Commissioners Appoint New County Judge

Following a closed session lasting more than an hour and a half Tuesday, the Gray County Commissioners Court reconvened in open session shortly before noon and announced that Commissioner Don Hinton is to be the new Gray County Judge.

Announcement of Hinton's appointment to the post followed the commissioners' acceptance of Don Cain's resignation which was tendered. "In order to assume the duties of Judge of the 23rd Judicial District of Texas, Gray County, effective April 1, 1977."

Cain's resignation and Hinton's new duties will become official on Friday when they are sworn into the two judgeships by 31st District Court Judge Grainger McIlhane.

Hinton will serve in his new position until the next general election.

Hinton's first county commissioners' court session will follow his swearing in on Friday.

One of the first items the court is expected to consider in the closed session portion of Friday's meetings is the naming of a replacement for Don Hinton.

Two Men Injured In Trail Derailment

Two Amarillo men suffered minor injuries early Friday when the rear portion of a Rock Island freight train derailed out of McLean.

Gene A. Fristoe and E. W. Browning, both Rock Island employees, were treated at Shamrock Hospital and transferred to Amarillo for x-ray examinations and released.

Both men were in the caboose of the train when the last six cars, derailed about 12:30 a.m.

An investigation into the cause of the accident was continuing and a final report will not be available for several days.

Browning said the train was moving about 30 mph west of here when it suddenly just turned over. It hit the bank and stopped immediately.

Browning suffered only bruises in the accident.

Wind Erosion Is Panhandle Problem

Hurricane-force winds and accompanying dust that swept across the Texas Panhandle in late February and March, although not new to the area, did considerable damage to farmlands. Farmers now are faced with the task of recuperating their losses to field erosion and damaged crops.

Preventing or avoiding wind erosion is, of course, the best answer to these problems. But what should a farmer do when gale force winds begin to cause movement of topsoil?

The best procedure is to chisel or work the field, leaving ridges perpendicular to the wind direction is recommended. The implement preferably should bring clods to the surface and not pulverize the soil. Disking should be avoided, since over-use of the offset and one-way disc probably contributed to the problem to begin with.

Widely spaced shovels or chisel points usually do the most effective job in controlling soil movement by wind. This system can also be used to control wind erosion in wheat fields. By proper spacing (three or four feet), only a small percentage of the wheat is destroyed, and the remaining stand usually compensates for the reduction in plant numbers when conditions return to normal.

Deep sands low in organic matter present a special problem, he notes. Ridging or deep furrows to catch the drifting sand help some. The Extension specialist says feedlot waste has been used successfully for controlling blowing sand in Dallam County. Rates from 5 to 20 tons have been used effectively on knolls and slopes that are most subject to erosion.

as the the severity of the weather until I stopped in Wichita Falls, got out of my car and found that I had been driving on three feet of Oklahoma Panhandle soil. As I plowed my way through the gas station, door I couldn't help but notice a large mound of dirt with two eyes that was sitting in a chair sipping coffee. Upon proper inquiry I came to the conclusion that it was a local farmer that had gotten caught out in his pasture on foot and had been blown 20 miles and into town before he could grab hold of anything. Not wanting to appear phased, I commented about the adverse weather. "Bad weather!" he exclaimed, "this here's the only time I make any money!" Being sharp and on my toes I asked, "How's that?". To this he replied, "Everytime it blows like this my farm gets another foot of the best durn northern panhandle topsoil in the country and my land value goes up

another \$100 an acre. A friend of mine, who is a real estate appraiser in Amarillo, later told me that it was the best day they had had in a long time. He said they just sat in their office and appraised the farmer's land as it went by.
 All in all, the panhandle is an interesting place to live. It's also very educational for meteorology students. It is probably the only place in the world a person can observe every weather extreme possible in only two hours time.

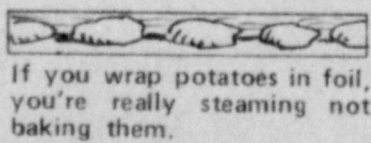

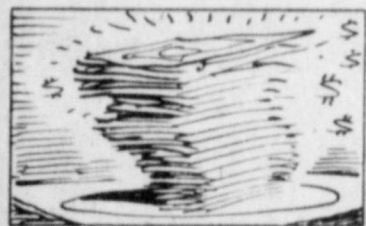

A Garden Seminar will be held Wednesday, April 6 at 1:30 p.m. in the Flame Room of the Pioneer Natural Gas building, 220 North Ballard, Pampa. Dr. Roland Robert, Area Extension Vegetable Specialist, Lubbock, Texas, will present the program.

Dr. Roberts will discuss home vegetable gardening for the Gray County area. Topics will include selection and preparation of the garden site, selection of varieties, planning and arranging the garden, fertilization, irrigation, disease, and insect control. In addition there will be an opportunity for gardeners to get their questions answered about particular problems.

This program is planned to assist some vegetable gardeners who are interested in learning the latest information on how to have a better garden. The meeting is free and open to the public.

Also on Wednesday, April 6, the second annual Texas A&M University Swine Short Course will be held in Plainview. The event will be in the Hal County Agricultural Center with registration at 8:00 a.m. and the program begins at 9:00 a.m.

Six swine experts will teach the course with program topics ranging from diseases, buildings, equipment handling and nutrition.

We expect to take at least a carload from Pampa and if you are interested in attending and want a ride, call the County Extension Office, 669-7429.

Then on April 7 and 8, the Texas BEEF Conference will be held in Amarillo at the Hilton Inn. This program will begin at 1:30 p.m. on April 7 and continue with a T-Bone Club meeting at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday evening. The Beef Conference continues on April 8 with the day's program starting at 9:00 a.m. and concluding at noon Friday.

Program topics include discussions on beef quality, energy, high-moisture grain, heifer feeding, shipping fever and other associated topics relating to animal health. Many outstanding speakers are scheduled for this beef conference.

The latest cattle on feed report issued by USDA estimated that on March 1 in the 7 major feeding states there were 7,546,000 head of cattle and calves on feed. This is down 7 percent from a year ago but 38 percent more than two years ago.

CONSUMERS FOOD NEWS

Easter-related specials in some Texas grocery markets will focus on turkey and eggs, Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist, reports.

At meat counters, scattered specials are available on beef and pork items--and lamb is more prominent in some markets, she added.

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University beef values on chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, ground beef and liver.

She advises consumers to look for best beef values on chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, ground beef and liver.

Pork features include quarter-loin sliced into chops, Boston butt roast, smoked picnics, ham portions, bacon, liver and roll sausage.

At fruit counters, items with most economical prices are grapefruit, oranges, small-size apples, bananas and pears. Pineapple supplies are increasing as the season progresses toward its peak in May, she said.

In fresh vegetable departments, economy appears on carrots, broccoli, head lettuce, collards and mustard greens, turnips, rutabagas and potatoes. Also, fresh asparagus is available at moderate price levels--and celery supplies are increasing.

At frozen food counters, vegetables head the 'key features' list. Along grocery market aisles, spotlight items are canned peaches, corn and peas -- and peanut butter.

CONSUMER WATCH-WORDS: Look for scattered promotions on lamb--including loin and rib lamb chops, leg of lamb and shoulder roasts.

Shaping and seeding, parallel terraces on cropland, and underground irrigation pipeline are other conservation measures installed through the GPCP on Mr. Shaw's farm. His Great Plains contract expired in 1976 and he was well pleased with the help he received.

The GPCP is administered through the Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District by the local Soil Conservation Service office. Any landusers needing more information about cost-share assistance for conservation work on their farms or ranches should contact the personnel at the Soil Conservation Service office.

Every time the state's public health agency receives a serum or tissue specimen from a physician, hospital, or local health facility, it's up to the technicians and scientists of the Bureau of Laboratories to determine what diseases, if any, the specimen reveals.

About one and three-quarters million laboratory tests are performed each year by the department's central laboratories in Austin, quarter million are done by the 24 regional laboratories around the state. In the past year, such major health problems as brucellosis, St. Louis encephalitis, tularemia, rabies, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, and leptospirosis have been detected through standardized laboratory procedures -- along with more routine, but equally serious, ailments such as influenza and venereal disease.

This amount of work, and its quality, may be surprising to many people. But in professional circles, the state health department's laboratory is considered one of the best in the country.

In fact, the central laboratory in Austin has recently been licensed by the national center for disease control, in Atlanta, Georgia, under the provisions of the Clinical Laboratories Improvement Act of 1967. It's one of only two state laboratories in the nation that have met the strict guidelines for Licensure.

Charles E. Sweet, chief of the bureau of laboratories, points out that the CDC licensure is not required of the Texas laboratory because specimens are not shipped across state lines. However, Dr. Sweet--who is a doctor of public health--said, "It seemed appropriate to me to voluntarily accomplish this step for professional standing. There is no reason why some independent and hospital laboratories should face mandatory

standards more strict than those which we voluntarily meet. I don't think we should do anything less than other laboratories in having top quality." Dr. Sweet added, "Now we can say to any laboratory, 'We have done no less than you in meeting good laboratory standards.'"

Meeting those standards, Dr. Sweet explained, involved the entire laboratory, including instruments, personnel, preventive maintenance, testing of procedures by outside sources, the references used in testes, and the rewriting of manuals. The manuals contain detailed instructions for each of the dozens of laboratory procedures used to detect various disease.

The Bureau of Laboratories contains ten separate branches, three of which--clerical services, scientific services, and the Laboratory Improvement Branch--serve as resources to the other seven. Those include:

- * Environmental Chemistry, which is concerned with the safety of drinking water and wastewater
- * Clinical Chemistry, which handles blood testing primarily for the medical screening program for children whose families receive welfare assistance.
- * Biological Production, which manufactures vaccines against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, typhoid, smallpox, and some other diseases
- * Serology, which performs tests to detect antibodies in human blood as evidence of infection caused by specific organisms
- * Virology, which detects all types of viruses.
- * Parasitology, which identifies parasites such as worms and amoebas
- * Bacteriology, which is concerned with bacterial diseases such as gonorrhea, tuberculosis strep throat, and various foodborne disease.

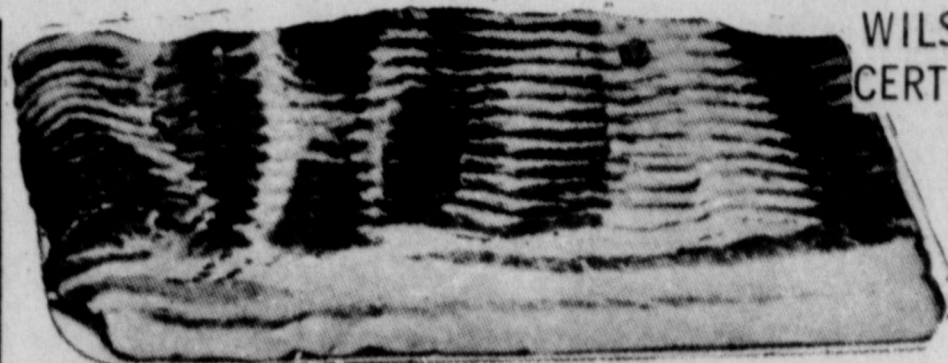

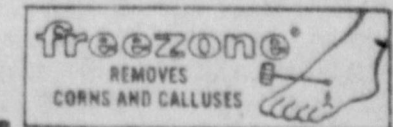

Dancers To Tour Texas This Year

The Texas Commission on the Arts and Humanities has submitted a grant application to the National Endowment for the Arts for \$130,881.00 for its Dance Touring Program. This represents one third of the fee commitment on the part of Texas sponsors for contracted services with dance companies. Twenty community sponsors will be participating in forty-one residencies throughout the state for a combined twenty-four weeks of dance and dance related activity in Texas.

"The purpose of this program," stated Maurice Coats, Director of the Commission, "is to make performances of professional dance available to as many people as possible, regardless of where they live."

Residency schedules are developed through the close cooperation among the state arts agency, sponsor and the dance company with consideration given to the sponsor's needs and the capabilities and style of each company.

"Involvement of the entire community in the activities of the residency has been emphasized," continued Mr. Coats. In addition to performances, a residency may include such activities as master classes, lecture demonstrations, seminars, children's programs and open rehearsals.

Texas' Dance Touring Program offers a wide variety of companies ranging from soloists to companies with more than eighty dancers. They represent virtually every dance form and style as well as mime and mime artists.

Incorrect Data Delays Refunds

Incorrect or illegible addresses and social security numbers on tax returns can delay refunds, the Internal Revenue Service cautioned.

Taxpayers who have moved since filing their tax returns should inform both the U.S. Postal Service and the IRS Service Center where they filed their return of the new address, or any refund due might not reach its destination. An incorrect or illegible social security number can also delay the processing of the tax return and slow up the issuance of a refund check due.

A simple solution to the problem is for the taxpayer to use the peel-off label attached to the tax package mailed out by the IRS. The taxpayer can make any name, address or social security number corrections right on the label so that the IRS will know to whom and where to direct the refund.

NOTICE FROM THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

It has been called to my attention that there is a slight excess of nitrates and nitrites in the water supply of McLean. This would amount to approximately four percent in excess of the amount considered allowable by the Texas State Department of Public Health. Removal of excess nitrates is a very expensive process. I am told that a plant necessary to remove this small excess would cost thousands of dollars.

Though all the effects of nitrates are not known, it seems to affect the unborn child and the infant more than it does other age groups. The following recommendations are made:

1. The pregnant mother should probably drink bottled water.
 2. Infants up to six months of age should be breast fed or should have breast fed or should have bottled water to drink and use powdered milk formulas. Liquid milk formulas would be an alternate to powdered milk formulas and would be more convenient.
 3. It is known that Vitamin C in the form of citrus or tomato juice counteracts the effects of nitrates and nitrites in drinking water.

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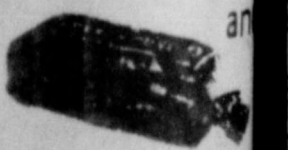
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
