The appointment as Conference Evangelist is a time honored relationship that is in the "main stream" of the Methodist Church according to Bishop Pope's statement to the delegates. It provides opportunity for the evangelist to serve the general church-at-large, in any way that his personal qualifications and creativeness are in demand.

CATTLE PRICES

As far as the stocker market is concerned contracting of stockers for fall delivery is at a stand still. There is great apprehension among cattle feeders and stocker operators about future prices at present. The fat cattle market is still strong but most feeders are running scared. They wonder if fat cattle will hit the deck like wheat and feed grain.

Wheat is now at feed grain price which makes it competitive to the other feed grains for live stock feed. Some forecasters believe milo will be as low as \$1.45 by the time fall harvest sets in. A long standing rule has been proven right many times "Cheap Feed Makes Cheap Beef."

For income tax reasons many feeders plan to feed cattle this fall to clear the feed lots soon after January 1, 1969. This is a long used and effective method of carrying net income into the following year. I've heard numerous feeders say they plan to drop their inventory down soon after the first of the year. All of this thinking is now having a depressing or pessimistic affect on the feeder replacement market.

Many observers feel that the fat market will continue on about the same level as at present until the end of the year. Government forecasters predict heavier marketing this fall and a \$1.50

to \$2.00 slide in the price on fat cattle.

A new ray of hope presented itself last week when the average slaughter weight took a drop of some 30 to 40 pounds. This indicates that most feed lots are current-no over finished cattle.

## PUBLIC NOTICE PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as
