Hot, Cold, Wind, Dust All Mix in Week's Freakish Weather

Ozona experienced almost every kind of weather in the catalogue during the past week, except the very worst sort, tornadoes, all a possobile backlash from the destructive tornadoes which struck the cities of Waco and San Angelo Monday.

Although limited in the area covered, the area profited from the weather disturbance by receiving the very best the weathermakers afford - rain.

Both draws through Ozona ran water for the first time in more than two years. Johnson draw, fed by heavy rains in the northern part of the county, was still running at the end of the day Tuesday from Monday night's rain. Gurley draw, a short water course from northeast to southwest through the city, ran for several hours Tuesday morning and had another rise Wednesday morning from rains during the morning.

Ozona received a little more than two inches of rain in the two falls ,the heavy rain Monday night, or early Tuesday morning, producing a total of an inch and a half and Wednesday morning's slow fall adding another 1/2 inch.

The Wednesday morning rainfall was more like a fall rain than a Spring one, the temperature falling to an uncomfortable chill.

Monday night's heavy thunder shower covered areas of the county to the north and east but did not extend beyond a few miles south or west. Heaviest falls were in the northern and northeastern







'Social Security' Pays Average \$32 a Month to 2515 In 13-County Area

Social security payments totaling \$82,136 went to 2515 people in the 13 county area served by the San Angelo office in April 19-53, according to George D. Clark, manager of the San Angelo social security office. These figures are based on revised estimates of current benefits and represent an increase of 51% over payments at the end of 1951.

Changes made by the 1950 and 1952 Amendments to the Social Security Act accounted for a conin the number of people receiving benefits and in the amount of their payments. In 1950 the law was changed to include millons of people not covered before, and to make it easier for them to qualify for payments. Among those newly covered were self-employed people and regularly employed household and farm workers.

The 1952 changes, effective in September, raised the amount, of practically all benefits, gave social security credits for military service after the end of World War II, and provided that a person can be considered "retired" even though he is earning as much as \$75.00 a month.



NOTE — Employers act as are forced to contribute the percentage indicated above for the "privilage" of collecting, making quarterly and annual reports and paying a stiff fine for failing to do so on time. And only those who reach the point where they are starving to death at not more than \$75 month income, can starve a little longer on the small pittance they will have coming from the so-called Social Security. Mr. Clark's figures above show payments averaging about \$32.50 a month.




