This issue of The Stockman was punied under difficulties, due to a breakdown of machinery in the Stockman plant Wednesday night.





ost most of its glamour. Spanish governors found the climate of Texas unsuitable for their health. From August 30, 1813, to May 27, 1817, there were no less than six governors. Each one would take office reluctantly, and bombard the Commandant General with petitions for a transfer.

Conditions became so desperate that no attention was paid to public health and cleanliness. Early in March, 1815, some rebels were hanged in the plaza in San Antonio. About two weeks later. Father Zambrano wrote a letter to the governor asking that the decomposing bodies of the rebels be removed because they were unsightly and because Spanish children were amusing themselves by throwing rocks at them.

Poorly Paid Army

The situation kept growing from bad to worse. Officers in the army were paid only one-fourth of their salary throughout the years 1814, 1815 and 1816, and soldiers were given half salary. In March, 1815, the governor reported that he had taken a forced loan of 5,000 pesos from Don Francisco .rebalo and 4,000 from Don Erasmo Eeguin. The following month an order was given by the governor to impress mules from ranches wherever they could be found for hauling salt to Texas from Coahuila. The farmers could plant no crops because the Indians would swoop down on them and kill them while they were at work. The governor petitioned the Commandant General to give him enough soldiers to furnish a guard of ten men for each of the four farms near Bexar. But. unfortunately for Texas, the Commandant General was not interested in this province-full of Indians, Anglo-Americans, renegade Spaniards, and Mexicans. On June 19, 1815, the governor called a meeting of the townspeople of San Antonio to beg for supplies for his troops. The settlers were willing to help. but they were starving to death themselves. 

The console itself was made this summer by University carpenters, supervised by Ernest William Hoffmann, white-bearded and genial shop carpenter, while Dr. Paul Boner, adjunct professor of physics, assisted by Charles Newman, Jr., of Wichita Falls. student assistant in physics, and other members of the department. assembled the 1,750 pipes and 80 stops. Dr. Boner estimates that the total cost of the instrument has not been in excess of \$2,500, or approximately 10 per cent of its value

The pipe organ is a four-manual organ, that is, it has four tiers of keys instead of the usual two or three, and is the only instrument of its size in Austin. Every variety of tone is afforded by the set

Total capitalization, \$1,520,-000, was down 51 per cent and 31 per cent respectively from the previous month and the corresponding month last year. May Discontinue Medical Service **To Relief Clients**

AUSTIN, Oct. 2-Continuation f special medical service charges by local physicians over the state on the basis of a State Medical Association contract will determine whether or not Texas relief clients will continue to receive medical service grants after October 1, it was announced today by State Relief Director Adam R. Johnson.

The Medical Association has informed the Relief Commission that the executive council of the doctors' organization voted September 15 to end on October 1 the agreement by which special rates were allowed relief clients, in the belief that the emergency period for which it was established has ended. The Association has been granting such special medical service charges since November 24, 1933,

"In view of this notification," Johnson announced, "granting medical service to relief clients will be discontinued unless such services are rendered voluntarily by local physicians on the basis of the previous contract charges, as our funds are extremely limited in this transition period into the Works Program."

Special home inspection forms introduced into the homes here through the children in schools. Arrangements have been made with school authorities so that school children will receive these blanks, take them home and conduct an actual inspection of the home to eliminate accident causing hazards with the help of parents or relatives and return the blanks to the school, where they will be forwarded to the Red Cross for compilation of statistics to indicate what type of home accident. hazard is most prevalent."

"Preventing unnecessary death and alleviating human misery," it is pointed out in Red Cross accident prevention campaign literature, "is a chartered obligation of the Red Cross, and home safety is a natural outgrowth' of First Aid, a Red Cross service which has been in effect for some 25 years and is annually responsible for saving many lives.

The accident prevention campaign will be carried out on a nation-wide scale and each of the nearly 13,000 Red Cross Chapters and Branches will play a part.

The Red Cross believes that knowledge of first aid will do. much to prevent home accidents. A person instructed in first aid is accident conscious; and certainly, when an accident does occur in the home, the practical application of first aid knowledge may prevent a minor injury from crippling, a serious injury from killing.


