This plan completely isolates this section of town lying south of Interstate 40 and denies it reasonable access to the Schools, Churches, Hospital, Post Office. Library and all other public fácilities and renders almost completely ineffectual fire protection to the area.

It is all too evident that as now planned the construction of Interstate 40, with no provision for an overpass to serve the people south of it, is in effect the seizure of private property without compensation and it is clearly in violation of the intent of the laws authorizing condemnation and seizure of privately owned property.

The people of the State Highway Department have assured us that the design of this section of Interstate 40 as first submitted to the Bureau of Public Roads-incorporated an overpass across interstate 40, one block east of South Main Street, which overpass was a reasonable solution of the problem, but that the Federal Bureau struck it from the plans as not justified. They further state that they know of no means by which they-the State Highway De partment-can effect the restoration of the overpass to the design of Interstate 40.

Seventeen windbreak species are available this year: black locust, buffaloberry, catalpa, Chinese elm, cottonwood, euonymus, mulberry, multiflora rose, sycamore, Osage orange, red cedar, ponderosa, Austrian, shortleaf, slack and loblolly pine, and black walnut stratified seed.

Seedlings are sold only for windbreaks and other types of conservation planting. None are sold for ornamental or shade tree purposes. No order for less than a total of 100 trees will be ac-



Length properties also determine the size yarn which can be made from a given cotton.

From the grower's standpoint, length is a principal factor that determines price. It also exerts a strong influence on the demand for cotton from a given area and on whether a premium will be offered or how much premium is

The National Cotton Council stresses that moisture content of cotton should be checked at frequent intervals to make sure it is maintained at 61/2 to 8 per cent levels during ginning.







#### Veterans Must Have Encephalomyelitis Outbreak in Horses

An cutbreak of encephalomyelitis among horses has become wide-spread in Texas, according Veterans Administration regional to the Texas Veterinary Medical Association. It has been held and garrisoned at various times by Spain, Mexico, the Republic of Texas, the Confederacy and the United States.





lose the race.




That is, persons using a tag on an antierless deer bonus tag or the regular tag, must have a signed permit on their person authorizing the harvesting of an
