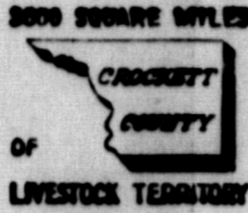

Dr. L. L. Morriss, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Midland and one of the leaders in the Southern Baptist Convention of Texas, will preach at a series of Revival meeting services at the First Baptist Church here beginning Monday, April 13, the pastor, Rev. Keith Bailey announced this week.

Write-In Falls Short In School Trustee Election

An unusually large write-in vote here Saturday saw Jesus Castro come within 10 votes of being elected to one of the four places on the school board. A small turnout saw only 178 votes being cast.

The four men whose names appeared on the ballot were elected to the four places. Celestino Puantoz received the largest share of the vote with 172, followed by L. B. Cox, III, who received 104 and W. P. Seahorn Jr. with 98, the three incumbents. Joe Bean, asking for his first two-year term received 85 votes.

Castro received 76 votes in his write-in campaign. Other write-in votes included Jim Dudley, 1; Joe Molina, 1; Floyd Hokit, 2, and George Bunker, 2.

County school board members returned to office were Bob Bissett with 161 votes, Jeff Owens, 162, and Marshall Montgomery, 160.

\$696,000 Wool, Mohair Incentive Pay To County

Crockett county wool and mohair producers were cashing Commodity Credit Corp. checks this week totalling approximately \$696,000, representing incentive payments on wool and mohair sold during the 1969 marketing year.

The Ozona office of the ASCS which serves both Crockett and Sutton counties, paid 612 producers a total of approximately \$1,128,000 in the two counties, according to Cliff Elder, office manager.

Payment was based on an incentive rate of 65.1 percent for wool and 18.9 percent for mohair. These percentages were reached after computing the national average price was 41.8 cents for wool against a support level of 69 cents and for mohair the national average selling price was 65.1 cents a pound against an incentive level of 77 cents.

Crockett county producers sold a total of 1,827,000 pounds of wool and 621,000 pounds of mohair. Average price received in this county for wool was 52 cents a pound, which was an unusually large nearly 10 cents a pound over the national average. Mohair brought an average of 63 cents a pound in this county against the national average of 65.1, about 2 cents under the average.

Ozona Juniors Cop Own Relays In 5-Way Meet

Ozona's junior high cubs scored a total of 147½ pts. Saturday in the first Cub Relays, to claim the championship trophy by a wide margin. Sonora came in second with 117 points and Eldorado was third with 105½ points.

Other teams participating were Big Lake, 65 points; Sanderson, 34 points; Iraan, 11 points, and Ozona junior high B team, 6 points.

At the close of the field events, the Cubs were in trouble. Eldorado and Sonora had scored 45 points each while the Cubs only had 14½. However, with 133 points in the running events, the Cubs took an easy win.

She was married to John Rae Powell, Schleicher County rancher, in San Angelo, October 28, 1954. She had lived on the ranch near Eldorado for the past 15 years.

Mrs. Powell was active in church work and county 4-H work.

Survivors include her husband, a son, Johnny Powell, and a daughter, Margaret, both of the home; a brother Frank McMullan, Jr., of Ozona; a sister, Mrs. Dixie Pettigrew of Clovis, N. M., and her parents.

Residents May Apply Next Week In Food Program

The USDA Commodity Food Program for Crockett County will begin operations at 9:00 a. m. Monday, April 13, with applications being taken in the district courtroom, according to Bob Johnson of Sonora, who will administer the program here and in Sutton county.

The county program is to be operated under the supervision of the State Department of Public Welfare and will distribute commodities furnished by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The program is designed to relieve financial stress of low income families in the county.

Basic requirements for eligibility include: Family must be resident of county. Residence must include cooking facilities. Total family income cannot exceed certain limits as established by the state. The value of personal property and real estate other than the homestead cannot exceed limits established by the state.

Persons who now receive public assistance may automatically be eligible to receive commodity food, but must make application for the food the same as persons who do not receive public assistance. All persons or families who believe that they are eligible and desire to receive food through the Commodity Distribution Program should make application at the courthouse according to the schedule be-

Pot Possession, DWI Charged In Two Indictments

Judge Charles Sherrill of Fort Stockton opened the April term of 112th District Court here Monday morning.

After the grand jury was impaneled, three matters were brought before it for consideration. The jury investigated the gunshot death of G. W. Snively, but did not return an indictment. Two indictments were returned, one against Jack Haynes Barrett of El Paso for possession of narcotics, and another against an out-of-county man for D. W. I. subsequent offense.

Snively, a Dallas insurance executive, was shot on the Ralph Jones ranch east of here in February while he and his wife were visiting there. At the time, he told Sheriff Billy Mills that the shooting was accidental. Before his death early in March, however, he made another statement of an accusatory nature. The statement did not involve anyone locally.

Indictment of Barrett stemmed from charge filed several weeks ago when local officers found marijuana in his car. The car broke down here and Barrett left it. When a search turned up marijuana, officers arrested Barrett when he returned for the car. Barrett is out on bond at the present.

The man charged with D. W. I. is not yet in custody.

Enthusiastic representatives were present from Big Spring, Big Lake, Ozona and Del Rio at the organizational meeting. The Association will promote traffic from Big Spring and north along the most direct route on State Highway 33 through Big Lake, Ozona and Comstock to Amistad Lake. Plans for a campaign promoting the Amistad Trail were mapped at the meeting and more activity is planned later.

Joe Pickle, editor of the Big Spring Herald, was named chairman of the group. Hubert Baker, manager of the Ozona Chamber, will act as secretary.

One of the two immediate projects adopted by the group for execution was the erection of a large lighted sign about five miles south of Big Spring, at the Texas 33 cutoff from U. S. 87, to point the way to the most direct route to Amistad.

The second project involves work toward bringing about much needed highway improvement between Ozona and Comstock. Cooperation of the Texas Highway Department will be sought to bring about an improvement program for Highway 163 south from Ozona.

A committee to erect the sign was selected to consist of Gordon Thrall of Big Lake, chairman, Troy Williams of Ozona, Charles Tompkins of Big Spring and Silas Byrd of Del Rio. The committee plans to contact a sign company for estimates on the sign.

There were 18 present for the meeting. Coffee and donuts were served at the conclusion of the meeting.

THE WAY TO TYRANNY

Speaking before a group of college students recently, Alexandra Tolstoy, the daughter of Leo Tolstoy, reminded her audience of an amazing similarity between the pronounced aims of a character portrayed in "The Possessed" by Dostoevski and the apparent aims of fellow-travelers and Marxist-Leninists in the United States today. The comparison is all the more appropriate since Lenin was born just one year before the great Russian novel was written in 1871. The 100th anniversary of birth of Lenin will be celebrated by the communists all over the world on April 22 this year.

The character mentioned by Countess Tolstoy was Verhovensky, described by Dostoevski as a self-styled "revolutionary." Verhovensky says:

"There is only one thing lacking in this world — obedience! Yearning for education is already an aristocratic (capitalist) wish. Where there is family life or love — there is desire for property. We shall kill all such desires. We shall spread drunkenness, gossip, denunciations; we shall create unheard-of corruption; we shall exterminate geniuses in their very childhood. We will bring them all to one denominator — absolute equality — no individualism."

Dostoevski's character, Verhovensky, also described the kinds of people on the side of the Leninists in the United States today with such accuracy that it seems impossible that the words were put on paper nearly 100 years ago.

"Listen," said Verhovensky, "I have counted them all: the teachers, blaspheming God with the children, are already ours! The lawyers, who defend an educated murderer, are ours! Teenagers, who kill a farmer for the sake of the sensation, are ours! Judges, acquitting criminals, are ours! Prosecutors trembling at court for fear they are not liberal enough, are ours, ours! ... corruption is now needed; corruption unheard of before, and vile, when men turn into wicked, cowardly, self-loving and mean wretches — that's what we

need!" Dostoevski could write as he did, not because he had a magic crystal ball, but because he was a student of history. History has already written in blood the rose of tyranny in civilized societies — and it is time for some people today, whether rebellious youth or so-called "liberal" adults, to decide what it is they want and who's side they are on.

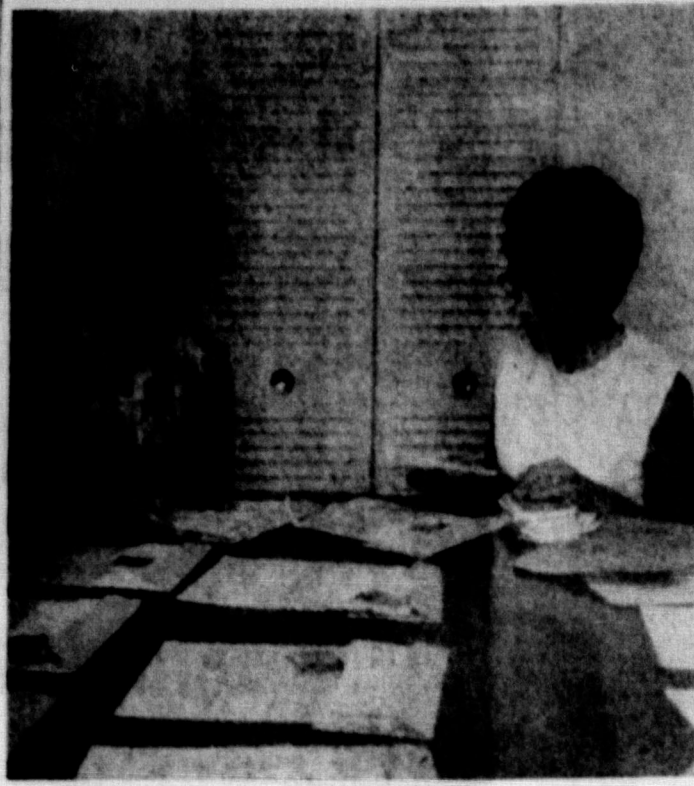

TIPS For Gardeners
From The Ozona Garden Club

April is usually a month to enjoy the results of autumn planning and preparation of the garden. Seems the warm spring days have been delayed by cold snaps with some ice several mornings. It has been too cold to plant tender bedding plants unless protected. The latter part of this month is the time to plant zinnias, caladiums, vinca, periwinkle and marigolds. Plant caladiums and elephant ears where they will not be exposed to hot afternoon sun. Remember they need watering almost every day through the summer.

If you have Easter lilies, you may reset from pots when they finish blooming. Try not to disturb the roots by tapping pot to take them out easily.

Prune early flowering shrubs as they finish blooming. Many landscape plants were damaged by the hail last month and severe freezes. Prune away damaged wood, for that is the first place insects and disease attacks.

Time to fertilize. Later in the month at the peak bloom time for roses, apply a complete fertilizer (10-10-10) or (10-20-10) to stimulate new growth and extend the flowering period of your roses. Use ¼ cup per plant for bushes under 18 inches at ½ cup for large bushes 3 or 4 feet high. To water, flood the bed to soak the soil rather than sprinkle the roses, unless sprinkled early enough for leaves to dry before night.

The latter part of this month is a good time to fertilize newly planted lawns again so that they will be well established by the time hot weather arrives. Also, a

light fertilizing to established lawns will help maintain a beautiful lawn for the summer. Mow the lawn frequently before it gets too high and you won't have to sweep the clippings off.

Spray. April is a very critical month for spraying and keeping insects under control. Watch your roses for mildew, aphids and black spot. All-purpose insecticides are very good preventative, so use after rains.

Any time now, chrysanthemums may be divided for specimen plants and borders. Rework the bed where they are to be planted and separate into single plants. If too tall, cut back top to 6 or 8 inches in height. For the border, plant about 8 inches apart and for large flowered plants, space 15 inches at least. Discard the old root stem, using new side branches for better plants.

April 23 is our Flower Show date. So we hope every one in our city will be tenderly caring for any plants that might be blooming at that time, and enter them in the horticulture division. There will be more information on the show later.

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman.

From The Stockman Thursday, April 10, 1941

Thirteen minutes from the time the last "O Yez" had died on the crisp atmosphere of the town square Monday morning, a grand jury had been impaneled by Judge W. C. Jackson to open the April term of District Court, the grand jury had met, organized, made its findings, reported to the court and received his dismissal with thanks.

New evidence of continued property in the sheep raising domain of Crockett county is afforded in the statement of condition of the Ozona National Bank issued at the close of business Friday. The statement shows an increase of nearly \$55,000 in deposits since the last statement. Deposits now total \$1,767,631.98.

Formal conclusion of transfer of properties of the Ozona Water Works to the newly created Crockett Co. Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 was effected here Friday afternoon when deed to the property was given by Judge C. E. Davidson for the water com-

pany and received by directors of the district. Payment of \$50,000 was made for the property. Pat Mahan has been employed by the directors as manager of the system, with J. A. Sparks to continue as service manager.

Officers, directors and special committees are perfecting final plans this week for the charter-night banquet of the newly formed Ozona Rotary Club Saturday night. Near 300 Rotarians and their wives are expected to attend from Ozona and all over Texas.

A campaign which did not materialize until election day brought spirited voting Saturday in the election for members of the district school board. Incumbents Paul Berner, Ira Carson and Bascomb Cox were re-elected by almost two to one over a write-in slate of T. A. Kincaid, Richard Flowers and Alvin Harrell. Despite the fact that there were no avowed seekers of the offices and voters were handed blank ballots, campaign methods peculiar to this community or an unusual voluntary surge of interest brought out an unusually heavy vote of 127.

Al Nimmo, associated with Pascal Northcutt in operation of Smith Drug here, was called to Wichita Falls

Friday when his father, B. F. Nimmo, died in a Wichita Falls hospital after an illness of three weeks.

Crockett county unit of the Women's Field Army has been actively at work this week making Ozona cancer conscious and members feel encouraged by the interested response, according to the county captain, Mrs. Carl Colwick.

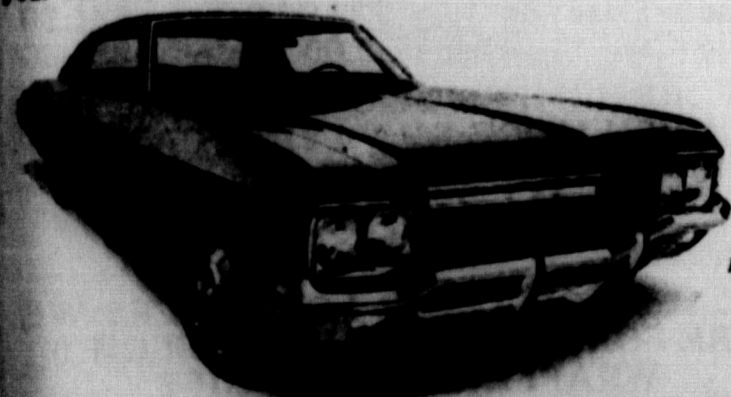
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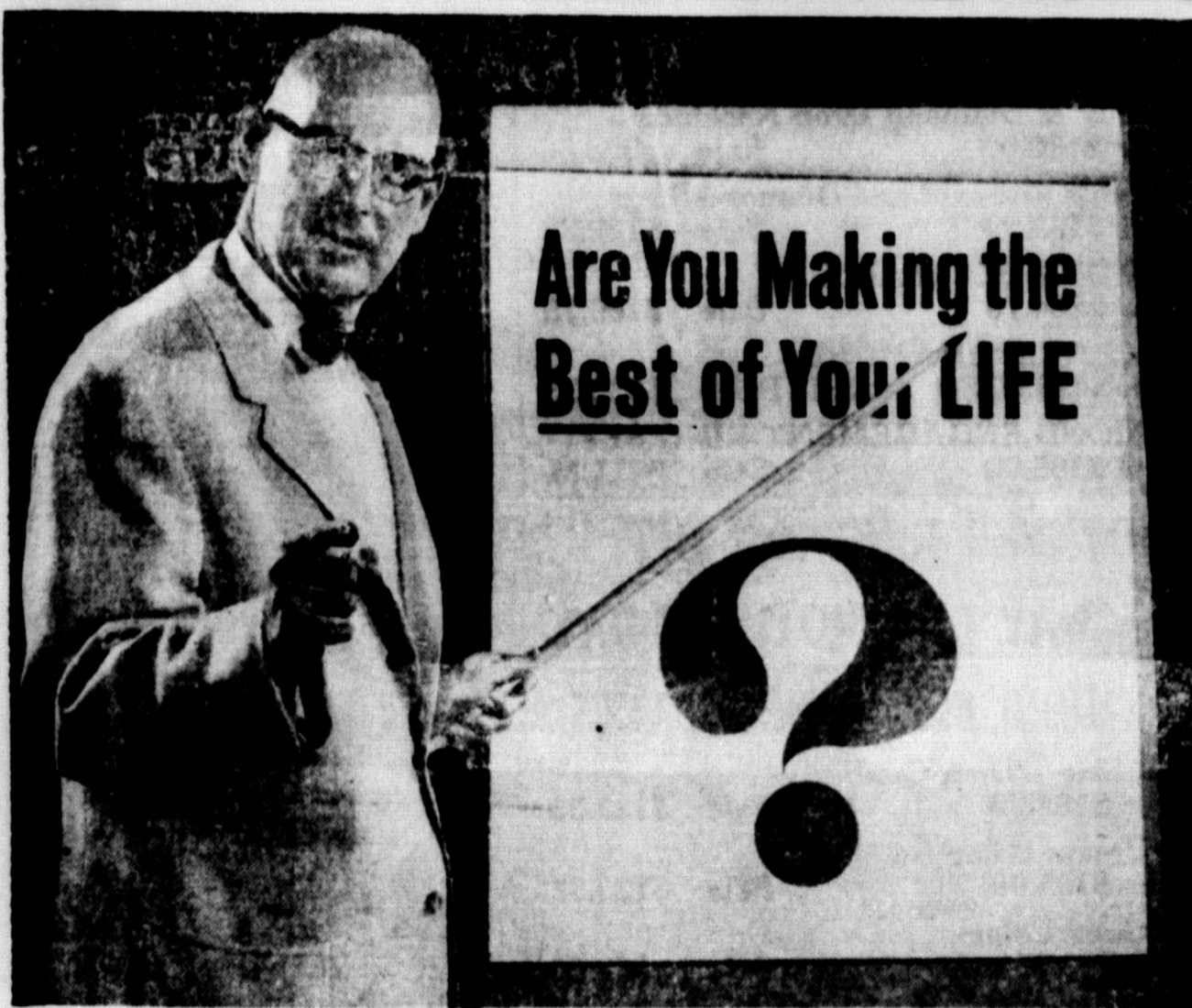

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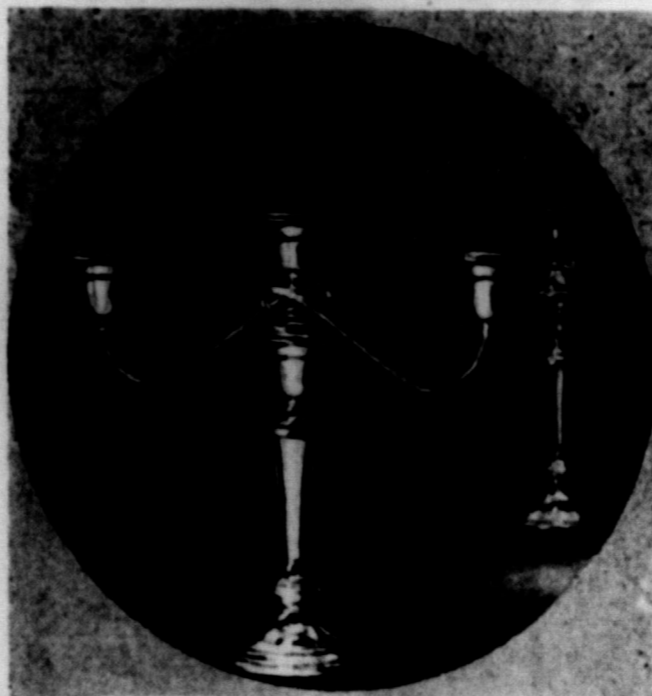
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Tracksters Pick Up Third Championship Of Current Season In Top Performance In Del Rio

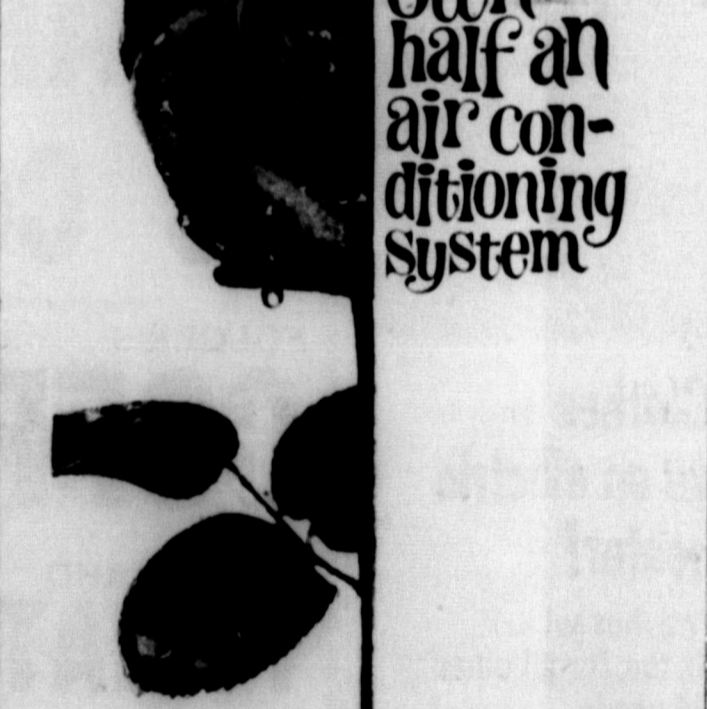
