Based on a projection of a 4.5 increase over last year, Friou predicts approximately 1,200,000 fishing licenses will be sold before Sept. 1, 1968.

Since persons over 65 and under 17 years-of-age are not required to have a fishing license, there is a significant number of unlicensed fishermen as well.

The population increase in Texas from 1967 to 1968 was 2.3 percent.
