BAPTISTS SET DINNER FOR OCTOBER 28

A Loyalty Dinner, in connection with the First Baptist Church Forward Program of Finance, will be held at the American Hall October 28, beginning at 7 p. m. Rev. Jesse Leonard, pastor, stated that the dinner is one of the big events in the new finance program being conducted by the church. Dr. Franklin E. Swanner, mission secretary for District 9, will be the chief speaker for the evening.

Sunlight transformed into electricity! Sounds futuristic, but it'll be one of the two big exhibits to be displayed in McLean Friday and Saturday at Southwestern Bell's open house.

The open house will be in the new telephone building here from 1 to 5 p. m. Friday and from 1 to 9 p. m. Saturday, District Manager Joe McDonald announced.

"We hope to see as many of our McLean people as possible," McDonald said.

The sunlight-into-electricity demonstration is made possible by the new Bell Solar Battery. McDonald said the battery is similar to the one now being used to provide electrical energy for a radio in the US satellite placed in orbit a short time ago.

Besides the solar battery, the manager said a "voice mirror" will be brought to McLean. "With this device," said McDonald, "you can hear your own voice just as it sounds on the telephone. It's

really a lot of fun, and most people are surprised to find out they sound pretty good."

In addition to these exhibits, the complicated telephone equipment here will be displayed. Telephone subscribers will be shown the exact pair of wires that bring their telephone service if they can recall their number, the manager said.

Special invitations have been sent to telephone subscribers to attend the open house.

"We hope to see as many of our McLean people as possible," McDonald said.

Tigers Hang To 2-A Lead

★ ★ TO MEET CYCLONE TOMORROW

McLean's mighty Tigers will be out to keep a perfect record in district action tomorrow night as they host the Memphis Cyclone in the third 2-A contest of the season.

After bowling over Panhandle last week, the Tigers stand with a 2-0 mark in conference play, tied with White Deer for the lead. Memphis, on the other hand, will be looking for its second district victory of the year, having dropped two of three encounters with 2-A teams.

For the year, the Cyclones have compiled a dismal 1-6 record, scoring their lone victory over the Lefors Pirates with a dubious 6-0 margin.

In other games, Memphis was beaten by Tulla, 36-8; Estelline, 21-20; Wellington, 16-6; Quannah, 42-0; Clarendon, 22-0; and Canadian, 30-8.

The Tigers have suffered two defeats for the year, the first to Groom, 12-0; and the second to Wellington, 20-0. They have downed Shamrock, 32-16; Wheeler, 36-14; Canadian, 8-0; and Panhandle, 26-6.

By mutual comparison, the Tigers look far stronger with the exception of Wellington. Memphis lost to the Skyrocks by a 10 point margin while the Tigers fell by 20 points.

At the present time the Tigers have scored 102 points while allowing opponents 68 points. Memphis has scored 48 points while allowing opponents 167 points.

Game time is 7:30 on Duncan Field.

Clout Panthers, 26-6 To Chalk Second Conference Victory

McLean's aggressive Tigers bounced back into the winners circle Friday night as they roared by the Panhandle Panthers, 26-6, in a game played on the Panthers' home ground.

Boasting one win against no losses in District 2-A competition, the Tigers remained in a tie for first place with White Deer after the Panhandle rout, making a perfect 2-0 district mark.

Coach Clifford Bradshaw's Tigers jumped to a first quarter lead when the line stopped a Panhandle punt deep in the Panthers' end of the field. David Crockett plunged over from 9 yards out a minute later to chalk the tally.

In the second quarter O. K. Lee pushed the McLean score up when he raced 15 yards on an end run. Only a few plays later Lee again broke loose, sacking up 42 yards and the third Tiger TD.

The Panthers managed their lone score late in the second quarter with a pass and run combination from Jim Elder to Mike Stone.

Quarterback Ken Willingham, tagged the final touchdown for the Tigers in the third period when he scampered over from the five yard line.

Crockett, McLean's potential all-stater, shared the bulk of the yards gained with Lee, a converted end who is proving to be one of the area's top running backs.

Tomorrow night the Tigers will be back on home ground when they host the Memphis Cyclone in a District 2-A contest to start at 7:30 p. m.

NEW PLAN WILL ELIMINATE WHITE DEER FROM DIST. 2-A

Of interest to all football fans in McLean was the announcement this week that after 1959 the Tigers will not compete with White Deer and Panhandle in district competition.

The re-districting placed Canadian, Clarendon, Lefors, Memphis and McLean in 2-A beginning next season.

White Deer and Panhandle will join 1-A, which includes Gruver, Stinnett, Stratford and Sunny. In the past two seasons, the 1-A district has held perennial powers in the Class A circuit.

Conversely, 2-A's main powers for the past two seasons have been McLean and White Deer. The switch was regarded as mainly advantageous for McLean, as they have prospects during the next few seasons of being one of the chief contenders for the 2-A title.

'LEARNING' TESTS GIVEN HI SCHOOLERS

A test designed to measure McLean students' learning was administered here Tuesday and Wednesday of this week, High School Principal Harold Bunch, said yesterday.

The Iowa Test of Educational Development in learning was given to freshmen and juniors. The nine divisions included in the test included understanding of basic social concepts, general background in the natural sciences, correctness and appropriateness of expression, ability to do quantitative thinking, interpretation of reading material for social studies, natural sciences and literature, and general vocabulary and use of sources of information.

The results of these tests are used in counseling with students as to their points of strength and weakness so they can better plan a future course of study.

YOUR TAX BILL

How much money in taxes will the average man pay between now and age 65?

Frank R. Ford has figured out the answer, in an article which appeared originally in the New York World-Telegram and the Sun and has been condensed in Reader's Digest.

This average man is 29 years old, makes a little under \$100 a week, and has a wife, two children, a low-priced car and a mortgaged home.

In the next 36 years, says Mr. Ford, he can expect to pay \$47,221 in taxes. That amounts to \$25.23 a week—or more than 25% of his income.

Federal income taxes are the biggest single item. Even so, they come to but 44% of the total. The balance consists of social security taxes, real estate taxes, personal property taxes, taxes on gasoline and tires, sales taxes, state income taxes, and so on.

To cap the climax, Mr. Ford emphasizes that the figures are conservative—for they don't take into consideration future tax increases. And the way things are going, increases seem as certain as tomorrow morning.

What it amounts to is that the average man puts in a quarter of his working time in behalf of the government. Then, what money he has left has been ravaged by inflation.
