New programs are in the works for job training and computerizing data on the industrial stages offered by Texas communities.

The Industrial Commission announced its computer program will go into operation this summer with completion of data on cities across the state.

The Texas Municipal League, members of Commerce and Industrial developers are cooperating.

The commission plans to provide information on every town in Texas, listing natural resources available, economic potential and strengths in each place.

A program also is designed to help communities which are most likely to be benefited in their attractions.

Meanwhile, a three-year project to develop industry's views to determine what training is needed and where was announced at the Governor's Conference on Technical-Vocational Education here.

Construction Industry Council for Education, Manpower Research will receive \$90,000 from Texas Education Agency to help other industries in training based on families, occupations or employment.

It will use the system to develop an environmental technology program expected to benefit between 9,000 and 10,000 students in 1972.

Students will get an introduction to the industries in the 11th grade, study plumbing in the tenth grade, heat and cooling in the eleventh, and their senior year, they will get jobs for part-time super-advanced training. After high school, they can go directly to a trade or take advanced training in technology or engineering. Industry and education agencies cooperate in offering the training.

Funeral services for Rev. George Rodrick MacDonald, 76, who died Tuesday at 12:04 a. m. in High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo, will be held Friday, April 3 at 2 p. m. at the McLean Presbyterian Church. Rev. Dudley Bristow, pastor, of Lela Baptist Church, will officiate.

MacDonald, born January 22, 1894 at Butte, Montana, moved to McLean from Belvedere, S. D. in March, 1968. He was married to Kate Morgan at Wheeler on June 24, 1968 and they resided 7 1/2 miles north of McLean.

He had finished Gordon Seminary in Boston in 1920 and held pastorates in Mass., Maine, Montana, Washington State, North and South Dakota. He had pastored McLean Presbyterian 1949-1950 and again in 1968 until his death.

Survivors are his wife Kate; three daughters, Mrs. W. R. McCune of Tremont, Ohio, Mrs. G. E. Udem of Sherman, S. D., Sara MacDonald of Champaign, Ill.; one son, John MacDonald of Los Angeles, Calif.; one brother, Fraser MacDonald of Seattle, Wash.; 11 grandchildren.

Burial will be in the Hillcrest Cemetery under the direction of Lamb Funeral Home.

Taxpayers Asked To Wait 10 Weeks Before Writing About Refund

Ten weeks from the date a Federal income tax return calling for a refund is mailed, the taxpayer should have either his check or a letter explaining why it is held up, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for North Texas, said today.

A taxpayer who has not heard about his refund should, therefore, wait ten weeks before writing IRS. Most taxpayers will find their inquiry unnecessary if they wait this long, Mr. Campbell said.

Millions of tax returns are handled every filing season at the Austin Service Center which serves North Texas taxpayers. That many returns makes it practically impossible to locate a particular return and to answer any question about it until processing cycles are complete.

If it does become necessary to write, the taxpayer should indicate where and when he filed his return and give his

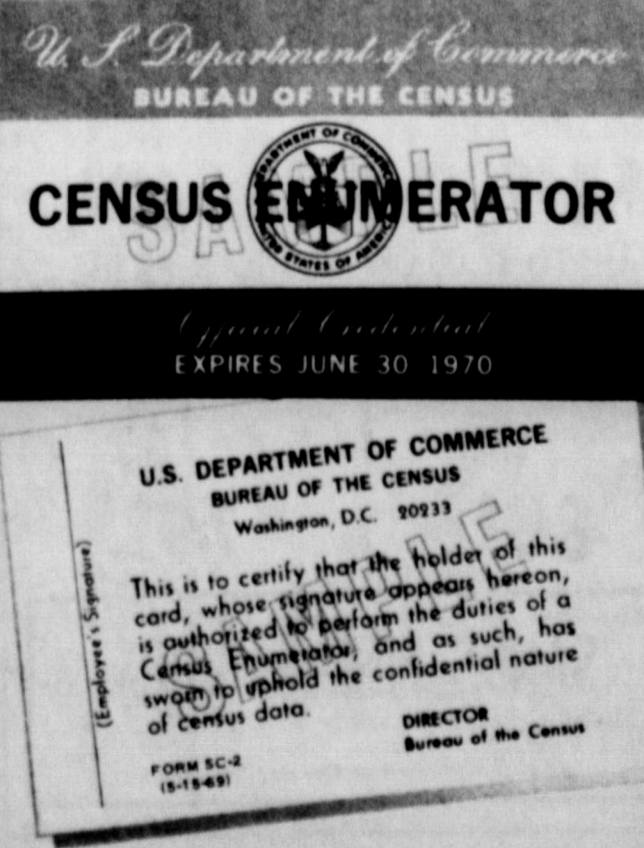
Census Takers Easy To Identify

House holders will not have any difficulty identifying enumerators for the 1970 Census of Population and Housing, District Manager R. L. Butler pointed out today. Enumerators, or census takers (most of whom are women), started making their rounds in the area on April 1 and are expected to complete their work in three to five weeks.

Each census taker will wear a red, white, and blue identification card. This card bears the seal of the Department of Commerce, and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. It bears the census taker's signature and certifies that she is authorized to perform the duties of a census enumerator and has sworn to keep confidential all census information you provide.

Persons purporting to be census takers who do not have this identification card should be reported immediately to the local police or to the census district office.

Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is blue and bears the legend, "1970 Census." In the portfolio, the census taker carries her supplies of report forms, maps, pencils, and other tools necessary for her work.

BOARD-AG CLASH

Texas Air Control Board has asked the attorney general's office of demanding too much evidence before it will take action before it takes litigation cases to court.

TEST REINSTATED

Tuberculosis tests have been reinstated at all border ports of entry for cattle imported from Mexico, reports the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Action was taken under terms of a Travis County district court order enjoining the commission from permitting entry into Texas of cattle from Mexico in violation of health regulations.

Will Rogers' Indispensable Friend

In his own delightful, highly personal, amusing style, Will Rogers lassoed the hearts of America in the 1920's and 1930's.

The Oklahoma cowboy was, in Damon Runyon's words, "America's most complete human document." Rogers was a showman. The core of his act was his soliloquy which concerned human nature in general and politics in particular. It was barbed and good-natured.

The remarks registered best when he artfully appeared to be tossing them off while primarily concerned with unknitting a rope and making it spin.

He also made a place as a newspaper or syndicated paragrapher, and like many other amateurs, was a "doctor who looked at literature."

Rogers enjoyed and appreciated his newspaper. All he knew, he said, was what he read in the paper.

Some more of his thoughts on his newspaper bear passing on:

"Take away my ham, take away my eggs, even my chili, but leave my newspaper. Even if it has such purely local news as 'Jim Jones came home last night unexpectedly and bloodshed ensued,' or 'Jesse Bushy-head, our local M.D., is having one of the best years in his career, practically speaking — but they just won't pay him when they get well,' and 'Election ain't far off, and everybody is up for office that can sign an application blank.'"

"Now all that doesn't seem much news to you. But it is news, especially when you know the people and they are your own folks. So, no matter how punk you think your local newspaper is, let them take it away from you for a while and see how you feel. The old newspaper, I think, is about our biggest blessing. So let's read and be merry, for tomorrow the paper may not have enough ads to come out."

"A breakfast without a newspaper is a horse without a saddle. You are just riding bareback if you got no news for breakfast. Don't underestimate your paper. I don't care how small it is, and how little news you think it might have in it at that particular issue. Lord, kiss it, for the news that it does bring you."

Now, we are going to let Will Rogers cut loose on a number of other topics:

"There ain't nothing that breaks up homes, country and nations like somebody publishing their memoirs."

"Our investigations have always contributed more to our amusement than they have to knowledge."

"It's great to be great but it's greater to be human."

"Half our life is spent trying to find something to do with the time we have rushed through life trying to save."

"We know lots of things we didn't use to know but we don't know any way to prevent 'em happening."

"A difference of opinion is what makes horse racing and missionaries."

"I never met a man I didn't like."

23% of 1970 Saving Bonds Goal Reached in Gray County

United States Saving Bond sales during February in Gray County totaled \$39,802 according to an announcement today by County Bond Chairman George B. Cree, Jr. Sales for the first two months were \$94,978 -- 23 percent of the 1970 sales goal.

Treasury figures show that Texans purchased \$16,678,196 in Savings Bonds during February -- an increase of 16 percent over February 1969. Series E sales alone during the month were \$15,497 million compared to \$12,940 million during 1969 -- an increase of 19.7 percent. Sales for the two month period totaled \$32,540,738 with 18 per cent of the yearly goal of \$179.9 million achieved.

Nationally, there were new purchases of E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares amounting to \$414 million. Total cash sales for the first two months of the year totaled \$821 million -- 5.1 per cent below a year earlier.

1040 U.S. Individual Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) Is there a Form 1040-1 and if so, where can I get a copy?

A) The designation 1040-1 refers to the page number of the back of the first copy of the Form 1040 in the tax packages sent to all taxpayers this year. On it will be found general information on the new Form 1040. Other general instructions for Form 1040 continue on the back of the taxpayer's copy of the 1040 and on pages B-2, E-2, and R-2, all of which are found in the package. The designations 1040-1 and 1040-2 were used simply for numbering and indexing purposes and do not refer to any form separate and apart from the 1040 itself. This same approach applies to other instructions in the package, which, again for indexing purposes, also have been given alphabetical and numerical designations.

Q) The estimated tax forms you sent me said to watch for changes in the law. Have there been any that would affect my 1970 declaration?

A) One change that affects all taxpayers is the increase in the amount allowed for personal exemptions. For the 1970 tax year, \$625 should be taken for each exemption. The Tax Reform Act of 1969 increased the amount for personal exemptions from \$600 to \$650 effective next July 1 when the necessary adjustments will be made in withholding rates. Since the change takes place at mid-year, the net effect will be to increase the exemption amount to \$625. Also, the tax surcharge has been continued at a 5 percent annual rate for the period January 1, 1970, through June 30, 1970, or 2.5 percent for the tax year 1970.

Q) Do I handle dividends from a savings and loan account the same way as other dividends?

A) No, this income should be reported as interest on line 13 of Form 1040. If your total interest income is over \$100, list the amounts you receive on Schedule B, Part II, and attach it to your return when you file.

Q) I just sent in my return. How long will I have to wait for my refund?

A) If your return is accurate and complete, you should have your refund within 5-6 weeks of the date you filed. However, should your refund be delayed beyond this period, wait 10 weeks before contacting IRS about it. This will allow time for any notice to reach you about an error or omission such as a missing Social Security number, W-2 or one of the schedules.

Q) Who can use the tax surcharge tables in the 1040 package?

A) The tables should be used for determining the surcharge if your income tax is under \$735. For \$735 and over, multiply your tax by 10 percent to determine the surcharge you owe for 1969.

Q) Will IRS figure the tax for you even if you end up owing tax?

A) Yes, if there is tax due, you will be billed and have 30 days to make full payment. IRS can only compute the tax where the taxpayer's gross income is under \$5,000 which consists of wages subject to withholding and not more than \$200 of dividends, interest and wages not subject to withholding, and the standard deduction is claimed. But the taxpayer computes his tax when he is claiming sick pay, moving expenses, or employee business expenses.

Q) Do you have to itemize deductions to get any credit for hospital insurance premiums paid?

A) Yes, you must itemize to claim this deduction. However, you may deduct half of your medical insurance premiums up to a maximum of \$150 even though your other medical expenses do not exceed 3 percent of your adjusted gross income.

Q) I pay someone to take care of my two girls while I work. Is there any deduction for this?

A) You may deduct all or part of this expense when certain conditions are met. These conditions are explained on page A-2 of the 1040 tax package you received in the mail.

Q) I'm over 65. Do I still have to file a tax return?

A) Your age entitles you to an additional \$600 exemption and therefore you are not required to file a return unless your gross income is \$1,200 or over. However, if you had net earnings from self-employment of \$400 or more, even if your gross income was less than \$1,200, a return will have to be filed and self-employment tax paid.

Q) Are union dues deductible?

A) Yes, these dues are deductible as an employee business expense if you itemize. For more details on these expenses, check page E-2 of the 1040 instruction package.



"Iffy" Marriage

"I do love you enough to get married," said the young man to his girl friend, "but frankly I don't care for the financial burdens that go with it. Suppose we make an agreement that your father will continue to be responsible for all your expenses after the wedding." The girl and her father promptly agreed to this arrangement, and the wedding bells rang out. For a time, she was content to receive regular checks from her father.

But when the bloom of love began to fade, she decided that—despite the premarital agreement—her husband would have to start supporting her himself.

And, after a hearing in court, the judge ruled that she was entitled to make such a demand. He said a husband's duty of support is an inherent part of the marriage relationship. Not even by a premarital agreement, said the judge, may a husband escape an obligation that is imposed by law.

True, the law does allow some "ifs" in the marriage contract. As to matters less basic than support, the bride and bridegroom may indeed enter into a premarital agreement that will be binding. For example:

A widower, planning to remarry, obtained an agreement from his fiancée that in case he died, certain property would go to the children of his first marriage.

After he died a few years later, the second wife tried to back out of her agreement. However, a court

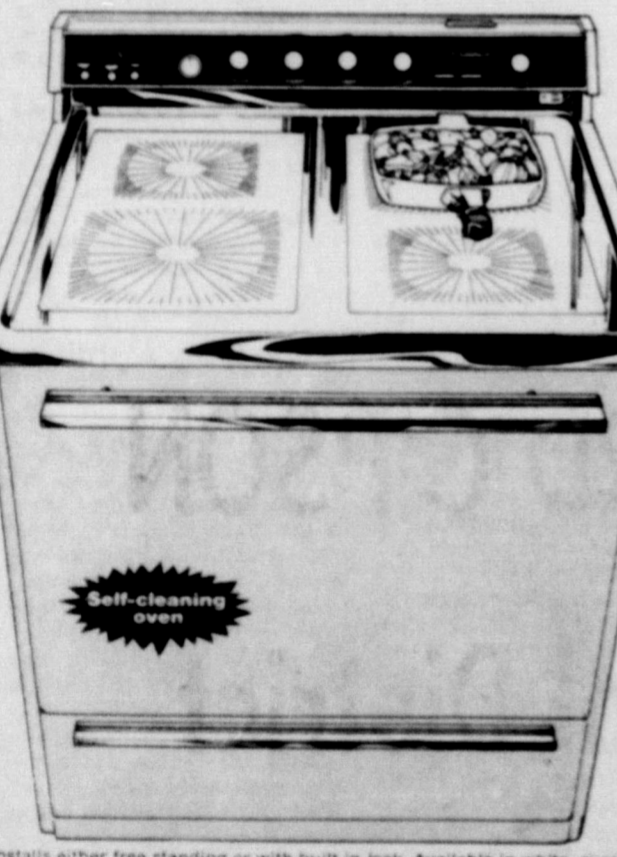

The Native grasses, Big and Little bluestem, grass, Indiangrass, Side grama, and Blue grama have trash and litter left on the grass drilled into soil. Almost impossible to eradicate these grasses on a clean seeded. Date for planting native grasses is Jan. 1 to May 15. The best time is February.

New stands of grass should be protected from weed competition by shredding or with a biocide. They should also be protected from grazing until grass is well established. In some cases this means that will have to be fenced.

Diversion Terraces Help Protect Land

Diversion terraces are another conservation practice to help erosion problems and protect the land.

Diversion terraces should not be thought of as filed terraces and are not to be used to take the place of field terraces. Diversion terraces are primarily used in pastures and on flat slopes in Cropland intercept great quantities of water and to dispose of it on a safe outlet to control erosion problems. Diversion terraces are used to divert runoff water to a pond or to carry the water from a pond spillway to a safe outlet.

A diversion terrace is a design terrace, designed to a size and channel capacity that will carry the runoff water from the above watershed whether it is four acres or two hundred acres.

Due to the variation in size of the diversion terrace, the payment through the ASCS or Great Plains is by the cubic yard and the contractors construct them by the cubic yard. The ASCS pays about 50 percent and Great Plains about 70 percent help on construction of diversion.

For assistance on your grassland and cropland erosion problems contact your local Soil Conservation personnel.

Directions for safe use are spelled out on insecticide labels. Be sure to follow those directions precisely or the bugs in your garden might not be the only ones poisoned.

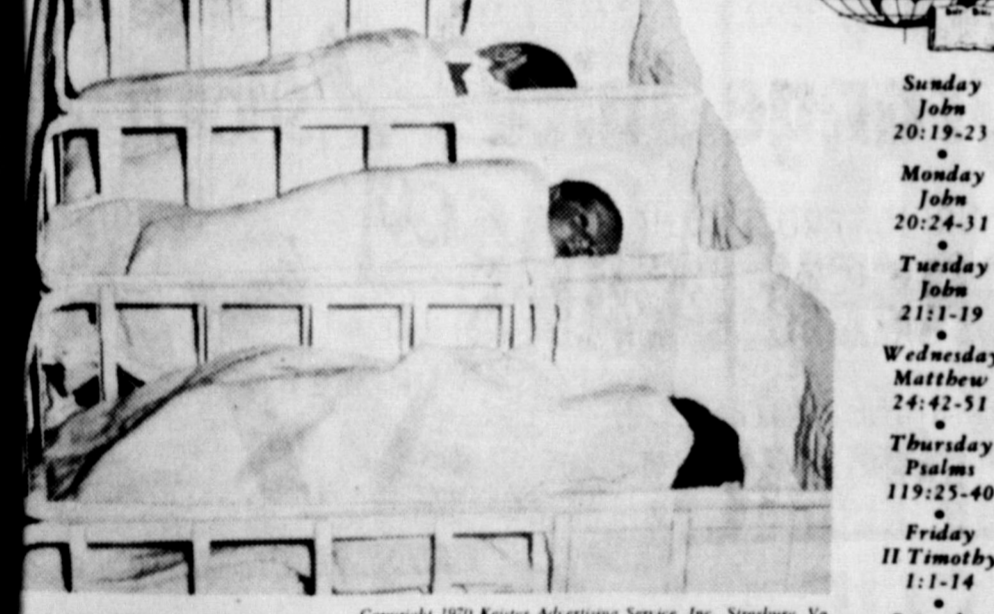

April Is Honey Month For Shoppers

April is a honey of a month for Texas food shoppers. Honey supplies are especially plentiful.

U.S. honey production during 1969 figured at a record-large 283 million pounds. Honey is produced commercially throughout the continental United States.

Other foods reported plentiful during April by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service are canned peaches, canned tomato products, canned and frozen sweet corn, peanuts and peanut products, dry beans and eggs.

High-protein foods such as peanuts and peanut butter, dry beans and eggs offer welcome variation in mealtime planning. Last year's peanut crop set a new record. Dry bean production was six per cent above average. April output of eggs is expected to run above a year ago.

Production of canned cling peaches amounted to a record-large 37.1 million cases. You'll enjoy serving these delicious peaches in a variety of ways. Processed tomato items also will be at record-high levels.

Custom-Made Town Builds-In Safety

A new town for 75,000 people being built on 12,000 acres of open farmland has incorporated the best new ideas in traffic control.

Litchfield Park, Arizona has arterial roads which are limited access parkways, fenced off and landscaped. There are no pedestrians, roadside stores, homes, driveways, or parked cars to interfere with the flow of traffic. Very few traffic lights are needed.

All businesses are in shopping centers and industrial parks. Even gasoline stations are off the main roads. Homes are built on cul-de-sacs or long, looping roads that return cars to their original entry point.

A complete 35-mile long network of pathways winds throughout the town for pedestrians, and bicyclists. It crosses main roads via overpasses, and keeps vehicular traffic entirely separate from foot traffic. The road system has safety built-in.

Get Ahead In Your Job

Here Are Seven Ways To Get A Raise

Turn out more work? Beat your deadlines? Of course. Come up with an idea that earns or saves a tidy sum for the company? No doubt about it — you're in line for a raise if you do any of these things. But, how do you do it? If you're already doing a good job, how can you do a sufficiently better job to make the big difference?

These seven steps, taken in many a successful career, may help.

1. Listen with both ears. Speech experts estimate that the average man hears only half of what's said to him! By getting all the facts the first time around, you avoid costly mistakes and time-wasting back-tracking. A busy boss prizes the employee who has to be told only once.

2. Become an idea man. It's easier than many people think. Be observant! That's the first step. Be skeptical that the "tried and true" way is always the best! That's the second. Train yourself to pinpoint areas of waste, inefficiency, needless complications in your daily work routine.

Form the brain-storming habit: write down as many solutions as you can think of, drawing on everything you know from your own experience and from what you have observed. Many of the best

"new" ideas are simply adaptations of procedures that worked in other fields.

3. Recognize your failings. It's fine to have faith in your abilities, but it may be equally profitable to understand what traits are blocking your path to success. What does the boss most often criticize about your work? Would certain tasks be easier if you were better organized or more highly trained?

4. Know your boss's job. So that one day when he moves up to a higher slot you'll be a logical candidate to succeed him. Also, if you know your boss's job — understand the duties of all the other people who report to him, and how he coordinates their efforts — you'll have a clearer perspective of your own job. You'll understand his problems and pressures, and how to be most useful to him. In short, you will be a more effective employee — the kind who deserves and gets a raise!

5. Make the clock work for you. Plan your time as much as possible by using calendar pads, memory-jogging notes, and methodical files. Get into the habit of estimating how long each task should take you, then trying to save a few minutes... a half hour... even several hours off your day. Here's where being

a clock-watcher can help you — if you use the clock as a stimulus, not an escape.

6. Learn! Read as widely as possible: trade publications, professional and technical books in your field, general-interest magazines. That money-making knack of idea creation depends to a great extent on how much knowledge you can draw upon. Also, seek to acquire skills that will make you more promotable; a working knowledge of accounting, for example, will probably make you a lot more valuable to your company, no matter what type of business it is, or maybe you should consider preparing yourself for a transfer to a growth area such as accounting where the demand for qualified people exceeds the supply.

Bombarding the boss with questions is not a sign of alertness; ask only the questions that are strictly necessary to get the job done. And then do it to the best of your ability and don't voice qualms or doubts even if you have them. As Donald R. Morrison, President of International Accountants Society, Inc., points out: "Companies can always find lightweights to do the easy jobs. What they look for are men and women who eagerly take on the hard job."

Is there a co-worker who "gets your goat"? Avoid voicing your sentiments, even if justified. Bosses hesitate to promote even an able man if they feel it will cause friction in a department — and you may find yourself passed over in favor of someone who has the reputation of getting along with everyone.

Follow these seven positive steps toward making a good job performance better, and you will find that you have promoted your own interests and raised more than your hopes for getting ahead.
