TIGERS LEAD 2-A AFTER FIRST ROUND

Bengals Undefeated Through 4 Games; Clarendon Is Next

Canadian held McLean's Tiger and Tigerette scoring aces to their lowest point totals of the year last Friday, but the locals still managed to split a pair of District 2-A games.

The contests in Canadian closed the first round of conference play, and McLean goes to Clarendon Friday night to open the second round. Lefors is due here next Tuesday.

Derrith Welch came through with 23 points at Canadian, his best effort of the season, as the Tigers won their fourth straight 2-A game 32-41.

Bailey Scores 28
Jan Bailey tossed 28 points through the hoop for the Tigerettes, but it was all in vain. Canadian pulled the game out of the fire in the fourth quarter 50-47.

It was the first district loss for Coach Lloyd Hunt's Tigerettes in three outings.

Jim Watson, the Bengal's leading scorer, sank only six points Friday.

Welch got his big 23 points on seven field goals and nine free throws. Ken Williamson added 13, while Don Woods tossed in 10, Clyde Windom eight and Bill Gold-ton two.

Narrow Lead
Coach Derral Davis' Tigers held a narrow 16-14 lead at the close of the first quarter, then moved ahead 28-23 at halftime. They scored on the points in the last half, finishing the third period with a 45-31 advantage.

Cindy Rice, the McLean sextet's usual leading scorer, finished the evening with only six points, but Miss Bailey's 28 and Helen Smith's 3 kept the Tigerettes in the game.

The Tigerettes led through three periods—10-7, 22-16 and 33-30.

Doctor H Return, owned by the Doctor Hereford Ranch in McLean, was named reserve champion Hereford bull at the Southwestern Exposition and Fair Stock Show this week in Fort Worth.

The fine Hereford bull, shown by Faris Hess of McLean, partner in the Doctor Hereford Ranch with Bill Wright of Fort Worth, had only the week before been selected the grand champion in the Amarillo Fair Stock Show.

Significance of the honor is underscored by the fact that 5,397 cattle, sheep and swine—topping last year's record total—were entered in the 1962 show.

The entry list in all departments neared 10,000.

last week.

Candidates for the school board must file in the school district office by March 8.

They are George W. Terry of McLean, seeking the state representative's position; Mrs. Helen Sprinkle, Pampa, who has filed for re-election as district clerk in Gray County; and Ola Gregory, Pampa, asking re-election as county treasurer.

Filing for county offices and for state representative from the 87th District ends on Feb. 5.

C. H. BUTRUM RITES HELD

Clarence Humphrey Butrum, beloved resident of the Lefors community for many years and faithful member of the First Baptist Church, died at 4:30 a. m. Thursday, Jan. 25, in Highland General Hospital in Pampa.

He was taken to the hospital the previous evening in the Lefors community ambulance following a heart attack.

Funeral services were held Saturday, Jan. 27, in the First Baptist Church in Lefors, with Rev. Ed Spivey, pastor, and former pastors of the church, Rev. Luther Berry of Spearman, Rev. Therman O. Upshaw of Pampa, Rev. Bob Lawrence of Clarendon and Rev. Dan Beltz of McLean, officiating.

Mr. Butrum was born Dec. 28, 1890, being 71 years of age at the time of his death. He retired from Phillips Petroleum Co. six years ago. He was born in Arkansas and moved to Lefors in 1931 from Wynona, Okla.

It's the Law in TEXAS

LEGAL CHECK-UP
 Legal trouble is easier and cheaper to prevent than to cure. Most wage-earning, child-bearing, home-buying, installment-paying families don't see much need for a family lawyer. Often under prodding, one may get a lawyer to write a will. But can you tell a big legal risk from a small one? Can you spot the signs of legal trouble? Check with your family lawyer when:
 1. Your status changes: Upon coming of age, marriage, the birth of a child, buying a house, divorce or death. For you may then need to draft or revise your will, change your insurance, or refigure your taxes.
 2. You buy or sell. Look out for flaws in the papers before you go into debt, part with money, or sign anything involving big expenditures or long term obligations.
 3. You enter into other contracts. Promises, spoken or written, bind you if they call for a "consideration," something of value in return.
 4. Someone threatens your rights. The law exists to defend them but with some rights you must take action for yourself for them to work for you.
 When you can bring your lawyer "live" facts (e. g. unsigned contracts, vexing tax returns you haven't filed), he can do much more for you, and at a smaller cost than when you bring him "cold" facts (mistakes you have made which threaten trouble).
 But above all, get both live and cold facts to him at once. For time may run out in many such situations. Your lawyer may be able to do something for you today, which he cannot do tomorrow.
 Tell your lawyer what you want. Tell him all the facts, good or bad, and then keep him informed all along. He is sworn to keep what you tell in confidence, and he cannot serve you without full knowledge.

Cotton Variety Is Important Factor In Mechanical Harvest

Did your mechanical cotton harvester do a satisfactory job on this year's crop? If it didn't, the blame might lay with the variety of cotton you planted.

According to tests conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, some cotton varieties are more suitable to mechanical harvesting than others. For the studies 11 open-boll varieties were tested on the Texas A and M Plantation near College Station and 12 storm-resistant varieties were tested at Substation No. 6 near Denton.

In the mechanical picking tests all varieties were planted on the same date and all received the same cultural practices. All were harvested in a once-over operation and immediately after the harvesting the cotton remaining on the plants and cotton dropped to the ground was collected and weighed.

This information was then analyzed statistically to determine mechanical picking efficiency. The storm-resistant varieties were tested in the same manner, but two different types of stripper rolls were used. Double steel rolls, which are used on some commercial strippers, and rubber paddle stripper rolls developed by the experiment station were used on all varieties. In almost every case the rubber paddle stripper rolls showed higher harvesting efficiency.

If you use machine harvesting, and did not get the harvesting efficiency you desired on your last crop, then you should get a copy of PR 2209. This Texas Agricultural Experiment Station publication contains the test results, and this information may help you select a cotton variety more suitable to mechanical harvesting. A copy may be obtained from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

INCOME TAX

C. H. Bates, our farm management specialist at College Station, sent me a chart which the Internal Revenue Service recommends for those making out the long form on their income tax return.

You may use this as a guide in estimating sales tax that is deductible under taxes on your long form.

If your income as reported on Line 9, Page 1, Form 1040, is between \$2,500 and \$2,999, you may deduct \$6; between \$3,000 and \$3,499, \$7; \$3,500 to \$3,999, \$8; \$4,000 to \$4,999, \$9; \$5,000 to \$4,999, \$10; \$5,000 to \$5,999, \$11; \$5,500 to \$5,999, \$12; \$6,000 to \$6,499, \$13; \$6,500 to \$6,999, \$14; \$7,000 to \$7,999, \$15; \$8,000 to \$8,999, \$16; \$9,000 to \$9,499, \$17; \$9,500 to \$9,999, \$18; \$10,000 to \$10,999, \$19.

The above amounts are for the last four months in 1961 since the tax did not become effective until Sept. 1, 1961.

To find out what it will be for the coming year, multiply by three.

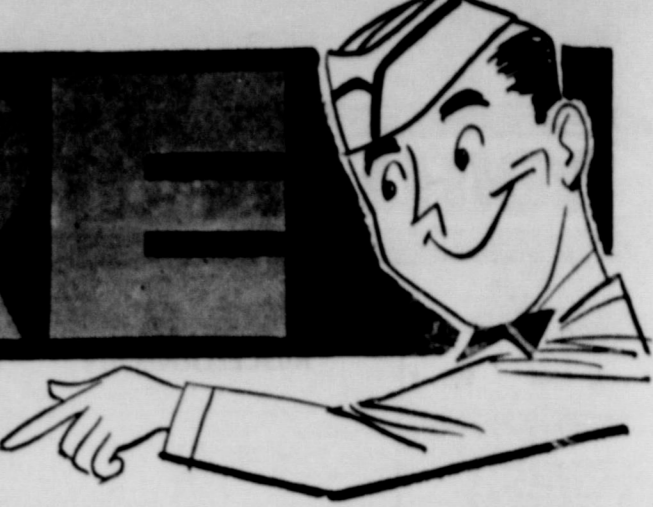

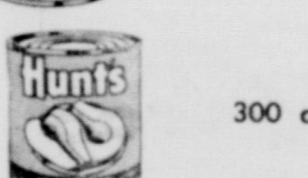
