Lions Open District Play Friday Night With Reagan Owls As Rivals

The Ozona Lions begin district play tomorrow night with traditional rival, Reagan County. Kick-off time is 8:00 p.m. at Lion Stadium.

While the Lions were giving the Iran Braves a 41-15 pounding last Friday night, the Owls were losing a 6-9 decision to the Fort Stockton Panthers.

The Lions and the Owls go into district play with identical 3-2 pre-season records. The Owls ended the season last year as co-champions with the Lions for the district championship, although the Lions easily subdued the Owls in their own territory in the district opener last year.

Last year was a rebuilding time for the Owls, and although they have not been impressive this year, Coach Sewell warns against over-confidence on the part of Lions and Lion fans, and feels the Lions will have to be tough to take

the victory.

The Lions breezed by Iran Friday night and had the Braves down 14-0 at the end of the first quarter. The first score came when Gerald Huff knocked the ball loose from an Iran carrier and caught it in mid-air, flying 42 yards for the first Lion score. Just minutes later, Sewell passed to Huff for 17 yards and another Lion score. Sewell made both PATs good.

The Lions were held scoreless in the second period and the Braves pushed one across from the 4 to score. The PAT was good and at the half it was 14-7 in Ozona's favor.

The Lion owned the only score in the third period when Sewell passed to Jenkins for 22 yards and the score. Sewell added the extra point, giving the Lions a 21-7 lead going into the final period.

With eleven minutes to go

in the fourth quarter the Braves capped off a drive with a score from the 1-yard-line and were successful in running for the two points, narrowing the Lion lead 21-15. This was the incentive for three more Ozona scores. The Lions drove 69 yards and Jenkins again caught a 20 yard pass from Sewell for the score. The PAT was no good, but the Lions held a comfortable 27-15 lead.

The next Ozona score came when Ruben Tambunga got loose for 88 yards and the score and Sewell kicked the PAT. With 15 seconds to go before the final whistle, Monty Peltz scored on a quarterback keeper to end an Ozona drive. The PAT was good and that ended the scoring for the night.

Pipeline Firm Employee Hurt In Freak Accident

Only one serious injury was sustained in three potentially dangerous accidents in the county Monday. The three accidents included a freak accident at the McVean and Barlow location south of town, a car motorcycle accident in town and a one-car roll over south of town of Hwy 163.

David Phillip Dorcluek was transferred to San Angelo after receiving treatment at the local hospital after a boulder fell on the lower part of his leg at the McVean and Barlow location while he was cleaning equipment tracks. The accident occurred at mid-morning Monday.

Two boys escaped all but minor injury at noon Monday in a motorcycle-auto collision at the intersection of Hwy 290 and Ave G. Mrs. Oscar Fikes in a late model Ford and Gary Scoggins, driver of the motorcycle, with Michael Barfield as a passenger, collided at the Gulf Station. Both boys were taken by Janes ambulance to the Crockett County Hospital where young Barfield was examined and found to be uninjured and Scoggins was treated for cuts and bruises and released.

At midnight Monday a one-car accident 2 1/2 miles south of Ozona on Hwy 163 sent a Crane youth to the hospital by way of Janes ambulance while two passengers were uninjured. Tim Browne of Crane was hospitalized overnight after jumping a narrow ditch in his 1969 Dodge Challenger and turning over end, coming to rest right side up. Browne was hospitalized overnight but released Tuesday morning. Bob Caldwell of the sheriff's department investigated the accident.

Another 1.25 inches of rain fell on Ozona last Thursday night and Friday morning, bringing the yearly total to a fantastic 29.81 inches of moisture. The rainfall Thursday night was general throughout the county with the heaviest totals reported in the south section. Skies cleared Friday afternoon, but rain and drizzle had been common for the first week in October daily, for a rainfall of almost two inches.

Rainfall for the year has already more than doubled that of 1970, in spite of the fact that no rain of any consequence fell until April of this year.

The total rainfall for 1970 was 11.15 inches.

Until April severe droughty conditions prevailed in the county. No rain was recorded in November and December of 1970, and January and February of 1971 yielded a total of .15 of an inch. March followed with no rain recorded in the county.

April Showers brought 4.46 inches of rain, followed by May with .70 of an inch. Heavy rains fell during the ensuing months with a total of 2.11 for June, 4.20 for July, 9.90 in August and 6.37 for September.

Lamar Hunt, Dallas, will drill a 9,600-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, 22 miles west of Ozona, 1/2 mile northeast of the one-well Cox, North (Strawn gas) field and 1-3/8 miles northeast of the Perner Ranch (Simpson and Devonian gas) field. It is the No. 1-33-X-University.

Location, on a 320-acre lease, is 1,250 feet from the north and 2,225 feet from the east lines of 4-33-University. It was filed as an exception to Rule No. 37.

The Cox North opener, Texas Gulf Producing Co. No. 1-AA University, was finished Oct. 2, 1961, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.6 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 8,470-564 feet. Slated to 10,500 feet, it was drilled to 9,758 feet. (Continued on last page)

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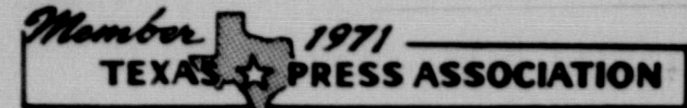

ANOTHER FORGOTTEN LESSON OF HISTORY

The sale of American scrap-iron to Japan before Pearl Harbor, soon returned to us in bullets that killed thousands of Americans, used to be the guilt-laden symbol of policy that recklessly put profit above national security.

Despite the opposition of the Chiefs of Staff and the Defense Department, Washington has withdrawn its opposition to the sale of \$12-million worth of British computers to Soviet Russia. The doors have thus been opened to similar sales by American producers. Its backwardness in computer technology has been one of the critical bottlenecks in Soviet industry. Moscow has promised that the British computers will not be used for military purposes. But at the very least, as Admiral Hyman G. Rickover has warned, they will "free other computers of Soviet design for weapon use."

Expert analysis of Soviet weapons on display in the Israel-Arab war of 1967 and in the protracted conflict in Indochina has identified the low quality of trucks as a conspicuous weakness in Soviet military equipment. Under a \$700-million contract the Mack Truck company would cure that weakness by building the world's largest truck factory in Russia. So far there has been no sign that our government disapproves the deal. Only a year ago a similar proposal by Ford was blocked by Washington—that's how fast the hope of profit is taking priority over the logic of national security!

Meanwhile Congress has authorized huge credits by Export-Import Bank — in effect credit guaranteed by the U.S. taxpayer — for trade with Communist nations. Our government appears hell bent on repeating the "scrap-iron to Japan" blunder on a larger scale.

HANDOUT 'HUMANITARIANISM'

In accepting the "Great American Humanitarian Award" given by the American-Nigerian Committee, U. S. Sen. Ernest F. Hollings (D-S, C.) repeated the familiar liberal theme that the nation needs "a national commitment to end hunger." It is a theme that is irritating to working citizens who must pick up the tab for the free-loaders on relief.

Sen Hollings would have better served the country had he stressed the need for a national commitment to end parasitism and welfare-chiseling. Only the day before Sen. Hollings spoke in New York City, The New York Times said that the state controller reported the fraudulent cashing last year of about \$4 million in duplicate relief checks, ironically, New York officials apparently aren't planning a crackdown on offenders, instead welfare recipients will be able to draw money as well as food stamps from accounts established in their names at neighborhood banks. Certainly, that's something new in government giveaways -- individual, taxpayer-supplied bank accounts for non-workers.

In his speech, the "Great American Humanitarian" from South Carolina complained that millions of families "are getting no help whatsoever" from the taxpayers, adding that "they are denied the right to participate in the food stamp program solely because our government has decided that to feed hungry Americans would be fiscally irresponsible."

No doubt food stamp recipients -- many of whom are well-dressed and who enjoy purchasing choice cuts of meat and other goodies with taxpayer's funds -- will be gratified at Sen. Hollings' solicitude for the non-working population. The citizens who have to pay the bill for the parasites may

not be pleased, however. They may wonder whether the senators read the federal government's statistics on welfare, published the day before Sen. Hollings received the "Great American Humanitarian Award." The Department of Health, Education and Welfare disclosed Sept. 23 that total welfare spending for the last fiscal year was \$16.3 billion, an increase of 27 percent over the previous year and almost twice the \$8.9 billion figure of four years ago. The number of persons on the welfare rolls increased by 17 per cent during the last fiscal year.

These statistics tell a story of growing indolence and dependency in our society. Relief began in the 1930s as a temporary measure. Today, welfare is a way of life. Food stamp programs, which Sen. Hollings had a major role in pushing through the Senate have created a new and privileged class of hand-out recipients, new and privileged class of hand-out recipients.

The ordinary working man is understandably resentful of the food stamp programs. He buys hamburger in the supermarket while the food stamp recipient buys items the working man can't afford. Proponents of food stamps deny this, but anyone who spends a little time in supermarket checkout lanes gets the truth about the food stamp abuses.

No one wants Americans to be without food. Certainly, public assistance should be available to people who are destitute. But many of the people receiving welfare or food stamps are people who refuse to accept such jobs as are available. Moreover, political sentimentality about the hunger issue has made idleness profitable. Increasingly, the incentives in our society encourage withdrawal from the work force.

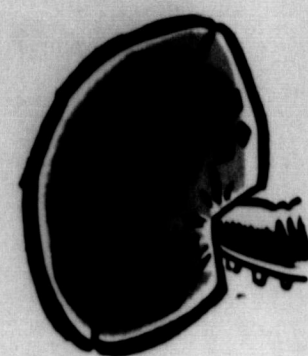

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club
 By Mrs. Bailey Post

It's later than you think, so with frost approaching, do take time to enjoy the beautiful green of the hills and valleys whenever you may go on a weekend trip or perhaps from your own windows.

Many of the towns around us are stressing a general fall cleanup in October, so we don't want Ozona to fail to keep grooming yards and urging others to do so. Old trash may harbor insect pests or diseases, so should be placed where it can be hauled off. A sanitation program includes pulling up all of the spent bedding plants, cutting off tops of browned perennials, raking the ground to collect the surface debris, and removing from the garden. Also, plants that are now being dug and divided, should be carefully cleaned and all injured, diseased or dead leaves and stems removed.

The leaves of deciduous (non evergreen) trees and shrubs should be carefully collected, and either placed on the general compost pile or stacked separately to make leaf mold, if the leaves are free of insects and disease.

There is more time now than in the spring for garden construction, such as paths, terraces, rock gardens and other features. Roses should be at peak bloom this month and they surely are at the Redwood Motel and the Tom Mitchell home. Should you be where you can visit municipal rose gardens, take your notebook and make notes of information on colors and varieties you may want for fall or spring planting. Now you can buy roses in containers to allow time for them to get established before severe freeze. Your mums still need care with regular attention. Continue watering frequently to

produce steady growth and buds. Also feed lightly each week with one teaspoon fertilizer per gallon of water. Discontinue when color shows in flower buds.

Root prune wisteria that failed to bloom last spring to encourage flowering next spring. With a sharp spade, cut through the roots in a circle about three feet from trunk.

While the days are cooler and nights are frost free, move your indoor plants outside for two or three weeks. Apply liquid fertilizer and water well to encourage strong growth. Foliage plants such as pandanus, dieffenbachia, philodendrons, rubber plants, and schefflera will take on a healthier glossier appearance. And crotons become more colorful outside. Be careful to place plants in a shady area beneath trees or large shrubs, so the bright sunlight won't scorch them. Be sure to listen to weather forecasts and bring plants inside when frost is predicted. Don't make the mistake of re-potting plants just because you are bringing them inside. Flowering houseplants bloom more profusely when their roots are slightly crowded. Repot in larger size pots only those that were pot-bound last winter.

His dejected face slumps under a shabby hat. We don't know who he is. But we know what he is. He is a MAN. One of us! To his loved ones he may be a disappointment. To himself he may be a failure. To society he may be useless. But to God he is a SOUL - like each of us! And therefore his whole life can change when one day he'll discover the power and strength and hope with which every soul is endowed. Quietly, behind the closed doors of a pastor's study, the Church is daily helping men to come to grips with their problems. Sunday its pulpits are imparting faith and courage for those secret inner struggles. The century-old Christian concept of the dignity of man has never rested simply on who and what we are. It is founded on the vision of what - with God's help - we can become.

Chris Perner Wins NASA Service Medal For Moon Mission Work

Houston -- Chris D. Perner, formerly of Ozona, but now employed by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Manned Spacecraft Center, was awarded the NASA Exceptional Service Medal for his contributions to the successful Apollo 15 mission.

Former Manager Ozona C Of C Killed In Auto Accident Mishap

Luther Walker, 39, former Ozona Chamber of Commerce manager, was killed in a car-truck collision the morning of Oct. 4, seven miles west of Sherman, Texas on Hwy 82, according to a report in the Pauls Valley Daily paper.

According to the report, a Texas Highway patrolman reported that Walker was traveling east and a cattle truck was traveling west. The patrolman said that Walker's car collided with the truck in the westbound lane and was dead on arrival at a Sherman hospital.

Services were held Wednesday at 9:30 a.m. from the First Baptist Church in Paul's Valley with burial in Walker's home town of Haskell.

Walker was manager of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce from May, 1963, shortly after the organization was formed, until January of 1965. He and Mrs. Walker were members of the First Baptist Church here.

Survivors include his wife, Joyce Helen, of Pauls Valley, Okla.; a son, Kevin of the home; two daughters, Karen and Kathy of the home, and several brothers and sisters.

His gold imprinted certificate reads: "To Chris D. Perner in recognition of his outstanding contributions to the success of the Apollo 15 mission: the long list of accomplishments of this scientific expedition included the first use of the improved spacecraft, the lunar roving vehicle, remote control television, expanded communications, enhanced crew mobility, and the first deep space extravehicular activity.

This extraordinary lunar exploration produced vast and unique additions to our store of scientific data from inflight observations as well as from the lunar surface, and accomplished all of the planned scientific and engineering objectives."

Along with his certificate, he received a medal with wreath, rosette and NASA insignia imprinted across its face.

The awards were made in Houston October 5, by NASA Administrator James C. Fletcher. Assisting Dr. Fletcher were George M. Low, Deputy Administrator; Christopher C. Kraft, Jr. Deputy Director at the Manned Spacecraft Center, and the crew of Apollo 15.
