Verdict For Defendants Declares Against Vacancy Contention

District Judge W. C. Jackson Saturday overruled a motion for a new trial presented by attorneys for the plaintiff in the vacancy suit filed by S. B. Phillips, Jr., against the J. S. Todd and J. M. Shannon estates and interested oil companies and royalty holders.

A verdict in favor of the defendants in the suit was returned by a Crockett County jury last Thursday afternoon following a five-day hearing of testimony presented by the opposing sides. The jury's verdict was based on special issues presented to it by Judge Jackson, who entered judgment in favor of defendants declaring that no vacancy existed in the disputed area. Attorneys for the plaintiff indicated that the case would be taken before the Court of Civil

State, County, School **Collectors Join In Raiding Rolls**

With the federal government's w defense tax program just gone nto effect, the taxpayer is already roggy but the state, county and chool tax collectors have no qualms about jumping on the punch-drunk victim with their reminder that its taxpaying time again on that type of taxes.

But the government uses power persuasion, the state, county and schools have offered an attractive discount to induce the wary taxpayer to "kick in" promptly.

The taxpaying period opened discounts will be operative this year as in previous years. The discount on all taxes, except poll taxes, will be 3 per cent if paid during the month of October, 2 per cent if paid in November, and 1 per cent for payment in December. After that month, no discount will be available and taxes must be paid before February 1 or become delinquent.

ten per cent, and in at least one case, 20 per cent-a tax on rental value of safe deposit boxes.

Quail Shooting To Be Best In Years, Says Game Dept.

AUSTIN, Oct. 1-Here's a little ecret that the executive secretary of the Game Department doesn't want anybody to know anything about, except the people of Texas: The Lone Star State, he avers, has one of the best quail crops in years, and scattergun addicts are going to have plenty of fun when they take their dogs into the fields this season.

It's a little early to begin talking about quail populations and quail shooting, for the season doesn't open until December 1st, but that is the very reason he brought the subject up today, the executive secretary said.

For dove hunters are in the fields blasting away, and it is not infrequent at all for them to flush a husky covey of quail, or even some small ones, and the Game Department head warned sportsmen o lay off the quail until it is legal

By paying delinquent taxes for all years prior to 1940, BEFORE NO-VEMBER 1, 1941, you can save accumulated penalty and interest on the whole amount.

The law remitting penalty and interest on delinquent taxes if paid before November 1 of this year does not apply to taxes delinquent for the year 1940 or later, but to all years before. In order to take advantage of this saving, however, it is necessary that ALL the delinquent amount, for ALL years and on ALL property be paid.


