Jack Bogan Reported Missing

Jack Bogan and Mrs. W. E. Bogan have reported their son, Jack Bogan, missing on the flag-ship, Indianapolis, is reported missing in action.

Edward W. Jones of McLean has been awarded the Bronze Medal for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy.

The citation accompanying the medal reads: "For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Pampa, Texas, on 25 October, 1944. While engaged in hauling engineer equipment, an enemy bomber scored a direct hit on a fuel dump at which Jones was refueling his truck. In the face of the explosion ignited his truck and threw him from the vehicle. Stunned by the concussion, he nevertheless entered the burning cab in total disregard of his own safety and removed the vehicle to a place of safety where he extinguished the flames. His prompt and heroic actions, while military equipment was being destroyed from certain destruction."

Following is a letter received by Mrs. C. G. Nicholson from her son, D. V.:

Aug. 5, 1945.

A few lines to let you know everything is fine with me and I hope these few lines find you the same.

We have been wondering what you have been doing. Well, I am glad to tell you that I have been training mid-shipmen—In other words, the future officers of the navy.

I stepped up another notch the last of the month. I was made 1st Water Tender.

Well, as it is about time to go to work, I will close for this time.

The "best seller fever" continued its hold on the American reading public during the last year. Regardless of their quality, many books attained this somewhat ephemeral rating, based not on intrinsic value, but solely on their ability to attract readers.

Last year was a prosperous year in the publishing business. As in any other line, publishers could sell almost anything they had. Publishers were halted in their dizzy pyramiding of sales by two major factors—paper rationing and labor supply—which caused numerous postponements, a large volume of back orders accompanied by a continuous rash of "out of stock" letters. However, even paper rationing had its brighter side since its restrictions prevented such a book as "Forever Amber" from causing the same amount of damage as it could have done under conditions of unlimited paper and labor supply.
