## McLean Observes National 4-H Week Tuesday Is Lions Farm-Ranch Day

During National 4-H Club Week (Sept. 28-Oct. 2), the nation pays tribute to 4-H, the club leaders, parents of 4-H'ers and county and state extension service workers. Good wishes are in order for those who encourage, train and guide 4-H boys and girls everywhere.

4-H is no longer confined to farmers' sons and daughters. During the past decade 4-H has adjusted to change: Families leaving the farm for towns and cities; the mushrooming of suburbia; the unprecedented advance of technology and science; the expanding interests and needs of youth.

"Learning for Living" is the theme of the 1965 National 4-H Club Week. For more than 50 years 4-H Clubs have guided young people in their personal development.

There are approximately 2 1/4 million 4-H boys and girls in this country. Their motto is "To Make the Best Better."

The 4-H pledge is one that everyone should try to live by: "I pledge my Head to clearer thinking, my Heart to greater loyalty, my Hands to larger service, and my Health to better living for my club, my community and my country."

A student pilot, Robert E. Westbrook of 5405 S. Dewey, Oklahoma City, was forced to land his Sessna 175 in a field of shoulder-high switch grass four miles west of McLean on Sept. 19. He was attempting to reach the El Paso landing strip.

Westbrook had left Amarillo flying low because of heavy fog. He attempted to return to Amarillo, but fog had closed in from that direction. He landed in a driving rain about 100 yards east of the Frank Howard residence, just missing a landing strip on the west side of Howard's house by 200 yards.

With Mr. Howard's help, the plane was pulled to the landing strip, from which Westbrook took off a week later. The plane was undamaged.

### McLEAN TIGERS SWAMP PIRATES FOR 2ND WIN

The McLean Tigers successfully battled the Lefors Pirates at Duncan Stadium Friday night for a non-conference tilt. In a fast, action-filled game which tried both the offense and defense of both teams, the Tigers came out on top by a score of 22-0.

The first quarter ended scoreless, with both teams showing well on defense. After receiving the kickoff, the Pirates were held for four downs and were forced to punt. A strong-willed Pirate defense then held the Tigers for four downs, and they were faced with a punt situation. After recovering a Tiger fumble, the Pirates started toward Tiger territory, but were unable to penetrate through the Tiger line past the 42 yard line.

A successful McLean touchdown drive was started in the second quarter, with Clovis Bible, senior end, carrying from the 30 to the Lefors five yard line. Two plays later, Steve Fuller, sophomore fullback, charged across from the two yard line, chalking up a 6-0 lead in favor of McLean. The try for extra points failed.

The third quarter brought another Tiger score, with Steve Fuller breaking loose from the Pirate defense and scampering for a 40-yard touchdown. Freshman quarterback Joel McCarty ran over for the extra points and the score stood at McLean 14, Lefors 0.

The fourth quarter saw some great defensive play by the Tiger squad, with Raymond Baker and Bryan Parker, junior tackles, doing a fine job, nailing the Pirate ball-carrier a number of times. In the latter part of the quarter, senior end Doyle McCurley who did a great job on blocking during the game, ran 37 yards for the final Tiger TD. Jimmy Hester ran the conversion, making the score 22-0 in favor of the Tigers.

This week the Tigers will go to Wheeler to face the rough Wheeler Mustangs. The Mustangs, led by All-State hopefuls Dan Dorman and Bobby Vanpool, will probably be the toughest team the Tigers have faced so far this year. Kick-off time will be 8 p.m.

The Tigers stand at two wins and one loss for the season.

Soil and Water Conservation Districts of Texas will celebrate their 25th anniversary during their annual meeting in Corpus Christi on Oct. 12, 13 and 14. The meeting will be in the Robert Driscoll Hotel.

There are 183 soil and water conservation districts in Texas, covering better than 99% of the land area with over 160,000 landowner cooperators. There are five supervisors on the governing body of each district, totaling 915 supervisors in Texas.

Your local district board is composed of Milton Carpenter, chairman; Stan Friend, vice chairman; Curtis Schaffer, secretary; W. C. Epperson and James Cliett, members. These soil and water conservation district supervisors are unpaid, elected officials given many responsibilities under their enabling act. Responsibilities include control and prevention of erosion, thereby preserving natural resources; control floods, prevent impairment of dams and reservoirs, assist in maintaining navigability of rivers and harbors, preserve wildlife, protect the tax base, protect public lands, and promote the health, safety and general welfare of this state.

**State Highway Patrol  
Needs 70 Men**

State police are looking for 70 men.

They need to find that many qualified applicants by Nov. 29 to make up the next class for the Department of Public Safety's Law Enforcement Academy.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director, said DPS trainees get \$375 a month while in the 16 weeks course, then start work at \$433 or \$458 a month, depending on the type work to which they are assigned.

After a year they advance to \$468 or \$484, depending on the branch of service, and after five years get \$10 a month longevity pay. A life amount is added each five years.

Patrolmen get two weeks' vacation, 12 or more holidays a year, and 12 days sick leave.

Application forms may be obtained at Department of Public Safety offices.

The life of a dollar bill is 13 to 14 months.

**INSTEAD OF BANKRUPTCY**

To the wage earner drowning in a sea of debt, the Bankruptcy Act offers two kinds of rescue. One is bankruptcy itself, whereby most of a person's debts are wiped out. Last year about 155,000 individuals chose that course.

The second alternative, although not so well known, has been gaining favor steadily in recent years. Called the Wage Earner Plan, it is designed for the person who is ready, willing and able (eventually) to pay his debts—if only he can have a breathing spell to put his finances in better shape.

Although the Wage Earner Plan is administered by the bankruptcy court, the debtor continues to be called a "debtor," never a "bankrupt." In a typical case it works this way:

The debtor agrees to turn over a fixed percentage of his weekly wages to a court-appointed trustee, who makes regular payments to the creditors. In return, the debtor is protected from wage attachments and most other forms of pressure by creditors.

In short, the Wage Earner Plan gives a debtor time to pay his debts gradually, under the protecting wing of the court. It requires an OK by a majority of the unsecured creditors, and also by the court.

Under what circumstances will the court approve a debtor's application? There are two main tests:

1. Financial—The debtor's earnings must be large enough, in proportion to his debt burden, to give a reasonable chance of success. As a rule, the court will approve only if his debts can be paid off in not more than three years, using not more than 25 per cent of his income.

2. Moral—The debtor must have an earnest desire to make good on his obligations, even at the cost of prolonged, belt-tightening and penny-pinching. And, in most cases, his wife must share that desire.

The Wage Earner Plan is not an easy alternative. Nevertheless, last year about 27,000 debtors chose that way of keeping the stigma of bankruptcy from their record.

For, even though debt is not considered as sinful as it once was, there still are a lot of job applications and credit forms that ask the question: "Were you ever a bankrupt?"

And there still is comfort in being a person who, like Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's village blacksmith, "looks the whole world in the face, for he owes not any man."

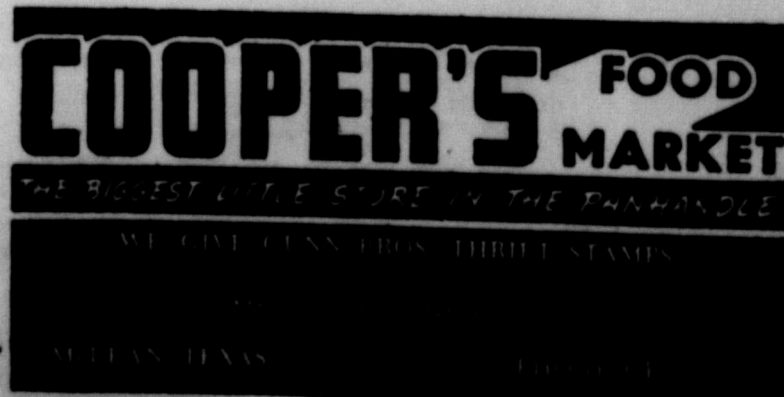

Another of the changes in Social Security made by the 1965 amendments is the one that eliminates remarriage as a basis for ending widows' benefit checks in some situations, according to Geldon.  
Any widow who was receiving social security benefits based on her deceased husband's social security record, and saw them ended due to her remarriage, should get in touch with the social security office at once.

The 1965 provisions will let her receive either one-half of her former husband's basic amount, or one-half of her present husband's retirement amount (slightly reduced if she is between 62 and 65), whichever is the higher, Geldon went on.

For example, Mrs. A began to receive \$82.50 per month at age 62, based on Mr. A's social security record. At age 64 she married a man who was not entitled to social security benefits at that time, so her checks were stopped. Geldon says that she may now begin to receive \$50 on her former husband's record. Later, if her present husband becomes entitled to retirement benefits of more than \$100 per month, her checks can be raised to one-half of his.

Anyone who feels that this change applies to her, should get in touch with her Amarillo Social Security office promptly.

AN ORDINANCE TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND PROMOTE THE PUBLIC WELFARE OF THE CITY OF McLEAN, TEXAS, BY PROVIDING FOR THE FILLING UP AND DRAINAGE OF LOTS THAT SHALL HAVE UNWHOLESOME PLACE OR PLACES WHERE STAGNANT WATER MAY ACCUMULATE THEREON; THE CLEANING OF ANY BUILDING OR PREMISES OF FILTH, CARRIAGE OR OTHER IMPURE AND UNWHOLESOME MATTER; REQUIRING OWNERS OR OCCUPANTS OF LOTS IN THE CITY OF McLEAN TO KEEP SAID LOTS FREE FROM WEEDS, RUBBISH, BRUSH AND OTHER UNSIGHTLY OR INSANITARY MATTER; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE TO BE GIVEN TO OWNERS OR PREMISES IN CASE OF FAILURE OF OWNER TO MAKE LOTS AND/OR PREMISES SANITARY AND TO SIGHTLY THAT THE SAME MAY BE DONE AT THE EXPENSE OF THE CITY OF McLEAN; PROVIDING FOR THE FIXING OF A LIEN AGAINST SUCH LOTS FOR SUCH IMPROVEMENTS; PROVIDING FOR UNCONSTITUTIONALITY; REPEALING CERTAIN ORDINANCES; AND PROVIDING PUBLICATION, AND PENALTY.

WHEREAS, it is deemed by the City Council of the City of McLean, Texas, that it is dangerous to the public health for lots in the City of McLean to have places thereon where stagnant water may accumulate and for filth, carriage or other impure and unwholesome matter to accumulate on lots in said city and that it is dangerous to public health and constitutes a fire hazard to have weeds, brush, rubbish, and other unsightly and insanitary matter on lots in the City of McLean; and

WHEREAS, it is expressly provided by the provisions of Article 4536, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, that cities shall have the power to correct the evils hereinbefore recited.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF McLEAN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation who shall own or occupy any lot or place in the City of McLean, Texas, to permit or allow holes or places on said lots where water may accumulate and become stagnant, or to permit same to remain.

SECTION 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation shall own or occupy any lot or lots in the City of McLean, Texas, to permit or allow the accumulation of stagnant water thereon, or to permit same to remain.

SECTION 3. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation who shall own or occupy any house, buildings, establishment, lot or yard in the City of McLean, Texas, to permit any carriage, filth or other impure or unwholesome matter to accumulate or remain thereon.

SECTION 4. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation who shall own or occupy any lot or lots in the City of McLean, Texas, to allow weeds, rubbish, brush or other unsightly, objectionable or insanitary matter to accumulate or grow on said lot or lots.

SECTION 5. Should any owner of said lot or lots that have places thereon where stagnant water may accumulate and/or which are not properly drained, or the owner of any premises or building upon which carriage, filth or other impure or unwholesome matter may be fall and/or refuse to drain and/or fill the same lot or lots, or remove such filth, carriage or other impure or unwholesome matter, as the case may be, within ten days after notice to said owner to do so, in writing, or by letter addressed to such owner at his postoffice address or within ten days after notice by publication as many as two times within ten consecutive days in any newspaper in Texas, if personal service, may not be had as aforesaid, or if the owner's address be not known; then in that event, the City of McLean, Texas, may do such filling or draining, or removal of filth, carriage, etc., or any other unsightly, objectionable or insanitary matter, or cause the same to be done and may pay therefor and charge the expenses incurred in doing such work or having such work done or improvements made to the owner of such lots or real estate, and if such work is done or improvements made at the expense of the City of McLean, Texas, then such expense or expenses shall be assessed on the real estate, or lots upon which such expense was incurred.

SECTION 6. Should any owner of any lot or lots within the City of McLean, Texas, who shall allow weeds, rubbish, brush or other unsightly, objectionable or insanitary matter to grow or accumulate thereon, fail and/or refuse to cut down and/or remove such weeds, rubbish, brush or other unsightly,

objectionable or insanitary matter, as the case may be, within ten days after notice to said owner to do so, in writing, or by letter addressed to such owner at his post office address, or within ten days after notice by publication as many as two consecutive times within ten consecutive days in any newspaper in Texas, may do such cutting down and/or removing such weeds, rubbish, brush or any other unsightly, objectionable or insanitary matter, or cause the same to be done and may pay therefor and charge the expenses incurred in doing such work or having such work done or improvements made to the owner of such lot or lots or real estate; and, if such work is done or improvements made at the expense of the City of McLean, Texas, then such expenses shall be assessed on the real estate, or lot or lots upon which such expense was incurred.

SECTION 7. The Mayor or City Health Officer of the City of McLean, Texas, shall file a statement of such expenses incurred under Section 5 or under Section 6 of this ordinance, as the case may be, giving the amount of such expenses, the date on which said work was done or improvements made, with the County Clerk of Gray County, Texas, and the City of McLean, Texas, shall have a privileged lien on such lot or lots or real estate upon which said work was done or improvements made to secure the expenditures so made, in accordance with the provisions of said Article 4536, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas which said lien shall be second only to tax liens and liens for street improvements; and said amount shall bear ten percent interest from the date said statement was filed. It is further provided that for any such expenditures, and interest, as aforesaid, suit may be instituted and recovery and foreclosure of said lien may be had in the name of the City of McLean, Texas, and the statement of expenses so made, as aforesaid, or a certified copy thereof, shall be prima facie proof of the amount expended or such work or improvements.

SECTION 8. ANY person, firm or individual who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) and each and every day's violation shall constitute a separate and distinct offense, in case the owner or occupant of any lot, lots or premises under the provisions of this ordinance shall be a corporation, and shall violate any provision of this ordinance, the president, vice president, secretary, treasurer of such corporation or any manager, agent or employee of such corporation shall be also severally liable for the penalties herein provided.

SECTION 9. THAT if any part of this ordinance is, or should be held invalid for any reason, then that fact shall not invalidate the entire ordinance, but the balance thereof shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 10. All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 11. Notice of the enactment of this ordinance shall be given by publication in the official newspaper of this City; and this ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after its publication.

**Panhandle Deer Increase In 1965**

Both white-tailed and mule deer, in brushy canyons and river bottoms traversing the Texas Panhandle, will be more plentiful this year than in 1964, according to Biologist Richard DeArment of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department staff.  
Panhandle deer densities have never been high in comparison to hill country herds, but what Panhandle deer lack in numbers is made up for in size, noted DeArment. White-tailed bucks weighing 150-200 pounds on the hoof are not uncommon on the Washita and Canadian Rivers in eastern Panhandle counties.  
The Palo Duro Canyon, southeast of Amarillo and the Canadian River area south of Dalhart, supports stable mule deer herds from which most Panhandle mule deer are harvested, said the biologist.  
In 1964, 246 mule deer and 299 white-tailed deer were harvested by sportsmen.

Miss Lillian Abbott, graduate of West Texas State Teachers College, and former teacher in the McLean High School, will teach history in the Clarendon High School this fall.

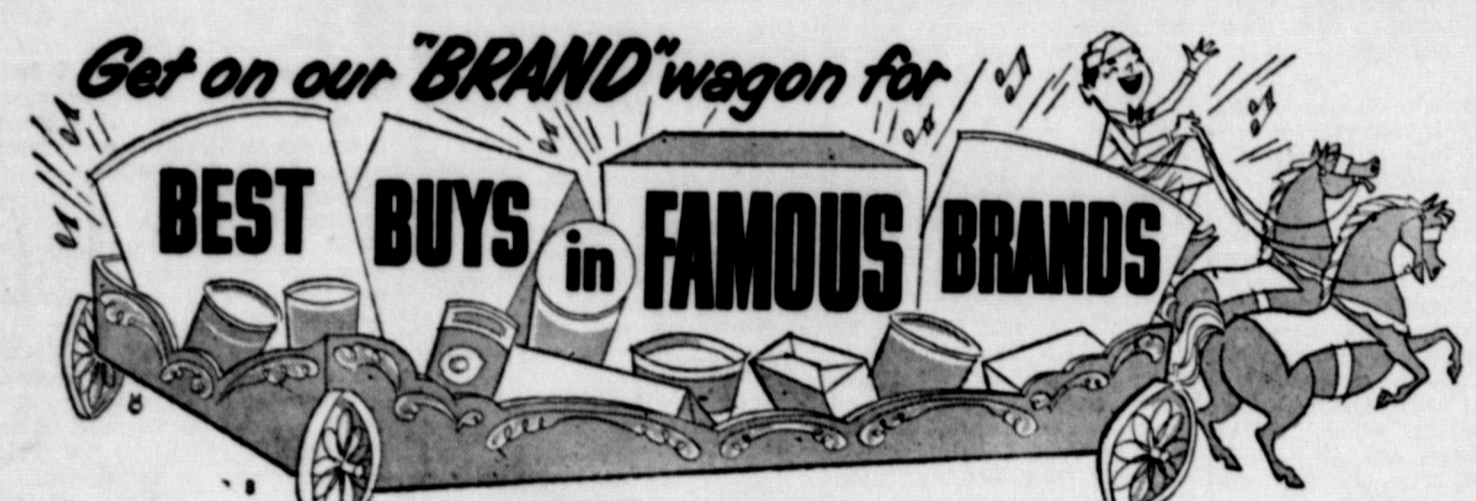
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
