Dr. Virginia Apgar, director of the division of Congenital Malformations of the National Foundation-March of Dimes, said that many chemical defects which often cause severe mental and physical disability can now frequently be treated by special diets and other means to prevent permanent dam-

It was pointed out that nearly one-and-a-half million American children under the age of six are birth defect victims, spending ap proximately six million days in hospitals each year at a cost of more than \$180,000,000. More children are hospitalized for birth defects than for all infectious

diseases combined. The March of Dimes is fighting birth defects on three fronts: medical care, research and pro-

fessional education. In medical care, March of Dimes funds support 77 birth defects centers. ing research. In research the March of Dimes is using the same formula that proved so successful in the conquest of polio. Eminent scientists are conducting studies not only of conditions directly related to birth defects, but also are seeking to learn the secrets of basic life processes which, if understood, might shed light on what causes

defective births. The March of Dimes professional education program aids the struggle against birth defects through medical conferences, publications, symposia, teaching films and exhibits that channel the latest technical information to treatment specialists and scientific researchers alike.

The March of Dimes is also conducting a prenatal care educational program. In many local chapters, volunteers are organizing programs aimed at urging pregnant women to seek medical attention in the important early months of the pregnancies.

The answers to these political questions and to thousands of others can be found in a handsome, 84page book published by the State Democratic Executive Committee as a souvenir program for the recent state convention.

The books are now available to the public at \$2.50 each. Orders should be sent to SDEC, Brown Building, Austin, Texas.

The book has pictures and biographies of all 22 state officials and the Democratic members and nominees of the Texas Delegation in Washington.

All candidates - both Democrats and Republicans - for the Texas Senate and the House of Representatives are listed by districts, along with their home addresses and telephone numbers.

Perhaps most useful to the gen eral public is the scalion on the voting habits of each county for key races in 1964 and 1966. The guide gives the votes and percentages for the presidential, gubernatorial and senatoria races of 1964; the registered voters and population for 1966 and the total turnout in the two spring primary

The book also has maps showing district boundaries of Congressmen, State Senators and State Representatives.

Milton has been a very active member of the board and has spent a lot of time and effort in getting the McClellan Creek Watershed approved.

Benchleveling and contouring of sloping land are being compared as to yield, water usage and returns at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway. A five year study comparing benchleveling to rows directly down a 1% to 3% slope definitely showed benchleveling to be superior.

Benchleveling increased grain sorghum yields 1,225 pounds per acre and returned \$25.49 per acre more with 7.1 inches per acre less irrigation water. Cotton yields were increased 55 pounds of lint per acre and returns increased \$24.41 per acre when benchleveled.

DIET FOR DIABETICS

Nutrition can be discussed in general terms for normal people For those with illnesses or metabolic deficiencies, the diet must be "tailored" to each individual, just as a well-fitted garment must be. Diet for diabetics falls into this class. One can, of course, give certain general principles, but the details must be:

a) advised by the attending physician after physical examination, history of illness, and laboratory tests;

b) closely supervised at intervals varying with the severity of the condition; and c) modified from time to time as conditions change.

Nature of Diabetes Diabetes is an inability of the body to cope with the chemical handling (metabolism) of sugars in the body. It is due to deficiency in a secretion produced by spe-cialized cells in the pancreas, called after their discoverer, the islands of Langerhans. The se-cretion is called insulin.

While diabetes is a deficiency in sugar metabolism, it involves other classes of foods. Starches are quickly converted into sugar; proteins in excess of needs are also changed into sugar. The han-dling of fats is impaired by the deficiency in sugar chemistry. It is obvious that the entire diet must be controlled.

These controls usually involve:
a) reduction in total calories except where body weights are normal or below (many diabetics are overweight); h) elimination of all sugar as

 c) restriction of starchy foods;
 d) adjustment of fat intake to dietary needs.
In addition to dietary controls,

diabetics may require injections of insulin, or in the case of older and milder cases, one of the pills which help metabolize sugar. These pills are not insulin. Insulin must be injected.

Must Have Adequate Diet

Diabetics, like everyone else, must have an adequate diet in order to maintain health and strength. The diabetic diet, in addition to its emphasis on strict quantity control and sugar elim. ination, stresses the adequacy of protein intake. It also demands ample vitamin and mineral supplies, derived from vegetables and fruits relatively low in su-

Cotton Producers Urged to Keep Moisture Content Low

Close cooperation between the producer and ginner is required to achieve the highest bale value, preserve fiber properties, and insure the best gin oppration.

For his part, the grower should not harvest cotton containing more than 10% seed cotton moisture or 8% lint moisture. Cotton containing excessive moisture or green leaf should be delivered immediately to the gin and the ginner notified of its condition.

The ginner should check the moisture content of each trailer load and group those which require about the same amount of drying and cleaning. This will allow him to select gin machinery and drying temperatures so that he can properly process cotton at different moisture levels, the National Cotton Council points out. Lint moisture should be kept be-

tween 61/2-8% at the gin stand and only enough cleaning machinery used to obtain maximum bale value, not just the highest grade. Total bale value is the product of price times weight. Price is based on grade, staple, fineness and area reputation or strength and length uniformity. Weight includes moisture and trash as well as lint.
