Amarillo Firm Low Bidder On Hedley Road Project

\$362,797 IS BEST OFFER BOARD HAS

Gilven-Terrill, Inc., of Amarillo was declared low bidder Tuesday on the construction of the McLean-to-Hedley road.

Bids on this and other state highway projects were opened Tuesday by the Highway Commission.

Gilven-Terrill submitted a bid of \$362,797 on the project, which includes 8.6 miles of grades, structures, base and surfacing starting at U. S. Highway 66 and extending south into Donley County. The road is designated as Ranch 2695.

Ferrier Brothers of Seymour was low bidder on an erosion control project east of Lefors at the North Fork of Red River bridge on Texas 273 and Ranch 2375.

Beginning Date not Learned
The Ferrier bid was \$37,349 on this the only other area project for which bids were opened this week in Austin.

It was not immediately learned here when construction would actually start on the Hedley road, but Gilven-Terrill has a good reputation for rapid completion of such projects.

The approximately 26 miles south to Hedley won't all be constructed this year, but the Highway Commission has assured local area boosters of the road that it will be finished in some three years.

The commission finally gave approval to the project early last year after boosters had worked for the road some 30 years.

FFA FARM WORK BEGINS

Material is now being gathered for the start of construction at the McLean High School Future Farmers of America chapter's new farm southeast of town.

Jim Weatherford, MHS vocational agriculture teacher and FFA advisor, said Wednesday that the board of education has purchased lumber and coagulated metal for a livestock shed to be erected on the farm, and some material has been donated.

Crockett Lumber and Builders Supplies submitted the low bid on the material that is being bought for the farm.

Weatherford said a quantity of four-inch pipe, assorted lumber, posts and wire has been donated by El Paso Natural Gas Co.; hinges by Robert L. Green; cross ties by Charles Cousins; grinder by Paris J. Hess, and some two—

Two Escape Injury In Auto Accident

Two McLean residents luckily escaped serious injury Saturday morning in a collision at the intersection of Fourth and Walnut Streets here.

Dixie Jo Burroughs, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Burroughs, and R. L. Cline, junior high coach, were drivers of the two cars involved in the crash.

Constable J. D. Fish, who investigated, said Cline was driving north on Walnut and Miss Burroughs east on Fourth when the mashup occurred at 9:15 a. m.

Fish estimated damage to Cline's 1961 Tempest and the Burroughs' 1958 Ford at more than \$500 each.

Both Cline and Miss Burroughs were treated for cuts.

Grass Fire Burns Over 250 Acres

The most serious grass fire of the year in this area swept over an estimated 250 acres of rangeland northwest of McLean last Saturday afternoon before being brought under control.

A salvage yard, farm house and buildings and hundreds more acres of grassland were threatened by the flames, whipped by a strong southerly wind.

McLean volunteer firemen called for help from the Lefors and Shamrock fire departments when it appeared the blaze could not be extinguished without assistance.

Many other residents used sacks and shovels to help in the battle, which lasted for more than two hours.

The fire began near the Willoughby Garage and Salvage Yard on U. S. 66 west of the city and quickly swept northward.

Property over which the flames spread is owned by John B. Rice, Guy Bessley, Mrs. Ethel Smith and Boyd Meador. About half an acre of land in the McLean Gold Course was burned before firefighters

ACCIDENT IS FATAL FOR JOHN PETTIT

Funeral services for John Robert Pettit, who was accidentally shot Sunday afternoon near Alanreed, were held Wednesday afternoon in the Alanreed Baptist Church.

Rev. J. I. Herdon officiated at the services, assisted by Rev. Steve Greenwood. Interment was in Alanreed Cemetery, under the direction of Lamb Funeral Home.

Pettit, 28, died at 5:25 p. m. Sunday in Highland General Hospital, Pampa, where he was taken after being shot apparently while cleaning a .38-caliber pistol in the basement of the home of his mother, Mrs. Betty Day, some eight miles north of Alanreed.

Mother Hears Shot
The accident occurred about 2:30 p. m. Sunday.

Mrs. Day told investigating officers—Constable J. D. Fish and Deputy Sheriff's D. L. Day and Shirley Nichols—that she heard the pistol shot and rushed to the basement, where she found her son.

McLean Justice of the Peace C. H. Day, acting as coroner, ruled the shooting accidental following the investigation.

The bullet from the gun entered Pettit's forehead.

A postal employee in Pampa in the past year, Pettit collected guns as a hobby. Officers theorized that he was taking the gun from a trunk when the trigger caught on the trunk lid.

Born in Alanreed

He was born in Alanreed on Feb. 2, 1934, and three years ago moved to Pampa, where he lived at 313 Davis Street.

He served in the U. S. Navy from 1952 to 1956.

Survivors, in addition to his mother, include his father, Oscar B. Pettit, San Bernardino, Calif., and one sister, Mrs. Nan McGinley, Pampa.

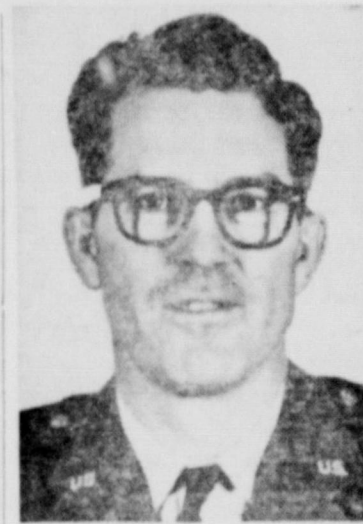
Tibbets Is Named Lieutenant Colonel

SCREW WORM PROGRAM

A total of \$1,600,000 has been raised on the state level for the screw worm program.

Male sterile flies in large numbers are being released daily in south Texas in a band several

miles wide. This is the all-out attempt to have a screw worm free Southwest in 1962.

This is two years earlier than anticipated. The break came when the extremely cold weather killed the worms out of Texas this winter.

The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation let the contract for a plant to be built in south Texas that is scheduled for completion by July 1.

The capacity will be approximately five times the present level of production when the plant is completed.

TIPS for OUTDOORSMEN

Attendance at hunting, fishing or boating club meetings depends largely on two things . . . the importance of the business scheduled and the entertainment to be provided.

Regardless of how important the business may be, some sort of entertainment is necessary to bolster attendance.

Good attendance is a must when your club is on an "asking" campaign. For example—when your club is seeking help from city or county authorities or from the Texas legislature.

Nothing impresses the politically-minded more than a big crowd. Furthermore—your speaker will work harder for a gathering of 100 people than he will for only a dozen.

When a talk is scheduled . . . or when you're seeking help . . . augment your program with some outstanding entertainment to guarantee attendance or the part of your "lukewarm" members.

An ideal way to furnish good entertainment is in the form of an outdoor film. Nothing attracts a crowd better than a movie—especially if it's free.

Outdoors clubs can obtain with out charge, some excellent films from the Texas Game and Fish Commission. These films—color as well as black and white—cover such things as hunting, fishing, boating, game managements, etc.

A number of national organizations and companies have some outstanding movies available for club use. Most of these films are provided gratis! But because of the popularity of the movies, you must make reservations at least a month in advance.

Shooting, safety and hunting films may be obtained from the Sportsmen's Service Bureau, 250 East 43rd St., New York City; Remington Arms Co., Bridgeport, Conn.; Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp., New Haven, Conn.; National Rifle Association, 1660 Rhode Island Ave., Washington, D. C.; American Motors Corp., Detroit, Mich.; and Studebaker-Packard Corp., South Bend, Ind.

A long list of available fishing films may be secured from the Sports Fishing Institute, Bond Building, Washington 5, D. C.

Most major tackle companies also have films available.

Boating and water sports films are obtainable from the National Association of Engine and Boat Manufacturers, 420 Lexington Ave., New York, N. Y., as well as from the major outboard motor companies.

Ducks Unlimited has produced some excellent waterfowl hunting and conservation films. When ordering films from Ducks Unlimited, however, a \$25 minimum contribution is requested to support DU's migratory waterfowl conservation program.

In requesting a film, be sure to specify a preferred showing date. Also, if possible, one or two alternate showing dates.

These films are available only to clubs and are NOT for personal use. So in making your request, be sure it is made on the letterhead of the club you represent.

A mistake some sportsmen's clubs make is to try to meet too often. Unless engaged in some vigorous campaign, too frequent meetings will kill a club simply because good programs can't be lined up that often. It's better to have one good meeting a month than to try for weekly meetings with mediocre programs that will

become boring. When calling upon a city, county or state figure for help, send a committee. Several heads can present the problem much better than a single representative.

Carefully explain your club's objectives and why you think a particular problem merits attention. Above all, be courteous.

Free Booklet on Ducks

You can obtain some interesting and comprehensive information on mallard ducks from a new free booklet published by the Conservation Department of the Olin Mathieson Corp., at East Alton, Ill.

Entitled "The Mallard," this 80-page booklet is the work of Joe Madson, who is a graduate biologist and journalist. It covers the life history, diseases and parasites, conservation and management and hunting of the most popular of America's wild ducks.

"The Mallard" is the second in a series of booklets on American game published by the Olin Mathieson Corp. The first, "The Cottontail Rabbit," was published last year.

New Top-Water Lure

A lure that may prove to be a sensation is now in the Texas market. Fishermen who like to work the lily pads and duck weeds or bounce 'em off the shorelines, will find this lure enticing.

It's called the SLO-POKE. Inventor is Steve Ross. He's a former newspaperman who now heads his own advertising agency in Fort Wayne, Ind.

SLO-POKE is a weedless popper that you can cast beyond the half submerged logs and work it back over them again without getting hung.

Hooks swing in a groove, barbs up. When the lure goes over an object, the hooks move upwards. Its action, like a mouse in the water, really is fascinating.

Small fish will miss the lure occasionally, because of the up-turned hooks. But the lunker bass that take the whole bait seldom get away.

SOME MEN NEVER DIE

"Tis said that two things are sure on this earth—death and taxes.

"Though death may be sure, it isn't so certain just how you'll be remembered after death.

But some men, like William "Bill" Goyens, will never die. They live on forever, in the hearts of other men.

Goyens' body now lies in a cemetery four miles west of Nacogdoches in the central portion of East Texas. His gravestone tells his story well:

"Born a slave in South Carolina, 1784, escaped to Texas in 1821, rendered valuable assistance to the Army of Texas, 1836, acquired wealth and was noted for his charity, died at his home on Goyens' Hill, 1866. His skin was black, his heart, true blue."

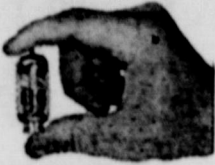

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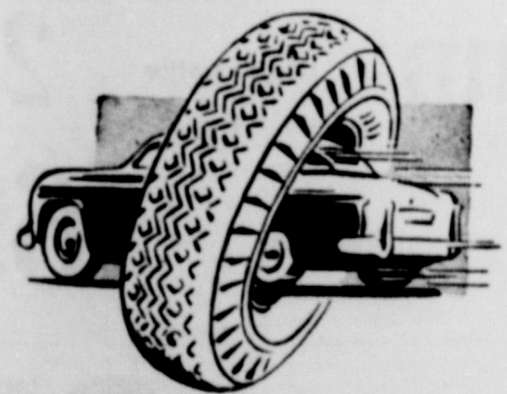

LET'S TALK POLITICS

EDUCATION

I am a Democratic candidate for State Representative from the 87th District. This is the third in my series of newspaper columns and radio speeches.

All acts appropriating money to finance programs in our education system must originate with the House of Representatives. Therefore, I feel obligated to inform people of this District concerning my views.

Educating the young people of Texas is our most important contribution to the future. Economy that takes precedence over education is a false economy. Forward strides have been made and can continue to be made in education. However, prior to the enactment of our Sales and Use Tax Law, the Legislature has been most reluctant to provide added financial support for our education system.

I am opposed to Federal Aid to Education. The best preventive for this control is an education system, second to none, provided for on a state and local level. Our present relationship between state and local control of schools must be maintained and strengthened.

There is one phase of our education in which we are weak. This is for the student who desires a vocation which our colleges are not now equipped to teach. I am referring to those who would attend these schools. We should initiate a survey by the State Board of Education, consulting with representatives of industry, labor and business, as to the need and desirability of such trade schools. I will vote for the appropriation needed in the survey. Provided the result of the survey was favorable, this question should be made available for the vote of the people before any legislation was initiated on this subject. A detailed discussion will be made on radio, Friday of this week.
