Blakley Leads, Tower Close 2nd In Crockett Vote

Senatorial Race Brings Out Only One-Third Of County Vote

Interim Senator William A. Blakley, Dallas millionaire business man and rancher, held the edge, with John G. Tower, Wichita Falls college professor, a close second among Crockett county voters who cast their ballots in the special election Tuesday to name a U. S. Senator to succeed Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson.

Blakley led the ticket with 134 votes to 108 for Tower, who last November polled over 900,000 votes as a Republican candidate running against Johnson for the Senate post.

Attorney General Will Wilson mustered 43 votes, Rep. Jim Wright of Fort Worth got 32, Henry B. Gonzales of San Antonio polled 22 and Maury Maverick of San Antonio was the choice of only 7 Crockett voters. Four votes were scattered among the 65 also-rans on the local ballot. One went to Albert Ray Smith of Maverick county, one to Joyce J. Bradshaw, of Dimmit county one to Homer H. Stalarow of Dallas, and one to Ben M. Johnson of Harris county.

A total of 358 votes were cast in Crockett county, approximately one third of the county's voting strength.

The statewide vote count to yesterday indicated that John G. Tower and William A. Blakley would battle it out for the almost-six-year term as U. S. Senator in a run-off election next month.

Wool Incentive Pay Applications To Be Readied This Month

March 31 was the final day of the 1960-61 wool marketing year under the National Wool Act and applications for incentive payment on wools marketed during the year ending March 31 are now being received at the local ASC office.

Since April 30, final day on which applications for payment could be received, this year falls on Sunday, ranchers who put off such filing until the last minute will have an extra day of grace, the applications to be received through May 1. Claude Russell, office manager, announced this week.

In order to minimize the rush at the ASC office preparing payment applications, ranchers are urged to file their sale documents as soon as possible after the close of the marketing period.

Incentive payments for shorn wool and sale of unshorn lambs during the marketing year from April 1, 1960, through March 31, 1961, will be determined on the basis of the difference between the national average received for wool and the support price, fixed by the USDA at 62 cents per pound. Payment will be a percentage of the total amount the grower received for all wools sold during the year.

Applications for payment are now being prepared in the local ASC office and growers will be advised when their application are ready to be signed.

Strain Bros. Get Contract For New Segment Iraan Road

A contract for 1.3 miles of construction on R. M. 1980 in Pecos & Crockett Counties has been awarded to the San Angelo firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Strain Brothers, Inc. submitted the low bid of \$72,487 on the project. Grading, structures, base and surface from S. H. 349 in Iraan, to 0.08 mile east of Pecos River is expected to take 90 working days, according to Archie J. Sherrod District Highway Engineer at Odessa.

Jack V. Valentine, Jr., Resident Engineer at McCamey will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

OZONA TO HOST DISTRICT TRACK AND FIELD MEET AT LIONS STADIUM SATURDAY

Range Management Field Day May 1 At Range Station

Production Results To Be Studied At Ozona-Barnhart Station

Response and production of livestock obtained by various grazing methods and carrying capacities will be the topic of discussion at the Texas Range Management Field Day to be held May 1 at the Texas Range Station located between Barnhart and Ozona on State Highway 163. The meeting will start at 9 a. m.

The program will be under the direction of Don Huss of the Department of Range and Forestry at Texas A. and M. College, and R. V. Ketchum, Work Unit Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at Ozona.

Huss said the program will feature an all-day field trip and discussion showing the production and responses of livestock and forage on a two-pasture, four-pasture and six-pasture rotational grazing system and a continuous grazing system. The pastures are grazed by sheep only, cattle only and cattle-sheep combination at carrying rates of one animal unit per 25 acres and one animal unit per 30 acres.

Production figures will be given on the amount of gain, per cent calf crop, per cent lamb crop and wool production obtained from the various grazing systems and carrying capacities.

Other features on the program will be progress reports on control of bitterweed and prickly pear, range fertilization, rootplowing and reseeding trials. Also a report will be given on grazing management studies with sheep and cattle on a tobosa-buffalo grass-curly mesquite type range.

This is an open house meeting and anyone interested is urged to attend, said Huss. Lunch will be served.

One of the most closely contested district track meets in a number of years loomed as a possibility this week as the running of the district 8-A meet in Ozona Saturday approached.

Sonora, Eldorado, Junction, and Ozona each loom as strong contenders on the basis of recent showings and Big Lake who has been very shy this season showed signs of coming to life in San Angelo last week.

Ozona will be seeking additional points from boys who have not been scoring this year Saturday and if they do not come through, the chances of Ozona repeating as district champ for the third straight year seem slim.

Sonora, with a large stable of athlete, will be favored to cop the title but both Junction and Eldorado could come in for the flag if they can win their strong events.

Sonora, since winning the Ozona meet easily in the year has steadily gained strength in the running events but on the dark side of the ledger, many Ozona and Eldorado boys have displaced the Broncos in the field events.

Sonora has fine distance runners and is heavily favored to win points in the low hurdles, the 440 relay, and the broad jump along with heavy wins in the mile, the 880, and the mile relay.

Eldorado has come along very strongly and with Jim Runge a fine 440 man the Eagles will be favored to win that event, as well as picking up points in the high hurdles, the 220, the mile and 880 and gaining a first place in the shot with Mike Jurek.

Junction has fine pole vaulters and may win the first three places in that event. The golden Eagles have beaten the Ozona 440 team on several occasions this season and the winner between the two in this event could determine the chances either have of winning the meet.

In Willis the Junction team has a runner able to score in the 100 and the 220 and here once again the way Junction runs will be largely determined by the way their unheralded men can garner the fourth, fifth and sixth places which may determine the winner.

Big Lake has not had much beyond Mike Holmes, one of the district's best sprinters, entered in most of its meets this year but the Owls indicated at San Angelo last week that they have more than they have been showing and this week all the cards will be on the table.

Coach Chick Womack reported this week that his squad was in better shape than has been the case for several weeks and aside from the loss for the year with a pulled muscle of Freddy Dobbs.

The Senior class will have a barbecue dinner at the field Saturday for those interested in attending the meet.

Unopposed Candidates For School Board Win Approval From Voters

The three candidates whose names were on the ballot for the three places to be filled on the district board of school trustees in last Saturday's election, were whisked into office by solid margins in the light voting of the day.

Incumbent board members, Bill Carson, president, and Glenn Sutton, were re-elected for another two-year term on the board, Sutton with 86 votes and 82 for Carson. Taylor Deaton, recruited as a candidate when Joe Williams declined to seek re-election, was the choice of 83 voters.

Write-in votes went for four other persons, four each for Fred Hagelstein and R. H. Knox and one each for Mrs. R. A. Harrell and Mrs. P. L. Childress.

Hillery Phillips for Precinct 1 and Wayne W. West, at large, were re-elected to the county board on the same ballot.

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Two Gas Strikes Wildcat Spotted In Western Crockett Co.
H. B. Herring No. 1-B Bouscaren, depleted producer in the Noelke (3,565-foot Clearfork) field of Crockett County, eight miles southeast of Iraan, has been re-completed as a Tubby dry gas discovery.
It was finaled for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.7 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations between 3,580-630 feet.
Original completion was Jan. 6, 1954, by Ledge Petroleum Co. as the No. 1-B Bouscaren as the second well in the Noelke 3565 feet, gauging 141.51 barrels of 34.4 gravity oil, no water, through a 1/2-inch choke and perforations between 3,612 1/2-3,628 feet.
Location is 2,173 feet from the south and 618 feet from the west lines of 29-GG-HE&WT.
The field also produces gas from

the Soma sand at 2,100 feet.
A Yates gas discovery was indicated in the Olson multipay field of Crockett County with the flowing of gas at the daily rate of 1 million cubic feet on a drillstem test at Plymouth Oil Co., Midland, No. 13-00 Noelke Livestock Co., in 10-GC-T&NO, 16 miles southeast of Iraan and one mile south of Soma gas production.
Gas surfaced in three minutes, flowing the above gauge, on a one-hour test taken between 1,203-1,3 hour test taken between 1,203-1,345 feet.
No shows were recovered on cores cut between 1,197-1,248 feet

and 1,201-1,345 feet.
Spero T. Construction Co. will drill a 2,500-foot wildcat in Crockett County, four miles southeast of Soma field. It is the No. 1-B, 10-GC-T&NO, 16 miles southeast of Iraan and one mile south of Soma gas production.

Notes From The County Agent's Office

By Pete W. Jacoby

Research shows value of performance testing of rams in work carried on at the Sonora Experiment Station over a period of years. Lamb and wool producers face a challenge to maintain their position in a competitive economy. One way they can meet this challenge is by increasing their productive efficiency through continued improvement of breeding flocks. Selection is the only method yet demonstrated that will bring about this improvement.

Recent work by the Texas Experiment Station has shown selection is most effective when accurate production records, especially on rams, are used as a supplement to the current practice of selecting animals by visual appraisal. Visual selection is useful for length and quality of wool and for face covering and skin folds, but undue emphasis on these characteristics can result in the sacrifice of others. Selection should be made with proportionate emphasis placed on each character, and not with excessive emphasis on any one trait.

A new publication contains valuable information on performance testing and outlines suggested procedures for testing ram lambs. These procedures are: select the most promising ram lambs at weaning and put them on post-weaning performance tests; identify each animal, shear and weigh,

place the rams on good range or pasture of self-feed in drylot; weigh the rams periodically to determine the rate of gain; shear, a second time at the next regular shearing; score the animals and dispose of the low performers.

Persons desiring more information on performance testing may contact the county agents office and ask for MP-467, "Performance Testing of Rams as an Aid in the Improvement of Fine-wool Sheep."

Mrs. Hoover, one of the members of the Ozona Woman's Club, was the thirteenth serving with her were... Elizabeth Fussell, secretary; Mrs. Max... and Mrs. Carson... was elected as de... Biennial and State... Mrs. Lis Carson... Convention.

Later she was married to Arthur Clinton Hoover in the home of her parents in Ozona. Mr. Hoover was the son of the late W. P. Hoover and Laura McNutt Hoover, who came from Llano county to this area in 1882. Mrs. W. P. Hoover is said to have been the first white woman to live in what is now Crockett county. They settled on the Pecos river and withstood the rigors of pioneer life, hostile Indians, wild animals, rattlesnakes and the like. Mother Hoover related that once in those early days she did not see another woman for nine months.

C. Montgomery was a member of the civic department, discussed such topics as parks and playgrounds, history and buildings, home-forestry and landscaping. Members were Mrs. Ira... L. J. Kittle and Mrs. Frank Friend was made a member of the club by her vast influence and service to the club. Mrs. Hoover and her family had moved to Ozona to make their home. A special project of this club was encouraging women to accept their responsibility after informing themselves. Mrs. Hoover said the club offered \$5 and \$2.50 for the essays on "Why I Should..."

Dunlap Hoover was the daughter of a native Texan, Davis Dunlap and his wife, Mary Osborne Dunlap, who came from Comanche county to Crockett, arriving here in 1881, just a month after Crockett County was organized. Osborne Dunlap, "Mac Dunlap," at the age of one year, three years, still living in Ozona, is truly one of the old timers yet with us. Mac Dunlap was born in Edin, Concho county and later in Ozona. She attended the Normal in San Antonio and received a certificate to teach school as a young girl. She first filled out a term for the Smith, who resigned to the Turkey Roost school. She taught for a year and a half at the Hembrina Community school on the old Bell ranch, which was located toward Big Lake. She then taught a term under Prohibition as a primary teacher.

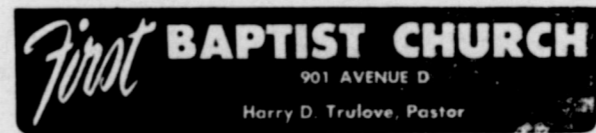

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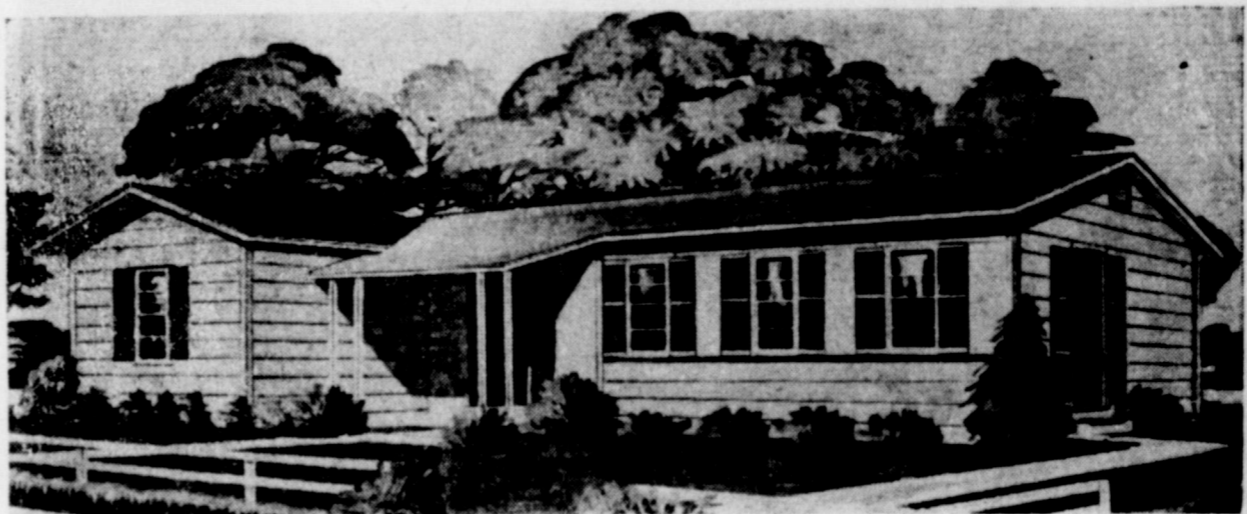
