Reagan County Oil Field Report

The following article printed in the San Angelo Standard of the first of the week shows the developments which have taken place in the Reagan County oil field since our last report, and includes all development up to the first of this week. Persons interested in the oil situation in this section should find the report interesting.

With four producers out of six wells completed now making a total of over 500 barrels of oil daily, and territory almost three miles in length thereby proven to be oil bearing, the Big Lake Oil Company will this week spud in its eleventh test in the Reagan County field. Building of the derrick and drilling of a water well on the southwest corner of section 24, block 9, one-half mile due east of No. 5, were finished Saturday, and rigging up will start Monday, all materials being on the ground.

Big Lake No. 4 is now making better than 200 barrels every 24 hours, it was officially announced her Saturday, while Big Lake No. 5, down 2,930 feet, was swabbing better than 100 barrels daily. It will be placed on the pump this week. The discovery Santa Rita is maintaining its daily average of in excess of 150 barrels, and Big Lake No. 3 is flowing 30 barrels a day into a separate tank. Big Lake No. 2, located 800 feet due west of the Santa Rita, will be shot around 3,625 feet as soon as the water is plugged off. Its total depth is 3,115 feet.

Big Lake Nos. 6 and 7, and Associated No. 1, nine miles south of the Santa Rita on section 2, block 2, were finished as dry holes last week, and are being abandoned. The final depth on No. 6 was 3,262 feet. This well is about a half mile southwest of the Santa Rita. No. 7 was finished at 3,316, after striking sulphur water at 3,240 feet. Associated No. 1 is being abandoned at 3,500 feet. No great significance is attached to the failure to find oil in these wells, since none of the tests were on what is considered to be the structure, but were sunk mainly to protect the acreage held by the Big Lake Oil Company.

Big Lake No. 8 was finished Saturday for twenty joints of 8 1/2 inch casing in the 2,625 foot hole. No. 9 was drilling at 2,300 feet. Pipe was frozen at 2,470 feet in No. 10 (the rotary). The former Smith and Enders well in Crockett county, taken over by Levi Smith, president of the Big Lake Oil Company, and associates, was drilling at 1,350 feet after a fishing job.

The Mid-Kansas Oil and Gas Company, on the McIntosh ranch section 1228, seven miles northeast of the Santa Rita, was drilling around 2,000 feet, it was learned. The same company's well on Harris Brothers' ranch in Crockett county was fishing for a bit at 2,020 feet. This well is on section 17, Block HH.

The well spudded ten days ago by William Dunning, Jr. of Fort Worth on the Bar S ranch, section 93, block 1, ten miles northeast of Big Lake, was drilling late in the week around 600 feet. This well is understood to be financed by the Humble Oil and Refining Company. The Texas and Pacific Coal and Oil Company's Schuemburg No. 1 on section 206, block 1, five miles east of Big Lake, was drilling at 2,300 feet. Texon Oil and Land Company was reported ready to spud in its No. 1 on section 1

Ozona Schools Close Session

Dr. Horn is a man of great intellectual development, and his address will surely please his hearers.

Numerous recitals, plays, etc., have marked the closing days of school, and they have been of an elaborateness and fine quality seldom witnessed in schools of this size. Some sort of entertainment has been provided for every night of this week, and several were held during the past week.

New Device That Weighs Material in Transit

Industries using large quantities of coal, stone and similar materials always have lost much time through the necessity of halting the materials in transit to weigh them.

Now there has been devised a scale by means of which any sort of material, whether carried by car, bucket or on belts, may be weighed in motion. In addition, the scale automatically supplies records both of the weights of individual units and of the total amount of material carried.

This is accomplished by an ingenious system of suspension and gearing, described as follows in Popular Science Monthly: A portion of the conveyor is suspended in a way that may be compared with the ordinary platform scale. From this extends the weighing beam, counterbalanced by a steel float in a mercury bath. This float permits the beam to move from its zero position as the weight of the material falls on the suspended portion of the conveyor.

Valuable Results From Recent Exploring Trip

Specimens of bird, plant, animal and reptile life have been brought to this country by expeditions which explored jungles in South and Central America for the United States government. A coral snake, declared to be one of the most poisonous reptiles in the world, is included in 3,000 specimens collected in Guatemala by Harry Malleis for the National museum. He returned with a large and valuable assortment of bats, taken from the ruins of prehistoric towns. A number of new plants were gathered in Peru, Ecuador and Bolivia by Dr. A. S. Hitchcock of the Smithsonian Institution. He reports that natives chew the leaves of the coca bush, from which cocaine is produced, and are affected by it. It makes them old before their time. Johns Hopkins university has sent an expedition in charge of Prof. J. T. Smeeth to conduct geologic explorations in the Andes mountains in Peru.

Mistook His Opponent

Two pickaninies, not thoroughly accustomed to ocean bathing, were engaged in a "water fight" off a beach one windy afternoon. The fight consisted of desperate attempts on the part of each combatant, breast deep in water, to dash more of the ocean in his opponent's face than he himself was getting. They did not notice the huge wave which rolled slowly up to them, lifted the little fellow nearest the beach off his feet and sat him gently in the back water.

Considerably surprised, the pickaniny rose to the surface, dripping and spluttering, and turned to his companion, an ailed expression on his face.

Russian Authors Put Out Their Work in "Script"

The wheel of time is not going forward; sometimes it rolls back. Despairing of ever getting their books published under the soviet regime, a number of Russian authors are copying their works in manuscript and have established a "Bookshop of Authors" in Moscow, says London Answers.

This recalls the early days of the Renaissance, when the revival of the old learning led to a great demand for "scribes" to make copies of the poets and philosophers whose work, after centuries of neglect, had once more come into its own.

These scribes for some time could command quite high prices for their work and, even after the printing press had been introduced, continued to put up a brave fight against that "soulless machine."

In this they were encouraged by some of the great nobles of the time. The duke of Urbino, for instance, who kept 40 scribes employed in copying parchments, was accustomed to say that he would be "ashamed to have a printed book in his library."

Men of Genius Troubled by Most Childish Fears

Fear has played an important part in the lives of the great and the very great. Contrary to the natural supposition that genius should be on a plane higher than that troubled by ordinary worries, the most commonplace cowardice and the most inconsequential bogies were theirs.

The Iron Duke of Wellington, who defeated Napoleon at Waterloo, was afraid of cats! In fact, the only man in the world at that time who feared a feline to the same extent as the duke was Napoleon himself.

Peter the Great was afraid to cross a bridge, and would cry out in terror when forced to do so. Caesar was terrified at the sound of thunder and would shudder at the crowing of a cock. Pythagoras, the Greek philosopher, preferred death to passing through a field of beans.

Sir Walter Scott could never be induced to visit Melrose abbey by moonlight for fear of bogies. Byron refused to sit down at a table where salt was served.

Camouflaged Fish

Submarine color photography has given additional evidence for the theory that the gayly colored fishes of tropical reefs wear their gay colors so that they may more easily fade into their environment. They escape larger fish which prey upon them while at the same time becoming hard to be seen by the small fish upon which they in turn feed. Photographs taken near the sea bottom in these shallow waters have shown the natural background of corals, sponges, sea anemones and other marine growths to be brilliantly colored. The gaudy fish merely conform to their background, and their gay colors are another instance of natural camouflage.

Use the Hose on Rats

To get rid of rats use the hose on them, suggests Sara Bambart an English (A.A.) reader. "For several years," she writes, "I was troubled by rats and spent a lot of money for poisons and traps but still could not get rid of them. One day I took the hose and put it in their holes or runs and let the water run in for at least ten minutes. I have never had any trouble since. 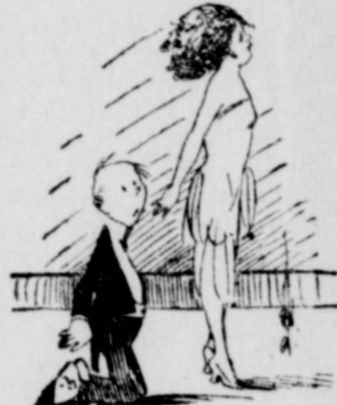

Scientific Opinion as to Variations in Star Heat

In discussing variations in star heat, Prof. Donald Menzel of Princeton observatory says that though the equator on Mars bears no snow at noon it registers 60 or more degrees below zero at night. The Martian atmosphere does little shielding and is less than that of the earth or Venus. He thinks the maximum temperature on Mars is not much above freezing. For Venus the observations indicate that the temperature there is about 20 degrees greater than on the earth. The moon's temperature ranges from boiling (in craters) to 200 degrees C. below zero, according to the amount of illumination by the sun. Jupiter and Saturn radiate some heat of their own. If they were warmed only by the heat of the sun they would be 160 to 190 degrees C. below zero. One temperature estimate put the temperature of Jupiter at 90 degrees C. below zero. Saturn is believed hotter by some 20 degrees.

Free Port a Success

The free port of Stockholm at the end of the fourth year of its existence is described in a trade letter from that city as a complete success. The free port's activity last year brought to its stockholders a dividend of 7 per cent, after a surplus of \$87,000 had been turned over to the city, according to the company's annual report.

Ingoing and outbound traffic during 1923 was many times larger than that of the preceding year. The warehouses are reported to be full and it is difficult, says the trade letter, for ships to find available space at the piers. New facilities are gradually being added, including a new pier 400 feet long, which was opened early in January.

Closely linked with the expansion of Sweden's free port business is a service of scientific assistance which is furnished vessels off the Swedish coast.

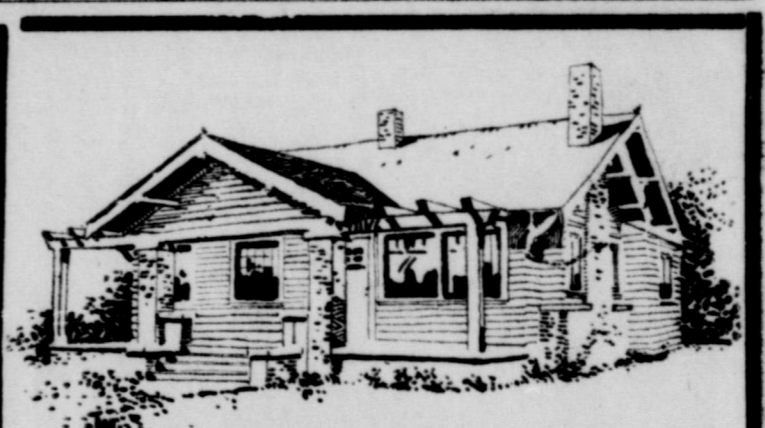

Fish and Plants Source of Earth's Oil Deposits

As a result of half a century spent in studying fish and their habits, Prof. J. H. MacFarlane of the University of Pennsylvania has come to the conclusion that the finny tribe constitute the sole source of the earth's oil deposits. However, this statement is disputed by Dr. D. W. White, petroleum expert for the United States geological survey.
 "It has been proved in our laboratories that petroleum can be made from fish," he admits, "but it has also been proved that vegetables also are a source from which petroleum is derived. While I have no doubt that some of our petroleum comes from fish, I do not think it conceivable that all of it did. I cannot conceive of conditions which would bury enough fish or other animals far enough underground to produce our vast oil resources. On the other hand, it is entirely possible with plants."

Expedition Sets Out to Explore "Mystery Island"

Once upon a time, so the story goes, a Frenchman named Bouvet and two other men claimed to have discovered a small island about 1,000 miles southeast of the Cape of Good Hope. However, nothing further is known about this remote little isle. It appears on some maps as "Bouvet island" and others indicate the spot as an expanse of water. Seamen give the locality a wide berth, claiming that it is haunted. Some of the more adventurous skippers, however, say they approached the mysterious island only to have it vanish in smoke before their eyes.
 An expedition of 16 persons representing the Cleveland Museum of Natural History has sailed from New London, Conn., to determine if Bouvet island really does exist. Incidentally, many other islands will be visited during the course of the 30,000-mile trip in search for museum specimens.
