90% of 1976 Savings Bond Goal Achieved

In releasing Treasury figures, County Savings Bonds Chairman Floyd P. Watson, announced today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Gray County during February totaled \$49,556. Sales for the two-month period of 1976 were \$99,584 for 90% of the 1976 sales goal of \$490,000.

Texasans purchased \$22,615,095 in Savings Bonds during the month compared to February 1975 sales of \$20,183,108. Year-to-date sales totaled \$46,733,395 for 77% of the yearly sales goal of \$272.4 million.

Fabian was named outstanding in chemistry.

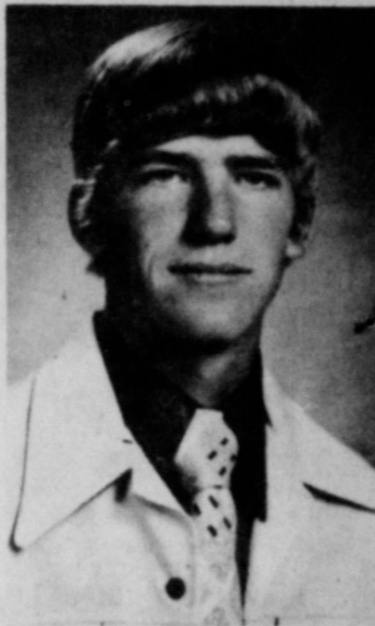

Heart Disease:
Protect Your
Children

Maybe the kids need shoes. Or new coats. Whatever the need, parents try to do the best they can to help their children. But the importance of guarding children against heart disease is too often neglected according to the Gray Co. Heart Assoc.

This is especially significant at a time when more than a million Americans die from heart and blood vessel diseases each year. And, more than 28 million living Americans suffer from one form or another of these diseases. These are not just diseases of aging, as so many believe. They can, and often do, begin early in a child's life. Pediatricians have found cases of high blood pressure even in young children. Autopsies performed on teenagers and young adults have revealed the early stages of atherosclerosis, a form of hardening of the arteries.

Parents can do a lot to forestall and possibly even prevent their children from becoming part of the tragic statistics: set an example for your children by not smoking cigarettes, serve foods low in saturated fats and cholesterol at home, and select the same when dining out. Get moderate daily exercise and make sure your children exercise regularly. And most important, see that every member of the family, including yourself, has a regular medical check-up which includes tests for high blood pressure.

High blood pressure and atherosclerosis are two of the heart diseases that can begin early in life. Rheumatic fever, which can lead to rheumatic heart disease, is another one to beware of. It begins with a common streptococcal infection—for example, strep throat. If not treated immediately with readily available antibiotics, a strep infection could lead

to the development of rheumatic fever and possibly rheumatic heart disease, in which the heart valves become scarred and deformed. There are several heart defects which begin even before a child is born. A hole in the heart is one of the most common congenital heart de-

fects. In this condition, there actually is a hole in the dividing walls of the heart. Frequently, this is detected at birth and can be corrected surgically. In some cases, the hole will close by itself.

Heart valve damage can develop in an unborn child if the mother contracts German measles (Rubella) during the first three months of pregnancy. By immunizing the mother at least two months before she becomes pregnant, it is possible to protect her during the critical first trimester.

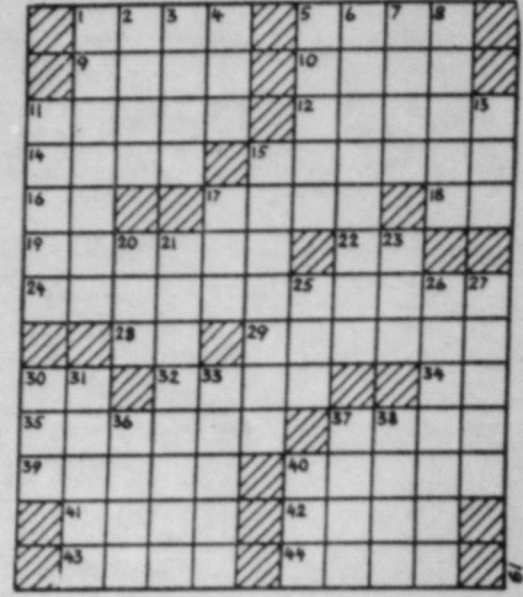
A Sinking Thought

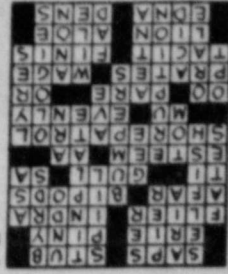

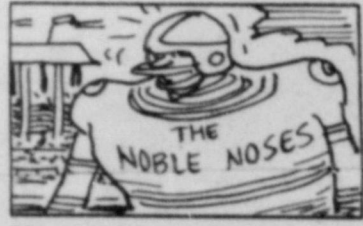

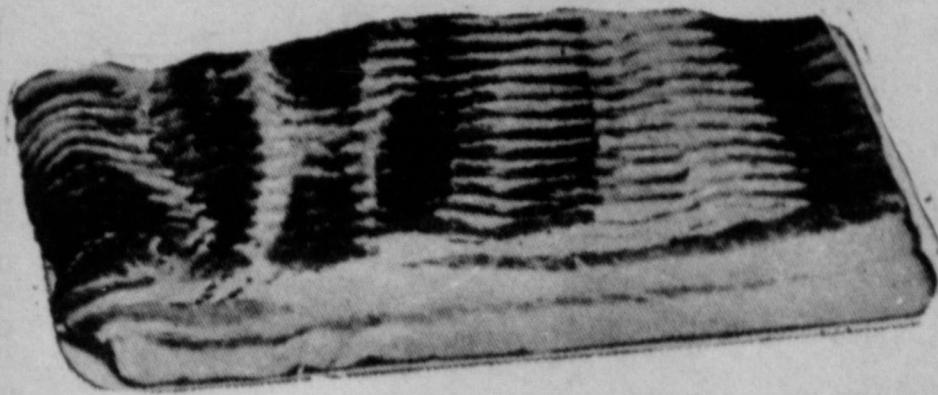

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MacKenzie Lake Opening Set

Panhandle and South Plains anglers, picnickers and campers are always looking for additional water and lakes to fish and visit and MacKenzie lake near Silverton should be put on the list May 1.

The new reservoir has been missed by the good rains during the past year and anglers will be restricted to bank fishing only when the lake opens.

The lake has approximately 150 surface acres at conservation level," said Jim Green, general manager.

The water is at least 10 feet below the new Texas Parks and Wildlife Department boat ramp located on the south side of the lake. A good general rain in the Tule Creek watershed should bring the water level up and then the Mackenzie commission could allow boats and watercraft on the lake.

An estimated 20 feet of water is available at the earthen dam and this will furnish anglers a chance at some nice two-to-three pound bass found in the lake.

As the lake fills to the conservation level, more species of fish including striped bass, small-mouth bass, rainbow and Kamloops trout and salmon are on the stocking agenda.

Lake Mackenzie is located in picturesque Tule canyon and it is typical of the caprock country of northwest Texas. Plenty of native game to the area including deer, aoudad sheep, quail and rattlesnakes use the lake

site as their home. The dam is located on highway 207, nine miles northwest of Silverton, or 30 miles east of Tulia and it is easy to find.

Campers will find hookups and picnic tables have been completed at strategic points around the lake. Visitors are asked to bring their own water for the present as construction on these facilities are still underway. The entrance fee has been set at \$1. per visitor with additional charges for camper hookups.

All anglers 17 years of age to 65 years of age will be required a Texas fishing license and this regulation will be enforced by both lake personnel and state game wardens.

A black bass limit of 10 fish per day with a 10 inch minimum will also be enforced.

No floaters, rafts or boats of any kind will be allowed on the lake until the water level rises and the Mackenzie commission approves boating for the lake.

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

the rise in cattle prices the last month have been real dramatic. Who would have believed cattle prices would go up over \$2.00 in a month's time? That is a 36 percent rise in prices. This just goes to show that prices were unduly depressed before the price rise and cattlemen were getting the raw end of the deal. All of this has helped cattlemen smile again.

The USDA Cattle On Feed Report as of April 1 for the 23 major feeding states estimated 10,872,000 head, 28 percent above last year, but 12 percent below levels on April 1, 1974. In Texas the number on feed is 1,675,000 head, up 49 percent from a year ago.

Placements for the first quarter of 1976 in the 23 states totaled 5,439,000 head, up 14 percent from 1975. In Texas placements were 980,000 cattle, an increase of 35 percent above year earlier levels.

Marketings for the 23 states during the first quarter of 1976 were 6,350,000 head, up 15 percent from last year and 6 percent more than in 1974. Texas feedlots marketed 1,102,000 cattle during the first quarter, an increase of 26 percent.

Farmer planting intentions as of April 1, according to USDA indicate corn acreage is expected to increase 6 percent from last year and to total 82.7 million acres. This is also a 2 percent increase from that indicated on January 1.

Sorghum acreage intentions of nearly 17.9 million acres are 2 percent below the 1975 acreage, in contrast to the 2 percent increase expected as of January 1.

Food grain (wheat, rice, and rye) acreage is expected to increase 3 percent to 83.8 million acres. Cotton growers intend to plant 11.3 million acres of all cotton, up 16 percent from last year. Soybean acreage is expected to decline 10 percent to a total of 49.3 million acres.

Wheat production in Texas is forecast at 66,300,000 bushels, down sharply from the record crop of 1975, which was 131,100,000 bushels, a decrease of 51 percent. However th 1976 crop estimate as of April 1 conditions is 25 percent above the 1974 crop of 52,800,000 bushels in Texas.

Acreage planted for the 1976 crop was slightly above a year earlier, but the April 1 indicated 76 percent would be harvested for grain this year compared to 91 percent last year.

When you invite a visitor into your home, it's usually someone whom you know and like to be around.

But there's one visitor you seldom see and don't want even though you provide him with the run of your home and all the comforts which you enjoy. That visitor, says the

Boating Season Is Near

Spring was delayed by a few cold days but, Texas boaters will soon be heading for the lakes and another season of skiing, fishing and just plain boating.

Some boats will be in the same shape they were last fall and if the skipper is planning on an active water season, that might not be to good.

Many boating accidents are the result of carelessness and lack of common sense. Over 638 Texans drowned during 1975 and many of these fatalities occurred while boating.

A thorough check of the boat and its required equipment before going on the water will insure at last a safe start. A few of the things that should be checked before leaving home include checking the boat for cracks or chipped paint; cleaning the fiberglass hull and applying a new coat of wax which will produce better speed and more fuel economy; inspecting the controls and throttle for cracks or breaks and replacing them if defective.

Take a look at your personal flotation devices (life jackets). Be sure they are serviceable and conform to US Coast Guard specifications which includes a serial number stamped on the preserver.

A quick thorough check of the running lights will ease your mind if you are caught out on the lake after dark or in a storm. Replace any bulbs that don't shine but be sure to check the battery for low voltage first.

Many boats are not required to carry a fire extinguisher but this device is very handy if a fire breaks out even on a small boat. Check for cracked or broken fittings or obstructed nozzles. Check the pressure gauge, locking pins and sealing wires and recharge the unit if the gauge indicates a low pressure.

A well tuned outboard or inboard engine will insure a safe trip and save towing time that could have been used for fishing or skiing.

These precautions take a little time, but it is better to find the problems while in your own backyard rather than when you are 100 miles from home.

Texas Department of Health Resources, is the rat.

Just as surely as if by invitation, you welcome the rat into your home by providing harborage and food--the two necessary ingredients for infestation of any premises. This may come as a surprise to most persons, since Texas and the United States have long prided themselves on being highly sanitized.

But, let's take a look at the problem to determine whether you may be guilty of encouraging rats.

A rat must have food to exist. If you have a cat, dog or other pet and overfeed it--leaving scraps around--the rat can survive quite well. Grain is another standard diet of rats and mice. What about that bird feeder? Is it constructed so that grain spills onto the ground or so placed that a rat can climb onto it? And how about your garbage can? Is the lid tight, or does it fit loosely? Do you always keep the lid on the can?

The answers to these questions may give you a clue as to why there are rats around.

Now, for the harborage requirement.

Rats take up residence in sewers, in piles of junk and lumber, in heaps of boxes and leaves, in storage sheds, in the attic or under your house. Have you heard strange noises in your walls or attic? It could be rats scampering around.

With winter upon us, rats are more prone to seek shelter in the warmth someone's home. You'd be surprised just how little space they need to squirm through a hole--around a water or gas pipe or ventilator duct--and get into your home. If the hole isn't big enough, they'll enlarge it with

their sharp teeth. Then they'll head for your kitchen pantry.

In addition to health hazards from rats, which transmit many diseases, rats love to chew on things, including electric wires which produce short circuits and fires.

Texas participates in rat reduction programs, and many cities have rodent control activities through Model Cities Programs. Local health departments direct programs in other cities. The Public Health Education Division and General Sanitation Division of the Texas Department of Health Resources cooperate in offering help in insect and rodent control.

Butter
1 poached egg

Melt 1 tablespoon of butter in a skillet over moderate heat. Add ham and cook a few minutes each side. Remove from heat and keep warm. To make sauce, combine remaining 4 tablespoons butter over low heat in a saucepan. Combine egg yolks, lemon juice, salt and cayenne in a small bowl; slowly add melted butter, stirring constantly. Toast muffin and spread with butter. Place slice of ham and the poached egg on the muffin half and top with sauce over.
