

Surplus Property Auction Set By State

Homer A. Foerster, Executive Director, Texas State Board of Control, has announced that the 16th State of Texas Surplus Property Auction will be held at the Austin City Coliseum on December 1, 1973. Included in the auction are six lots of draperies from the Governor's Mansion and a considerable amount of heavy duty Highway equipment.

Nelson International of Dallas has been selected as the auctioneer and will feature as a portion of the sale color slides of road building equipment. The color slide technique will allow equipment now located in Wichita Falls, Amarillo, Abilene, Waco, Lufkin, Dallas

and Brownwood to be sold at the Austin arena. Foerster noted that there seemed to be acceptance of this auctioneering method and that the slides would include dump trucks, a crawler crane with 30 foot boom, a 25 ton truck mounted crane, a tractor shovel, and other miscellaneous items.

Persons who attend this auction will also have an opportunity to bid on a pickup, paper cutter, calculator, floor polishing and scrubbing machines from the Board of Control; 15 sedans from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department; re-finished metal and wood furniture from the Texas Dept. of Corrections; a sedan from

Southwest Texas State University; a mobile office and three 12-passenger buses from the Texas Employment Commission.

Also to be sold are 100 automobiles and a motorcycle from the Dept. of Public Safety plus radio equipment, office furniture and machines, fork lift trucks, sedans, pickups, mowers, tractors, flatbed trailer, two road sweepers, and a truck cab and chassis with a winch from the Texas Highway Department.

Lists of all surplus property are available from the Texas State Board of Control, P. O. Box 13047, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711. The auction area will be open for inspection shortly after 7:00 a.m. and the bidding will begin at 9:00 a.m. A spokesman for Nelson International Auctioneers said persons may estimate one (1) minute for each numbered item to be sold. Foerster reported 15 prior

auctions have netted the State more than \$1,845,207.00. Auctions are an activity of the Purchasing Division of the Texas State Board of Control.

Terms of the auction are cash on the day of the sale. Foerster reminded prospective bidders that merchandise must be removed the day of the sale because space and special protection in the Austin City Coliseum are not available on the following day.

Proper Way To Use Spray Paint

Spray painting isn't fool-proof--and may not be as easy as it looks, one authority warns.

"Satisfactory results depend on proper techniques," according to Patricia A. Bradshaw, housing and home furnishings specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"First of all, read the manufacturer's instructions thoroughly.

"Also, shake the aerosol can every time it's used. The rattling noise inside the can is a metal ball that aids in agitation. If you don't hear it, tap the bottom against a hard surface to dislodge the ball.

"Surface preparation plays a crucial part in spray painting--as any other method. Unless prepared correctly, improper drying, peeling and chipping can result.

"The clean, dry surface should be free of dirt, grease, wax, oil or any foreign substance," the specialist emphasized.

Generally, hold the aerosol can 10-12 inches from the surface when spraying, she continued. "Depress the head (or button) completely to insure a uniform spray.

"Move the can in a straight line, keeping it the same distance from the surface at all times.

"For best results, begin spraying past one edge and continue past the other edge. Then release the button.

"Spraying over wet paint causes a build-up or dripping--so let the first coat dry before applying the second."

If a thin paint film "sags" or "runs", the can is either too cold or it's used too close to the object's surface. Miss Bradshaw said.

"Rough-textured paint film occurs when the can is too warm or it's held too far from the work."

When the spray head doesn't spray--or sprays, then sputters and clogs--first try turning the can from side to side a few times. Often this clears it, the specialist added.

"If it doesn't, pull the spray head off the can. Clean out the head with a fine wire--or soak it in lacquer thinner.

"Then push the cleaned head back onto the can. To seal, give it a half turn."

Miss Bradshaw pointed out that the cost-per-ounce of spray paint is far higher than paint bought in ordinary containers. "However, for a small job--and a quick, smooth one--the difference may be worth it."

Senator Tower Reports

U. S. Senator John Tower's Weekly News Report To Texans

For a number of years, some of us have been trying to warn the nation of the potential crisis facing us because of our growing dependence on oil from the Arab countries. Now our worst fears have been realized. The Arabians have virtually cut off oil shipments to the United States, and are using oil as a political weapon in an effort to force the free Western world to meet near impossible terms.

I have warned repeatedly of the inevitability of this situation and of the concomitant dangers to our economic prosperity and national security inherent in such reliance.

As a result of the most recent Mideast war, the policies of the oil producing Arab countries have crystallized. Their forces have been unified as never before. Because of the U. S. policies of giving preferential treatment to Israel, we have seen most of the producing countries, including Saudi Arabia, the most important one, halt all exports of crude oil and downstream products to the United States.

But the heavy oil producers of Arabia have not stopped at that. Listen to what the Beirut Weekly, an influential oil publication of that world, says about supplying oil for the Western world:

Quote: "Saudi Arabia has three Western countries on its most-favored status list--France, Britain and Spain. Such countries will receive priority

in oil supplies. It is understood that Saudi Arabia is insisting that to qualify for most favored status, a country must fulfill some or all of these conditions: Break off diplomatic relations with Israel. Apply some economic sanctions against Israel. Afford some military assistance to the Arab states." End quote.

Last week, Saudi Arabia--considered the most pro-American of the Arab states--refused to resume oil deliveries to the U. S. despite a personal appeal from Secretary of State Henry Kissinger to King Faisal. Faisal also was reported to be putting out feelers to Moscow.

It has been conservatively estimated that the Arab oil states in 15 years will own \$100 billion in gold and foreign currencies. This is enough for them to challenge all industrialized nations and to have a profound effect on the economic health of the entire world community.

So we can see that the theory that the Arabians will use their oil as a political weapon is no longer a theory. The suspected crisis of yesterday is a reality of today.

Without again elaborating in too great a detail the cause of these problems, it can be directly attributed to the diminution over two decades of the economic incentives needed to attract the risk capital necessary to develop domestic supplies.

Even if every current corrective action could be taken to establish and maintain the necessary economic climate for such investments, there would be a lag of several years before significant new quantities of energy will be available to meet our burgeoning requirements.

It is impossible to determine with precision the total effect of the Arab embargoes on the United States. We do know that prior to the embargo, we purchased from Arab countries about 1.2 million barrels per day and over 500,000 barrels per day of petroleum products,

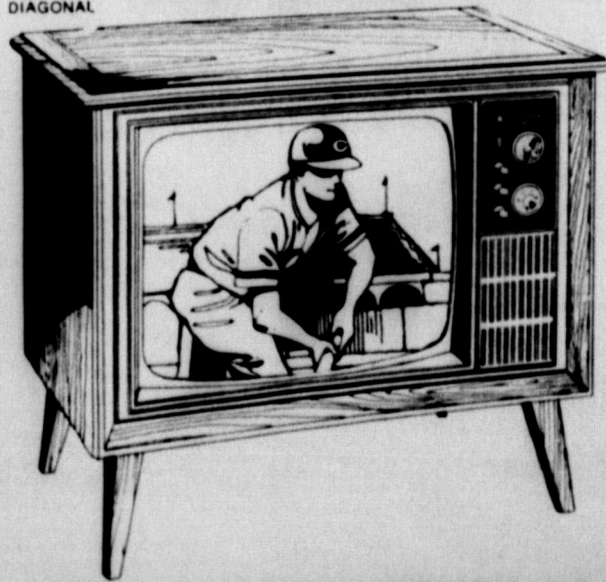

RECIPE

Oven main dishes and full dinners are popular in our home. The sauce for "Sunday Chicken" can be prepared the day before.

Sunday Chicken

3 lbs. frying chicken pieces
Brown chicken in margarine and place in covered casserole—skin side up.

Sauce For Chicken

1/2 stick margarine
1/4 c brown sugar
2 T cornstarch
1/2 t Worcestershire sauce
1/4 c vinegar
2 T chili sauce
1 t salt
1 can (2 cups) pineapple pieces, drained
reserve juice

Melt margarine in pan. Add brown sugar, cornstarch, seasonings and pineapple juice. Cook slowly over low heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Add pineapple pieces. Spoon over chicken, cover and bake 1 1/2 hours at 350 degrees.

Record Entries In Ft. Worth Fat Stock Show

Fort Worth—A volume of entries for the 1974 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show are being processed daily by show officials, reports W.R. Watt, Jr., general manager. The show is scheduled Jan. 25 through Feb. 3.

Watt said a primary reason for the early entry volume is that entry closing date is Dec. 1 for the National Centennial Angus Show, being held in conjunction with this year's Stock Show. The American Angus Association is observing the 100th year of the introduction of the black cattle to North America.

Other cattle, all junior divisions, horses, sheep and swine entries will close Dec. 15, while exhibitors of poultry, rabbits and pigeons have until Jan. 15 to make their entries. Entry cards and premium books are available at the Stock Show office, or by writing P. O. Box 150, Fort Worth, Texas, 76101.

"We anticipate more than 13,000 head of livestock will be entered in the 1974 Stock Show," Watt said. "New breeds this year include Brangus breeding classes and Maine-Anjou in Junior Steer Show Classes, Brown Swiss in open and junior dairy divisions and Morgans in the Horse Show."

Total premiums have been increased to a record of more than \$275,000. Guest entertainment for the World's Original Indoor Rodeo, held as a major part of the annual Stock Show, will be Tanya Tucker, the "Delta Dawn" girl and her country and western band.

Tanya, the 15-year-old with the grown-up voice, will be singing her hit songs, "Delta Dawn," "What's Your Mama's Name," "Blood Red and Going Down," and other favorites during each of the 20 action-packed rodeo performances. Rodeo tickets are available by mail by writing the Stock Show office.

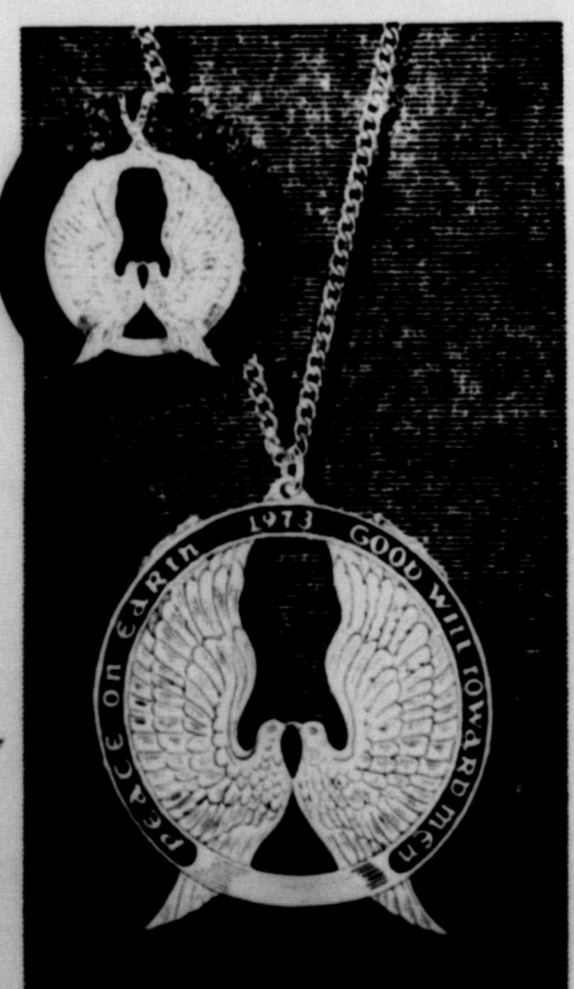

Proper Tax Planning Can Save Money

Many opportunities to reduce or defer paying federal income taxes are available to farmers, says a Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist.

"Cash farm income often fluctuates greatly from year to year. Good financial management includes leveling taxable income to reduce or defer taxes," explains Dr. Wayne A. Hayenga. "Since this year is an unusually high income year for many Texas farmers, quick action can help reduce the 1973 tax bill."

The first step in year-end planning is to determine where the farm business stands now, explains the Texas A&M University System economist. Good records make this job much easier.

First, total this year's income and expenses up to the present time. Next, estimate and include expected transactions for the rest of the year. Then, compute depreciation for buildings and equipment. Using these results, estimate the taxable income.

"Depending on your findings, you may want to buy more supplies or sell less than you planned before next January 1," says Hayenga.

"Farmers using the cash method of accounting who need to reduce taxable income should consider buying fertilizer, feed and other supplies for use next year. Buying fertilizer now may be an especially good move, since higher prices and tighter supplies are expected next spring."

Purchasing needed machinery, equipment and breeding animals also helps reduce taxable income, points out the economist. In most cases, farmers can use the 20 percent additional write-off the first year and can also use the investment tax credit.

Money spent for conservation, land clearing and land forming is deductible, subject to certain limitations. Such expenditures may not only save taxes now but may also be an excellent long-term investment

Delaying crop or livestock sales until after January 1, 1974 may help reduce taxable income. Crop sales can be delayed by using a deferred payment contract or on-farm storage.

"Remember that the objective of income tax management is not just to minimize taxes, but to maximize after tax profits," points out Hayenga. "Do not sacrifice farm profits by making unwise purchases and sales just to reduce your 1973 taxes by a few dollars. Where a choice exists between a wise tax decision and a good business decision, choose the alternative that will produce the larger income after taxes."

The Internal Revenue Service or the local county Extension office has additional information on income tax management, adds the economist.

Tips For Gardeners
From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

We will be most fortunate and grateful if a freeze is delayed until after Thanksgiving. For the last several years, very early freezes have browned and deadened the beautiful fall foliage so many enjoy at this special holiday season.

Directions for planting shrubs and trees that you may be planning to buy this fall or next spring:

If plants are dry when bought in a nursery or upon arrival, water them immediately. Set in a shaded place until roots have absorbed enough moisture for safe planting in the garden without undue drying from the sun or strong winds. Plants with tender green leaves are best kept in a shady location for a few days before planting in the garden. This will get them accustomed to the sunlight after having been in darkness during shipment.

Jiffy pots are made of peat so that the plant and container is planted directly in the soil.

Be sure top sides of each pot are covered with 1/2 inch soil to hasten decomposition of the peat container through constant contact with moisture. Press soil firmly about the sides of each pot. Soak thoroughly with water after planting.

For ease of fertilizing, and for healthy growth, work in one application of a slow-release fertilizer sufficient for a season's growth and which provides sufficient nutrients for maximum development.

Broadleaved evergreens are all basically acid soil plants, while deciduous types prefer soils to nearly neutral level. Evergreens also grow best in soil high in humus content. Work in quantities of peat moss, leafmold or compost to provide this important soil additive, especially where soils are naturally of heavy clay or very sandy consistency. In all cases, provide good drainage for permanent plantings.

When choosing plants, Garden Club members have been urged to add a red bud to their landscape, so join us in this project that will add beauty to our city each spring. Other colorful shrubs are easy to grow also, if you plan to add

Despite increased interest in controlling "noise pollution" outside the home, many Americans overlook the problem in the home. Electrical appliances—such as dishwashers, disposers, vacuum cleaners, washing machines and blenders—are some of the worst noise polluters. Add the effects of cost-cutting building techniques, poorly-insulated walls and ceilings, and house location—and there is a definite noise problem.

Some people feel the answer to noise pollution is simply "get used to it". However, those no longer bothered by the noise may not be adapting to it. Instead, they may be experiencing some hearing impairment.

Homeowners with initiative can take steps to achieve a quieter home.

- Use noise-absorbing materials on floors.
- Hang heavy drapes over windows closest to outside noise sources.
- Use upholstered, rather than hard-surfaced, furniture.
- Place foam pads under blenders and mixers.
- Use insulation and vibration mounts when installing dishwashers.
- Install washing machines in the same room with heating and cooling equipment—preferably in an enclosed space.
- Place window air conditioners where their hum can help mask objectionable noises. Try to avoid locating them facing a neighbor's bedroom.
- Select children's toys that don't make intensive or explosive sounds. Some can cause permanent ear injury, besides getting on your nerves.
- Compare noise outputs of different makes of an appliance before selecting one.

Job Corps Offers Second Chance

A second chance is waiting for unemployed, out-of-school young men and women 16-21 who want to learn an occupation that pays. The name of the chance is "Job Corps", says the Texas Employment Commission.

"Openings exist now for young men and women who would like to improve themselves and qualify for jobs in the labor market today," says L. W. Kellers, office manager of the Texas Employment Commission office at 122 South Oakes, San Angelo, Texas.

Enrollees in this residential training program receive room and board, medical and dental care, work clothing, a nominal allowance, and other benefits, Mr. Kellers explains.

"Job Corps strengthens basic educational skills, and offers a wide range of vocational training in job skills which are in demand today," Kellers says. "In addition, personal development is encouraged through sports, music, hobbies, student government and recreation."

The length of training depends on the individual, some completing the training program within a year, and others taking up to two years.

The Texas Employment Commission interviews and screens applicants for Job Corps openings and sends the applications to Job Corps headquarters for selection and assignment. Most enrollees can be as-

signed to a center in Texas, either at Camp Gary at San Marcos, for young men or at McKinney, for young women.

Homeowner's Insurance May Not Be Adequate

Most American homes are not adequately insured, according to a recent survey.

"Conducted by American Mutual Insurance Alliance, the survey reports that more than half of all single-unit homeowners don't carry enough insurance to protect their property fully," Lillian Cochran noted.

The home management specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, cited inflation as a common cause of inadequate coverage.

"A house that was fully insured 10 years ago now may be covered for only half its

value unless the homeowner periodically increased his insurance.

"Since a home's value increases with any home improvements--adding a room, remodeling or even paneling an exist-

Hunting Accidents Increase Last Year

Texans were involved in more hunting accidents during the 1972-73 season than they were during the 1971-72 season, and more of the accidents were fatal.

Statistics compiled by hunter safety specialists of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department showed that 94 persons were involved in hunting accidents during the past season compared with 82 the year before.

Of the more recent accidents 28 were fatal, a substantial increase over the 20 fatalities the year before.

Twenty-four of last season's accidents were caused by persons 16 years old or younger, and 33 of the 94 victims last year were 16 years old or younger.

During the 1972-73 season, shotguns were involved in 41 of the accidents; rifles in 35; handguns in 15; bow and arrow in one and pellet gun in one. In one other hunting accident, the causative agent was unknown.

Hunter safety specialists say the wearing of hunter protective clothing, such as blaze orange or hunter orange, might have prevented 23 of the acci-

dents involving shooter judgment such as the shooter's swinging on victim, the victim's moving into the line of fire, the victim's being mistaken for game or the victim's moving out of sight of the shooter.

Thaw Meat Properly For Safety

Improperly thawed meat is one of the most common sources of food-borne diseases, according to a foods and nutrition specialist.

"Bacteria which cause these diseases grow and multiply at temperatures between 40 and 120 degrees F. When foods remain in this 'danger zone' for three to four hours, they can become unsafe to eat," Sally Springer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, warned.

Hearing Is Set For Endangered Species

A proposed list of some 26 endangered fish and wildlife species to be submitted by the Parks and Wildlife Department to the Texas Secretary of State will be reviewed in a public hearing Nov. 28.

The exact time and place of the hearing will be published when it becomes available.

Interested members of the public are invited to voice their opinion on the list which will become effective 45 days after submission to the secretary of state.

The tentative list includes birds such as the whooping crane and peregrine falcon, mammals such as the red wolf and reptiles such as the American alligator.

Such a listing is required by House Bill 260 passed by the recent Texas Legislature and marks the first step in a more thorough management of the state's endangered wildlife.

Administered by the Parks and Wildlife Department's non-game project under the direction of John Smith, work with endangered species will be financed through an appropriation from the General Revenue Fund. This money is not derived from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses.

Funds from violations of the act and the sale of permits for collection and propagation of such species will go into the General Revenue Fund.

Provisions of the act do not apply to coyotes, cougars, bobcats, prairie dogs or red foxes. Listing was compiled from the present federal Red Book of endangered species and foreign fish and wildlife lists of endangered species.

Under the provisions of the bill, the department is authorized a full range of activities including research, census, management, law enforcement, habitat acquisition and improvement, and education of the public in the plight of endangered species.

Ongoing department investigations of non-game fish and wildlife will enable Smith and his staff to make recommendations for the addition or deletion of species from the list.

Such investigations shall also provide the basis of further non-game regulations to be prepared by the Parks and Wildlife Department.

A system of permits for the collection and propagation of endangered fish and wildlife has been provided for under the bill.

The department must issue such a permit before anyone can take, possess or transport endangered fish and wildlife from their wild or natural habitat and then only if the species is unavailable from any source

"Only heating food to 170 degrees F. and above for a period of time kills the bacteria. Freezing doesn't--it simply retards their growth."

The specialist offered several precautions to insure meat safety.

"Thaw all meats--including poultry--in the refrigerator. Or, to thaw meat items quickly place wrapped packages under cold running water."

Both methods, she explained, keep meat out of the "danger zone" for bacteria growth.

Fresh or freshly-thawed ground meat, fish or poultry should be refrigerated and used within 24 hours, Miss Springer continued.

"Roasts or large steaks, on the other hand, keep in the refrigerator for 48 hours. If fresh, freeze these items for longer storage periods."

"When preparing poultry, cook until done throughout--with an internal temperature of 180 degrees F."

"Also cook pork to the well-done stage, or 170 degrees F."

If planning to stuff poultry or pork chops, wait until just before placing them in the oven to stuff the cavity, she advised.

"With today's high food prices, don't waste food by letting it spoil--and never endanger the family by serving unsafe food."

Fawn Survival Depends On Good Range

Predators and disease may be the ultimate cause of death for some white-tailed deer fawns, but good habitat and range conditions are key factors which can minimize the loss of a fawn crop.

These are the findings of a three-year study on fawn survival conducted by biologists for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Using a 22,000-acre study tract in Gonzales County, biologists attached radio transmitters to 20 fawns each year and marked them for individual recognition by color coding.

When the study was initiated in 1971, the study area was in the grips of a severe drought. There was little food for deer, and very little cover, say biologists.

As a result, only two of the 20 fawns tagged the first year survived the first eight weeks.

Twelve fawns were killed by coyotes, two by bobcats and four fell to disease.

The average age at death was 17 days the first year.

In 1972, range conditions were better, and 13 out of 20 fawns survived the first two months of their lives.

Texas has had abundant rains in 1973, and range conditions are excellent, according to biologists.

As a result, only two of 20 fawns equipped by biologists with radio transmitters were killed by predators during the spring, 1973 study.

According to biologists, there is no big mystery about the high fawn loss to predators during drought years--simply, the fawns are more easily found by the predators because of lack of ground cover.

During the times of better range conditions there were just as many predators as during the drought seasons, but the fawns were better able to elude them.

The fawns were also in better shape in the plentiful years since their mothers get enough to eat and therefore produce the needed milk. For this reason, the fawns were better able to resist the diseases which kill them during lean years.

The coyotes and bobcats fell back to eating the "buffer species" such as mice and rabbits during the years which had good range conditions. Good range conditions assured a good population of these species, and the predators did their part in keeping them in check, according to biologists.
