VILLA SAYS HE WILL FIGHT U.S. IF NEED BE

ARMY IN POSITION FOR ATTACK ON CARRANCISTAS AT AGUA PRIETA.

TRENCHES AMERICANS

Attacking Force Said to be 18,000, While Defenders Number Approximately 6,000.

Douglas, Ariz.-General Francisco Villa began moving his troops into position Sunday night for an attack on Agua Prieta, Sonora, opposite here, regardless, he personally declared, of any consequences or effects from the United States.

"If necessary I will fight the United States army along the border," Villa asserted, after hearing for the first time that the American government had given permission for Carranza to transport troops from Eagle Pass, Texas, to reinforce the garrison at Agua Prieta

Four of these troop trains had just arrived, bringing the total fighting men of the garrison commanded by Gen. P. Elias Calles to approximately 6.000 men.

Villa, according to reliable estimates, has 10,000 soldiers. He claims to have 18,000.

Villa himself was with his cavalry, forming a flank guard which passed along the border. It was during this march that he learned that Carranza reinforcements had been transported over American territory, and launched a verbal attack on the United States, which he declared would turn into a physical attack if necessary.

'Agua Prieta will be mine," he asserted "Americans or no Americans."

"Through With United States." Villa asked again if it were true that the United States government had permitted General Carranza to transport reinforcements over American territory, then continuing, he

said: "This is the way the United States repays me for the treatment and protection I have given foreigners in

Mexico-or in my territory. "I am through with the United States. I can fight my battles. Let them fight theirs.

"I can whip Carranza and his entire army, but it is asking a great deal to whip the United States also. but I suppose I can do that, too." Villa said his entire plan of cam-

paign had been manned out BULGARIA HOLDS KEY TO NISH.

Austro-Germans Are Endeavoring to Throw Ring About Serb Capital.

Paris.-The retaking of Veles, Serbia, by Bulgarian troops, has been officially confirmed, according to a Havre dispatch from Athens.

London.-The Serbian fortress of Pirot, described as the key to Nish. is in the hands of the Bulgarians, while the Austro-Germans, advancing from the north, are endeavoring to form a ring around Kraguvevatz. where the Serbian arsenal is situated. Thus, besides endangering bothian war capital and the town where the Serbian munitions are manufactured, the central powers, with Bulgaria, are narrowing the gap through which the Serbian army in the northwest must escape.

Austrians Attack Montenegro. Simultaneously the Austrians are attacking Montenegro to remove, if possible, the danger of having an enemy army on their flank.

Government Money Advanced, Unpaid Washington .- The treasury department has made public a list of more than 1,000 names of persons whom the government aided financially to return from Europe soon after the out break of the war, and who have not repaid the money advanced, although they are able to do so. In many instances the treasury letters are returned unclaimed, and in others no response is made. The total due the government runs into thousands of dollars, and Texans are indebted to the extent of \$2,178.50.

1,500,000 Jews are Starving in Russia. London.-At a meeting here in behalf of the fund for the relief of Jewish victims of the war in Russia. it was announced that there were 1,500,000 Jews starving in Russia. Chief Rabbi Hurtz said the Jews were face to face with a tragedy unparalleled in the history of Jewish agony. The Petrograd authorities, Rabbi Hurtz concluded, expected \$5,-000,000 from the British Jews and only \$300,000 had been raised. He said the present call was for sacrifices and self taxation.

American Steamer Seized Off Coast. Halifax, N. S .- The Dutch steamer Hamborn, from New York, and the steamer Hocking, from New York for Norfolk, were brought into port here by prize crews from a British warship. The Hocking was formerly the Danish steamer Gronland, but was recently changed to American registry and was flying the American flag when overhauled by the warship. Yet nothing has been made public as to why the vessels were seized. Both steamers were convoyed here by war-

FIRE DRILL SAVES HUNDREDS

Falling of a Child Believed to Cripple, Blocks Front Entrande and Cuts Off Escape.

Peabody, Mass. - Twenty-one chi dren, most of them girls ranging it age from 7 to 17 years, lost their lives Thursday in a fire which de stroyed St. John's parochial school. Another girl was perhaps fatally injured, while others were less severely

The 600 children had entered classrooms for the morning ses when the fire was discovered, and though a majority of them were gu ed to safety by Sister of the Order of Notre Dame, who were their teachers panic seized a large number as the neared the front door, and in the rush to escape they lost their footing and their bodies blocked the exit. was in the front vestibule that nearly all the bodies were found.

How the fire started may never b known. An early theory that a boile explesion caused it having been dismissed, the state police officials were of the opinion that a storeroom in the basement where a gas meter was located was its source, but investigation of the theory was difficult as the place where the storeroom had been was entirely burned.

A tardy pupil, who smelled smoke reported it, and the fire drill was quickly started. A few days as practice drill the building was emptied within two minutes. 



IMPORTANT TO KNOW AMOUNT OF FOOD TO PROVIDE.

Famous Chef Recommends the Quantities Enumerated Below as Being Amply Sufficient to Supply One Hundred Guests.

When arranging a special dinner or supper, such as church societies often give, it is as important to avoid having a large amount of food and drink left over as it is to provide enough. One thing to be borne in mind is that an item which is part of a full menu will be served in smaller portions than when it is part of a limited number of dishes.

The following are the quantities of materials which a famous chef recommends as sufficient for 100 guests: Three and one-half pounds of

Six gallons of cocoa made from three gallons each of milk and water and one pound of cocoa.

Four pounds of loaf sugar. Five gallons of oysters. Two hundred and sixty sandwiches,

made from 16 loaves of bread and four pounds of butter. Thirty pounds of ham, to boil and slice.


