Bosworth, Author, Former Ozonan To Research Work on New Book Tentatively Titled The Ozona Story

Allan R. Bosworth, author of a number of books, the latest of which is "New Country," a story of his family and their wanderings in pioneer days of Texas and the ultimate end of the aimless journey when the family put down roots in Ozona, is back in his home town this week.

Captain Bosworth, (he is a retired Naval officer) whose home is in Roanoke, Va., has rented an apartment in Ozona and plans to be here several weeks while he does research for a projected new book, tentatively titled "The Ozona Story."

Just what that book will be about is still as yet an undeveloped idea but Bosworth plans to interview old timers, pore through historical documents and dredge up personal memories to form what he hopes will be another work with the apparent appeal his "New Country" has won, judging from the almost unanimously favorable reviews it has received from coast to coast.

The research for the book, contract for which has already been signed by his publishers, Harpers, like that for "New Country" will involve interviews with members of Bosworth's family still living in this area. He has a brother at Sanderson, one at Odessa, one at Brady. A tape recorder and a relaxed session at family reminiscences, plus a writer's mind which retains the essential images to be transcribed into words, were the instruments which produced the latest book by Bosworth and no doubt will again figure in the gathering of material for the forthcoming "Ozona Story."

Although he has been in town but a couple of days, Bosworth has already accepted engagements to speak at the Lions Club meeting meeting next Tuesday noon. Also, today and at the Rotary Club the Crockett County Historical Society plans a meeting and aut-

Mahon To Be Sworn In As DA At Formal Ceremony At 10 Mon.

Dixon Mahon, Crockett county attorney, who will become district attorney of the 112th district by appointment of Gov. Price Daniel to fill a vacancy created by the resignation of Connell Ashley, will be sworn in at a formal ceremony in the district courtroom of the Crockett County courthouse Monday, June 4, at 10 a. m.

Swearing in the new district attorney will be District Judge Steve Preslar of McCamey. The public is invited to attend the ceremony.

Mr. Mahon will continue his residence in Ozona and as resident district attorney can perform the duties of a county attorney if requested by the Commissioners Court. He will resign the office of county attorney and will draw no compensation from the county but as a resident district attorney can perform the duties incumbent on a county attorney, such as prosecutions in justice and county courts, filing complaints, etc. Mr. Mahon has announced he will be available for such duties to Crockett county.

Vacation Bible School At First Baptist Opens With Parade Saturday

A parade last Saturday morning launched the First Baptist Church Vacation Bible School which is currently running on an eight-day schedule from May 28 to June 6th.

The staff of the school includes Rev. Harry Trulove Principal and 38 persons and the enrollment has risen sharply in the last few days reaching 157 Wednesday morning. Rev. Trulove stated Tuesday that he expected the enrollment to reach 200 before the school closes. In order for a child to be enrolled he must have been present two days or more.

The largest number of children enrolled fell in the 6 to 12 years old bracket with over 100 enrolled in those departments Wednesday. The school begins each morning at 8:30 and dismisses at 11:30

Perners Have Top Horses At Ozona's 10th Annual Show

Ozona Quarter Horses Judged Best In Sat- urday's Show

The 1962 Ozona Horse show sponsored by the Ozona Roping Club proved to be one of the largest shows held in recent years Saturday as fair weather greeted the some 125 entries, their owners and riders.

Comet Hancock, a three-year-old sorrel gelding, was chosen all-around quarterhorse and was presented a trophy.

The horse, owned and ridden by Sam Perner of Ozona, won several firsts in the performances division and was named reserve champion gelding in the halter class.

Keeping honors somewhat in the family, P. C. Perner's Topper Hancock, the sire of Comet Hancock, was named champion aged stallion, and grand Champion stallion in the show as well as winning first place in Senior Western riding and barrel racing.

Champion mare was Katy Taylor, owned by Paul Jesse of Uvalde. The reserve champion was Kelo Bump, shown by her owner W. C. Kyle of San Angelo.

Reserve champion in the stallion class went to El Ganador, a horse owned by W. B. Blakemore of Midland.

The champion gelding was Payband, a horse owned by Bob Ealinger of Midland, and the winner of a number of honors in horse shows over West Texas this spring.

In the youth division, open to 4-H and FFA members, Paul Perner's horse, Dashing Darling, was named top mare. Top stallion honors went to a horse named Baby Giant Buck, owned by Wayne Smith of Garden City.

CROCKETT VOTERS PICK NEW JUDGE, TWO COMMISSIONERS IN DEMO RUN-OFF SATURDAY

Run-off races for three local county offices plus a spirited statewide campaign between the run-off candidates for the offices of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, and Congressman-at-Large, are expected to whip up intense interest in the Democratic party's run-off primary here next Saturday, June 2.

Although the time of year may have a lot to do with it, the fact remains that absentee voting was far ahead of the first primary period and observers were predicting a heavy turnout of voters in Saturday's election. Historically, the second primary becomes something of a drag in Texas, mostly because local races are usually settled in the first. But the fact that Crockett county voters will pick a county judge and two commissioners in addition to the state candidates should make for a healthy turnout of voters.

Campaigning down to the final wire to become Crockett county's fifth county judge in its 70-year history are Brock Jones, insurance man, ranchman and former oil company employe, and Troy Williams, ranchman, builder and former grocery store proprietor. Jones and Williams survived out of the field of four, including incumbent appointee judge, Ralph Jones, and ranchman Ted M. White.

Voters in Precincts 2 and 4 will pick their county commissioners in the run-off primary. In Precinct 2, incumbent appointee Commissioner Richard L. Flowers, ranchman and former Ozona business man, is being challenged by newspaper carrier Rex Halydier. The two candidates topped the field of six in the first primary.

In Precinct 4, incumbent Commissioner Jake Young rancher, faces Glenn Sutton, filling station operator. In the state races, that for governor holds the spotlight, with John Connally, product of the nation (Continued on Last Page)

Famous Air Force Band To Appear Here For Opening Of 5th Annual Junior Rodeo

An outstanding contribution to the success of the fifth annual Ozona Junior Rodeo, scheduled July 12, 13, and 14, will be made by the appearance here of 539th Air Force Band, pictured above in marching formation.

The band will be here to appear in the opening day parade on Thursday, July 12. Appearance of the famous band here was brought about through the efforts of Major W. C. Bowman, commander of the 732nd AC&WS Squadron at the Ozona Air Force Station.

The 539th Air Force Band, known throughout Texas as the Air Force Band of the West, is a distinctive and accomplished musical organization. The band, organized in 1948 by Major Samuel Kurtz, then a warrant officer, plays at military and civilian events throughout the southwest. It

is presently under the direction of Major Kurtz, who also functions as command band supervisor for the Air Training Command with headquarters at Randolph AFB, Texas. Executive Officer of the band is Lieutenant Larry B. Lyon, Assistant director of the group is Chief Warrant Officer Guy C. Powell.

Major Kurtz holds an honorary Doctor of Music from the Southern College of Fine Arts, Houston, Texas. Lieutenant Lyon in 1960 was awarded a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Oklahoma State University and Warrant Officer Powell is a graduate of the Vandercook School of Music in Chicago. Major Kurtz has studied privately with the famed trombone virtuoso Arthur Pryor.

The Air Force Band of the West

has appeared on national television hookups several times, one of the most significant single appearances being the Air Power Pageant televised from the Hollywood Bowl in Los Angeles in 1951. As the foremost Air Force musical group in the Southwest, the Band of the West has an extremely busy schedule of appearances at both military and civic events.

In addition to its capabilities as a marching band, the Band of the West gives symphonic concerts, often using arrangements written by Air Force musicians. One of the "firsts" in the concert field, the mas band concert as part of the Armed Forces Week observances in many parts of the country, was originated in San Antonio by the band. The Band of the West is considered one of the most versatile of Air Force bands.

1,395 Housing Units Listed In Crockett County By US Census

A U. S. Department of Commerce 1960 Census of Housing report for Crockett county lists 1,395 housing units in the county, of which only 1,068 were counted in "sound condition with all plumbing" and 1,189 were shown as occupied, 121 of the occupied units evidently not being "sound condition with all plumbing." Owner occupied units numbered 672 with 517 occupied by renters, the median rental being \$68.

The census was evidently taken in the winter because it listed only 150 households as having air conditioning. TV sets were crowding telephones and radios, with 802 TV sets counted, against 1,083 radios and 809 telephones.

Of the housing units, 660 had at least one automobile, 326 had two automobiles and 57 had three or more. As for other household appliances, 932 had washing machines, 180 had dryers, 433 had home freezers.

Sanitary facilities were found pretty common in Crockett homes. Out of the 1,395 total, 1,293 had hot and cold running water, 1,311 had flush toilets, 1,297 had bathtub or shower.

Thirty-three, the census takers found, had basements and 57 were trailer houses. The median value of owner-occupied homes was found to be \$8,300.

Services for Mrs. Blackwell were held in the Mt. Olive Baptist Church in Hempstead, Texas, Sunday.

Mrs. Blackwell is survived by her husband who moved to Jasper last week from Ozona, and her daughter, a teacher in the Jasper Public Schools.

Mrs. Damiana R. Fuantoz Trujillo, 49, died in Crockett County Hospital Monday, May 28th, as the result of a long present heart ailment.

Mrs. Trujillo has been a resident of Ozona for 23 years and is survived by three sons, Felix, Francisco, and Joe Trujillo all of Ozona, two brothers, Celestino Fuantoz of Ozona and Chon Fuantoz of San Angelo and two sisters, Mrs. Maria Longoria and Mrs. Carlotta DeHoyos.

From the Stockman June 1, 1933

Wool, the basic commodity upon which West Texas bases its hopes for future prosperity, continued its meteoric price rise with a jump of 1 3/4 cents a pound over the previous high, when the Producers Wool and Mohair Company of Del Rio Wednesday recorded a new high of 27 3/4 cents a pound in a sealed bid sale of its twelve months accumulation.

Word was received this past week of the marriage of Miss Edith Word to Monroe S. Decker of St. Louis. The wedding took place at the home of the Rev. Hoyle, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Las Cruces, N. M. on May 21. The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Word, formerly of Ozona. She is a graduate of Ozona High School and of Simmons University with the class of '31. For the past two years she has been teaching in the Garden City Public Schools.

The chemical mixture to use for aerial control of mesquite is 1/2 pound of 2,4,5-T, 1 gallon of diesel oil and enough water to make 4 gallons of mixture. This four gallons of chemical mixture should be applied to one acre in a manner that insures complete coverage of the foliage.

Hoffman says a miracle should not be expected. The total root kill under ideal conditions is 25 to 35%. The initial control will last from 5 to 7 years before spraying of the regrowth is necessary. local county agent.

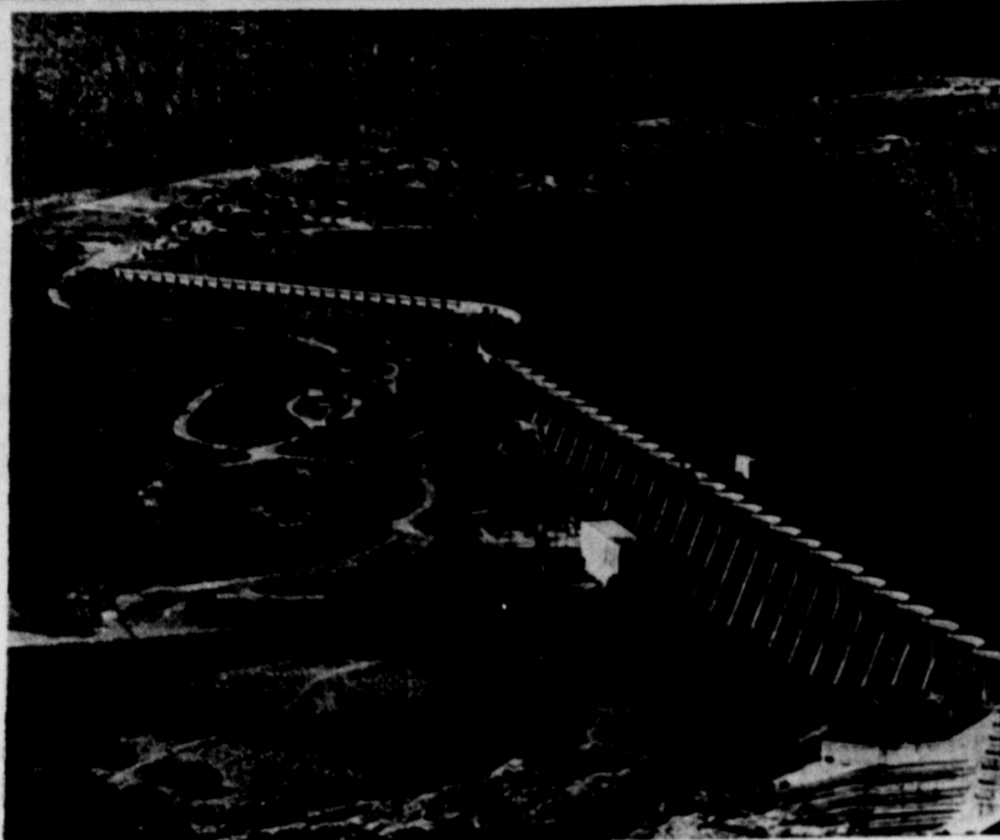

Soil Surveys Aid In Conservation Plans For Ranch Operators

The standard soil survey is sponsored by the Crockett Soil Conservation District according to R. A. Harrell, Chairman of the board. The survey is an inventory of the soils in the District.

The survey will be made on a limited number of ranches in the district next month, according to James Glynn, local Work Unit Conservationist.

He says the survey is made by soil scientists walking or driving over a representative area of the land and taking a number of samples. From the many characteristics of the soil are determined the depth of the topsoil, surface texture, or proportions of sand, silt and clay, depth and nature of parent material which may be hard rock or soft caliche, and the color and texture of the subsoil.

After the field survey is completed information of the different soils are recorded on aerial photographs for use in assisting farmers and ranchers plan and apply conservation practices.

Additional information about the Standard Soil Survey can be obtained from the local Soil Conservation Service.
