Bank Of Commerce Ends Third Week In McLean

The Bank of Commerce at McLean is completing its third week in business and according to president David Williams, and vice-president Lloyd Kurtz, things are definitely looking up.

The American National Bank of McLean, which opened in 1909, was declared insolvent and closed by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) August 16.

The bank was purchased by GrayCo BancShares Inc., a group headed by area banker E. W. Williams, Jr., and opened August 17 under the new name.

"People of this community have been very supportive during this time of change," stated Williams. "In fact, we could not have hoped for anyone to have been any nicer than these McLean citizens. From 9 a.m. August 17 until closing time August 31, deposits were at \$230,000," he explained.

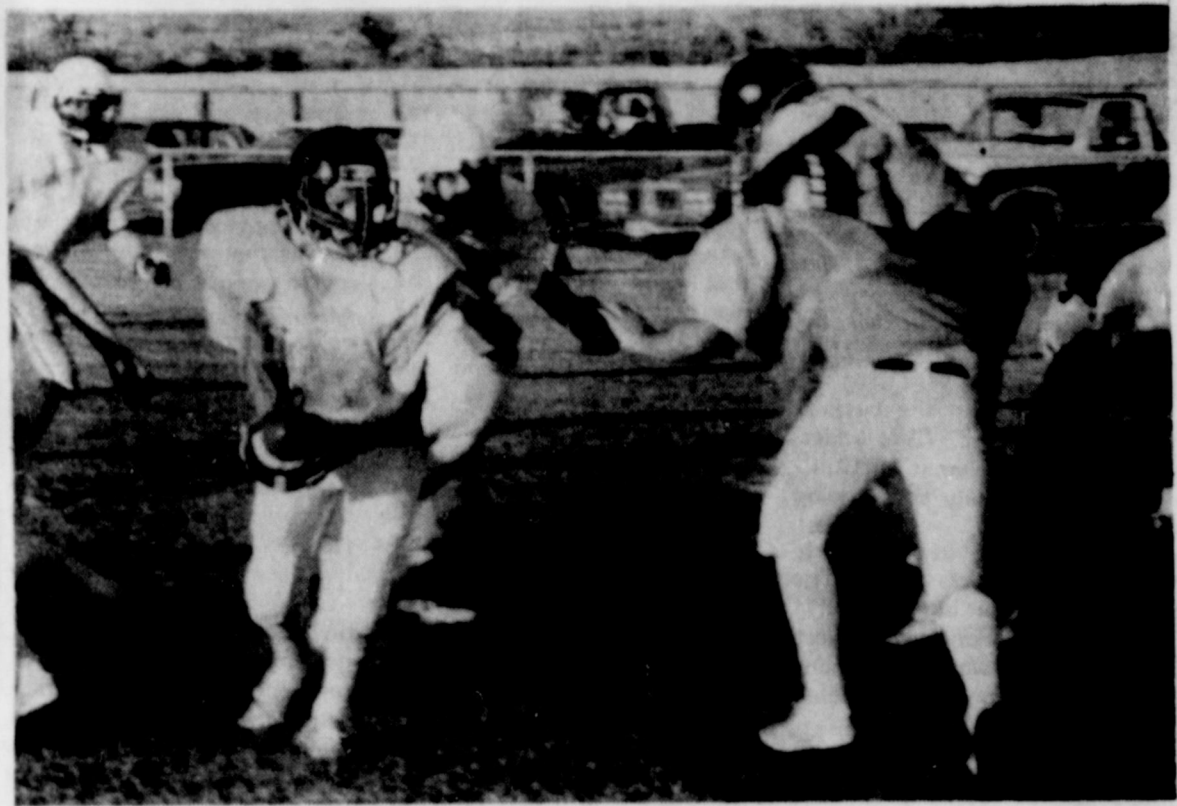
"We are proud of this strong show of support the good people of McLean are giving us, and we want them to know that we will turn around with their deposits and put it right back into the community. It is our goal to help create a better economy for

McLean."

The FDIC took possession of the bank and its loan portfolio after the closing August 16.

GrayCo BancShares Inc., then bought the bank from FDIC, and has the option to buy back any of the loans formerly owned by American National Bank. Those loans not purchased by the Bank of Commerce will remain with the FDIC.

"We have already bought back 30% of the loans in the portfolio - today Lloyd (Kurtz) bought back \$1.1 million worth

Tigers To Tangle Whiteface

McLean Tigers finished their scrimmage season Friday night against Memphis and turned towards their first regulation game against Whiteface tonight.

McLean and Whiteface are meeting for the third consecutive year and this year's contest will break an even-match. Whiteface defeated the Tigers at their first outing two years ago, but McLean sought revenge and defeated them last year.

Speaking of the scrimmage Friday night, head coach Joe Riley said, "Overall, we were much more pleased with the Memphis scrimmage than the Sunray scrimmage. Our line improved, and we moved the ball much better."

"Defensively we played better - everyone's getting more experience, valuable experience. It takes longer to discipline a group offensively than to discipline them defensively, but we were still pleased with our ability to move the ball against Memphis," he continued.

"Whiteface is a much-improved ball team," said Riley. "We will be facing a pretty strong team this year, and we are anxious to get out on the field with them."

Gametime is scheduled for 8 p.m. Thursday (tonight) at Happy.

The Tigers have an open date September 14, and then will travel to Wheeler to meet the Wheeler Mustangs.

Memorial Services Held Friday For Carl Lee Henley, 45

Carl Lee Henley, 45, died early Wednesday, August 29 in Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center of injuries received Tuesday night in a riding accident at the McLean roping arena.

Services were at 3 p.m. August 31 in First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Bob Brown of Fritch and the Rev. Billy Wilson, pastor of the McLean church, officiating. Burial was in Hillcrest Cemetery by Lamb Funeral Home.

Henley was injured when his horse fell and rolled on him during a practice roping at the arena. He was taken by McLean Ambulance to Cornado Community Hospital about 10 p.m. and later was transferred to the

emergency receiving center, where he died at 2:27 a.m. Wednesday.

He was born in Fort Sumner, N.M. and moved to McLean in

1943 from Fort Sumner. He was a 1957 graduate of McLean High School and married Gwen Burnett August 29, 1959 in Kellerville.

He was a maintenance technician for the Texas Highway Department, a member of First United Methodist Church and Texas Tech Dads Association.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Gregg of Tahoka; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Buck Henley of McLean; and a grandmother, Alice Dickenson of McLean.

of loans," explained Williams. "And we are working seven days a week to get the rest of the loans taken care of."

"Of course, we cannot speak for the FDIC, but we know that they are working very hard and very closely with the customers," said Kurtz. "We understand the customer's reluctance and anxiety about going in to visit them, but that anxiety is entirely unfounded. The FDIC is not the 'big bad wolf'. They are working with every one, trying to work out as many deals as is possible," stated Kurtz.

"We also want to make it clear that the FDIC cannot alter the contract terms of any note they may have," continued Kurtz. "If you have a 6 1/2% mortgage loan with monthly in-

stalments and the FDIC has your note, then the only difference to you as a customer, is that your payments will be made out to FDIC instead of the bank."

"We want to extend our offices, our expertise and our advice to anyone who needs them or wishes to make use of them. We will advise customers as to the proper steps to take, whether they are dealing with the FDIC or us," said Kurtz.

"Any loan payments that need to be made to the FDIC can be made through the Bank of Commerce."

"We can take your note payments, give you a receipt, and will make sure it gets properly credited," said Williams. "That's part of our job."

Williams and Kurtz stressed

that one of the hardest things for many customers to get used to was that the Bank of Commerce was a completely new bank.

"It's as if the American National Bank shut down completely...and someone else came in to put in a new bank," explained Kurtz. "We just happened to be lucky that this building was available and that the staff we needed to operate the bank was available. Customers of the Bank of Commerce are fortunate in that they get to stay with familiar surroundings, and although they see some new faces around, they mostly see the same faces they've been seeing here for years."

Officials with the new bank hope that by putting in 14-hour days, six and seven days a

week, they will be able to have the transaction period over with soon and will be able to get back to the business of banking.

"This transaction has gone smoothly. We are very pleased and proud of our employees. They have worked diligently and have made this transaction much easier for everyone involved," said Kurtz.

"We haven't even asked our employees to change their vacation schedules around," stated Williams. "Lavern Back had a vacation scheduled for this week, and she was able to go ahead and take it as planned. Things are running smoothly...I won't say we don't miss her, because obviously we do, but still, she was able to stick with her plans and that's important to us."

Local Church To Distribute Food

The United Methodist Church will begin distributing food soon, according to Rev. Billy Wilson, local minister.

Food made available through the High Plains Food Bank of Amarillo has been moved to the local church building for distribution.

According to Rev. Wilson, food will be available for transients and for those who are hungry and in need of food.

Currently available is baby food, stpla goods, crackers, cereal, eggs, bread, potatoes, frozen cheese, and frozen waffles.

"The only thing keeping us from obtaining any meat is lack

of freezer space," said Wilson. "If there's anyone who would loan or give us a freezer to keep here so that we may keep meat in it where we can easily obtain the meat, we would really appreciate it."

Wilson also wanted to emphasize that the food program was not a government program.

"It is simply people helping people through the High Plain Food Bank," he stated.

STUDENTS MUST EXERT MENTAL EFFORT

AUSTIN — Just how far reaching the education reform package that the Texas Legislature passed this summer will not be entirely known for some time.

But, to summarize some of the more obvious and meaningful steps, let's start with a competency exam. No student may receive a high school diploma without passing a statewide competency exam. The test will be administered in the 11th grade. If the student can't pass the test then he or she will receive a certification of attendance instead of a diploma.

Minimum grade requirements have also been established. Students may no longer receive social promotion; but, in the future will be promoted only on their academic achievement. That academic achievement will require the student to maintain a grade average equivalent to at least 70 on a scale of 100 for the school year. To receive credit for a course, the student must likewise maintain a grade average of 70. Parents must be notified of student grades which fall below the passing mark, and at least two alternative dates set for parent-teacher conferences regarding unsatisfactory grades.

There will be no exemptions for any student from taking a final exam which

other students are required to take.

A school district must provide, but not necessarily require, two or more tutorial sessions per week for students whose grades in a subject, during any grade reporting period, fall below 70.

All of these innovations in handling students and their grades are an effort to increase the competency levels of our students.

As students are made aware that they will not be promoted simply because they attend class, and when they realize they are being offered an opportunity to improve their efforts with an assistance program, then we will stand a better chance of those students coming to grips with the learning process. Through this new program we hope they will get down to business so that they can keep up with their classmates and attain the competency level necessary to graduate from a Texas high school.

This is but one phase of the changes which students will observe as they begin the new school year.

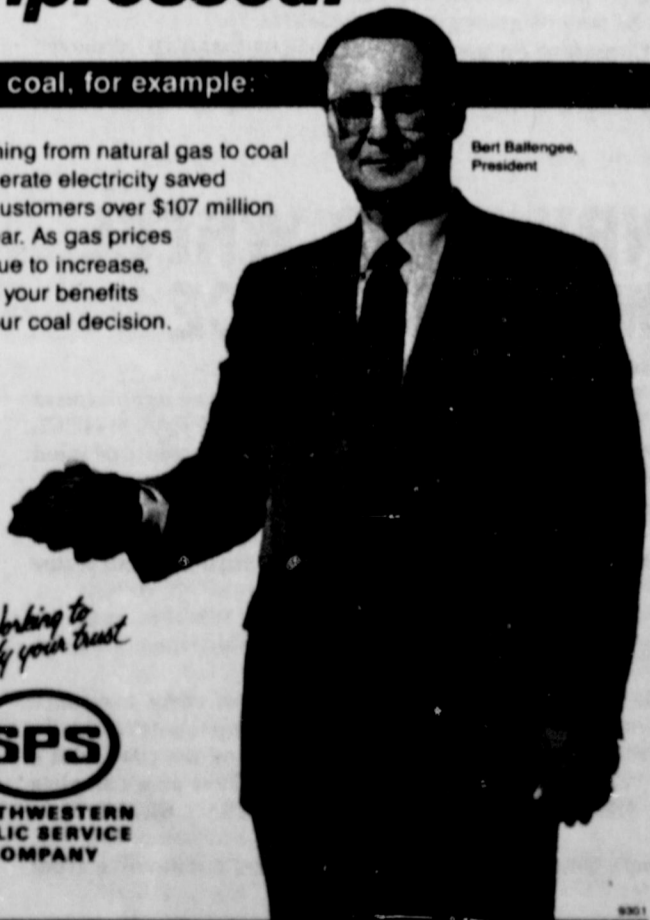

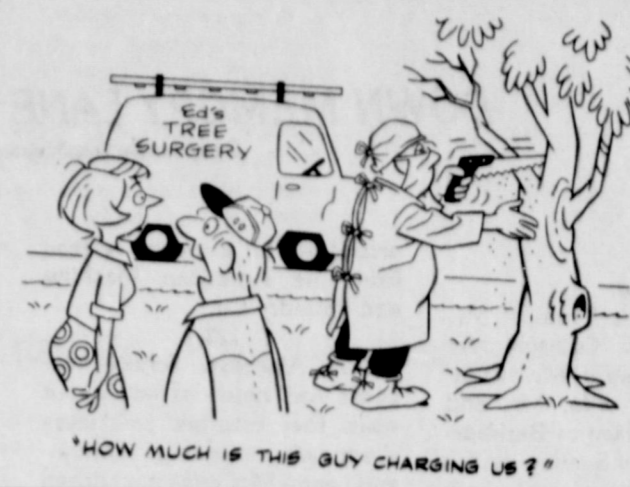
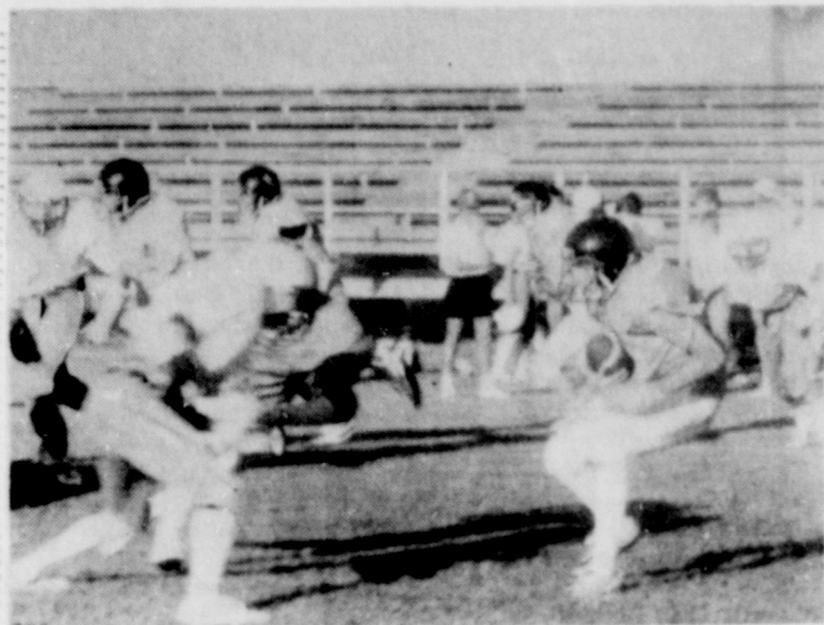

YOUR FLOWERS AND PLANTS

Helpful Hints From SAF—
The Center For Commercial Floriculture

Q I water my plants every week, like clockwork, always on the same day and yet they look terrible. What's the matter?

A Indoor house plants are a little like people. Sometimes they don't want or need a drink. Florists will tell you overwatering is the number one killer of plants.

Here are some of my favorite hints that are guaranteed to help you:

- Push a thumb or finger into the soil to a depth of about an inch. If the soil is dry, watering is needed.
- When watering, moisten the soil thoroughly... until you see water draining out the openings at the bottom of the container. If the pot is in a saucer, drain the excess fluid.
- Use water that is lukewarm and free of salt.
- To learn more about caring for house plants, visit a professional florist.
