Nearly 1,400 X-Rays Made In Unit Stand Here

Response Here Above Average For First Survey In County

A total of 1,376 chest x-rays were made of Crockett county people 15 years of age and over in the two and a half days in which the State Health Department mobile x-ray unit was in operation here Saturday, Monday and Tuesday, Miller Robison, general chairman, reported.

The above total does not include 382 pictures which were made by the x-ray technicians during the morning of the opening day which were later found to have been made on defective film. Through a telephone, mail and loudspeaker campaign, a large part of these 382 persons were induced to return to the unit to have a second picture made, this time on good film.

Based on experience in other counties of the state, the technicians who operated the unit here declared that the percentage of x-rays made to the total population of the county ranks among the tops in the state. They declared the survey highly satisfactory and complimented Chairman Robison and his co-workers for a splendid job in bringing the opportunity to the attention of the people.

Arrangements for bringing the x-ray survey unit to this county were made under sponsorship of the Rotary Club. Mr. Robison was named general chairman and organized an efficient corps of workers to handle details of preliminary planning and assistance during the filming process. To all of these faithful workers Mr. Robison and officers of the Rotary Club expressed appreciation.

Bill Earnest and Ruford Johnson were the congenial technicians in charge of the survey. These operators, working in one-hour shifts x-rayed an average of 80 persons per hour during the two and a half days they were here. Mrs. Earnest assisted as register clerk.

The mobile x-ray units are being sent into each county in the state where a request is made for such service, the purpose being to discover possible unknown cases of active tuberculosis. Reports on diagnosis of the x-ray pictures will be made to each individual, whether positive or negative. If the x-ray shows possible tuberculosis the patient will be urged to have further checks and tests made to establish definitely whether or not he or she has tuberculosis and thus to make means to control the disease in case it is present and active.

The reports will be made by mail from the State Health Department in Austin in about two weeks.

4-H Club Wool And Mohair School To Be Held Here April 16

A tri-county 4-H Club Wool and Mohair school will be held in Ozona Saturday, April 16, at the warehouse of the Ozona Wool & Mohair Company, Bill Bergfeld, Crockett county agricultural agent announced this week.

J. A. Gray, animal husbandryman from the Extension Service with headquarters in San Angelo will be in charge of conducting the school. Upton, Reagan and Crockett county clubs will be represented in the school.

County agents E. O. Nevills from Reagan county and N. M. Day, Jr., from Upton county with 4-H Clubmembers from their respective counties will attend. The school is being held to prepare the club members for the twelfth annual Wool and Mohair Show to be held in Sonora June 29 and 30th.

The school will begin at 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning, April 16, and will continue throughout the day.

35 Voters Name School Board Members In Saturday Election

Out of a possible total of more than 700 qualified voters in the county, only 35 took the trouble to go to the polls last Saturday to cast a ballot in the election of school trustees.

Two members of the present district board, Max Schneeman, board president, and C. O. Walker were returned for another two-year term and W. E. Friend, Jr., was chosen to fill the post held by Joe Clayton under appointment of the board. Clayton did not offer for re-election. The names of the three elected trustees appeared on the ballot. Walker received 32 votes and Schneeman and Friend 31 each.

On the county board, W. W. West and Hillery Phillips, whose names were on the ballot, were elected, West receiving 31 votes and Phillips 27.

School Board Ups Teacher Pay For 49-50 Term

New Schedule Puts Local Salary Scale In Top Bracket

Effective with the opening of the 1949-50 school term, a new teacher salary schedule for the Ozona Public Schools will place the local system among the top bracket of Texas schools in the matter of teaching pay rates.

A new base salary schedule which represents a raise of \$400 a year over the present schedule for elementary school teachers and \$300 for high school and for the first time places teachers in all grades, high school and elementary on the same salary schedule. Also for the first time, the new pay scale will recognize better trained teachers with a salary schedule for teachers holding M. A. degrees \$200 a year above those holding only the bachelor degrees.

The new salary schedule sets a base of \$2,800 for teachers with B. A. degrees and \$3,000 for those holding Master's degrees. The pay rate is increased at the rate of \$50 a year for each year of experience the teacher has had in teaching, up to a maximum of 12 years experience and a salary rate of \$3,400 a year for teachers with B. A. degrees and \$3,600 for those holding Master degrees.

With adequate housing available and exceptionally reasonable rental rates, the local system's new salary schedule should make positions here among the most attractive in the state. The school board adopted a rental schedule of \$35 per month for 9 months for couples and \$10 a month for 9 months for single teachers during next year's school session. These rates include gas and water.

The school system will require a certain minimum of professional growth on the part of its teachers. Members of the staff will be required to earn a minimum of twelve semester hours of college credit every three years until the Master degree has been received. Special courses will be required beyond the Master Degree as worked out for and with the individual teacher, with some exceptions possible in cases of special experiences.

House Of David Baseball Team Plays Here Easter Sunday

The colorful House of David baseball team will again be seen in action on an Ozona diamond when they play an exhibition game here on Easter Sunday, April 17, against the Ozona Rebels of the Trans Pecos League.

Manager Byron Stuart announced matching of the House of David game this week. Game time will be 3:00 p.m. and admission charges will be \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for students. In order to meet a guarantee to the bewhiskered guests, the local team will put on a pre-game ticket sale beginning in the next few days.

District Meet To Be Held Here This Week-End

Track-Field Events Fri. And Sat. Literary Tuesday

Ozona will be host to the 1949 District 91 Interscholastic League meet which will be held here Friday and Saturday of this week and Tuesday of next week.

Tennis and playground ball contests will be held Friday, track and field events Saturday and the one-act play and all other literary events on Tuesday, April 12, Jack McIntosh, superintendent of Ozona schools, will be director general of the meet.

The meet events begin at 9:00 o'clock each morning. Drawing for the tennis and playground ball contests will be held at that hour Friday morning. Mr. Rhymes of Junction will direct the tennis matches and Martin Hearne, J. A. Pelto and Mrs. John Vogler will direct the playground ball events.

Bill Bissett will be the official judge for the track and field meet beginning at 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning. Mr. Pelto will direct the meet.

The literary events will begin at 9:00 o'clock Tuesday morning with several of the contests being held simultaneously in various rooms of the high school building.

At 9:00 o'clock extemporaneous speaking and shorthand contests will be held, with Mrs. R. J. Adams of Ozona directing the speech contests and Miss Carol Jones of Sonora the shorthand. First round of debates will be from 9 to 10:30 with W. W. Wendt of Sonora directing. Number sense contests, spelling, ready writers, typing and slide rule contests will occupy the rest of the morning and early afternoon.

Beginning at 3:00 o'clock will be the one-act play contests, perhaps the most interesting of the contests for the general public. The first session of the play contests will be at 3:00 o'clock with casts from Menard, Junction and Rock Springs entered at that hour. At 7:00 o'clock in the evening, casts from Big Lake, Eldorado, Ozona and Sonora will present their plays.

Judges for the literary events will be Bruce Roach, director of speech activities of the University Interscholastic League; Arthur Hayes, professor of speech at the University of Texas, and Grover Fuchs, member of the speech department at the University.

Ozona schools have entered most of the events to be reeled off in the week-end meet. High school and Junior High classes will be dismissed Friday and all high school classes on Tuesday. The public is cordially invited to attend any of the contests.

Four divorces were granted in a brief session of the 112th district court here Monday.

Barbara Beeman was given a divorce from Kenneth Beeman, with custody of the couple's 2-year-old son, Kenneth Allan, given to the plaintiff.

Catarina G. Velasco won a divorce and custody of two children in her suit for separation from Juan Velasco.

Divorce was granted the plaintiff in the case of Ronda Louise Roth vs Edward James Roth. Custody of the couple's 3-year-old daughter, Tommie Louise, was granted the plaintiff. Jesus Martinez won a decree in his divorce action against Angelina Martinez.

Divorce actions dismissed on motion of plaintiffs were Manual Herrera vs Florencia Herrera, Adelfa Garza Duran vs Otilio Duran, and Mariana Herrera vs Marciano Herrera.

The court adjourned until Monday morning when the murder trial of O. D. Northcutt is scheduled. Civil actions ready for trial were set by the court for Wednesday morning.

Junior Class To Sponsor One-Act Play Dist. Meet Program

Casts from seven schools in the district will present one-act plays in the high school auditorium next Tuesday afternoon and evening in the district one-act play contest.

Admission charges of 15 and 25 cents will be made for the afternoon session starting at 3:00 o'clock and 25 and 50 cents for the evening session at 7:00 o'clock. The Junior class of Ozona High School will share the proceeds from these programs, the money to go toward helping to finance the Junior-Senior banquet.

The Tuesday afternoon program will include the following plays presented from three schools: Menard—"Thunderhead"; Junction—"Sugar and Spice"; Rock Springs—"The Perfect Gentleman."

Four plays will be presented at the night program, as follows: Big Lake—"Bishop's Candle Stick"; Eldorado—"Last Victory"; Ozona—"Sugar and Spice"; Sonora—"High Window."

Scholastic Count In Crockett County Shows Increase

Although totals have not yet been made, an increase of around 60 and possibly more in the scholastic count of Crockett county has been noted. Supt. Jack McIntosh, in charge of the census, reported this week.

Mr. McIntosh estimated the count to date at approximately 775, with accurate totals not yet taken. Last year's total scholastic count was 718.

The period of active census taking has been completed, but if there is any person living in the county who has a child that has not been enumerated in the census, he is urged to call the superintendent's office. The census total determines the amount of the per capita apportionment of state school funds to the county and it is important that all children of school age be enumerated.

Shelton's Crew Trims Rebels In Sunday Opener

Game Played In Football Weather; Sonora Coming Sunday

In weather much more suitable for football than baseball, Lefty Shelton and his Forsan Oilers captured an 8 to 6 decision over Lefty's former team mates, the Ozona Rebels, in the opening game of the 1949 baseball season on the home lot Sunday afternoon.

A goodly crowd of fans turned out for the game in the hope that the chill northeast wind would lay and at least endurable if not actually balmy temperatures would return. But the weather didn't abate and the chill wind got progressively chillier until finally there was a handful of indomitable fans huddled in the grandstand under blankets, the balance taking refuge in cars with heaters going or giving up the ghost and going home to warmth and comfort.

The rebels got off to a three-run lead in the second when they bunched three hits and took advantage of an Oiler error to push over that many runs. But the visitors took up some slack in the third when Hefley, pitching for Ozona, walked three in a row after two were on base, one via the hit route and one through a miscue. Two runs were passed in during this temporary wild spell. The Oilers evened the count the next inning with a couple of hits and a costly outfield error.

Hefley retired after five innings and Manager Stuart took the mound. Stuart had things under control in the sixth, but the first man up in the seventh rapped out a double. It looked as if the rally might be stopped when two were retired on fly balls. But the next up singled and the next drove one pass Harralson in centerfield for a home run through the fence. That counted three runs. Two more in the eighth on a couple of hits, an error and a few boneheads salted down the game for the visitors.

The Rebels filled the sacks in the sixth with one out but two strike-outs wiped out the chance. A walk and couple of hits in the seventh produced two runs and three Oiler errors in the eighth gave the locals one more.

The Rebels will play another practice game here next Sunday against the Sonora entry in the Concho Basin league. The House of David team is on tap for an exhibition game here on April 17 and Manager Stuart is trying to match a game for April 24 with some team in the area.

The two men roped and tied 10 calves each in a total time of 155.5 seconds. Best time of the match was made by Holleyman on his last calf. He needed a time of 11.5 seconds to tie Mansfield in the match and that's what he had on the last calf.

Northcutt Trial On Murder Count Set For Monday

Construction Worker Charged In Tourist Court Slaying

The trial of O. D. Northcutt, 44, of Amarillo, indicted Monday by a Crockett county grand jury on a charge of murder growing out of the rifle slaying of J. D. Freeman, 40, also of Amarillo, in an Ozona tourist court January 14, was set for next Monday morning by Judge J. B. Randolph when the April term of 112th district court opened here Monday.

A special venire of 75 men, in addition to the regular petit jury panel of 40, was ordered summoned to report at 10:00 o'clock Monday morning for possible jury service in the trial. The petit jury, originally ordered to report Tuesday morning, was notified of postponement until Monday morning.

Freeman died in his tourist court room here January 14 a few minutes after being struck in the chest by a bullet from a .3006 Winchester rifle fired at close range, investigating officers reported following the slaying.

Information gathered by Sheriff V. O. Ernest following the shooting indicated that the two men had been involved in a fist-cuff earlier in the evening, the trouble growing out of a reported argument over wage payments to a third man. All were employed as plasterers on the new Methodist Church under construction here, Northcutt being foreman of the crew.

After the argument over the wage question, evidence gathered by officers indicated, Northcutt returned to "serenade" Freeman with his violin. The latter evidently objected with the result that fists flew and Northcutt was ejected from the room where Freeman had already retired.

Northcutt is said to have returned a few minutes later, armed with the rifle and fired at Freeman as the latter rose from his bed. The bullet struck Freeman under the left arm and tore a large hole in the left side of the chest. Two women who were with the men in the tourist court told officers that they turned the wounded man on his back and his only words were, "I'm dying."

The grand jury this week also returned an indictment charging felony theft against Marvis Simpson of Iraan and K. S. Mikeworth in connection with theft of a string of pipe from John I. Moore of Midland at one of Moore's oil well locations in this county. The two men were indicted jointly in the case.

Simpson waived trial by jury and entered a plea of guilty to the charge before Judge Randolph here at the Monday morning session of the court, and received a 5-year suspended sentence at the hands of the court. Trial of Mikeworth, who is at liberty under bond, has not been set.

The body of Lt. Jake McCulley, Air Force pilot lost in the fall of the Philippines to the Japanese in the early stages of World War II, has been returned to the United States for reburial.

Lt. McCulley was stationed at Nichols Field in the Philippines at the outbreak of war. He was reported missing and later the Japs reported his death through the American Red Cross, ascribing disease as the cause of death. Investigation by Lt. McCulley's brother after the war established the fact that the pilot escaped from the Japs and hid in the hills for a time before being captured.

Oliver & Kotyza of Midland will drill No. 1-A Carothers to 1,600 feet with cable tools. Location is 990 feet from the south and west lines of the southwest quarter of the west half of section 24, block UV, CC&SFRR survey 3 1/2 miles west of discovery well in Vaughan (San Andres) field. Drilling is scheduled to begin April 10.

H. P. Dunn, trustee of Dallas, will drill No. 1 L. B. Hoover to 1,000 feet with cable tools. The test will be 5,610 from the north, 330 feet from the west lines of section 4, block N. N. N., T&STL Ry. Co. survey

C. E. Bay and Vickers Petroleum Co. No. 1 University, wildcat in northeast Crockett, C SW SW 4 39-U, recovered 252 feet of very slightly gas-cut mud on a 70-minute drillstem test from 8,135 to 8,209 feet the first in the Ellenburger. It deepened to 8,272 feet and was drillstem testing again. The Ellenburger was entered at 8,176 feet.

Texaco No. 2 Pierce, wildcat 2 1/2 miles south and slightly east of Ozona, was making hole at 10,287 feet in sand and shale.

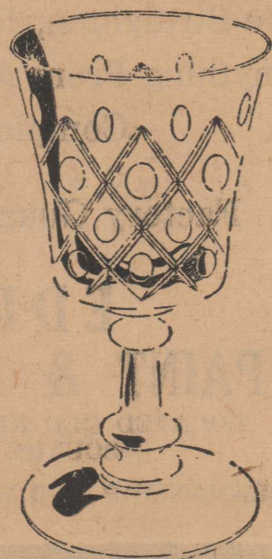
