling water. Cook until the potatoes are tender. Rub the flour and butter to gether, add the hot milk, stir until mixed and pour gradually on to the potatoes. Let the soup boil until ft thickens, add the Worcestershire sauce.

Canned Food Dangers.

Dr. Kate Lindsay, in a magazine article, warns housekeepers about leaving canned vegetables and fruits in the cans after they are opened, and also about leaving metal spoons in the fruit or vegetables. It is well to insist upon pure food, she says, but there are certain household regulations that must be observed or the purest food will become impure.

Pineapple Sherbet.

This is made from the grated canned pineapple. Add a pint of water to a pint of the pineapple and cook 15 minutes. Strain through cheescloth, add a teaspoonful of gelatin that has been soaked in a quarter of a cupful of cold water, the juice of a large lemon and a cupful of sugar. Strain and freeze. Serve in glasses after the roast or before the game course at a heavy dinner as an aid to digestion. A bit of the sliced pineapple can be put on top of each

Tomato Marmalade.

Pare and slice four quarts of ripe tomatoes, add four pounds of granulated sugar, six large lemons and one cup of seeded raisins. Put these in a kettle in layers and cook one hour or until quite thick. Pack in jars and cover with paraffin.-Good Housekeep-

IN CLEANING HOUSE

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ONE ROOM OR SUITE SHOULD BE DONE AT A TIME.

Sultable Clothing and Necessary Materials-How to Whip Carpets and Ruge-Clean Papered Walls with Mop of Cheescloth.

In housecleaning do not undertake oo much at once; clean one room or set of rooms, at a time and observe rder in doing it. Dress practically in ose, neat clothes that will admit of stooping, reaching, stretching and lift-A waist with a comfortably low neck and short sleeves, attached to a hort skirt is an ideal garment for this sort of work. A dusting cap should cover the hair and gloves should be worn whenever practical.

The materials needed for housecleaning should all be in readiness a couple of days before they are needed, so that no time will be lost in waiting for supplies after the work has once started.

There will be needed plenty of soap. borax, household ammonia, scouring soaps, alcohol, turpentine, benzine and erosene. Then there are scrubbing brushes, brooms, chamois, mops, plenty of washcloths, scrubbing pails, and, if there are hardwood floors, polishing pads and oils for use in cleaning and restoring them. The work will move much more rapidly and with a great deal less inconvenience if all these supplies are on hand before the actual work is commenced.

The carpets and rugs should be removed first. The carpet should be thoroughly swept and wiped over carefully with a cloth wrung out of tepid water into which a tablespoonful of ammonia has been added to each gallon of water. Remove the tacks and carefully fold one-half the carpet back upon the other. Sweep the exposed underside with a stiff broom, fold again in half and sweep the remaining underside of the carpet. Take the carpet to a grass plot and lay wrong side up, beat carefully with long, limber switches. Or it may be hung on the line, right side in, and beaten in

After whipping sweep the wrong side twice with a broom that has been wet in cold, clear water, care being taken to shake all the drops of water from it. Turn on the right side and sweep carefully. If the colors have become faded and dim it may be worth while to use prepared ox-gall, a tablespoonful to a gallon, in the water from which the cloths are wrung in soing over the carpet after the sweeping. Hang to dry and air, taking particular pains to see that the carpet hangs straight.

If the walls are papered and need cleaning they should receive attention before the floors are wet.

To clean papered walls a mop of cheesecloth strips, about an inch wide and nine inches long, made fast to a light handle, is the best thing to use. Brush the paper well with it.

Removing Ink Stains.

When ink has fallen on white linen it should be immediately dipped in buttermilk, if it is convenient, otherwise in sweet milk. Repeat until signs of the spots have vanished. If the ink has hardened, several of the commercial eradicators can be trusted to take out the spot without holes. The woman who fears to use acids will have to fall back on lemon and sait plentifully applied with hours in a hot sun.

Pickled Onions.

Peel small onions until they are white. Scald them in salt and water until they are tender, and put them into wide-mouthed bottles. Pour over them hot spiced vinegar. When cold cork tightly and keep on a dry, dark

To Serve Hard-Boiled Eggs.

Sometimes hard-boiled eggs are left over. Then prepare them to use in this way: Melt one tablespoonful of butter and stir two tablespoonfuls of flour in the melted butter, then pour one plat of milk and stir while cooking and cook until it thickens. Then chop the eggs as fine as peas. Pour the white sauce over them, add a few cracker crumbs and salt and pepper. Then mold in the shape of an egg and roll in cracker crumbs and fry in butter.

Rice and Fruit. One teacupful of rice, 116 pints of

nilk, sugar, stewed fruit. Put the rice and milk into a double saucepan and let it cook slowly till the rice has taken up all the milk, but it must not be dry. Make a wall of it on a dish and fill the center with nicely stewed fruit.

Fried Onlone and Apples. Take six onions and fry them until almost done, then add three apples. Fry in bacon fat. If your family is arge you can add more.

FALL PAINTING

The majority of property owners are under the impression that spring time is the only painting time. But the fall of the year offers several advantages to the painter. 
