## Many Fishing Ponds In Wheeler County

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District is blessed with many fishing areas capable of producing a string of fish. The most productive fishing areas are those farm ponds having year around water in them. These are usually on an intermittent stream, or having a large, high yielding watershed, or, are in a high water table such as seep ponds.

If you have such a location, you can get technical assistance from your Soil Conservation Service. If there is no permanent livestock water available within a reasonable distance, you may draw cost share assistance for the construction of the pond.

You may obtain fish to stock the pond from the SCS, Extension Service or the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

# LOOKIN' BACK

McLean made history in 1913-14 and many of the actors on this specific historical stage will have a reunion at the Alanreed-McLean Historical Society this coming Sunday.

The October 22, 1913 issue of the McLean News carried the following first-page story: "On Saturday afternoon McLean will play a matched game of Basketball at the school campus against Shamrock. Afterwards the girls from each town will stage an exhibition game."

This announcement started phones ringing, tongues wagging, and bets to be made. Though not a person in town, including the boys and girls themselves and their coach, Supt. J. R. Durrett, had ever witnessed such a contest, much less participated in one, everybody in town became rabid fans and plans were made to attend this new-fangled game and root for the old home town.

Mothers dusted off their sewing machines and spent hours shopping for the best bargain in black saten at either C. A. Cash and Sons, Lee Brothers, or at Wise and Beall's. It would take yards upon yards to make those extra full bloomers that bloused over their long black stockings. There must also be a long generously full middy blouse of black to protect their curly locks, the girls wore white and black caps with the bill twisted jauntily to the side. Those composing this Bloomer Girls team were an attractive group, as shown by the accompanying picture.

The boys brushed off their white nickers and gave their sisters a dime to wash their long black stockings and black turtle-neck sweater so they would be ready for their initial game. They played Shamrock and the score was 16 to 8, McLean's favor.

The game was to have been played at 3:00 o'clock but had to be postponed until 5:30 because the west-bound train was late. Local line-up: Raymond Glass, right goal position; Johnnie Back, left goal; Bryant Henry, center; Andrew Jordan, left guard; and Dolph Burrows, right guard.

The Bloomer girls were not so fortunate as the boys. They went down in defeat before the well-trained Shamrock Colleens. Members of the Bloomer girls were: Mollie Gardenhire, Grace Whately, Mabel Upham, Etta Storts, Sallie Lou Haynes, Virgie Heasley and Frankie Mae Upham.

Supt. Durrett acted as umpire, according to the News; Prof. Vanbuskirk from Shamrock, as referee; Wayland Floyd and Prof. Hendricks of the visitors, were time-keepers, and J. L. Upham kept score.

There was a return match in Shamrock that McLean would like to forget. McLean players and fans went down on the 11:00 o'clock train (90c round trip) and expected to return on the afternoon train which was usually several hours late. On this particular day, the west-bound was on time so the McLean group was compelled to ride a freight back home.

Line-up for McLean: Ed Newton, center; R. Glass and J. Back, goal pitchers; Bryant Henry, Andrew Jordan, guards. The News made no mention of a girls game at this time. What about it, Bloomer Girls, did you play?

It was the middle of November when the McLean boys suffered humiliation to the Nth degree. It wasn't that they lost their game to Clarendon. It was because at this game they realized for the first time that they—stalwart young men boastful of their masculinity—had been playing under girls rules. Local line-up for McLean was: Ed Newton, Dolph Burrows, Fred Thompson, R. Glass and J. Back. In the second half Bryant Henry went in for Burrows and Andrew

Jordan took Thompson's place.

Thanksgiving week was basketball week in McLean. Wednesday night the local campus was lighted with kerosene balls at intervals around the basketball court as various local teams engaged in spirited games while hundreds of spectators applauded. This was McLean's first night game and perhaps the first night contest in the entire Panhandle. Even the women teachers entered into the spirit of things and played the eighth grade girls. There were only six women on the faculty, so it is assumed that all of them played. They were Misses Emma McAfee, Susie Guill, Isabell Lewis, Fanny Boyles, Annie Dalrymple and Laura Newton.

McLean boys went over to Clarendon for a game with both the college and high school and dropped both games. They sought to soothe their feelings by winning over Jericho on their way home, but a heavy rain wet the court and that game was not played.

When they defeated Erick, Okla. here, the sensation of the day came when Fred Thompson sank a shot from the center line at the last minute of the game. That evening a musical and game party was given the players, both local and visiting, at the L. O. Floyd home.

At mid-term Supt. Durrett reported in the local paper: Teachers are pleased with the interest shown by pupils in athletics. The leaders on the basketball court are the leaders in the classrooms. Not a single cigarette smoker has been able to

make the first team.

In February McLean, both boys and girls, played Alanreed. Boys won, girls lost. A week later a three-cornered game (McLean's first basketball tournament) with Shamrock, Alanreed and McLean was held in McLean. Admission of 25c for adults, 10c for children was charged. This marked the beginning of paid athletics in McLean. As an added attraction a matched game between Alanreed and McLean girls was played. No charge!

In the game with Shamrock, Ed Newton amused himself by playing rings around his opponents and scoring 16 individual points. Johnnie Back immortalized himself by breaking all previous records as he accounted for 21 points. McLean guards allowed the ball to touch the Shamrock's backstop only twice during the first half. Rondo Dandympole substituted for Jordan during the second half.

Alanreed played McLean's second string, 22 to 2 in favor of McLean. McLean's line-up, Phillips, Foster, Dalrymple, Jordan and Wayland Floyd. Alanreed's players were, Austin, Phillips, Johnson, Harris and Roby.

By the time the editor had finished extolling the virtues of the local boys, he was either too tired or had run out of type, so again we find no mention of the girls teams.

McLean boys defeated Headley for the grand finale of the year, 34 to 13.

In the fall of 1914, Billie Biggers and Herman Glass organized an athletic association and

several games were played under their auspices. According to the News, the players were, Johnnie Back, Doyle Foster, Joe Glass, Giles Phillips and Kester Rippy. (Kester says this must have been Harold, as he wasn't much of a ball player.) One girl was added to the Bloomer Girls roster—Mary Henry.

Evan Sitter recalls that Giles Phillips—when he found no one near the goal posts—would haul off, from anywhere on the court, and aim at the backstop and more times than not the ball would drop through the hoops for a score.

This is only a part of the story of basketball's beginning in McLean. Want to hear more? Then be at the school cafeteria Sunday afternoon, July 28, at 2:30. A number of those early players will be there and others will send letters to be read. This will be a great day for anyone interested in athletics or McLean history.

Veterans Should File Compensation

Veterans retired from the Armed Forces for disability who have not filed a claim for compensation from the Veterans Administration were reminded by the VA today that they may be losing money.

Many retired disabled veterans do not file claims for VA disability compensation because they mistakenly believe that they will lose all military retirement benefits if they do.

This is not the case according to Jack Coker, Manager of the VA Regional Office in Waco.

Even though retirement pay and compensation cannot be paid at the same time, the veteran has the right to elect whichever benefit is greater and may switch from one benefit to the other whenever it is to his advantage to do so. If he waives his retirement pay and elects to receive VA disability compensation, he is still eligible for all basic retirement benefits such as commissary privileges and dependent medical care.

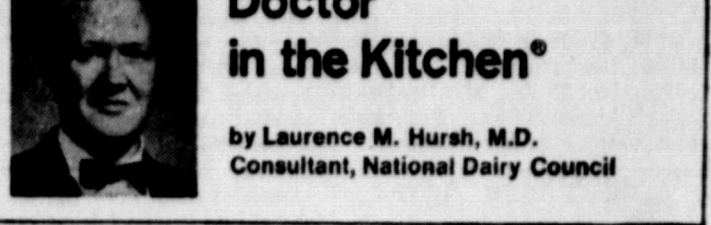

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Doctor in the Kitchen

COOL FOODS FOR HOT WEATHER

When the weather is hot your family enjoys cooler foods. And you can stand a little relief from a hot kitchen yourself. So what can we do to make things easier and happier for everyone?

To eat differently in hot weather one should remember we don't need as many calories to maintain body temperature. The difference between summer and winter is the reason that people just aren't as interested in heavier food when it's warm. Still, we must keep our meals balanced for good nutrition.

You Still Need Protein

To do this, don't reduce your protein intake. People most often associate protein with heavier foods and, in particular, with steaks, roasts, and other hearty dishes. But we get protein just as well from cold meats, milk, ice cream, cheese, and hard-cooked eggs. For that matter, as we all know, you don't have to give up steaks or fried chicken in hot weather. They are especially delightful if you just move the cooking outdoors. This has been one of the greatest developments in family feeding and entertaining guests — this cooking outdoors on your own patio barbecue or in the backyard.

Avoiding rich gravies and hot fried foods will cut down on calories from fat. And for less calories, we can use more of the low-sugar vegetables that are so delicious in salads. These include lettuce, radishes, onions, carrots, cucumbers, tomatoes, white or red cabbage.

Fresh fruits contain only natural sugar and they are a joy to add to any meal. In fact, for a cooling effect, fruit fresh from the refrigerator is hard to beat. Chilled fruit juices or fruit juice-flavored cold milk are even better. Add enriched or whole breads and cereals to your meals and you have a balanced diet for hot weather.

Salads As Main Course

The foregoing, of course, has to do mainly with lunch and dinner. Let me add that every homemaker also knows that salads can be the whole meal, especially in hot weather. Along with buttered crackers and a glass of milk, you would have your four food groups represented with just a salad added, if it includes protein foods as well as vegetables and fruits.

Just remember that fish, cheese, bite-size meat, crisp bacon, anchovies, cooked eggs, nuts, olives, cold kidney beans, and pickles — all these add substantially to the nutrition of a salad as your main course.

Summer Breakfasts

But finally, I want to say a word about breakfast. If you arise later than usual and the sun is already beating down pretty hard, you may not want the usual hot breakfast. Well, there are always the dry cereals in infinite variety, served with cold milk or cream and perhaps garnished with fruit.

An eggnog will give you a cool drink along with the nourishment of the egg, milk, and sugar. Coffee with cream can be iced instead of hot. We've already mentioned cold fruit juices. There really isn't problem here.

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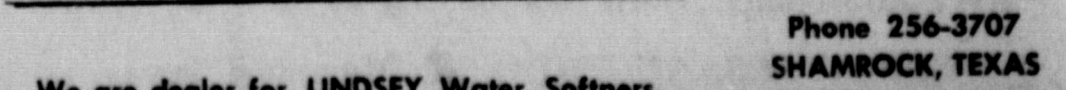
