

The discovery well flowed 840 barrels of 40.5 gravity oil in 121/2 hours through 11-64th inch choke on 2-inch tubing. It is 1,980 feet from the south, 2,010 from the west line of section 29-WX-GC&SF, and is 16 miles northwest of Ozona.
