4-H Club Members Honored At Annual Spring Award Program

Williams, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Williams, was named winner of the Mother Davidson Memorial Award, as outstanding Crockett County 4-H club member this year, at the Spring Awards Program, held at the new Crockett County Auditorium Tuesday night.

Charles E. Davidson, Jr., presented the award to the winner, who was selected by an anonymous committee. The Mother Davidson Memorial Award has been awarded annually to a member since 1951, its remaining anonymous.

Williams has been an active 4-H member for two years and has won many awards and honors in his 4-H projects and activities. He received the J. T. Rutherford Achievement Award in 1964 as outstanding 4-H club boy in District-6. Larry has been a member of state winning 4-H grass and range judging teams and has shown many prize winning livestock in county and area livestock shows. He is current president of the Senior 4-H Club and an active junior 4-H club leader. He has won both the Gold Star and Danforth Award in past years.

Larry is the second member of the Williams family to win the Mother Davidson Award. Sister, Jacquelyn won the award in 1957.

In order to qualify for the program, the student must have recommendations from both his high school Principal and science teachers, must be a Junior or at least preference is to be shown to 1966 graduates.

Students will be housed in air conditioned university dorms with a trained counselor acting as supervisor. The class at A&M is restricted to 36 students.

During the summer course, two extended field trips will be taken, first to Houston and Galveston and the NASA space center and to the vicinity of San Antonio, and the second to the Arbuckle Mountain area of Southern Oklahoma and the great salt producing area near Grand Saline, Texas.

The Oilers walloped the Flying W Ranchers 11 to 2 last Thursday, behind the steady pitching of David Williams and David Pagan. Williams pitched hitless ball during his three inning stint, striking out 6 of the 9 batters he faced. John Bland, Phillip Perner and Gerald Huff were the hitting stars for the winners.

The Oilers continued their win streak Monday night with a 15 to 7 win over Moore Oil. Phillip Perner and David Pagan both connected for home runs for the winners, who were never in trouble despite the fact that their own pitching got belted pretty hard at times.

Moore Oil gained a split to the week and stayed close to the leaders by edging B&B 4 to 2 in the final frame. Two crucial errors in that final frame proved to be the Grocers' undoing, as steady pitching by the Oiler's Ned Stephens kept the Grocers at bay. Dean Shaw of Moore Oil got the only extra base hit of the game, a double.

B&B gave the Flying W Ranchers the blues as they took the other win posted during the week by downing the Ranchers 10 to 8. The Grocers put 10 runs across the plate in the first two innings and then held off the Ranchers, who managed 8 during the balance of the contest.

Canyon Producer Finaled By Delta On J. W. Henderson

The Ozona, Southeast (Canyon sand gas) field of Crockett County gained its sixth producer and a 1/2 mile east-northeast extension with completion of Delta Drilling Co. and Pauley Petroleum Inc., Odessa, No. 4-B Henderson, 18 1/2 miles southwest of Ozona.

It was finaled for a calculated (absolute open flow) of 4.7 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 40,700-1. Production was through perforations between 6,221-727 feet.

Location is 1,542 feet from the south and 1,231 feet from the west lines of 8-M (southern part)-TCRR.

Ozona Trackmen Score 14 1/2 Pts. In State Meet

Three Ozona Lion trackmen scored 14 1/2 points in the class A state track meet held in Austin the past week-end and won by Geo. West High School.

A bumped hurdle in the 120 high cost the Lions dearly as Ozona's fine hurdler, David Childress, finished sixth after losing stride badly due to the collision.

Steve Lane of George West ran a sizzling 14 flat to win but Childress could have had third, Ozona coaches figured. Sonora's Bill Elliott won third, defeating Childress for the first time this season.

In the 180 low hurdles, Childress did pick up third place, running a 19.5 in doing so.

Gary Pagan missed a first in the shot by a scant half inch when the final throw of the contest proved to be a half inch longer than Pagan's 56 feet.

The Lion's only other contestant, Bill Carson, cracked his own record by clearing 12 feet six inches in pole vaulting but the winner went well over 13, and Carson's mark was good for fifth place.

Sonora got a first in the broad jump, a place in the high jump and a place in the high hurdles to lead the district scorers, but Sanderson with 14, and Eldorado with a like number, also scored.

George West, which won with 36 points, had 34 of the points scored by Steve Lane who ran the hurdles high jumped and threw the discus with amazing ability.

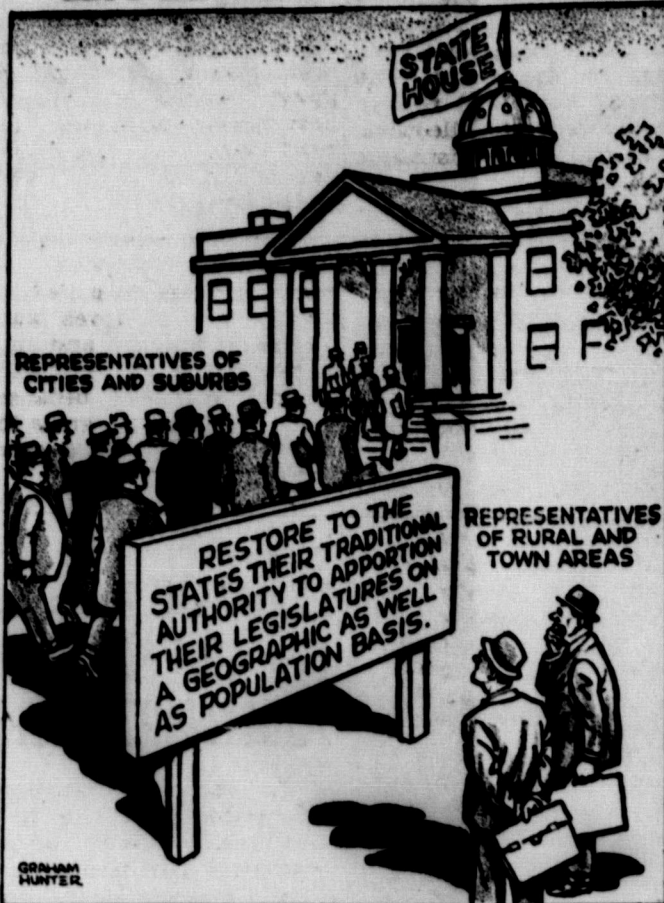

**MONEY 'LITTERED' AWAY
Million And Half Dollars Worth Of Roads Never Built**

Austin, Texas — Texas motorists paid for many miles of new highways last year. But they never were built.

Governor Connally emphasized this point today in accepting the first of a quarter-million litter bags given to the Texas Highway Department by the Galveston Chamber of Commerce and the Galveston Convention and Tourist Bureau.

The bags will be distributed to motorists at each of the eight Tourist Information Centers located at points of entry on key highways of the State and in the Capitol rotunda.

"The Texas Highway Department is charged with the construction and maintenance of the State's superb 66,000-mile highway system," Governor Connally said. He added:

"But the truth is that more than \$1.5 million of taxes levied on highway users is wasted each year to pick up litter thrown along the right of way by careless motorists. This money could better be used to build more miles of new highways, and to protect the taxpayers' \$4 billion investment in our existing system."

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The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman, From The Stockman, May 14, 1936

Two rains during the past week soaked most of the ranching area of West Texas and brought relief to ranches that were beginning to show the effects of prolonged drought.

Markers which will designate the ruins of old Fort Lancaster, giving essential historical facts in connection with this west Crockett county landmark, are to be erected under supervision of the Texas Centennial Commission.

As a parting gift to their alma mater, members of the Senior class of 1936 will have a lasting memorial of their passing in the presentation of a beautiful trophy case to be set up in the main hall of the high school building.

Twenty graduates will receive their high school diplomas in graduating exercises Thursday night. Diplomas will be presented by Judge Chas. E. Davidson to Eugene Baker, Vaughn Brown, Taylor Deaton, Margaret Ella Drake, Wanda Dunlap Stuart, Thomas Everett, Leonard Freeman, Berniece Freitag, Irene Green, Iris Green, Martin Harvick, John Henderson, John Meinecke, Richard Miller, D. A. Parker, LaVerne Schwalbe, Joe Whatley, Gene Williams, Louise Williams, and Jeanetta Williams.

Mike Friend, Crockett county ranchman, underwent an operation for appendicitis in a Temple hospital last week.

After suffering from an interrupted nosebleed for a period of five days, Mrs. Francisca Navarros was taken to a San Angelo hospital for treatment.

Bobby Joe Elledge, 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Elledge, suffered a badly crushed thigh bone just below the hip when he fell from his father's car and rolled under the machine, the back wheels passing over his leg.
