## Bus, Auto Collision Hurts Three Students

Three students of the McLean schools were injured, none seriously, and four California residents were also injured Wednesday morning shortly before 8 o'clock when the McLean school bus No. 1477, serving the Liberty community, was involved in a collision with a 1947 Frazer carrying the Californiaans, five miles east of McLean.

Students injured were Lewi Simpson, 13, who received bruises and was treated here and then released; Betty Knutson, 12, who suffered a bruised knee and a loosened tooth and was also treated here and then taken to a doctor for examination for possible back injury; and Sue Lively, 11, who was taken to the Shamrock hospital and treated for bruises and then released.

Injured in the California car were all four passengers, Mr. and Mrs. Page Christensen of Richmond, Calif., and Mr. and Mrs. J. Weber of Hayward, Calif. The four were en route to Joplin Mo. to attend the funeral of the mother of Mrs. Christensen and Mrs. Weber.

Both women were pinned in the wrecked car, and a winch truck was used to release them so they could be removed from the car. Christensen received a cut over his right eye and head bruises; Mrs. Christensen suffered a broken right leg and bruises; Weber received a cut over his left eye and a bruised hip; and Mrs. Weber suffered a broken collar bone and body bruises.

The accident occurred near the five-mile station east of McLean. Pete Henley, driver of the bus, was headed west and in the process of turning south from Highway 66 during the heavy fog when the California car, traveling east, collided with the bus. The car was badly damaged, and the bus turned over and was also badly damaged.

Besides Henley, there were 12 school children in the bus, but only three were injured seriously enough to require treatment. Womack ambulances answering the call carried Sue Lively and the California people to Shamrock for treatment, while the other children were brought to McLean.

## Couple Hurt In Car Crash

Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Barry of Bell Flower, Calif., were injured last Thursday morning at about 10 o'clock when the car in which they were riding overturned about one mile east of McLean on Highway 66.

Barry apparently lost control of his car while driving east on the pavement. The couple were taken to Shamrock to the General Hospital in a Womack ambulance.

Barry suffered a fractured shoulder, a broken rib, and shock, and Mrs. Barry suffered a fracture of the hip and shock.

The car, a 1941 Mercury sedan, was brought to McLean following the accident.

## Hospital Board Making Plans To Get Doctor

Directors of the McLean Community Hospital association met Saturday night in McLean to make definite plans for obtaining a doctor for the proposed hospital, and also discussed other phases of the project.

Officials of the Elk City, Okla., cooperative hospital, after which the McLean hospital is to be modeled, will aid in obtaining a doctor for the local association, it has been explained, and the directors are eager to obtain a physician's services as soon as possible.

The directors stated that applications for membership are open, and that more members are desired before the project is completed. It is believed that many more families will join the association as soon as actual operation is begun, but as many members as possible are wanted now.

Many of the families who are now listed as members have given notes, payable on demand. These notes, and also the notes which were to be paid in installments, are now due, and those who gave the notes should see either Frank Wilson secretary of the board of directors, or Clifford Allison at the American National Bank in McLean.

Rejuvenation of the hospital project, which has lain dormant for several months, was effected at a meeting of members and others interested last week. Approximately 50 attended the meeting, and voted unanimously to continue with the project.

## C. T. Calvert Dies in Dalhart

C. T. Calvert of Dalhart, former deputy sheriff in McLean, and a brother-in-law of Mrs. Anna Glass of this city, died Saturday from a heart attack. He was 64 years of age.

Funeral services were held Monday at the Dalhart Baptist Church, with Rev. W. R. Lawrence, former pastor here who is now serving the Dalhart church, conducting the rites.

Interment was in the Dalhart cemetery. Mr. and Mrs. Calvert lived in McLean for a number of years and he served on the law force here.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. C. T. Calvert; five brothers, Lon of Hinton, Rex of Blackwell, Okla., Harve of Arkansas, Claude of El Reno, Okla., and Charlie of Littlefield.

## Irish Defeat Rockets, Win 3-A Grid Title

The Shamrock Irishmen unleashed a second half attack last Friday night to take the high-flying Skyrockets of Wellington 12-0 and the Irish thus copied the District 3-A football championship crown with no conference losses.

Lefors, by winning over McLean Friday night and their previous defeat of Wellington, finished in second place, and Wellington will be in third place. The Rockets have a conference game with the Wheeler Mustangs next Friday night, but it is expected to be a pushover for the Rockets.

With the District 3-A title now wrapped up, the Irish will sit back and wait for their opponent in the bi-district game to be chosen. The Lovine Longhorns are riding high in the 4-A race, with no conference defeats against them, and must meet the Paducah Dragons Friday night. If Paducah downs the Longhorns, the Dragons must also win over Matador to tie for the crown. That district could possibly wind up in a three-way tie, should Paducah down Lockney and Matador, and should Spur (also defeated only once), down Rails and Floydada.

In the other half of the region, District 1-A will definitely be settled after Friday night when the two region powers, the Phillips Blackhawks and the Perryton Rangers, collide at Phillips. The winner of this game will be the district champion there.

The 1-A winner will meet the winner of 2-A in that bi-district affair, but 2-A is now all mixed up in a three-way tie. The three teams involved are Dimmitt, Canyon, and Tulla, each with one defeat. Canyon trimmed Tulla but lost to Dimmitt, and Tulla lost to Canyon but then upset the Dimmitt Bobcats.

Winners of each district must be certified by November 29, and the bi-district games will be played near that date. Following the bi-district clashes, the regional title game between the two bi-district winners will be played. Last year Phillips downed Wellington for the regional title.

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## Final Tribute To Be Paid to Pvt. McMahan

Final tribute to Pvt. J. C. McMahan, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. N. McMahan of McLean, who gave his life in World War II, will be paid at simple funeral services this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Baptist Church. Rites will be conducted by Rev. Ray Stephens pastor of the Baptist church.

The remains of Pvt. McMahan, who was killed in action in Belgium January 22, 1945, were shipped to McLean and received Wednesday from the Port Worth quartermaster depot. Interment will be in Hillcrest cemetery under the direction of the Womack Funeral Home of McLean.

Pvt. McMahan was born December 23, 1919, and was reared at Matador. He entered the service July 19, 1944, and received his basic training at Camp Hood. He was a member of the 94th division when killed.

Survivors include his wife and small son, Larry Lamarr, of Matador; his parents; a sister, Mrs. Granville Boyd, McLean; and two brothers, Mabry of Borger, and Bobby of McLean.

## Rains Total 1.3 Inches in McLean Area

A cold slow rain of the off-and-on variety fell in the McLean area—as well as in most of the other Panhandle—during the past week and by Wednesday morning had brought a total of 1.30 inches of moisture here in McLean.

The rain started Thursday of last week when .06 of an inch fell. Friday morning another .45 of an inch fell, with the weather clearing up for the Friday night football game at Lefors and the Pampa-Amarillo game in Pampa.

Then Sunday night another shower started, continuing through most of Monday to add .77 of an inch in moisture.

The rainfall brought the total for the year to 19.63, according to a report from Pete Fulbright, local weather observer.

The weather continued to be cold, with below-freezing temperatures at night. Monday afternoon a small amount of snow mixed itself in with the light drizzle, although the snow melted as soon as it hit the ground.

Fog also hovered over the city Tuesday morning and Wednesday morning, making driving dangerous when coupled with the wet rains.

### Tigers, Wildcats to Clash Here Tonight in Final Tilt of Season

The McLean Tigers, in their last game of the season, will meet the Canadian Wildcats on Tiger Field tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 o'clock in a non-conference battle.

Both teams are definitely out of the running in their respective districts and the outcome of the game will have no effect on either district. Neither of the two teams are among the top ten in the region.

The Tigers, however, will be heavily favored, since the local eleven has shown up well against some of the stronger teams of the area. The Tigers lost to Shamrock, for example, by a 13-12 score, while the Irish thoroughly trounced the Wildcats, 51-0. The Canadian eleven has won only one or two games all season, and did not score in their first four games.

The only other game scheduled in the district will be the Wheeler-

Wellington game to be played at Wheeler. This game will not have any effect on the district outcome, either, since Shamrock clinched the district crown with the upset victory over the Rockets last Friday night.

The Tigers have won so far four games, and lost five, and a victory over the Wildcats will give them a 500 per cent average for the season. The local eleven, rated as high as 5th in the region during the season, has been an off-and-on team, and at times has had the power to give the leaders in the district race much trouble.

Fans have been disappointed in the Tigers at times, and well pleased at other times. They were not slated to win the district this season but it is believed the fundamentals learned under the three coaches, Larry Sanders, George McCarty, and A. D. Shaver, will pay off well next season.

## Financial Help To Be Sought From Merchants

Directors of the McLean Lions Club voted in a special meeting Tuesday afternoon to sponsor a "Turkey Toss" here on several Saturdays beginning the first Saturday in December, and all merchants will be asked to contribute a small amount to aid in the program.

In addition, the money donated will be used also in the Christmas lighting of the downtown section, similar to that of last year, and in the sponsorship of the annual visit of Santa Claus the Saturday before Christmas.

Donations will be requested by a Lions Club committee this week. The committee will be headed by Wayne DeVore, owner of the Home Town Bakery, who advanced the idea for the Turkey Toss.

The Turkey Toss will consist of tossing five or more live turkeys from the top of some building down town each Saturday, beginning with the first Saturday in December, December 6. The person catching each turkey will be allowed to keep the bird caught. The number of turkeys to be given away will depend on the amount of money collected from business men.

The Christmas lighting project, sponsored by the Lions last year, will need some more money this year to replace burned-out bulbs and buy new holly which is used with the light strings. It is estimated that slightly more than \$100 will be needed for this project.

The visit of Santa Claus will also require a small amount of money, the money to be used in buying the candy which is given to small children who come to town to see old St. Nick. It is estimated from \$20 to \$50 will be needed for this part of the program.

The remainder of the money collected will be used in buying the turkeys to be given away. As many turkeys as can be bought with the money will be purchased, and it is planned to toss from some down town building five or more turkeys each Saturday before Christmas. Time for the tossing of the turkeys will be announced at a later date.

# Editorials

### OUR HEALTH

TOO MANY PERSONS approach the choice of a family physician casually, according to Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer of Texas.

The trouble, says Dr. Cox, lies in the fact that too many people view a doctor as they would a fireman—they wait until the emergency strikes before the doctor is called, just as they would wait until the fire breaks out before calling the firemen.

The state health officer does state, however, that such action may result in satisfactory treatment, but in the long run does not permit the supervision and close personal contact which can exist only by having a regular family doctor.

When a physician knows his patients, the doctor states, he is able to give advice on maintaining health and preventing disease, based on his intimate knowledge of the physical and mental make-up of the members of the family. The casually summoned physician plainly cannot have this background or opportunity. It is well known, the state health officer continues, to students of medical science that no one procedure or drug can be applied to the cure of every disease.

The idea of this article is not to get you to run to your doctor every day, but to pick out a doctor and stick with him. Let him study your case through a long period during the time when you are well. Then, if disease isn't prevented altogether, he will be better prepared to care for you.

Americans have always thought of themselves as an extremely healthy nation, but when the drafting of young men was started before the war, it was found that a large percentage were physically unfit for the armed forces. And many of these men would have been physically fit had they been cared for during the years when they were approaching manhood. A healthy life is much more happy than an unhealthy one.

## TALK

All of you undoubtedly read one or more daily papers each day, or at least nearly every day, and you read much about the starving people of Europe. You also read that many people go hungry each day in dear old England, and you read that the economic crisis there is very, very grave. Nobody has much of anything there any more, according to what you read.

But this little item, taken from a recent issue of a daily, caught my attention, and makes me wonder. The story was written by Marie Daerr, an NEA correspondent in London, and in it she tells the story in first person, as follows:

"If I'd had any desire to stick my finger into the frosting of one of Princess Elizabeth's wedding cakes, I should have had my mind changed quickly.

"I had a close-up of one of the cakes at a secret spot, miles from London, and swarming with mountain-tall guards who had a disconcerting habit of plucking my sleeves and saying, 'Come, now, liddy, not THAT near,' whenever I advanced a step.

"The cake is one of 12 baked for the royal wedding by various firms. The public saw it later—through a glass case.

"Here's what the bakers stirred up to make the 12 cakes:

"Almost a ton (1920 pounds) of almond paste.

"More than a ton (2380 pounds) of mixed fruits.

"Almost half a ton (960 pounds) of eggs.

"More than a quarter of a ton (600 pounds) of flour.

"94 pounds of sugar."

Oh well, all I can say is maybe all the hungry Britons can fill up on cake.

Last week, a meeting was held for all members of the proposed community hospital, and open to anyone else who cared to attend. There were approximately 50 people there, including both men and women, and the group voted to continue with the hospital project, only to continue at a slightly faster pace than had been followed.

I was surprised to see the number of women present who attended. It hadn't occurred to me

that so many would be so interested, but I found out that there are a large number of women who are interested in the hospital.

But more surprising to me was the fact that many of those present do not live in the city limits of McLean—a lot there were from the surrounding area. A disappointingly small number of McLean business men were present.

I really don't know much about such cooperative hospitals—I have never lived in or near a community with such an institution. I do know that in many cases they have been very successful, and, although I don't actually know of any folding up, there undoubtedly have been some which have closed up.

As was pointed out at the meeting, the need for a hospital in McLean is great, and so me it appears that about the only kind we can afford is one which we all chip in and build.

As far as the general citizenship in the city limits of McLean is concerned, I don't think the hospital will get much cooperation. I have been living here

for slightly more than a year, and many things have been tried but few have been successful. Everything which is attempted here and which will need cooperation to be successful has a decided habit of failing.

However, in the case of the hospital, I don't believe it will falter once it is placed in operation. My reason for this belief is that the people who live in the area surrounding McLean will cooperate to make it a success. There will be some in McLean who will do likewise (although most will not cooperate), and the hospital will then have enough support to carry on successfully.

There is not a doubt in my mind but what the hospital would be a big success if the citizenship of McLean in general would cooperate. But since I've been here, they never have cooperated in anything (especially in the business district) and I can't see why they will for the hospital.

I think I have said enough.

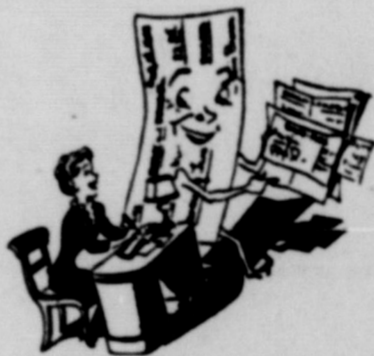

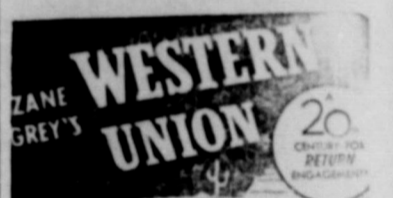
