





MacKenzie Lake Opening Set

Panhandle and South Plains anglers, picnickers and campers are always looking for additional water and lakes to fish and visit and Mackenzie lake near Silverton should be put on the list May 1.

The new reservoir has been missed by the good rains during the past year and anglers will be restricted to bank fishing only when the lake opens.

The lake has approximately 150 surface acres at conservation level," said Jim Green, general manager.

The water is at least 10 feet below the new Texas Parks and Wildlife Department boat ramp located on the south side of the lake. A good general rain in the Tule Creek watershed should bring the water level up and then the Mackenzie commission could allow boats and watercraft on the lake.

An estimated 20 feet of water is available at the earthen dam and this will furnish anglers a chance at some nice two-to-three pound bass found in the lake.

As the lake fills to the conservation level, more species of fish including striped bass, small-mouth bass, rainbow and Kamloops trout and salmon are on the stocking agenda.

Lake Mackenzie is located in picturesque Tule canyon and it is typical of the caprock country of northwest Texas. Plenty of native game to the area including deer, aoudad sheep, quail and rattlesnakes use the lake

site as their home.

The dam is located on highway 207, nine miles northwest of Silverton, or 30 miles east of Tulia and it is easy to find.

Campers will find hookups and picnic tables have been completed at strategic points around the lake. Visitors are asked to bring their own water for the present as construction on these facilities are still underway. The entrance fee has been set at \$1. per visitor with additional charges for camper hookups.

All anglers 17 years of age to 65 years of age will be required a Texas fishing license and this regulation will be enforced by both lake personnel and state game wardens.

A black bass limit of 10 fish per day with a 10 inch minimum will also be enforced.

No floaters, rafts or boats of any kind will be allowed on the lake until the water level rises and the Mackenzie commission approves boating for the lake.







the rise in cattle prices the last month have been real dramatic. Who would have believed cattle prices would go up over \$2.00 in a month's time? That is a 36 per cent rise in prices. This just goes to show that prices were unduly depressed before the price rise and cattlemen were getting the raw end of the deal. All of this has helpcattlemen smile

The USDA Cattle On Feed Report as of April 1 for the 23 major feeding states estimated 10, 872,000 head, 28 percent above last year, but 12 percent below levels on April 1, 1974. In Texas the number on feed is 1,675,000 head, up 49 percent from a year ago.

Placements for the first quarter of 1976 in the 23 states totaled 5, 439,000 had, up 14 per cent from 1975. In Texas placements were 980,000 cattle, an increase of 35 percent above year earlier levels.

Marketings for the 23 states during the first quarter of 1976 were 6. 350,000 head, up 15 per cent from last year and 6 percent more than in 1974. Texas feedlots marketed 1,102,000 cattle during the first quarter, an increase of 26 percent.

Farmer planting intentions as of April 1. according to USDA indicate corn acreage is expected to increase 6 percent from last year and to total 82.7 million ac es. This is also a 2 percent increase from that indicated on January

Sorghum acreage intentions of nearly 17.9 million acreages are ? percent below the 1975 acreage, in contrast to the 2 percent increase expected as of January 1.

Food grain (wheat, rice, and rye) acreage is expected to increase 3 percent to 83.8 million acres. Cotton growers intend to plant 11.3 milyear, Soybean acreage is expected to decline 10 percent to a total of 49.3 million acres.

Wheat production in Texas is forecast at 66, 300,000 bushels, down sharply from the record crop of 1975, which was 131,100,000 bushels, a decrease of 51 percent. However th 1976 crop estimate as of April 1 conditions is 25 percent above the 1974 crop of 52,800,000 bushels in Texas.

Acreage planted for the 1976 crop was slightly above a year earlier, but the April 1 indicated 76 percent would be harvested for grain this year compared to 91 percent last year.



Boating Season Is Near

Spring was delayed by a few cold days but, Texas boaters will soon be heading for the lakes and another season of skiing, fishing and just plain boating.

Some boats will be in the same shape they were last fall and if the skipper is planning on an active water season, that might not be to good.

Many boating accidents are the result of carelessness and lack of common sense. Over 638 Texans drowned during 1975 and many of these fatalities occured while boating.

A thorough check of the boat and its required equipment before going on the water will insure at last a safe start. A few of the things that should be checked before leaving home include checking the boat for

cracks or chipped paint; cleaning the fiberglass hull and applying a new coat of wax which will produce better speed and more fuel economy; inspectig the controls and throttle for cracks or breaks and replacing them if defective.

Take a look at your personal flotation devices (life jackets). Be sure they are serviceable and conform to US Coast Guard specifications which includes a serial numbe stamped they'll enlarge it with on the preserver.

A quick thorough check of the running lights will ease your mind if you are caught out on the lake after dark or in a storm. Replace any bulbs that don't shine but be sure to check the batte y for low voltage first.

Many boats are not required to carry a fire extinguisher but this device is very handy if a fire breaks out even on a small boat. Check for cracked or broken fittings or obstructed nozzles. Check the pressure guage, locking pins and sealing wires and recharge the unit if the guage indicates a low pressure.

A well tuned outboard or inboard engine will asure a safe trip and save towing time that could have been used for fishing or skiing.

These precautions take little time, but it is better to find the problems while in your own backyard rather than when your are 100 miles from home.
