Four Lions On All Dist. First Team

The All-District Football team was selected by Class 5-AA coaches at a meeting Tuesday morning in Big Lake. Ozona placed four players on the first team of offense and defense and eight on the second teams.

Ozona players chosen for first team, offense, were Marlin Farris, center, and Fleet Coates, back. Coates led the district in scoring and yards rushing. Both boys are seniors, and were all-district last year.

Johnny Barbee was named linebacker on first team, defense, along with Tony Wheeler, a junior. Barbee made the all-district teams last year.

Ozona boys placed on the second teams were Don Huff, senior, Wheeler on offense; Tom David on, sophomore; Rodney Pagan, senior; David Huff, senior; Marlin Farris on defense; Beto Vargas and Randel Clepper.

Coates piled up 1,534 yards rushing for the season in 24 carries for a 6.3 average, 19 touchdowns and 2 extra points. He completed 11 passes during the year out of 16 for 57 yards. He punted 29 times for a 34.1 average, and caught three passes for 57 yards, returned kick-off 8 times for 239 yards and a 29.9 average.

Farris got credit for 76 tackles, recovered 2 fumbles, returned a kick-off 1 time for 3 yards and has been at center position for Ozona for four years.

Johnny Barbee got 141 tackles for the season and led the defense. Tony Wheeler, a junior with B-team experience, followed Barbee with tackles, collecting 114.

AT METHODIST CHURCH— Dr. Chas. Allen, Houston Pastor, To Preach Here

The membership of the Ozona United Methodist Church present for their Preaching Mission, November 24-27, Dr. Charles L. Allen as preacher.

Dr. Allen, a native Georgian and graduate of Candler School of Theology, Emory University, has been pastor of the First Methodist Church in Houston for the past eight years. His is the second largest Methodist Church in the world with a membership of almost 9,000.

Dr. Allen is much in demand as a speaker. His pointed, pithy presentations of the gospel message interspersed with an abundance of dry humor delivered with a Georgia drawl bring real thrill and challenge to account for the large crowds he draws Sunday after Sunday. Dr. R. F. Carl, pastor of the local church, said in announcing the Preaching Mission.

Dr. Allen, noted author of numerous books on the application of the Bible to individual life, which have sold into the millions, also carries a syndicated column in several newspapers.

The music will be directed by the Rev. William A. Triggs pastor of the First Methodist Church in Pharr. The Rev. Mr. Triggs was a successful businessman leaving his commercial career to become a church musician. After thorough training in music and several years service in large churches, as choir director, including First Methodist Church in Wichita Falls, he returned to Perkins School of Theology and is now a successful pastor.

Lion B Ends Season With Win Over McCamey

The Lion B team ended its season Thursday night with a win over the McCamey Badgers by a score of 48-16, to give them an 8-2 season. Coaches Ned Fowler and Charles Spieker brought the team a long way after an 9-0 season last year.

Leading ground gainer of the season was Gregory Stuart, who scored 93 points. Arturo Torres was leading pass receiver and scored 50 points. Robert Maldonado sparked the defense with 75 tackles to his credit for the season.

Thursday night it was the Lions all the way. On the first possession, Greg Stuart scored from 50 yards out after a 30 yard drive. After the Lion defense held the Badgers on downs, Philip Perner broke through the middle for 60 yards and another Lion touchdown. It was no contest as David Williams scored for the Lions on an option from 5 yards out. After the kick-off Torres picked off a McCamey pass and ran it back 25 yards to score. Williams passed to Mike Jenkins for the two points and the Lions led 27-0.

Still in the first half, Donald Olson picked off a Badger pass and ran it back 26 yards to score. Williams passed to Pete Perez for the extra points. With the score 34-0, the substitutes took over (Continued on Last Page)

Lions Close Out '68 Football Season With Win Over McCamey

Fans saw some razzle-dazzle football Friday night as the Lions ended the season with a 40-23 victory over the McCamey Badgers there.

Ozona drew first blood when Pagan blocked a Badger punt on the McCamey 21-yard line and Randel Clepper hit Donald Huff in the end zone for the six points. The PAT was good and the

Lions led 7-0 with four minutes left in the first period of play. The Badgers were driving and had collected two first downs when David Pagan picked off a McCamey pass and hotfooted it into the end zone for another Lion touchdown. The PAT failed and it was 13-0 the Lions to end the first quarter.

The Lions scored early in the second period when David Huff fell on a Badger fumble to give the Lions a first and 10 on the McCamey 20-yard line. Ozona fumbled on the next play, but David Pagan had the ball for the Lions at the bottom of the heap to give the Lions a first down on McCamey's 10-yard line. Fleet Coates carried for the score. Tommy Conner kicked the extra point and the Lions had a 20-0 lead.

Clepper intercepted a McCamey pass and was dropped inches from the goal line. The next play gave the Badgers a two-point safety when they hit Clepper behind the line.

Fumbles, interceptions and penalties highlighted the remainder of the quarter, but the Badgers scored and passed for the two points to cut the Lion lead 20-10 at the half.

Late in the third period the Lions scored again when Tommy Jenkins grabbed a Badger pass and scrambled to their 3-yd line before he was brought down. Coates scored on the first play from scrimmage for the Lions and Connor got the extra point.

The Badgers scored in the fourth period when Pete Casillas found nothing but wide open space between him and the goal line after a screen pass from Charles Graves on the Badger 20. He picked up 80 yards and the score. The PAT failed. Minutes later, the Badgers scored again when Graves hit Stan Love for 40 yards and the touchdown. The PAT was good and the Badgers had pulled within four points of the Lions.

However, the Lions came back to put the game in the bag when Fleet Coates got loose from mid-field on the first play from scrimmage and ran in for the score. The PAT was good. The last Lion score came when David Huff picked off a Badger pass and (Continued on Last Page)

Supt. Assigned By Parks Dept. To Ft. Lancaster

Austin—William W. Johnston, 23, formerly stationed at Abilene State Park, has been assigned to duty as park superintendent at Fort Lancaster State Historic Park, 33 miles west of Ozona.

Johnston's duties will be to preserve the ruins of the old fort and conduct visitors around the site, according to Paul Harris, assistant director for park operations for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Johnston is married and has a degree in anthropology from the University of Texas.

The site will be open to visitors from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Monday through Saturday except Wednesday when it will be closed, Harris said.

The 39-acre fort site was donated to the Department earlier this year by Claude W. Meadows, Jr., Henry C. Meadows, Clara Lee Benckenstein and Charles H. Benckenstein. Since the acceptance, Department sponsored historical and architectural research has been conducted on the old fort.

Fort Lancaster was established Aug. 20, 1855, strategically on the military road between San Antonio and El Paso. The site is about a half-mile north of the junction of Pecos River and Live Oak Creek at a site called Indian Ford.

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CAUTION ON ELECTION REFORM

The cry for reform of our election process is at high pitch. The liberal press has harped on the subject without pausing for breath, since late morning of November 6. And it was amusing to watch the undisguised dismay of one of the network TV commentators who campaigned on-camera for abandonment of the electoral college after every paid commercial during the election coverage, or so it seemed.

It has already been announced that hearings will be held in both the House and the Senate with a view to chucking the electoral college and instituting a direct majority vote system. We hope that our readers will be cautious in supporting any such move. For example, the latest and most complete figures we have seen show the total vote in 6 states as follows:

- Alaska, 48,248
- Delaware, 211,413
- Idaho, 289,492
- Montana, 173,203
- Vermont, 159,651
- Wyoming, 193,767

The grand total of all votes for all presidential candidates in those 6 states is 975,744. And friends, there are more people than that on welfare in New York City, alone.

It comes to mind also that in the District of Columbia, the vote for Humphrey was something like 82 percent, as compared with the almost even split in the nation as a whole. Federal Government employees had a clear preference.

Further, we have seen a post-election survey of all voters in two districts in a primary election a couple of campaigns back, which re-

vealed that the Social Security vote was literally 100 percent for a candidate who had established a record of proposing or supporting every increase in Social Security benefits to come before the Congress. The Social Security voters represented more than 20 percent of the votes cast.

Ours is, after all, a republic, and not a mobocracy. One suggested solution is to let a majority of the States—26 States—decide the Presidential choice. But let none fail to realize that election by a simple majority may disenfranchise millions of taxpayers, particularly in small-population areas.

NIXON'S HARDEST DECISION

We will leave it to the pundits to pontificate on why the election went as it did. But President-elect Nixon did make one basic decision in the final days of the campaign which deserves comment, and applause.

President Johnson's last-minute bombing-pause announcement in the final week of the campaign created a crisis-decision for the Republican nominee. It was the kind of masterful political play which John F. Kennedy found it possible to employ in 1960. Candidate Kennedy had been briefed on the already initiated plans for invasion of Cuba, to which undertaking President Eisenhower had assigned the incomparable Whiting Willauer, the man who had master-minded the overthrow

of the Communist regime in Guatemala. Candidate Kennedy proceeded to embarrass Nixon, repeatedly, with charges of inaction against Castro—all the time knowing full well that the most careful invasion plans were in the making. Candidate Nixon felt constrained to remain silent in the face of the criticism, for security reasons. Kennedy won the "debates" while Nixon maintained a discreet silence. Upon achieving the White House, Kennedy promptly dismissed Whiting Willauer, and permitted the invasion to become a military and diplomatic fiasco.

President Johnson's bombing-pause announcement was interpreted by many of Nixon's aides and advisors as a cut of the same cloth. They were irate, pointing out that Johnson had no commitment from Hanoi and indeed, none from Saigon. There was no reason why it could not have been delayed until election day, or the day after, except that the dramatic announcement would help the candidacy of Humphrey, and bring Kennedy and McCarthy followers back into the party ranks just in time to vote.

Whereupon, Nixon gambled. He had gambled in 1960 by refusing to reveal that Eisenhower had ordered the overthrow of Castro. This time, he gambled that he could win without condemning what his aides believed to be a cheap political trick. Mr. Nixon was not willing to have the enemy, or the Government of South Vietnam, or our SEATO allies, believe that a President of the United States would play politics with war and peace. He realized that, as the new President, he would have to deal with that enemy, the Government of South Vietnam, and those SEATO allies. Mr. Nixon gambled, and won—but barely.

We reserve the right to become his severest critic. But he has earned the plaudits of the nation for his wise gamble. It should make peace possible sooner than would have been the case if he had followed his aides' demands.

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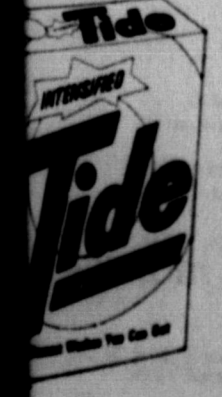

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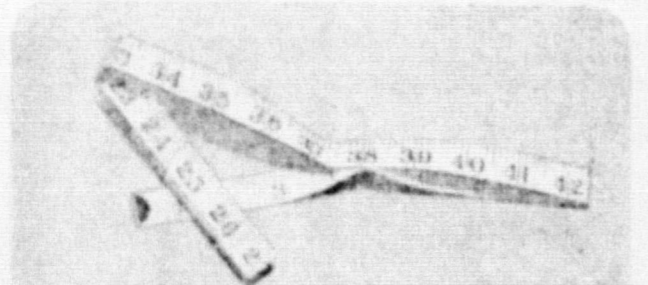

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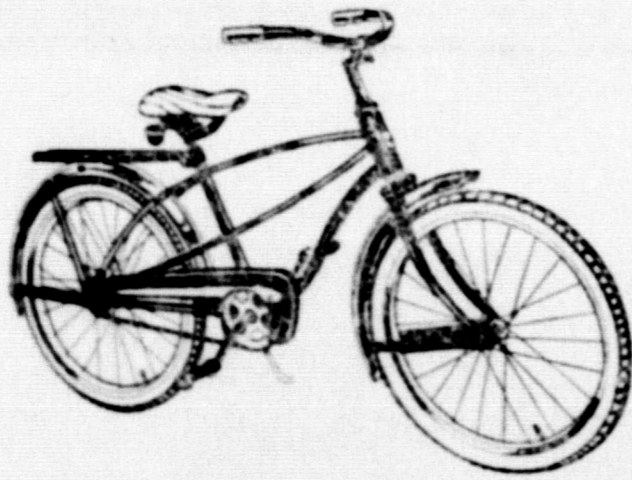

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Clam Chowder: 1 cup chopped clams, canned; 2 slices bacon; 1 tbs. butter; 1 cup diced celery; 1 cup diced onions; 2 cups cubed potatoes; 1/2 cup tomato sauce; 2 qts. water, fish stock or consommé; Salt and pepper to taste. Put celery, clams, tomato sauce into consommé, water or stock and simmer for 45 minutes. Sauté the chopped bacon until a light brown. Then add butter and onions. Sauté all together until onions are tender. Add to clam mixture and cook slowly for another hour. Last, add the potatoes, cut in half-inch cubes, season and cook until done. The whole process should take about 2 1/2 hours.

Wild Rice Casserole: 1/2 lb. butter; 1 cup wild rice (washed 3 or 4 times); 1/2 cup slivered almonds; 3 tbs. grated onion; 1/2 lb. sliced frozen mushrooms; 3 cups chicken broth. Place all ingredients except broth in skillet to brown. Place in casserole and add broth. Cover and bake one hour at 325 degrees. Stir occasionally and remove cover for a few minutes before removing from oven.
