Cities Service to Drill Deep Wildcat In Western Crockett

Cities Service No. 1-B Hobbs will be drilled as a 7,500-foot rotary wildcat in northwest Crockett county, nine miles norheast of

Drilling, on estimated elevation of 2,735 feet, will begin Sept. 30. and 1,068.85 feet from the north and 665.4 feet from the west lines of section 7-GG-GC&SF.

It is 3/4-mile west of Cities Service No. 1 Hobbs, abandoned Aug. 11, 1947 at a total depth of 5.890 feet on elevation of 2,433 feet. That project reported the followmums. 




