Dave J. Dorman, 50 Funeral Services Held Wednesday

Funeral services for Dave J. Dorman, 50, who resides east of McLean, were held at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday at the Shamrock Church of Christ.

Officiating was the Rev. James Douglas, minister. Burial was in the Shamrock Cemetery by Richerson Funeral Home.

Mr. Dorman, born at Dozier October 22, 1923, died at 7 a.m. Monday in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo. He had gone to the hospital Thursday afternoon for a physical examination and to cheer up his brother, Bus, who was scheduled for open heart surgery Tuesday. Dave died with aneurism.

Mr. Dorman moved to McLean in July, 1967 and purchased the Rogers place. He farmed at Grand Junction, Colo. and ranched at Mangum, Okla. He worked for Amarillo Furniture and Cosmopolitan in Amarillo for 15 years.

He met and married Belva Louise Jones in Amarillo on October 1, 1941.

A World War II veteran, he served three years in the South Pacific as Machinist Mate 1st class with the Navy See Bees.

Survivors include his wife, Belva; two sons, David and Dale; two sisters, Mrs. Viola Carver, of Amarillo, and Mrs. Zoella Blandford of Amarillo; six brothers, Bus of Wheeler, Bud of Mangum, Okla., B. F. of Pampa, Don of Vega, Jerry of Amarillo and Charles of Grand Junction.

The Heaven's Are Telling

I saw the comet Kohoutec the morning of Thursday, Nov. 29 through a 200 power telescope, at 6:30 a.m. It appeared in the east 20 degrees altitude. It did not scintillate as a star does, nor have a tail visible at this time.

If you've been keeping up with its progress in "Reader's Digest" or the Amarillo paper you know that Kohoutec will be visible to the naked eye around December 15, growing larger as it approaches the sun in the mornings. Then it will pass around the Sun and be blotted out because of the Sun's brightness. Then it will appear in the evening sky as the Sun sets. From then on we'll see Kohoutec at its most brilliant display - in January - only 75 million miles away. Kohoutec can be seen with the naked eye now.

Notice also four of our beautiful planets in the evening sky now. Venus in the southwest, so bright as to be visible even in the daytime, from 1:00 p.m. Through the telescope it looks like a quarter moon. Jupiter, visible after sunset, almost to the south is next. Through the telescope four moons can be seen in varying positions each evening. Mars, more brilliant even than Jupiter, high in the east as the Sun sets. Then low in the east is Saturn, the most spectacular because of its beautiful rings.

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RELEVANT or IRRELEVANT?

A frequent criticism of contemporary preaching is that it is not relevant. Or, in other words, preachers do not have their ears open to the questions which modern man is asking.

Is this criticism valid? Yes, we believe that it is to a certain degree. No minister of the Word can close his eyes and ears to the life situation in which he finds himself and expect his message to penetrate the hearts of his hearers. Each generation raises questions that are relevant to the gospel, and these should be dealt with frankly and sincerely.

But, is preaching the gospel to be limited to answering the questions of modern man? We reply with a categorical NO! God's preachers have always taken the initiative in raising questions on which the populace had given little or no thought. Jonah entered Ninevah uninvited (he was sent, however). "And Jonah began to enter into the city a day's journey, and he cried, yet forty days, and Neneveh shall be overthrown." (Jonah 3:4.) "This prophet did not announce a meeting in the town hall and then ask his auditors to pose questions. God told his beforehand what to preach.

Follow the steps of the New Testament evangelists. Was it in answer to a question of the Jews that Peter proclaimed his memorable sermon on the day of Pentecost, A.D. 33? On the contrary, it took that message to provoke their question, "What shall we do?" (Acts 2:37). Did Paul go to Athens because the Greeks were asking, "Shall we worship idols?" Did he reason of "righteousness, self-control, and the judgment to come" by virtue of questions put by governor Felix? (Acts 24:25).

Christ has told us to go preach the gospel to every creature, to "preach the Word; be instant in season, out of season, reprove, rebuke, exhort with all long suffering and doctrine; (2 Tim. 4:2). The gospel is designed to point out man's needs and then announce the remedy. We are to do in all our power to awaken the interest of a careless, thoughtless, unquestioning mass of humanity lost in sin. It is not until they hear the truth that many will begin asking the truly relevant question, "What must we do to be saved?"

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex. — Hearings will be held soon by the State Insurance Board to see if misleading or deceptive "sales pitches" are being used by the insurance industry in Texas. Joe Christie, Chairman of the Texas Insurance Board, says the goal of the board is to protect the consumer and build confidence in the insurance industry.

"People need insurance. The Board wants to make certain they are getting good information about the product," he told the Austin Ad Club last week.

"Some of the troubles of the insurance industry are caused by failure to communicate properly with the buyer. We are not getting life insurance rates, and we will hold hearings to compare rates. The Board will issue comparisons on life insurance policies and rates for the buying public."

Insurance is the largest industry in Texas, he added, and a difficult industry to regulate.

"The board started publishing names of agencies and agents who have been found guilty of abusing the public, and we have seen a decrease of complaints," Christie continued.

Another goal is to clean up deceptive advertising, he told the ad group.

Christie asked the ad leaders to help the Board make certain the buying public knows about deviating rates in fire and casualty insurance.

"Shop for your insurance as you would groceries or any other product. You can get a 10% reduction on your automobile insurance for example if you take the defensive driving courses. Watch for optional coverage on personal injury insurance. It will be on your bill if you do not specify that you "do not" want it.

"We are going to study "no-fault" insurance and health care in Texas too. We want to know if "no-fault" will lower our insurance rates, and what the buyer might have to give up in rights to get the lower rates.

"The Board plans to set up a Health Maintenance Organization to see how health care is delivered in Texas.

"We do not question the quality of health care in Texas, but we want to know the quantity of health care," he concluded.

DEMOCRATS CRANK UP — Texas Democrats are looking down the road to 1974 and 1976 national party conventions.

They set for December 15 here a State Democratic Executive Committee rules panel hearing to consider delegate selection procedures for the December 1974 "mini-convention" or policy conference.

State party officials must, by resolution, provide for compliance with rules on delegate selection and "affirmative action" to assure wide open participation in lower-level conventions.

The party must take steps to encourage convention activities by youth, minorities, women and others traditionally under-represented in its conventions. The same requirement carries over to the 1976 national presidential nominating convention process.

Gordon Wynne Jr. of Wills Point described the "mini-con-

vention" full-participation program to be agreed on by SDEC here next month as the "fore-runner" of the 1976 concept to be followed in presidential nominating procedures.

SDEC's resolution on delegate selection and affirmative action must be submitted to the Democratic National Committee prior to Feb. 1, 1974

HOSPITAL PROGRAM CHANGED — The Governor declined to sign an agreement with the Department of Health Education and Welfare to implement state and local review of health care facility construction in Texas.

His action left hospitals and nursing homes eligible to participate in federal programs without getting a state certificate of need.

Aides to Briscoe said the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in Washington has assured them there is no penalty to the health care industry if a state does not participate in the review program.

Briscoe advised new construction proceed cautiously so as not to build a facility where it is not needed.

COURTS SPEAK — A three judge federal court here heard arguments over whether state House members should be elected from individual districts or nine metropolitan counties.

A divided Court of Criminal Appeals held marijuana offenders convicted before April 23 and appealing for lighter sentences cannot be resentenced under the new Texas drug act.

Revenue from cigarette sales increased from \$19.8 million in November 1972 to \$20.1 million last month.

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Death Toll To Be Lighter This Year

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that changing travel patterns brought on by the national energy shortage make it impossible for the DPS to validly estimate the number of traffic deaths which might occur in Texas over the upcoming holidays.

He said, however, it was hoped the traffic death count would fall below the 14.5 daily average observed during last year's Christmas period, and below the 18.5 daily average recorded for the last New Year Holidays.

Speir said it is impossible to compare total deaths between this year and last because the current holiday periods are both 102 hours as compared to 78 hour periods twelve months before.

The DPS director said factors expected to affect auto travel include driving curtailments which might result from lower speeds, weekend service station closings, higher gasoline prices and the possibility of spot fuel shortages.

Reduced travel might formally result in some reduction in traffic deaths. But Speir warned that if a substantial number of drivers have reduced their speeds while a high percentage of others are still driving at high speeds, the number of deaths could be considerably higher because of accidents possibly resulting from more pronounced speed differences.

He reminded motorists that Texas law requires drivers going less than the prevailing traffic speed to keep right on multi-lane highways.

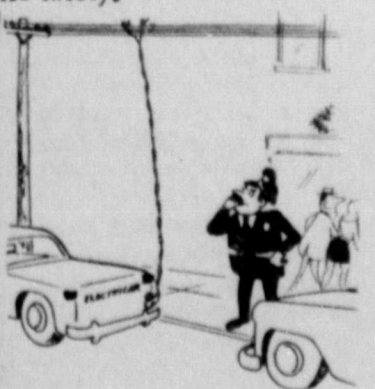
Speir urged drivers to avoid drinking if driving, noting that alcohol traditionally has been a major factor in the holiday accident problem.

And he pointed out that the apparently growing trend toward motorists carrying spare containers of gasoline in their vehicles might boost the toll—particularly if one of the containers should catch fire as the result of leaking fumes or spilled contents.

The Christmas period begins this year at 6 p.m. Friday, December 21, and ends at midnight Tuesday, December 25. New Year will start at 6 p.m. Friday, December 28, and terminate at midnight Tuesday, January 1, 1974.

During both periods, Speir said the DPS would place all available uniformed personnel on duty in a concerted effort to reduce accidents and save lives. He noted that patrolmen would be especially watchful for drinking and reckless drivers.

In addition to its enforcement activities, the DPS will be cooperating with local law enforcement agencies and the news media of Texas in a program called "Operation Motoreide." Information on fatal traffic collisions will be tabulated in Austin and released three times daily throughout the holidays in an effort to focus public attention on traffic safety.

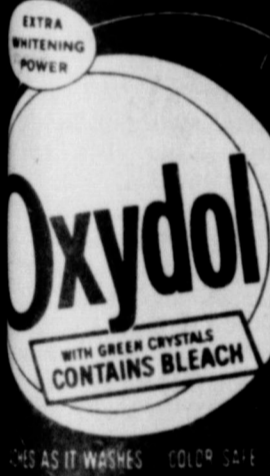

47,500 Cotton Samples Graded

Cotton harvest and ginning reached maximum proportions over the Greenbelt area, this week, according to W.E. Cain, in Charge of the USDA, Agriculture Marketing Service, Cotton Classing Office at Memphis.

The Memphis, Texas office graded 28,300 samples this week to bring the season total to 47,500. This compares to 35,100 on the same date a year ago.

The predominant grade classed this week was grade 31 with 32 percent followed by grade 32 with 31 percent, and grade 41 with 23 percent.

The predominant length classed this week was staple 31 with 43 percent followed by staple 31 with 34 percent.

Micronaire readings showed 83 percent miked in the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9.

Pressley tests showed 96 percent tested 75,000 psi or higher. The average for the week was 84,000 psi.
