If Nixon Goes

Many who ponder the question whether President Nixon should do as his critics demand-resign, fail to realize all that's involved if the President should bow to the pressure and step down

The American people voted overwhelmingly a year ago for the policies and political philosophy of President Nixon. Thus the vast majority would have voted in a President for four years without having these political views prevailat the top. If Mr. Nixon is forced out of office before Congress confirms Gerald Ford as Vice President, the defeated party of 1972 would, of course, capture the White House. (Speaker Carl Albert would become President, a respected legislator but a Democrat.)

Also, the fate of the future Supreme Court hangs very much in the balance. The liberal-conservative split of the nine Justices is usually 5-4 or 4-5 today. Mr. Nixon hopes to appoint at least one more constitutionalist to the high court during the remainder of his term.

If the President goes, far left elements in the nation Mr. Nixon at least initially discredited will have seemingly been vindicated. The secret-stealers, rumor-printers, newsslanters will have helped bring down the highest officer in the land. That would be a dangerous precedent.

Perhaps worst of all, the country will be badly and dangerously split if Mr. Nixon is impeached and removed from office (which seems unlikely). The core of Nixon support, now one in three or four voters, would feel the office had been stolen by a hostile media and ambitious politicians, whatever the facts, and this cleavage would torment the nation for years to come. (There are many who believe the 1960 election was stolen from Mr. Nixon.)

There is no doubt the President has erred, misused power and been less than frank at times, even blundered. But that is nothing new, only human. The nation can still find comfort in the fact that Mr. Nixon has tried, consistently, to do what he thinks is best for America.

If his failings can be forgiven or accepted in view of the considerable accomplishments in foreign affairs, and some at home, and the next political turn of the country decided normally by votes in the election of 1976, the future of the nation will be less stormy than otherwise

Thanksgiving, 1973

Our American Thanksgiving Day dates officially from 1863 when the nation was locked in a sectional struggle. At that time Mrs. Sarah J. Hale, who had been proposing a national day of thanksgiving for decades in Boston and Philadelphia as a magazine editor, wrote to President Abraham Lincoln-who in October of 1863 issued the first Thanksgiving Proclamation.

There had been earlier thanksgiving days; some date the American observance to the days of the early settlers of the nation-who gave thanks for their food supply and the opportunity America offered. The first probably occurred in the Plymouth Colony in 1621.

There have also been observances in other lands but few countries had adopted annual thanksgiving days prior to the American custom. An international thanksgiving day was held in Washington in 1909, having been conceived by the Rev. Dr. William T. Russell of St. Patrick's Catholic

Thus the American Thanksgiving Day, this year on the 22nd, is uniquely American. In 1973 it finds us blessed with both great wealth and peace.

In giving thanks for the many blessings all Americans enjoy, we can resolve to build a better community and a greater nation-for in spite of our blessings and accomplishments, there is still much to be done in the building of our country.

The nostalgia surrounding the John Kennedy Administration is unique-for several reasons. First, the handsome President was tragically assassinated-just ten years ago this month. He and his wife projected a fine public relations image as a glamorous, youthful couple.

Kennedy was a splendid speaker and captured audiences with his personality, sense of humor and frankness. He was the candidate of the party of the left and many of the "peepul" saw him as their champion, to a degree, as a symbol of what can happen in America.

Though he actually didn't accomplish a lot legislatively, Kennedy inspired many to greater hopes, to plans for better days. And while he committed the first Americans to the shooting in Vietnam, he is usually not held accountable for this fateful step. The public tends to blame the late Lyndon Johnson, who so vastly escalated the war.

Thus the Kennedy memory and legend remain undimmed and the nation tends to forget the unaccomplished goals and to recall the spirit, the hope, the idealism of that threeyear period, 1961-63-and the handsome, youthful image and personality of the martyred President, especially in these troubled times when so much doubt and confusion surround

the highest office in the land. That boyish, handsome smile and likeableness are certain to continue to captivate the American public, and the world, for years to come-that in itself being a measure of the late President's character, personality and charm.

FARMERS STEW OVER FUEL CRISIS -- Texas farmers have been having serious problems getting necessary diesel fuel to harvest cotton, pick citrus and combine grain sorghum due to 'mass confusion" over federal fuel allocation regulations.

After several reversals by federal officials, some dealers were still slow to make sales because they feared prosecution tolled. if they acted under informal agreements passed along to them. Agriculture Commissioner John White joined Gov. Dolph Briscoe in demanding "immediate positive action" at the federal level.

Rep. Jon Newton of Beeville announced at a national energy crisis meeting in Boston a top federal Department of Interior official had assured him the problem will be worked out in 10 days to two weeks (from last weekend). Newton said he was informed that users will be able to draw their allocations when they need the fuel rather than

resident's current strategy seems to be bearing fruit. For example, in an unannounced appearance before 4,000 realtors who were meeting in Washington last week, the press reported the President was applauded 21 times, followed by a standing ovation.

That evening I was one of 40 Democratic House members invited to the White House for a question-and-answer session with Mr. Nixon. Other Congressmen attended similar sessions last week. His candor, forthrightness and response to questions were impressive. He explained in detail the mixup regarding two conversations which Special Prosecutor Cox thought had been taped, but upon examination it developed Professor Cox was in error. He disclosed in detail a breakdown of his monetary worth, how each dollar was acquired and reinvested in real estate.

Capitol observers are now saying that no President in history has ever had his personal holdings so thoroughly investigated and no President in the past has accounted in such full detail for what he has accumulated.

In the meantime, the House has funded \$1-million to finance staffing and other costs for its Judiciary Committee to investigate the grounds for impeachment charges against the President, Actually, the committee can hardly be expected to do more than cover the same ground the Senate Watergate committee has already covered. It is a fact that the Judiciary Committee is presently dominated by Democratic Liberals and radicals, and fear is now being expressed that politics may be the dominant theme of the forthcoming hearings. Let us hope not,

Spray painting isn't foolproof -- and may not be as easy as it looks, one authority warns.

'Satisfactory results depend on proper techniques, " according to Patricia A. Bradshaw, housing and home furnishings specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.
"First of all, read the manu-

facturer's instructions thorough-

"Also, shake the aerosol can is no longer a theory. The susevery time it's used. The rattling noise inside the can is a metal ball that aids in agitation If you don't hear it, tap the bottom against a hard surface to dislodge the ball.

"Surface preparation plays a crucial part in spray paintingas any other method. Unless prepared correctly, improper drying, peeling and chipping can result.

"The clean, dry surface should be free of dirt, grease, wax, oil or any foreign substance, " the specialist empha-

Generally, hold the aerosol can 10-12 inches from the surface when spraying, she contin-ued. "Depress the head (or button) completely to insure a uni-

"Move the can in a straight line, keeping it the same dis-tance from the surface at all

"For best results, begin spraying past one edge and continue past the other edge. Then release the button.

"Spraying over wet paint causes a build-up or dripping-so let the first coat dry before applying the second."

If a thin paint film "sags" or "runs", the can is either too cold or it's used too close to the object's surface, Miss Brad-

"Rough-textured paint film occurs when the can is too warm or it's held too far from the

When the spray head doesn't spray--or sprays, then sputters and clogs -- first try turning the can from side to side a few times. Often this clears it, the specialist added.

"If it doesn't, pull the spray head off the can. Clean out the head with a fine wire--or soak it in lacquer thinner.

"Then push the cleaned head back onto the can. To seal, give it a half turn, "

Miss Bradshaw pointed out that the cost-per-ounce of spray paint is far higher than paint bought in ordinary containers. "However, for a small job-- and a quick, smooth one -- the difference may be worth it, "



Proper Tax Planning Can Save Money

says a Texas Agricultural Ex-

tension Service economist. "Cash farm income often fluctuates greatly from year to year. Good financial management includes leveling taxable income to reduce or defer taxes, " explains Dr. Wayne A. Hayenga. "Since this year is an tax profits," points out Hayenunusually high income year for many Texas farmers, quick action can help reduce the 1973 tax bill. "

The first step in year-end planning is to determine where the farm business stands now, explains the Texas A&M University System economist. Good records make this job much easier.

First, total this year's income and expenses up to the present time. Next, estimate and include expected transactions for the rest of the year. Then, compute depreciation for buildings and equipment. Using these results, estimate the tax-

able income. "Depending on your findings, you may want to buy more supplies or sell less than you lanned before next January 1,"

says Hayenga. "Farmers using the cash method of accounting who need to reduce taxable income should consider buying fertilizer, feed and other supplies for use next year. Buying fertilizer now may be an especially good move, since higher prices and tighter supplies are expected next spring.

Purchasing needed machinery, equipment and breeding animals also helps reduce taxable income, points out the economist. In most cases, farmers can use the 20 per cent additional write-off the first year and can also use the investment tax credit.

Money spent for conserva-tion, land clearing and land forming is deductible, subject to certain limitations. Such expenditures may not only save taxes now but may also be an

Many opportunities to reduce or defer paying federal income sales until after January 1, 1974 taxes are available to farmers, may help reduce taxable income. Crop sales can be delayed by using a deferred payment contract or on-farm stor-

> "Remember that the objective of income tax management is not just to minimize taxes, but to maximize after "Do not sacrifice farm ga. profits by making unwise purchases and sales just to reduce your 1973 taxes by a few dollars. 

we will be most fortunate and grateful if a freeze is delaved until after Thanksgiving. For the last several years, very early freezes have browned and deadened the beautiful fall foliage so many enjoy at this

special holiday season. Directions for planting shrubs and trees that you may be planning to buy this fall or next

If plants are dry when bought in a nursery or upon ar-Set in a shaded place until roots have absorbed enough moisture for safe planting in the garden without undue drying from the sun or strong winds. Plants with tender green leaves are best kept in a shady location for a few days before planting in the garden. This will get them accustomed to the sunlight after having been

in darkness during shipment. Jiffy pots are made of peat so that the plant and container colorful shrubs are easy to

e sure top sides of each pot are covered with a inch soil to hasten decomposition of the peat container through constant trees and grass, and especially contact with moisture. Press soil firmly about the sides of each pot. Soak thoroughly with water after planting. For ease of fertilizing, and

for healthy growth, work in one application of a slow-release fertilizer sufficient for a season's growth and which provides sufficient nutrients for maximum development.

Broadleafed evergreens are all basically acid soil plants. while deciduous types prefer soils to nearly neutral level. Evergreens also grow best in soil high in humus content, rival, water them immediately. Work in quantities of peat moss, leafmold or compost to provide this important soil additive. especially where soils are naturally of heavy clay or very sandy consistancy. In all cases, provide good drainage for permanent plantings.



Texans were involved in more hunting accidents during the 1972-73 season than they were during the 1971-72 season, and more of the accidents were fatal.

Statistics compiled by hunter safety specialists of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department showed that 94 persons were involved in hunting accidents during the past season compared with 82 the year be-

Of the more recent accidents 28 were fatal, a substantial increase over the 20 fatalities he year before.

Twenty-four of last season's accidents were caused by persons 16 years old or younger, and 33 of the 94 victims last year were 16 years old or younger.

During the 1972-73 season, shotguns were involved in 41 of the accidents; rifles in 35; handguns in 15; bow and arrow in one and pellet gun in one. In one other hunting accident, the causative agent was unknown.

Hunter safety specialists say the wearing of hunter protective clothing, such as blaze orange or hunter orange, might have prevented 23 of the acci-

iod of time kills the bacteria. Freezing doesn't--it simply retards their growth."

The specialist offered several precautions to insure meat

Thaw all meats--including poultry -- in the refrigerator. Or, to thaw meat items quickly place wrapped packages under cold running water. "

Both methods, she explained, keep meat out of the "danger zone" for bacteria growth.

Fresh or freshly-thawed ground meat, fish or poultry should be refrigerated and used within 24 hours, Miss Springer continued.

"Roasts or large steaks, on the other hand, keep in the refrigerator for 48 hours. If fresh, freeze these items for longer storage periods.

"When preparing poultry, cook until done throughout-ces of food-borne diseases, acwith an internal temperature of cording to a foods and nutrition 180 degrees F.

Predators and disease may be the ultimate cause of death for some white-tailed deer fawns, but good habitat and range conditions are key factors which can minimize the loss of a fawn crop

These are the findings of a three-year study on fawn survival conducted by biologists for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Using a 22,000-acre study tract in Gonzales County, biologists attached radio transmitters to 20 fawns each year and marked them for individual recognition by color coding.

When the study was initiated in 1971, the study area was in the grips of a severe drought. There was little food for deer, and very little cover, say biologists.

As a result, only two of the 20 fawns tagged the first year survived the first eight weeks.

Twelve fawns were killed by coyotes, two by bobcats and four fell to disease. The average age at death

was 17 days the first year. In 1972, range conditions were better, and 13 out of 20 fawns survived the first two months of their lives.

Texas has had abundant rains in 1973, and range conditions are excellent, according to biologists.

The covotes and bobcats fell back to eating the "buffer species" such as mice and rabbits during the years which had good range conditions. Good range conditions assured a good population of these species, and the predators did their part in keeping them in check, according to biologists.

Endangered Species

A proposed list of some 26 endangered fish and wildlife species to be submitted by the Parks and Wildlife Department will be reviewed in a public hearing Nov. 28.

The exact time and place of the hearing will be published life Department. when it becomes available.

Interested members of the public are invited to voice their opinion on the list which will become effective 45 days after submission to the secretary of state.

The tentative list includes birds such as the whooping crane and peregrine falcon, mammals such as the red wolf and reptiles such as the American alligator.

Such a listing is required by House Bill 260 passed by the recent Texas Legislature and marks the first step in a more thorough management of the

state's endangered wildlife. Administered by the Parks and Wildlife Department's nongame project under the direction of John Smith, work with endangered species will be financed through an appropriation from the General Revenue Fund This money is not derived from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses.

Funds from violations of the act and the sale of permits for collection and propagation of such species will go into the General Revenue Fund.

Provisions of the act do not apply to coyotes, cougars, bobcats, prairie dogs or red foxes. Listing was compiled from the present federal Red Book of

endangered species and foreign fish and wildlife lists of endangered species. Under the provisions of the bill, the department is authorized a full range of activities

including research, census, management, law enforcement, habitat acquisition and improvement, and education of the public in the plight of endangered species. Ongoing department inves-tigations of non-game fish and

wildlife will enable Smith and his staff to make recommendations for the addition or deletion of species from the list. Such investigations shall

also provide the basis of further non-game regulations to be prepared by the Parks and Wild-life Department. A system of permits for the collection and propagation of endangered fish and wildlife

The department must issue such a permit before anyone can take, possess or transport endangered fish and wildlife from their wild or natural habitat and then only if the species is unavailable from any source


