## Mrs. W. E. West, 85 Pioneer Resident, Buried Wednesday

### First Graduate Of Ozona High School Died Tuesday

Crockett county gave up another one of its pioneer citizens Wednesday with memorial services in the First Baptist Church for Mrs. W. E. West, 85, a resident of Crockett county since its organization in 1891 and the first graduate of Ozona High School.

Mrs. West, widow of a widely known ranchman and financier here, died Tuesday in the Crockett County Hospital where she had been a patient the past ten days.

Born in Junction July 18, 1878 the daughter of Sam T. Smith and Alice Crim Smith, she was the first white girl to be born in that early day community. The family moved to Ozona when she was a young girl and she had resided here since, except for a few years before Mr. West's death when they lived in San Angelo.

Funeral services were conducted at 4 p. m. Wednesday from the First Baptist Church here, of which Mrs. West became a charter member in 1891 and remained a faithful member to her death. Services were conducted by the Rev. Max Brown, pastor, with burial following in Cedar Hill Cemetery, James Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Pallbearers were grandsons and grandsons-in-law. They were Bob West, L. S. Terry, David West, Bill Carson, Boyd Baker, Larry Albers, Jerry Hayes, James Childress, Bill Clegg and Cap West.

On St. Valentine's day in 1897, Alva Smith became the bride of William E. West, a young ranchman of this county. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. D. M. Mathis in the Ozona Baptist Church. Mr. and Mrs. West celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in San Angelo in 1947.

They were parents of Wayne W. West, Robert Massie West, Wilma West Carson (Mrs. Ira Carson) and Alice West Baker (Mrs. Alice Baker).

As the school system's first graduate, Mrs. West was chosen Homecoming Queen at the 1955 Homecoming celebration here and rode in the spot of honor in the Homecoming parade.

Mr. and Mrs. West were world travelers. They crossed the Atlantic thirteen times to visit Europe and on world tours. One of their (Continued on Last Page)

## Ozona To Host District 8-A Teams In Annual District Track Meet This Week

The annual district meet will be staged in Ozona this week-end as practice meets end and the run for keeps begins with this week-end's activity.

The Eldorado Eagles will be heavy favorites to capture the District 8-A team title, but the Ozona Lions closed some of the gap between the two teams at Irwin last week and Coaches Sonny Cleere and Chick Womack will be making an all-out effort to overtake the Eagles this week.

Despite the fact that the Lions

have not been able to win over the Eagles this season and will not be favored to do so Saturday, the fact remains that this will be the first time this year that only the district teams have been involved in a meet. This very often tends to give a team a chance to pick up points where they had not been able to get them before.

Coach Chick Womack had some shifting of personnel last week and is expected to do some more this week in order to pick up points and get better use of his talent. The 880-relay is not a state event and the members of that team will be able to enter another event.

Rodney Stewart and David Childress, both profited from the move as Stewart got a third in the hundred yard dash and Childress got second in the 180-yard low hurdles, events that neither boy has been entering this season.

Childress, while placing high in the low hurdles, failed to run up to his best in the high hurdles and finished a poor fifth, losing to Eldorado's Ronnie Williams for the first time this season, though Williams did not win the event.

The Lions scored 68 points in the meet as compared to the Eagles 91 but Coahoma, Grandfalls, Van Horn, Pyote and Mertzon and Balmorhea all cut into someone's points, as all of the district teams were on hand for the meet.

Among the more disappointing aspects of the meet were an injury to Bob Amthor's foot which has hindered his work this week and could hamper his activity this weekend. The loss by the mile relay team to Big Lake, along with the already mentioned low finished of David Childress in the high hurdles, were other disappointing factors. However, all of these events have little bearing on this week's races, except for Amthor's injury.

On the bright side of the ledger were Childress's strong showing in the 180 lows and Stewart's finish in the hundred.

The failure of the Lions distance men was also discouraging since the locals had counted on some points in the 880 and the mile, but failed to place in either event.

Bob Stephens will be back with the Moore Oil team and if all of the talent that seemed to be budding for the Moore team last year comes through and the team gets a little help in other positions, then the Moore team could be the new title holder.

Charlie Annette will be at the helm of the B&B team. Rex Fenton and Weldon Maness will pilot the Woody Mason Motors.

Practice for those aspiring to get on a team this year will begin Monday afternoon at the Little League Park at 4:30 and will also be held Tuesday and Thursday for the next week or so before player selection is made.

## Pauley Says Gas Processing Plant Operative Apr. 15

### First Announcement By Multi-Owner Venture From Los Angeles

Los Angeles, Calif. — Pauley Petroleum Inc., Los Angeles, announced today that the new \$3.5 million Ozona Gas Processing Plant and field gathering system, in which it owns a substantial interest, will commence processing gas from the rich Ozona gas field in Crockett County, West Texas, by April 15.

Edwin W. Pauley, chairman of the board, revealed that Pauley Petroleum holds the largest single interest in the gas plant and related facilities, and identified other participants as Northern Gas Products Co., Omaha, Neb.; Delta Drilling Company, Tyler, and Johnson & Lindley, Inc., Houston.

Northern Natural Gas Co. recently completed a long term contract for purchase of all of the gas from the Ozona plant for the life of the field at the area price.

Constructed by Stearns-Roger Corp., Denver, the new gas plant has an ultimate capacity of 48 million cubic feet of gas per day. Initially, however, the plant will process a minimum of 8 million cubic feet of residue gas per day, and on or before Jan. 1, 1967, the rate will be increased to its ultimate capacity. In addition to residue gas, the plant will process and sell propane, butane and condensate.

The gathering system, which will extend more than 24 miles through the Ozona field, will deliver gas initially from 17 completions in 12 wells to the new plant, Pauley stated. Pauley Petroleum Inc., has an approximate 50 per cent interest in 40,000 acres in the field in the 12 completed wells.

Pauley said that the participants plan to drill 16 additional wells in the Ozona field during the balance of 1964.

The above press release is the first official announcement from the interested firms in the gas plant two miles south of Ozona, now nearing completion. Completion of details of the corporate identity of the operating company was given as reason for withholding the building announcement. The Stockman recently carried pictures and a story on progress of the installation.

### Three New Faces Added To Board In Saturday Election

Celestino (Charlie) Fuantoz led the ticket when voters Saturday chose four members for the board of trustees of the Crockett Consolidated Common School district for two-year terms.

Fuantoz received 352 votes. James Childress was re-elected to membership on the board by a total of 315 votes. In third place was L. B. (Bud) Cox, III, with 285 votes and fourth member of the new trustees was P. C. Perner with 258 votes.

B. W. Stuart, seeking re-election, received 249 votes and R. B. (Bob) Stephens polled 199.

Holdover members of the seven-man board of trustees are Bill Carson, president, Taylor Deaton and Charlie Davidson, III.

Also elected in the Saturday record balloting were three members of the county board, which functions only occasionally as custodians of school property. Elected were Charlie Black in Precinct 2, Jeff Owens, Precinct 3 and Marshall Montgomery, Precinct 4.

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#### EMPTY WORDS

Thoughtful citizens are becoming more and more disturbed over the shambles that passage of the Civil Rights Act would make of the Constitution and representative government in the United States.

The answers to their fears and protests, as received from Senators who obviously intend to yield to the Executive demand, very generally follow the same tone of deprecation in seeking to pat the heads of these alarmed constituents.

The formula is to point out that 34 states now have civil rights laws, so there's really nothing to get excited about.

But they fail to mention that passage of the Federal act would void all those state laws. They assume — or hope, at least — that the voters have forgotten that when the Supreme Court ruled in 1956 that Communist Boss Steve Nelson was not subject to the sedition laws of Pennsylvania (under which he had been convicted of conspiring to overthrow the Government by force and violence), our highest tribunal knocked out the anti-Communist laws of 42 states!

And it might be asked in passing what state has any means today of protecting its children against atheistic teachings since the Supreme Court in 1962 dealt the Lord's Prayer a knockout punch in the schools of 37 states in ruling a Pennsylvania law requiring its recital unconstitutional. And in 1963, the Court copper-riveted this decision by ruling out the "non-sectarian" school prayer of the N. Y. Board of Regents.

Clearly, the Civil Rights battle is the last stand of States' Rights. With the passage of this act, the states would have no law, no local government. In the place of representative government at any level we would have total Federal regimentation — rule by unlimited swarms of Government "inspectors" with authority from the Executive to interfere with anyone's business, anyone's job, and anyone's freedom.

It is a sad day for this once-proud nation when it is left to the 100 men of the US Senate to decide the fate of Liberty — for which ten thousand times as many have died. They need, as never before, the guidance and advice of 100 million of us to sustain them in their awesome and fearful loneliness.

High school boys are working out under the direction of Coach Ted White in preparation for the spring baseball season. Games will be matched with neighboring towns.

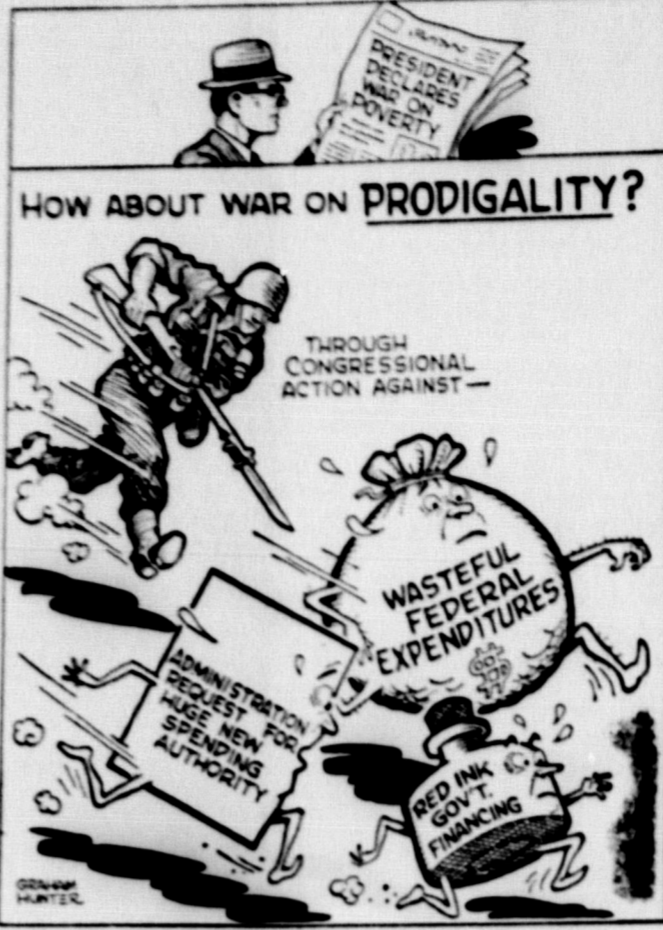
Crockett county was one of five in the state which could boast less than 5 percent of its population on relief rolls, the Texas Relief Commission announced.

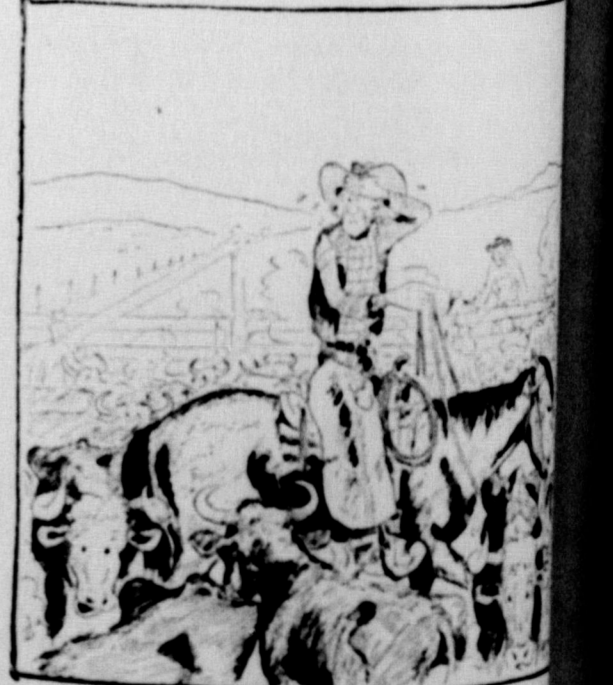

### HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — A mighty head  
of tension which had built up at  
the state capitol eased as the Hous-  
ton federal court agreed to post-  
pone effect of its congressional re-  
districting order until the next e-  
lections.

Top Democratic officials and  
members of the Legislature kept  
close watch on the news wires out  
of Houston as they sweated out  
the decision following four days  
of hearings and argument.

Their optimism had wilted in  
the last 24 hours before the rul-  
ing was announced. More than one  
legislator reportedly had his bag  
packed ready to return to Austin  
for a special session.

As it is, although the court post-  
poned effective date of its ruling,  
it kept the case on its docket and  
will take further action if a con-  
stitutional districting bill is not  
passed by August 1, 1965.

For all practical purposes, the  
judicial chapter on redistricting is  
closed for the year. Congressmen  
will run in their old districts one  
more time.

### Record Voter List — There are more Texas voters this year than ever.

A record total of 2,881,183 have  
paid poll taxes or obtained ex-  
emption certificates, the State  
Comptroller reports.

That's 293,929 more than in 1960,  
the previous record year, and 533-  
024 more than in 1962. Even so,  
the report does not include the  
free registrations for federal elec-  
tions or voters over 65 who do not  
have to get exemptions because  
they live in cities of less than  
10,000 population. Addition of  
these two categories could swell  
the qualified voter list to more  
than 3,000,000.

### Salt Water Pollution — Texas Railroad Commission is putting more teeth into its orders against unlined earthen surface pits for salt water disposal.

At least 30 oil leases in the  
Hubbard Creek watershed have  
been severed because operators  
failed to comply with the Com-  
mission's no-pit order which be-

came effective for that area on  
March 1.

Commission says it will inspect  
every lease in the watershed. Oil  
cannot be moved by pipeline or  
truck while the leases are sev-  
ered.

### They're Smoking Again — Tex- ans, who showed signs of slowing down on their smoking in Feb- ruary shortly after medical scare reports, are now at it again as heavy as ever.

Tax revenue from cigarette sales  
which dropped sharply soon after  
the federal report on smoking  
dangers was released, jumped  
nearly \$1,400,000 during March,  
according to State Treasurer Jesse  
James.

"It looks like they have gone  
back to smoking," shrugged  
James. "At least, there's not any  
big wholesale quitting."

### Bar Seeks to Ban Belli — Fed up with the antics of bellicose Cal- ifornia lawyer Melvin Belli, the Texas State Bar Association is seeking an order from the State Supreme Court to keep him from practicing law in Texas.

Claimed the Bar, in requesting  
an injunction against the onetime  
chief defense counsel for slayer  
Jack Ruby, "(Belli's) conduct has  
been so grossly and flagrantly un-  
ethical, intemperate and abusive  
in nature as to weaken the admin-  
istration of justice and to lessen  
public respect for the courts and  
laws of this state."

Belli has displayed no remorse  
for his tirades against Dallas and  
the trial court since his former  
client received the death penalty.

### April Oil Allowable — Texas oil production will be held at 29 per cent of potential during the next month, highest figure for Ap- ril in five years.

Texas Railroad Commission,  
which heard predictions of nine  
major oil purchasers that demand  
for oil will increase from two to  
three per cent this year, set April  
allowable at 2,931,746 barrels dai-  
ly. March production was 2,983,222  
barrels a day, also under a 29 per  
cent order.

Twenty-four executives( deliv-  
ering their annual state-of-the-in-  
dustry reports, said there were  
177,800,000 barrels of crude oil on  
hand in Texas on March 1. This  
is some 1,480,000 barrels more  
than they figured desirable.

One wants to put Ozona's water a potential pollution hazard to the ground water. However, even if wells were to utilize poor salt water disposal methods or, for a time, were even so reckless as to violate the standards set by the Railroad Commission, the city's water would not be polluted.

Since the water beneath Ozona moves from north to south, and the proposed wells in question would be located south of town, any resulting pollution would occur after the water passed under the townsite.

Now, as to what, if any, advantage it would be to the county or the individual landowner to pool their acreage in order to permit drilling. First it, must be noted that a number of wells are now in operation on land surrounding Ozona. More wells will undoubtedly be drilled in the near future in the areas already leased outside of town. Eventually, the oil and gas reserves beneath our lots, streets, buildings, etc. will be depleted by such wells - whether the acreage within town is pooled or not.

It seems unrealistic to sit by and do nothing when Crockett County, the Ozona schools, the water district, and the individual landowners could profit. Pooling an acreage costs nothing and results in no property damage; therefore, there is nothing to lose, but there is something to gain if oil or gas is produced.

Just what will this mean in actual monetary gain? Of course, a dry hole would render no profit - but no loss - to those who pool their property. Should there be production, however, the economic picture would be bright. The school and county lands would bring from \$50,000 to \$100,000 into Crockett County's treasury. One producing well already exists adjacent to county land which could be pooled with it.

As for the individual who leases his property, should he have dreams of becoming independently wealthy as a result of the income from this leasing, he quite probably will be disappointed. All returns, of course, are dependent upon the amount of land leased by an owner and the amount of oil or gas produced by the well. Though his personal income might not be bolstered considerably, whatever he does receive will be "found" money, which he can donate to his church or favorite charity.

### Jerry Shurley Quits Race For Legislative Post

#### Pledges '66 Campaign Fight On Law Limiting Candidacies

Jerry Shurley announced Wednesday that he is withdrawing from the race for State Representative of the 66th District.

prospective candidates.

I pledge to the people of this district that if they will send me to Austin in 1966, I will exert every effort to see that legislation such as this is not enacted and that the present law is changed so that voters will not be deprived of a choice of candidates because of technicalities created by the Legislature.

"I want to express my sincerest thanks to the wonderful people who have supported me in this campaign. I have no doubt but that if I had been allowed to remain in this race, these supporters would have assured my election by a great majority. It is my intention to campaign during the next two years for the office of State Representative from this District and I will appreciate the continued support of these wonderful friends.

judging and had the first three high individuals in the contest. Steve Taliaferro, Moe Barbee and David Lewis.

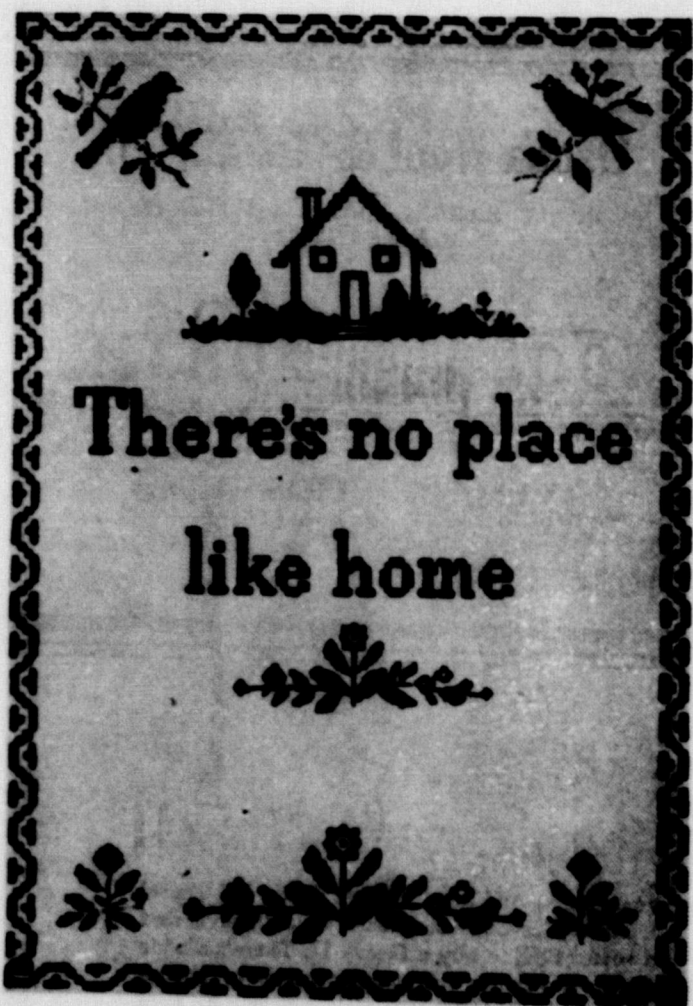

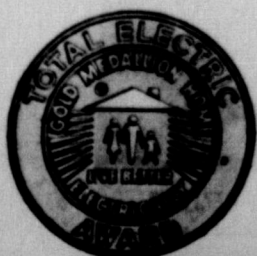

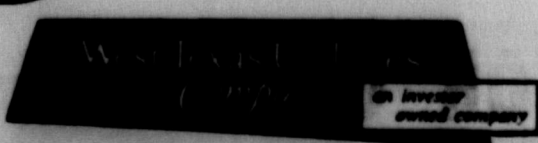
