## Grade, Weight Not as Good As Last Year

The harvesting of wheat in the McLean area is fully underway at the present time, and more than 14 cars of the grain have already been loaded for shipment.

First of the wheat was brought in last week by Leroy Williams, who had only a small load. He was followed soon after by J. L. Hess, who brought in a large load. Both were bought for \$1.65 per bushel by S. R. Jones, representing the Kimbell Milling company of Fort Worth.

Wednesday morning, the prevailing market price had advanced to \$1.68 per bushel.

Another grain loader was installed in McLean last week by the Knight Grain company, to make a total of two firms purchasing the wheat in this area. Weighing for the Knight company is L. H. Earthman at the Paymaster Gin.

Jones stated that the Kimbell company has notified him that the McLean area has been allotted a storage capacity of 25,000 bushels, for those growers who desire to place their grain under government loan rather than selling immediately. Jones stated that he was not told how long this allotment will be kept open.

The wheat is not as good in grade, nor in weight, as that of last year, it was pointed out. The grade is not as strong, and the weight is lighter. Moisture content, however, has been very low thus far.

Williams' wheat tested 13 per cent moisture content, with a weight of 60. That brought in by Hess tested 12 per cent moisture, and a weight of 60.

Yield of the acreage in the local area is varying considerably. The yield is ranging anywhere from 10 bushels to 30 bushels per acre. Most of the farmers of the area have allotted only small acreages to wheat this year. O. G. Stokely is about the only wheat grower with a very large acreage, it was reported.

The weather has been very favorable for wheat harvest during the past week. The rains stopped, with no moisture falling in the past week, and combines have been running long hours each day.

The northern part of Gray County is suffering from a slight shortage of combines, and a call for ten combines in that area was issued Wednesday. Rapid progress is being made in Collingsworth and Donley counties, according to a report of the Texas Employment Commission. Carson County harvest is about eight per cent complete.

## WEEKLY MARKET REPORT

Southwest farm markets presented a mixture of rising and falling prices during the week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Sorghum grain prices dropped 10 cents a hundred pounds for the week, and wheat and barley about two cents a bushel. Oats and corn advanced 3 to 5 cents.

No. 1 wheat closed Monday at \$2.03 1/4 to \$2.11 1/4 at Texas common points. No. 2 white corn sold at \$1.73 to \$1.75, yellow corn \$1.62 to \$1.64, and milo \$2.25 to \$2.35.

Heavier supplies of watermelons and cantaloupes sold sharply lower at most markets last week. Southern Louisiana growers received lower prices for cucumbers, bell peppers and tomatoes. Many other southwest products weakened.

Eggs strengthened slightly at Denver during the week, and sold about steady in the southwest. Prices of hens declined 3 to 4 cents a pound at Denver and (Continued on back page)

In Holland, Amsterdam and the Hague will be visited, as well as many other sites of interest. In Belgium, the tour will include Brussels, Bruges, Ostend, Ghent, and Louvain. Bonn and Munich will be two points of interest to be seen in Germany. In addition to Salzburg, Salskammergut, Aulse, and Badgastein will be seen in Austria. Not much time will be spent in Switzerland, but Paris, France, will be seen.

The group will leave Cherbourg September 7, arriving back in New York on September 12. Mrs. Boyett plans to be back in Mc-

Lean about the middle of September.



### IT'S TIME TO SHOO THE FLIES

YOU MAY, OR YOU may not, have noticed, but McLean is being besieged by a large number of flies this year. And the time has come for all of us to do something about it.

The city now owns a sprayer, and city employees have already sprayed the alleys of the town this spring. The News believes that this spraying should be done even more often, at least until the flies disappear.

However, there are other ways to keep down the number of flies. First of all, we believe that all citizens of the town should cooperate and do a little spraying of their own. There are various kinds of fly spray on the market, and the cost is not prohibitive. Small hand spraying guns can be obtained at a nominal cost at several stores in town. The investment in some fly spray and a gun would not be large, and the return may possibly be great.

Then, too, citizens can cooperate even more by keeping their premises cleaned up to such an extent that flies will not be attracted. One of the greatest attractions for flies is a dirty, filthy, stinking, open garbage container, usually found in about one-third of the alleys in town. As long as such open garbage containers are around, flies will also be around. It is entirely up to citizens to keep these containers covered, or free of wet garbage.

The polio epidemic in Texas has already started. Amarillo has several cases. San Angelo is overrun with cases scores of people having been hit by the dread disease in that city.

Doctors have found that flies can carry the polio germ. It may be that your flies are not afflicted with the germ. It may be, however, that they are. You cannot tell by looking, or you cannot tell by the way they bite.

So the simple thing to do to eliminate that possibility of contracting polio is to eliminate all flies, and the causes of flies. It's up to all of us.

It is certainly your privilege to say so.

**Doctor Urges Year-Round Sanitation Plan**

During the last several summers considerable enthusiasm was shown by various local organizations such as chambers of commerce, many civic organizations, and others in the arranging of a fly eradication program. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, says that for lacking interest in this work, the responsible parties are to be commended.

However, without year-round community sanitation the ultimate result, which is so important has not always been too successful; in some areas this has given rise to rumors that flies are DDT resistant.

"The Texas State Department of Health heartily endorses a fly spraying program, provided it includes a general clean-up program carried out during the entire year," Dr. Cox said. "For example, why spray a garbage heap that not only invites but actually breeds flies when it should be removed? Why spray the city dump when it really should be covered? I fear the unplanned spraying program is similar to the application of powder to cover toilet water to overcome B. O. or the application of powder to cover dirt."

In a well-planned fly control program, Dr. Cox declared, all places where flies gather, such as dumps, rubbish piles, garbage piles, decaying vegetation should be cleaned up by hauling away and burying. Proper garbage and rubbish containers with fly tight covers should be demanded from all. All buildings should be screened. Then, secure a sprayer outfit, preferably one with one or more hoses each manned by a skilled operator to spray the areas where flies and other insects will light. It does little good to spray the center of the street, the ball diamond, or the sidewalks. Spray the surfaces where insects light or breed.

A residual spray remains active until the DDT washes off or is covered with grease, dirt or soot. This usually lasts four to six weeks. After that, a second spray is recommended, provided the item of clean-up is still being carried out.

**City to Build Drainage Dip**

A concrete dip to aid in taking care of the drainage of water through town to the southeast will be built on Second Street, at about North Wheeler Street. It was decided at a meeting of the City Council Monday night. The water drains across town from the northwest, and has been known to rise high on Second Street during a heavy rain. It is believed the dip will increase the drainage facilities.

The council also voted to hire Charlie Morgan to re-check and test water and gas meters belonging to the city. Some of the meters have not been tested in several years, and it is thought that some may not be recording accurately.

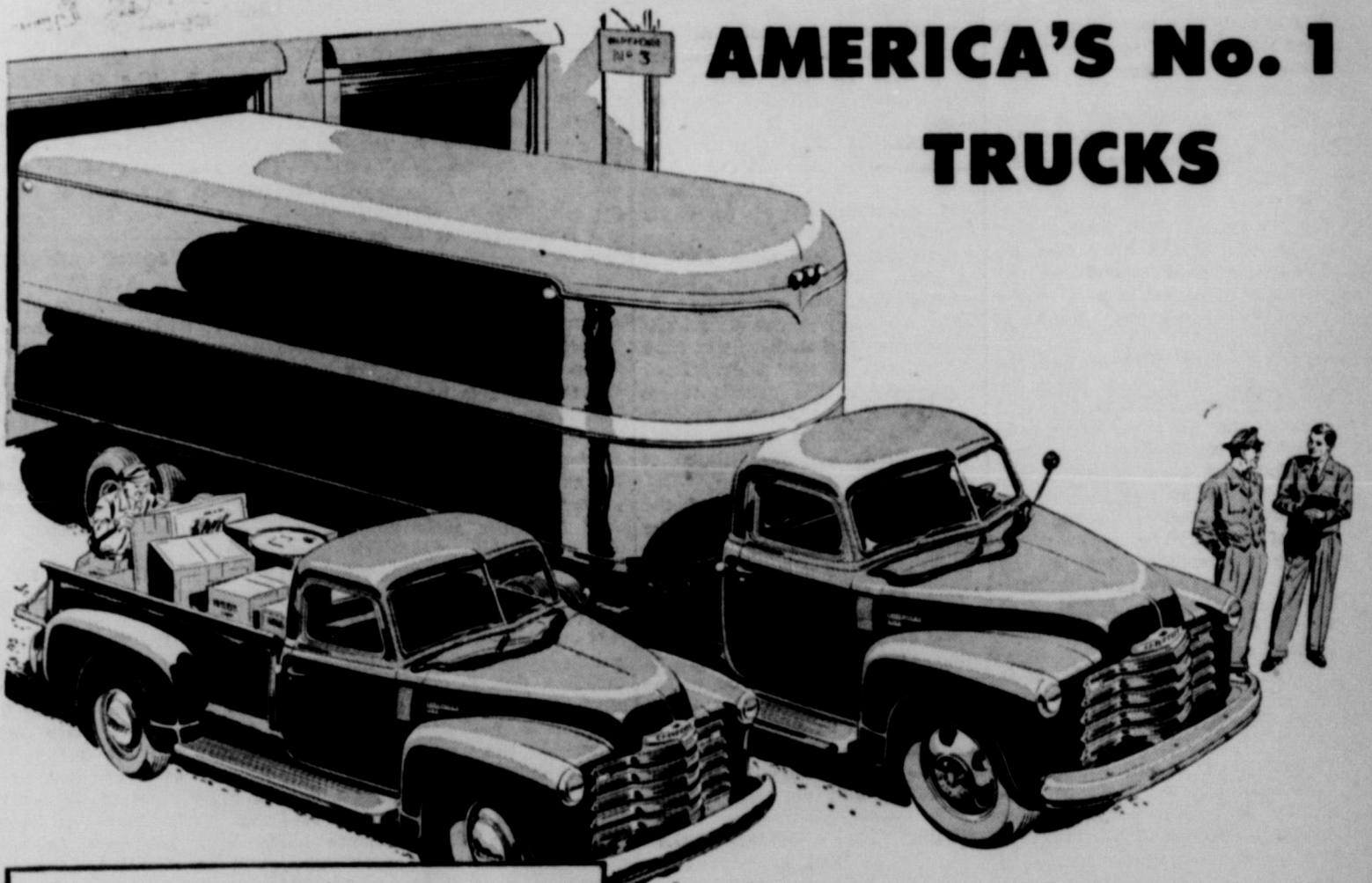

# Proposed Constitutional Amendments . . .

## SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector, provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 24th day of September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election. 25-4c

## SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof and making an appropriation for such purpose.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have

printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law. 25-4c

## SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is, hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election. 25-4c

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month. They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50), for every Twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to

be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year."

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session. Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months."

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4/5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Sec. 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, same being September 24, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members;"

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. 25-4c

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution, to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof;" and

"Against the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto. 25-4c

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machine shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. 25-4c

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power to make such provisions concerning the terms or conditions of each Court as it may deem necessary. The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District

Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding.

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on September 24, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. 25-4c

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23

proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, A. D. 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases;" and

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases."

Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. 25-4c

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 24

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the

electorate.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts;" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. 25-4c

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 28

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be Numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section, to be designated Section 63, to read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors or members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the

constitution as required by the provisions thereof.

Sec. 4. If at said election a majority of the votes cast "FOR" the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, the same shall be published as required by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice of election.

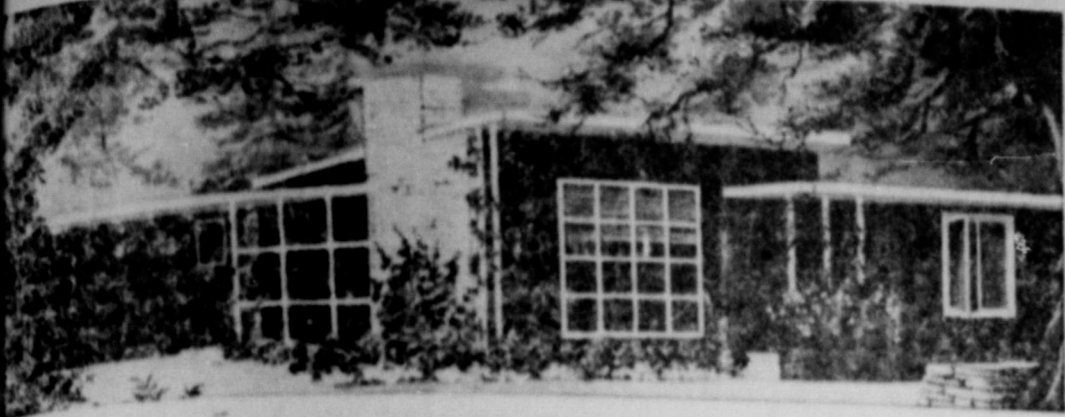

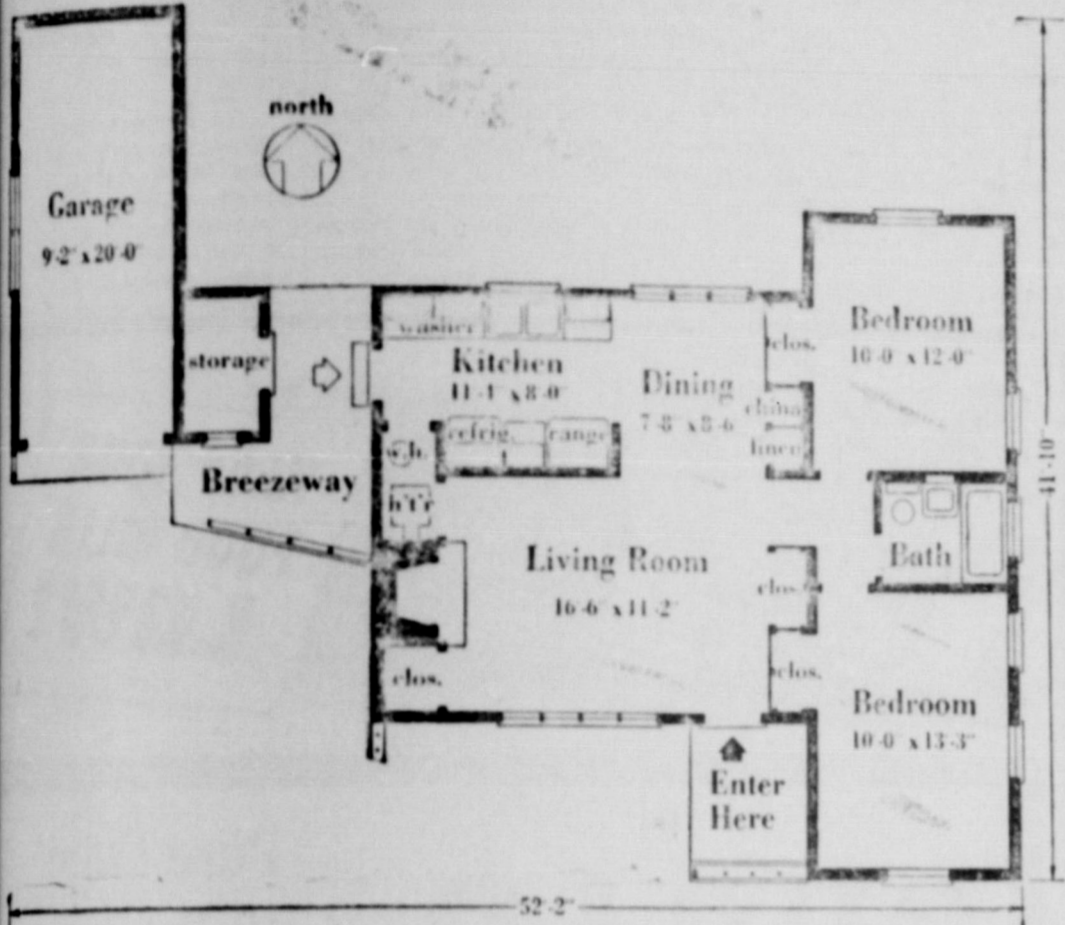

1 to 2 cents at Dallas. Fryers lost 4 cents at Denver and 1 in northwest Arkansas.

Leading markets received fewer livestock of all kinds last week than the week before. A third less sheep arrived in Texas and Oklahoma than a week earlier and less than half as many as a year ago. Wholesale dressed meat prices declined mostly \$2 to \$4 for the week at New York. Pork loin fell \$7 to \$8 and lamb \$8 to \$12.

Cows, calves and bulls recorded losses of \$1 to \$2 from a week ago at southwest markets, with fed classes unchanged to \$1 lower. Medium to good killing calves ranged from \$22 to \$25 at Denver, while good and choice grades brought \$24 to \$26 at Oklahoma City, and \$23 to \$26 at Fort Worth.

Monday's strong hot market reduced the week's losses at Texas terminals to around 50 cents. Oklahoma City showed little change on butchers but sows and pigs lost \$1. Butcher hogs gained up to \$1 at Denver, but most sows sold unevenly lower. Top butchers closed Monday at \$22 at Denver and \$20.75 at Fort Worth.

Cotton advanced 50 cents to \$1.25 a bale. Spot middling 15/16 inch closed Monday at 23.50 cents a pound at Dallas and Galveston, and 22.80 at New Orleans.

## Pruning of Shrubs Stimulates Plants

Pruning shrubs and trees will stimulate the plants to give larger blossoms in the blooming season and help shrubs in bounds. "Flowers and shrubs bloom in early spring and completed their seasonal bloom in summer and early fall are dormant during the dormant period. Flowering shrubs are trimmed excessively. Over pruning will cut away future blossoms. Rather than clipping excessively around the edges, move several canes from the shrub-cutting them off near ground.
