

the election judge. This county has a registered voting strength of 1,-290, plus the overage exemptions and those who have become 21 years of

age since January 1. Voters this year may be puzzled by a heavy black line which is printed on the ballots just under the last of the candidates for national offices. This is the result of the "double standard" for poll tax payers and non-payroll taxpayers in Texas. Those who take advantage of the federal anti poll tax law which gives them the privilege of voting for candidates for federal offices without paying a poll tax, can vote only for those candidates above the black line - and such voters will get only that por-(Continued on Last Page)






