"Our old fixtures don't look right in the store now," Mary explained.

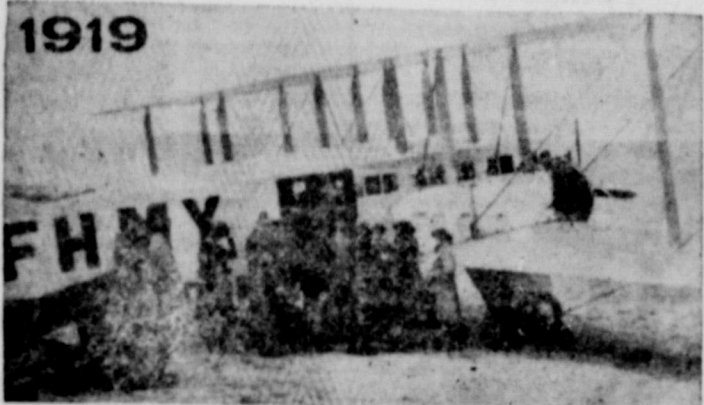
Jimmie Don Morris has collected bids on the Southwestern Public Service office work, and the project should be getting underway before too long.

Caution Urged

Grass Fire Danger In Area Increases

The increasing number of grass fires in McLean and surrounding areas this week prompted Fire Chief Boyd Meador to caution residents to be extremely careful.

Meador said the dry condition of fields and yards of this time of year makes it easy for fires to start.

Several grass fire alarms have been answered in the past two weeks, both in the city and in the rural areas.

The latest occurred Tuesday afternoon when grass near a residence in downtown McLean caught fire and threatened the house before volunteer firemen reached the scene.

Boards Catch Fire

Boards at the foundation of the house were ignited but quickly extinguished by the firemen, who then kept watch while the remainder of the grass in the yard, on an adjacent lot and in the alley burned.

Firemen last Thursday night also set fire to grass on vacant property in northeastern and southern portions of the city to eliminate a hazard.

Residents having vacant lots they wish the grass burned off of were invited to contact the fire chief or other members of the department.

Meador asked residents to remain nearby when they are burning trash to make certain that the fire does not spread.

Answer 34 Calls

Firemen answered a total of 34 fire calls during 1961. Of this number 17 were grass fires—14 occurring out of town and three inside the city.

There were seven automobile fires out of town and one in McLean. Miscellaneous fires totaled four in the city and five outside.

Largest single fire was at the Crockett Lumber and Builders Supply, which accounted for most of the loss during the year.

Fire Marshal Jimmie Don Morris estimated that the total fire loss amounted to \$16,050 in McLean last year.

Heavy fire losses cause an increase in insurance premiums in the city.

Project Mercury commemorative stamps have gone on sale at the McLean Post Office, Postmaster Bill Reeves announced Wednesday.

The stamps were prepared in commemoration of Marine Lt. Col. John Glenn Jr.'s successful orbiting of the earth Tuesday.

The stamp features an artist's drawing of the space capsule in which Glenn made the historic three trips around the earth.

Reeves also said that the Post Office is closed today in observance of George Washington's birthday. No counter service is available, but mail is being handled on a regular schedule.

Three school trustees are to be elected on April 7. Filing for the school election ends on March 8.

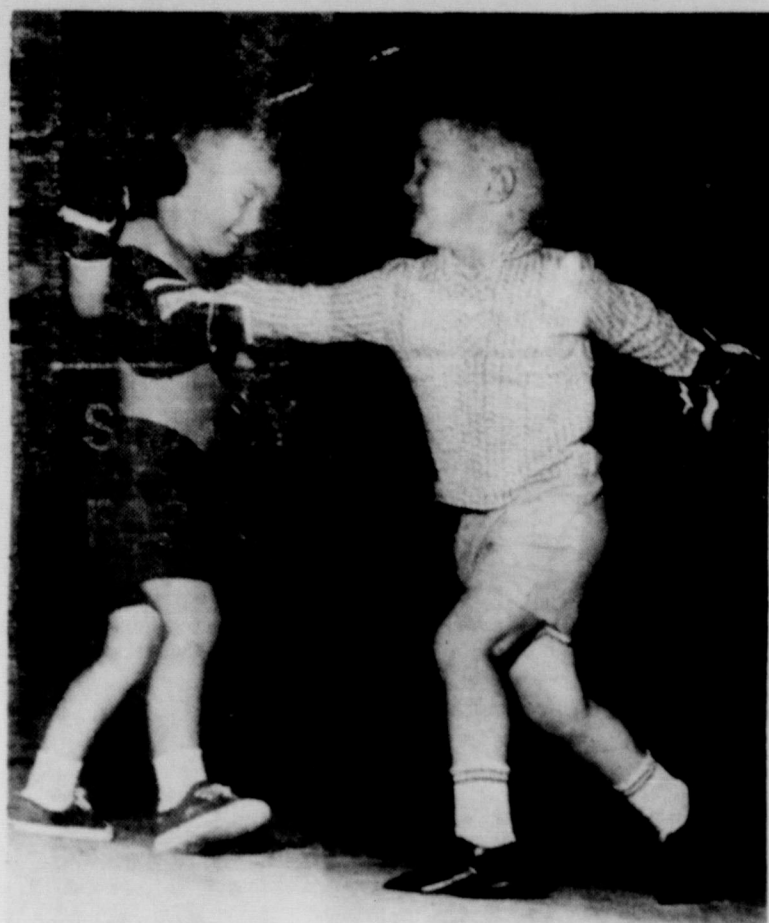

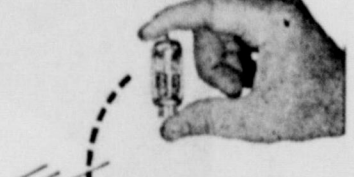

Screwworm Control Aim of Drive Here, All Across Texas

Stockmen and sportsmen of Texas and the Southwest have been requested by the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation to "pull all stops" immediately in their drive to control and possibly eliminate the costly screwworm.

John B. Rice of McLean, chairman of the Gray County screwworm control program committee, said he had been advised by the foundation's board of trustees that the long-sought goal of a screwworm free Southwest would be a possibility for 1962 if full advantage is taken of the recent hard freeze which dealt the flesh-eating parasite a very crippling blow.

Rice added that if the \$3 million voluntary contribution goal of the drive is reached within the next two to three weeks, they could expect estimated savings during the next two years of \$200 million from screwworm damage and treatment costs and a reduction of up to 50 per cent in the cost of the eradication program.

These savings alone, he said, make a stepped-up effort most worthwhile, but more important—"wouldn't it be a wonderful feeling to know that with the return of warm weather we wouldn't be spending time and money fighting the age-old battle against our most costly stock and wildlife pest?"

"We are so close now to success that any slow down could set us back indefinitely and lose for us the advantage gained from the hard freeze."

Chairman Rice said the foundation trustees are moving forward with their plans to get the malester fly release program underway within the next few days. They have also notified all county chairmen of a statewide kickoff meeting for Feb. 14.

The meeting will be held in Austin and representatives from every county will be urged to attend. Reports from 120 counties show that more than half a million dollars is now on deposit at banks in these counties. Organizations are now functioning in 212 counties. Too much is at stake, Rice said, to slow down now and he urged a redoubling of efforts by all drive participants.

George Newberry, Southwestern Bell manager, said the stickers should be attached to the telephone dial wheel.

He said the company had sent the stickers to encourage people to give their area code numbers to friends who call them from out of town.

"We also want our customers to get used to placing out-of-town calls by using area code numbers instead of giving the name of the town they are calling," he added.

Use of the code will bring faster service on calls.

Newberry said the telephone company has another motive in mind when it encourages customers to use area codes. This reason is direct distance dialing, a system by which customers can dial their own out-of-town calls.

He pointed out that the dial telephone equipment cannot recognize any names (even exchange names such as GFlamite 9 are really numbers to the equipment.) So customers who dial their own calls when DDD goes into service—within some two years in McLean—will have to first dial the area code for the place they are calling.

COUNTY GETS ROAD FUNDS

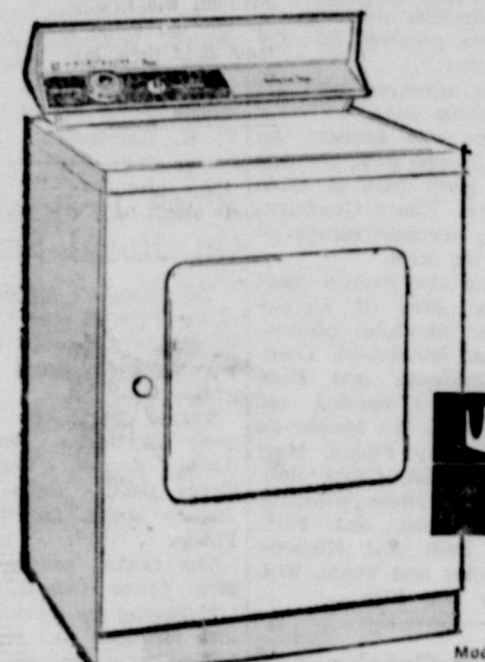

WPS to Install Big Generator Unit

A. R. Watson, president of Southwestern Public Service Co., has announced that the Missouri Valley Electric Co., of Amarillo, has awarded the contract to build a 20,000-kw. unit turbine-generator at the company's Plant X, located seven miles north of Amarillo. Construction will begin this week and completion scheduled for late 1961.

The new unit, manufactured by the General Electric Co., is the largest single turbine-generator ever installed in the area served by Southwestern Public Service Co.

In making the announcement, Watson stated that the new addition represents an investment of \$1,000,000 and is dramatic evidence that this region continues to be one of the fastest growing sections of the country.

This will be the fourth generator unit at Plant X, and will bring capacity up to 487,500 kw. The total for all 12 of Southwestern's plants to more than 1,000,000 kilowatts.

The electrical construction will be handled by Service Electric Co., of Dallas, Texas.

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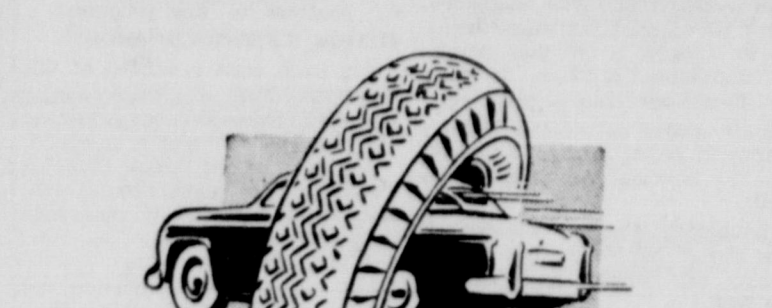

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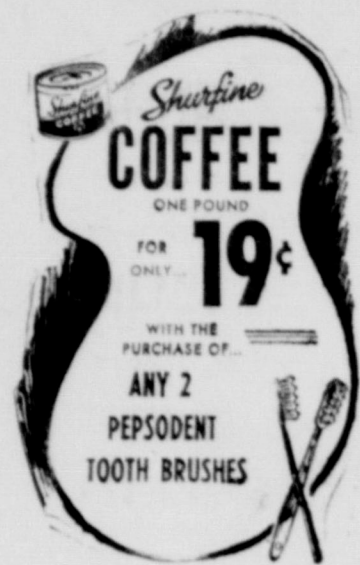
