Cotton Ginning Now Past 3,000-Bale Mark

A few hundred bales of cotton are yet to be gathered in the McLean area, and thus far a total of 3,323 bales have been ginned, giving the area one of the largest crops in a number of years.

Ginners L. H. Earthman of the Paymaster Gin and S. R. Jones of the McLean Gin expect to get several hundred more bales, although much of the late cotton will probably be of a poorer grade than that already harvested.

Some "carbon black," known to government graders as "gray," is showing up on the cotton now, the ginners stated. This matter damages the cotton to some extent, and usually costs the farmer a penalty of about \$10 per bale.

The staple is still about the same as it has been all fall, the two ginners stated, although the grade is down.

Some farmers are now sledding their cotton as the harvest nears the end. The sledded cotton, of course, is usually of a poorer grade and staple, and does not gin out as good.

A number of farmers are completely through with their cotton harvest, the ginners said, and those not through have only small patches remaining. Practically all of the transient boll pullers have left the area.

Golden Gloves To Be Staged At Shamrock

The community of McLean, which in the past years has been in the Pampa district, will be in the newly-created Shamrock district in the annual Golden Gloves boxing tournaments.

The tournament, to be held in Shamrock January 12, 13, and 14, will be sponsored by the DeShazo-George American Legion post of Shamrock, and ring activities will be held in the Legion home there.

The new district was set up following a meeting in Pampa November 5 of Shamrock Legionnaires and officials of the regional Golden Gloves organization, W. H. Dial, commander of the Shamrock post, said.

In past years, district tournaments have been held in Pampa, Childress, and Dalhart, with the winners participating in the regional meet in Amarillo. Winners from (Continued on back page)

T. H. Andrews Dies at Home Of Long Illness

Thornton Horace Andrews, resident of the McLean area since 1921, died at his home in McLean Monday morning at about 6:30 o'clock of a prolonged illness.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the First Baptist Church, conducted by Rev. Clayton Day of McLean and Rev. Cecil Goff of Dumas. Interment was in Hillcrest cemetery under the direction of the Claborn-Womack Funeral Home.

Andrews, who had been engaged in farming most of his life, had been in ill health for several years. He had been seriously ill for the past two months, and had not been able to be up a great deal during that time.

The long-time resident of the area moved here from Childress in 1921, where he was engaged in farming. He continued to farm in the McLean area until 1947, when he and Mrs. Andrews bought the old Church of Christ building and made it into an apartment house.

Andrews was born in Marion, La., February 24, 1889, and was 60 years, 9 months, and 4 days of age at the time of his death. He and Miss Laura Mae Dickerson were united in marriage in 1912 at Huttig, Ark. He had been a member of the Baptist church since a child.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Andrews of McLean; one son, Clyde H. Andrews of McLean; two daughters, Mrs. H. C. Weatherby of Shamrock and Mrs. Neil Humble of Lawton, Okla.; one sister, Mrs. Joe Moore of Bernice, La.; and five brothers, Ollie, Tommie, and Johnny Andrews of Marion, La.; Elmer Andrews of Childress, and Leamon Andrews of McLean.

Weekly Swing of Southwest Farm Markets

Southwest farm products sold in mostly steady to stronger markets during the past week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Prices of cattle and calves were mostly firm and unchanged from a week earlier at Texas and Oklahoma markets. Most classes gained 25 cents to \$1 at Denver, but good and better steers declined. Average good steers topped at \$26.70 at Denver, and \$26 at Oklahoma City. Medium steers brought \$18 to \$23.50 at Fort Worth.

Hogs were unchanged from a week before at Texas and Oklahoma markets, and 50 cents to \$1 lower at Denver. Top butchers cashed at \$16 Monday at San Antonio and Oklahoma City, \$16.75 at Fort Worth and \$15.75 at Denver.

Livestock receipts held up fairly well on most market days, but the Thanksgiving holiday cut sharply into the week's total supply.

Wholesale beef, lamb and mutton were largely steady to \$1 or \$2 higher for the week, but veal, and pork showed weakness at some eastern markets.

Egg and poultry markets firmed up a bit in pre-holiday trade last week and have held steady since. Turkey marketing fell off after the Thanksgiving rush ended. Farmers received 50 to 55 cents a dozen for current egg receipts in Texas, 42 to 55 in Oklahoma, 45 to 55 in Arkansas, 40 to 55 in Colorado, and 50 to 65 in Louisiana.

Although feed sales picked up a little last week, both production and demand were still below normal for this time of year. Hay markets were inactive. Mild, dry weather, together with plentiful grain pastures, roughage and feed grains held movement of feedstuffs to a slow pace.

S. L. Ball Dies; Burial Is Held At Alanreed

S. L. Ball, former resident of Alanreed, and a brother of W. J. Ball of that community, died at his home in Amarillo Friday afternoon of last week.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon in the Boxwell Brothers funeral chapel in Amarillo, conducted by Dr. Snodgrass of Amarillo. Burial was in the Alanreed cemetery with Masonic graveside services, under the direction of the Claborn-Womack Funeral Home of McLean.

Ball, born in Thornton, Limestone County, August 7, 1880, was united in marriage with Duffie Gaunt of Athens December 24, 1903. He came to Gray County in 1904 and settled in Alanreed. In 1906 he moved to Tyler, but returned to Alanreed in 1913, where he remained until moving to Amarillo in 1945.

While in Alanreed, Ball served as postmaster for more than 28 years. He was also associated with his brother, W. J. Ball, in business there for a number of years. He was a charter member of the McLean and Alanreed Masonic lodges, and a member of the Chapter of Royal Arch Masons at Clarendon.

Survivors include his wife of Amarillo; one son, Elwood Ball of Amarillo; one sister, Mrs. B. T. Stubbs of Amarillo; and one brother, W. J. Ball of Alanreed.

Pirates to Play Littlefield at Amarillo Friday

The Lefors Pirates, undefeated and untied in ten straight games, ran almost at will last Saturday afternoon to out-score the Phillips Blackhawks, champs of District 1-A, 42-28, in the bi-district contest at Phillips.

The victory gives the Pirates the right to seek the regional title Friday afternoon, when they will meet the Littlefield Wildcats at Amarillo stadium at 2:30 o'clock. Littlefield downed Spur's Bulldogs 47-14 in the other bi-district contest of the Panhandle when the two teams met Thanksgiving Day.

Winner of the Lefors-Littlefield game will meet the winner of the Ballinger-Wink tilt in the quarter-finals of the state playoffs. In the lower bracket, New Braunfels is favored to go to the finals, but an upset could easily be scored in either this week's quarter-finals or next week's semi-finals.

The Littlefield-Lefors game will conflict with the Pampa-Wichita Falls Class AA game, to be played at Pampa Friday afternoon. Lefors wanted the game to be held Saturday, due to the conflict, but Littlefield won the toss and chose Friday as the date and Amarillo as the place.

In another play-off of interest to many local people, the White Deer eleven will meet the Kress team in Buffalo stadium at Canyon Friday afternoon. George Watson's White Deer gang has been beaten only once this season, that loss going to the Lefors Pirates. Kress also lost one game, an early-season tilt with Lakeview.

The White Deer-Kress game will be the bi-district 1-2B game.

Prizes Offered For Downtown Decorations

The annual Christmas activities sponsored by the McLean Lions Club and financed by contributions of merchants and other individuals will feature something new this year—a downtown Christmas decorations contest.

The home decorations contest will also be held again. Bill Howard, chairman of arrangements for the activities, stated.

Only two prizes will be given in each division. A first prize of \$10 and a second prize of \$5 will be given in each of the two divisions—the best-decorated downtown store and the best-decorated home. The change was made in the home decorations contest due to the difficulty of the judges in deciding in which divisions the homes should fall last year, for example, the divisions in the home contest were outdoor, door, and window. To avoid this confusion, only the two prizes will be given, and all visible decorations will be taken into consideration.

Judging of both the downtown decorations and the home decorations will be done by out-of-town people some night shortly before Christmas.

The strings of holiday lights downtown were put up this week, noon, December 10, at 4 o'clock. The first of the two turkey tosses will be held Saturday afternoon, December 1, at 4 o'clock, and the second at the same hour the following Saturday, December 17.

"Kids Day" will be featured Saturday, December 24, when a free movie will be shown for the children, followed by a visit of Santa Claus.

Money Raised For Easement At Lions Meet

That McLean will be the site of a new warehouse for the maintenance division of the State Highway Department is fairly well certain.

Negotiations with Ed Howard for a plot of land just east of the city limits are being made, and it is expected that the site will be obtained within about two weeks, C. W. Smith, assistant division engineer of the Amarillo office, said Tuesday in a telephone conversation with The News.

Holding up the deal for the land earlier in the fall was an easement, with a highline through the land, held by the Southwestern Public Service company. The company agreed this week to move the highline and turn over their rights to the strip of land for \$225, considerably less than moving the poles will cost.

Then at a meeting of the Lions Club in McLean Tuesday noon, Ed Lander, who has been working on obtaining the warehouse here, outlined the need for the \$225. The Lions members quickly raised about that amount, to be used for that purpose. Others who wish to aid in the project may make donations to Lander.

Smith stated that the warehouse, for the present at least, will serve as a sub-district station for the district which now has its offices in Pampa under Jack McDowell. However, the assistant division engineer did state that the district set-up for maintaining the highways of the area may be moved to McLean at a later date.

At the present time the highway department has about five men working on maintenance here. It is believed that this number will be increased to about 12 when the warehouse is constructed, and possibly increased more as the need arises.

The warehouse building will be of sheet metal, Smith stated. As a general rule, such buildings cost the state about \$9,000, he said, plus the cost of a fence surrounding the building, and beautification costs. Smith said that the department hopes to do considerable beautification of the grounds around the proposed building to make it an attractive addition to the highway through McLean.

Just when work on the warehouse will start is not known, Smith said. Negotiations for the land should be completed within two or three weeks, but actual work on the building itself will have to wait until the funds are made available.

Business men who knew of the proposed warehouse here were well pleased, in view of the fact that such a set-up here will bring more families to town. When the warehouse is established, it will be kept here as long as there is a need for such a maintenance set-up.

A. A. Simpson Dies at Pampa

Albert Alvin Simpson, who has been living since July 1 in the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. West of Kellerville, died at a Pampa hospital Monday. He was 73 years of age.

Simpson, born in Missouri April 17, 1876, had been making his home in Sapulpa, Okla., for a number of years, and had been in Kellerville only since July 1.

Funeral services were held in Sapulpa Tuesday afternoon. The body was carried overland by the Claborn-Womack Funeral Home of McLean early Tuesday.

Survivors include two daughters, Mabel L. West of Kellerville, and Marguerite Harrey of Hobbs, N. M.; a sister, Alva B. Simpson of Orange; six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

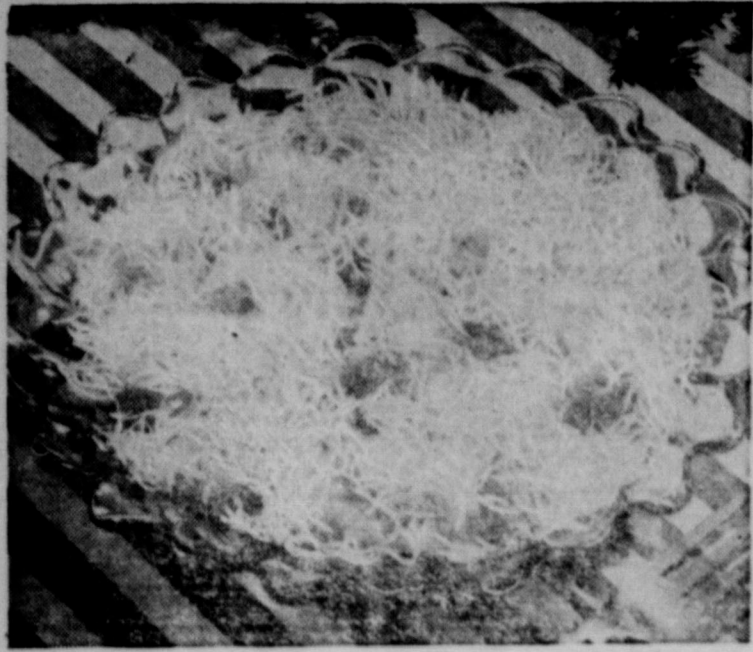

COCONUT DECORATION

You will want to tint or toast the coconut that decorates your Christmas sweets — it makes it more festive. It is simple to do. To tint coconut: Place coconut in a glass jar. Cover jar and shake vigorously until coloring is evenly distributed and desired shade is obtained. To toast coconut: To toast the coconut, spread it out thinly in shallow baking pan. Place in moderate oven (350°F.) to toast until slightly browned. Stir coconut or shake pan often to toast evenly.

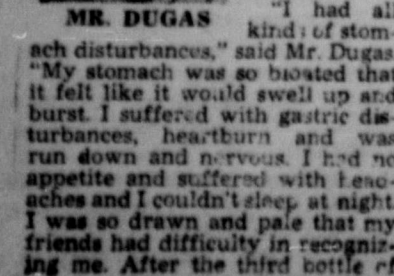
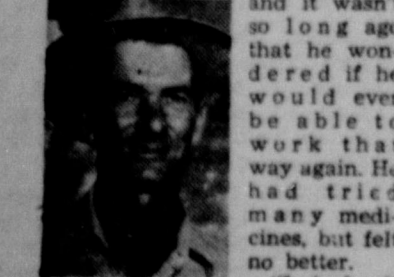

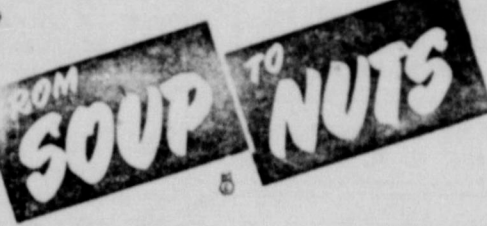

WE AND THE LAW

DURING THE PAST WEEK, since the escape of the three prisoners from the Potter County jail, a great deal of discussion concerning our law enforcement officers—and our court system—has been making the rounds.

Unfortunately, the Potter County sheriff has been taking the brunt of the attack. We are unaware as to his capabilities as a sheriff, and have no comment to make on that point, believing the people of Amarillo should know more about that than we do and believing it is up to them to solve their own problems.

In McLean and in Gray County as a whole, the seige of small and large crimes and jail breaks has been noticeably absent, in comparison to the trouble Amarillo has been having. Whether it is due to our law enforcement officers we are unaware, but we are fortunate that we have had little criminal trouble.

However, the main trouble throughout the state seems to lie not so much in the officials we elect to office or officials who are appointed but more so to the court system. For example, it is not uncommon for a man convicted of murder to get off with a two-year suspended sentence. It is even less uncommon for a man convicted of murder to get off with a small two or three-year sentence, even though he may be known as a hardened criminal.

The trouble seems to lie in the fact that Texas has been, and is, too easy on those convicted of serious crimes. A hungry man who steals a loaf of bread may get more punishment than a habitual criminal who finally is convicted of killing some innocent person. That same hungry man who steals a loaf of bread may get more punishment than a robber who steals several thousand dollars from a super market in just one of that robber's jobs.

Then, too, it seems that too often it takes too long to bring a suspect to trial. We realize that the defense should have every opportunity, as well as ample time, to work out the defense of a suspect, but sometimes valuable witnesses for the state seem to disappear if that time is drawn out very long.

There may be other things wrong with our system of protecting the public. If there are more errors in our laws and our systems, then those errors should be corrected. The trouble in Amarillo is just one of many, but it should start all of us to thinking of needed improvements.

New things and new uses I have recently read about:

They're using putty to encase cameras which take pictures of the V-2 rockets as they hit the ground at White Sands, N. M. The putty is the same kind as used in the center of golf balls to make them bounce, and it seems to work pretty well in keeping the cameras from jarring too much.

An enterprising farmer has rigged up a conveyor belt system to feed his chickens. The conveyor belt takes the feed from a storage bin and it moves down a trough, giving the chickens one and one-half minutes to eat before the feed is returned to the bin. This action is automatic, and occurs 16 times per day. The chicks like it cause they are getting fat, and the farmer likes it cause he is wasting less feed.

A large number of citrus growers in California are getting away from smudge pots, and using giant electric fans instead to protect their precious crops from freezing. The big fans are automatic, and can protect an area which ordinarily would require 50 smudge pots, plus men to tend them. It seems the fans blow away the freezing air.

Now you can get a deodorizer for your home, or your business lavatory, or anywhere else you might want to put a deodorizer. The gadgets are electrically-operated, and employ the dry-cake method. Not only does the gadget deodorize, but it also leaves a very pleasant scent, they say.

In all likelihood, McLean will have another business not too far in the future. Mrs. E. J. Windom was in the other day and asked if I had an axe to grind. Well, I didn't even have an axe, which was what she wanted to borrow to cut down some trees on her property just outside the city limits west of town. But I did have a saw which I loaned her to eliminate the trees. Seems that she is going to have the new business—a drive-in cafe near the Windom Station and Courts west of town.

This isn't a new business, but it is something new for McLean. Bob Shedrick, the jeweler, has just got in a high-powered engraving machine. He can now engrave your name or initials on almost anything, if that thing isn't too big for the new machine to hold. The cost will be small, Bob said, and items bought at his store will be engraved without additional cost if the customer so desires. Now you won't have any excuse for buying those cuff links, or tie clasp, or watch, etc., in Amarillo just to have it engraved. It only requires Bob a few minutes to do most engraving. Incidentally, Bob now handles Fostoria crystal which you women like, and also can get any brand of sterling silverware—one piece or a set—for you, at the same price or lower than it can be bought in Amarillo.

cotton is really booming things in that area.

My brother-in-law, who is in the dry goods business, says he has never seen anything like it. Business is the best he has ever seen it, and is better than he expects it to be again for a long time. It's not just his business, but also every other one of the 75 or 100 businesses in that small community.

Naturally, all gins are overloaded. Perhaps the biggest bunch of unginned cotton I saw was at the co-op gin in Wellington. It is a double-stand gin, and always enjoys a nice business. When we went through there Wednesday evening, the gin yard and all vacant space within a radius of two or three blocks was loaded with unginned cotton.

Fields throughout the entire area have cotton piled up. Apparently the farmers take their pick-ups or trucks or trailers to the gins, get the cotton tagged, and have to leave them there. Then they go back to the fields where the piling is still in progress, and have the remainder piled for future hauling to the gins. My father-in-law, in the hardware business in Memphis, says the demand for cotton forks is almost unbelievable. He has 100 sold, but can't get them right away.

The people in that area are very grateful for the abundant crop, but realize well that the big crop is more or less one in a million. I'm wondering if the farmers and merchants are saving back some of that money which is rolling in, or spending it as fast as they get it as I would be doing.

Christmas is coming up rather rapidly. There is much shopping yet to be done to satisfy the many people which you have to buy gifts for this year. Let me suggest that you try to find what you want in McLean first, then look elsewhere. Too often, we just say, "Aw, we can't find anything in McLean," without ever looking. Many of the local merchants have very, very nice gift materials this year, and it's very, very likely that you can find what you want

if you will spend a day shopping here, as you would if you went to Amarillo or Pampa.

The new city building, which will serve as both a gym and an auditorium, is coming along fine now. The fair weather has certainly aided L. K. Stout, the contractor, in his work. Reports on Mr. Stout indicate that he is most cooperative. Guy Beasley, councilman in charge of the work for the city, says Mr. Stout goes out of his way to cooperate in any small changes which are desired as the work progresses. Carl Jones, manager of the Cicero Smith Lumber company, says Mr. Stout buys as much material from him as is possible. Guy Beasley also says Mr. Stout is using all local labor which he can. Those facts are quite unusual. The gym building will be a

great asset to McLean. A stage is to be installed in the north end, Mr. Beasley tells me. The stage will be made so that it can be lifted out of the way during basketball games or other functions where the space is needed. There will be four nice-sized shower rooms, two for boys and two for girls. It is hoped that one side of the bleachers can be the folding type to allow more room when needed.

There seems to be some question as to whether to allow smoking in the new building during functions there. I personally believe that smoking should not be allowed in the main portion of the building at any of the athletic contests which will be staged there. Perhaps smoking would be all right at a banquet there, or something of that nature, but at most public functions there smok-

ers should be required to get into the small corridor at front of the building. I am of the tobacco habit people, but I still don't believe smoking should be allowed at basketball games or boxing matches, similar affairs. What's your opinion? If you have one, tell Beasley, not me.

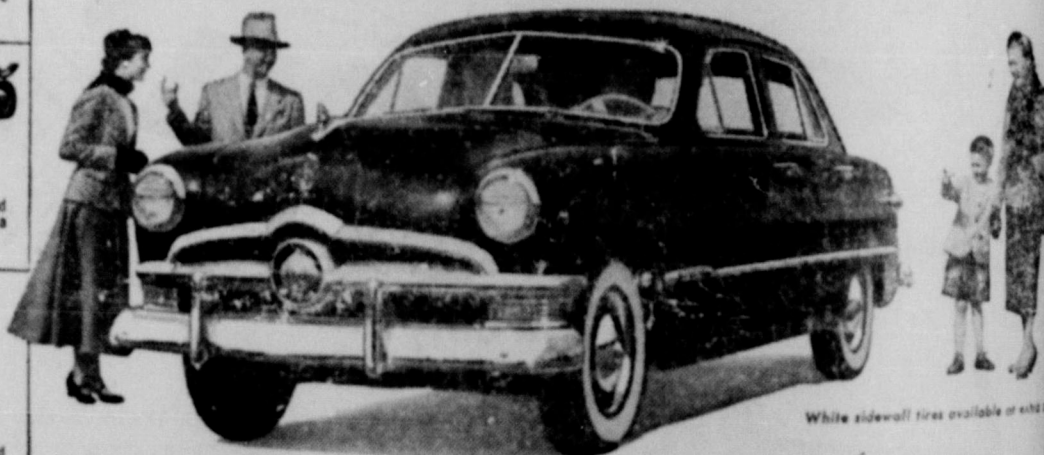

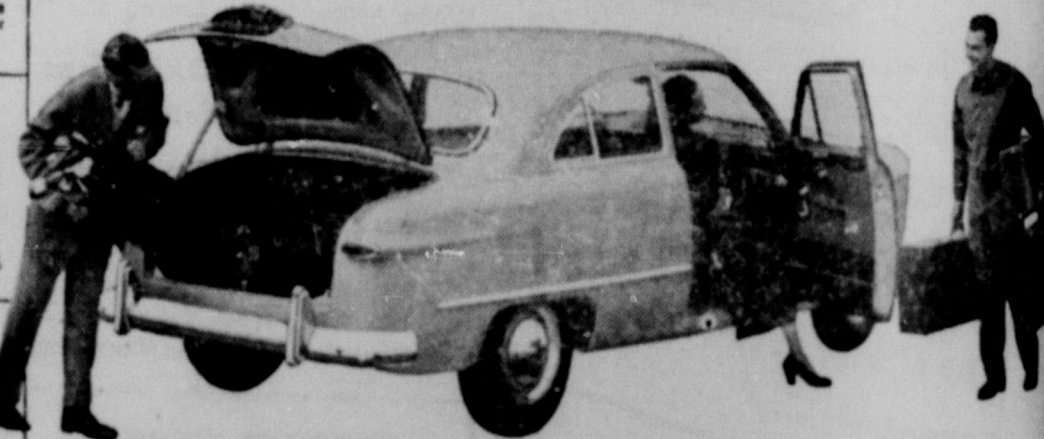

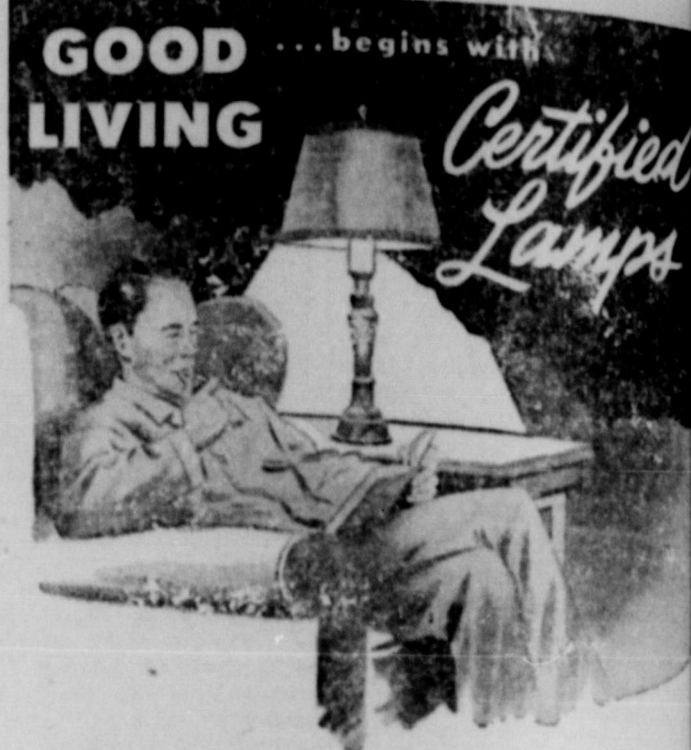

Shivers Names Health Week

Governor Allan Shivers, by official proclamation, has designated the week between December 4-11 as Better Health for Texans Week, emphasizing venereal diseases.

The purpose of the week-long drive, according to State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, is to "accentuate all segments of the population with the facts concerning this most serious group of diseases, thus providing a weapon of knowledge which all persons can use in their own protection." Cox indicated that the health department informational campaign would be a year to year project, now on, with a different phase of public health being the subject each year.

Highlights of this year's drive will be a state-wide radio address by Governor Shivers, and a short motion picture trailer featuring the governor and the state health officer. Informational packets have been prepared for distribution throughout the state by city and county health units. The official proclamation reads: "One of the most important factors that will influence the future of Texas is a healthy citizenship. Public health has many phases, all contributing to the welfare of mankind. One of these is the campaign to eliminate the venereal diseases. Methods of diagnosis and treatment are at hand to prevent the unnecessary suffering caused by these diseases. All that remains now is to induce our citizenship to take advantage of the present day knowledge."

Principle appeal of the campaign is directed to leaders of individual communities. Dr. Cox believes that the "final solution to the venereal disease problem will be forthcoming only when it is tackled on a community basis."

Patrons Urged To Do Holiday Mailing Early

People are doing their Christmas mailing slowly.

That's what Johnnie Back, postmaster, says this week as he urges everyone to go ahead and mail those Christmas packages if they wish the parcels to reach their destinations by the holiday.

Parcels which go for a very great distance must go to terminals, the postmaster said, and they simply won't be delivered by Christmas if they are not mailed early.

"Prepare the parcels well," Back emphasized. "Parcels which go for long distances need to be tied—paper tape is not sufficient for parcels, especially heavy packages, if they go far."

Then, too, in addition to being well tied, the packages should be wrapped securely, not just thrown together. Furthermore, the addresses should be plain, for the postal workers will be very busy during the next few weeks.

And, too, parcels must have a return address marked plainly on them.

By the way, the postmaster says, don't try mailing your unsealed Christmas cards for one and one-half cents—they won't go anywhere at that rate. Christmas cards now cost two cents to be mailed unsealed.
