The feeding ration will be composed primarily of alfalfa hay, a small amount of ground milo and just enough molasses to make the milo stick to the

The facilities are adequate but nothing on the cadillac order. Just good practical usable equipment and pens. The working pens are under cover with a very unique circular crowding pen. Cattle enter from east and

exit from east. The entire setup has been built by the Crocketts with a minimum of outside help. They have utilized tons of used oil field pipe and have one of the sturdiest sets of corrals you will find. They have their own portable welding machine. This means they have a low, low investment and an excellent set of facilities. One person can easily handle cattle without out side help.

The holding pens are much larger than those you see in most still. commercial feedlots. New calves are much less subject to disease if given more room.

For sometime I have wonder ed why someone in the McLean Receive Degree vicinity did not install such a facility. Cattle can be transported to feed much cheaper than feed to cattle. Two books of interest in the museum are: "The Everyday Cook Book", used by Mrs. Alenzo Stanfield, and "Lee's Priceless Recipes" donated by Frances Wilson Litchfield. Each contained as many home remedies as they did kitchen recipes, all of which make interesting reading.

Below are some that might interest you:

"For sore throat: Cut slices of salt pork or fat bacon; simmera few minutes in hot vinegar, and apply to throat as hot as possible." And right after the holidays, this might come in handy: "Pulverize one pound of fresh quili-red Peruvian bark and soak in one pint of diluted alcohol. Strain and evaporate down to one half pint. For the first and second days take a teaspoon every three hours. If too much is taken, headache will result. In that case doses should be diminished. On the third day give one half teaspoonful on the fourth day, rescript or important paper but duce to fifteen drops, then to ten, then to five. Seven days .... will cure average cases, courtesy has been given us by though some require a whole month," The above is labeled "The Quinine Cure for Drunk-

You'll need Mrs. Stanfield's down at 117 North Main this recipes to roast rabbit, stew week. Perhaps we'll have time rabbit, and the fancy fricasseed rabbit. You can find help in making beefsteak and kidney pudding, in concocting a pigeon pie, in rendering lard boiling parsnip fritters in picking walnuts, and to make brine which will preserve butter for a year.

For the lady's complexion, the book recommends: olive oil to make the hair curl, and for a good shampoo; one penny worth of borax, half a pint of olive oil, one pint of boiling water. Mix and put in bottle. Shake and apply with a flannel cloth. Something I need: "To remove wrinkles - white wax, one ounce; strained honey, two ounces; juice of lily-bulbs, two ounces; melt, stir, and apply.'

Want to know when to expect rain? "Lee's Priceless recipes says: "Rain invariable follows when cattle sniff the air and herd together in a corner of the field with their heads leeward. or when they take shelter in sheds; when sheep leave the pasture unwillingly, when dogs lie about the fireside more that usual and appear drowsy; when cats turn their backs to the fire and wash their faces: when pigs cover themselves more than usual in litter when cocks crow at unusual hours and flap their wings much; when hens chant; when ducks and geescare unusually noisy; when guineas make a continuous grating clamore; when sparrows chirp noisily and congregate on the ground; when moles throw up hills industriously; when toads creep out in numbers: when the robin approaches near the house; when bats squeak and enter houses; when bees leave thier hives with caution and fly only a short distance, when ants carry their eggs busily; when flies bite severely; and when earth worms appear on the surface."







getting quite a bit of snow. Moisture from this snow, if saved and stored, can be used to produce better crops and more grass on pasture and rangeland. A good cover whether on cropland or on grassland will hold this snow in place and even catch some extra from your neighbor who is not doing as good a job of management as you are. This snow is held in place until it melts and soaks into the soil for later use. The extra cover also reduces evaporation and protects the soil from windero-

As you drive around through the country notice the farms and ranches that are bare of cover. Then notice the lack of snow accumulation on the soil and the increased accumulation along the road ditches and fence rows beside these bare fields and pastures.
