Our Tax values on property in McLean Independent School District have recently been raised because of necessity to meet present operational costs. Gas and oil are now paying a good portion of our present taxes, however, with the rapid depletion of these minerals, a heavier tax burden will have to be carried by the home, business and land owners. Tourists today are supporting business in McLean up to 75 percent in some cases. What will happen to this town when it is by-passed by Interstate 40? Can you afford to pay 3, 4 or 5 times as much tax as you are paying today?

Economical buildings constructed today are not constructed of re-inforced concrete, steel, brick and mortar to last for a long period of years as is our present high school. In thinking of a \$500,000 bond issue bearing 6½% interest over a 20 year period of time we suddenly realize it will cost the tax payers approximately a million dollars to finance this school. There have been other buildings in our area reconditioned and completely modernized for the approximate cost of \$6.00 per sq. ft. as compared to \$12.00 per sq. ft. for new construction. Present high school contains approximately 20,000 sq. ft. floor space as compared to proposed construction of 38,000 sq. ft. which includes a new gym. The present gym, built by the City of McLean when our school could not afford to, has been used primarily by our school, and still has \$54,000 bonded indebtedness against it.

We realize our present school facilities are in a rundown condition and something must be done. Education is the most important service a community can give it's children.

We are against the present bond election due to its impracticability. However, we are for and will work hard to see our present facilities remodeled to meet modern school standards.

We want our school to be modern and our teachers to be of the highest quality, not only to have a good school, but to insure available funds to meet the ever increasing cost and standards of future education.
