McLean's first gasoline price war in many years was kicked off over the weekend, and Wednesday afternoon motorists still were able to buy regular for as low as 25.9 cents per gallon. Premium prices ranged from three to five cents higher.

One service station owner said Wednesday that it was the first price war he had seen in the city since entering the business 18 years ago.

Whether the prices would drop farther was anybody's guess. At least two major stations had cut their prices Saturday to the 26.9-cent figure they were still holding at late Wednesday. 




