## Ozona 4-H Team Takes 4th Place In National Contest

### James Childress, Sec. and Stringer, 4th High Individual

Representing all of Texas 4-H the state champion Ozona club range and pasture judging team, composed of Erby Chandler, James Childress, and Jacquelyn Williams, won first place in the national judging contest at Oklahoma City last week.

Twenty-two teams from four states participated in the contest. The judging was of Oklahoma range and land. The Ozona team was under the leadership of County Agent Pete Jacoby, and was coached by Garland Hoffman, a specialist with A&M College. Hoffman had planned to get a day and a half of intensive study of the range but almost constant rain prevented much of the field work.

Ozona 4-H Clubs had five members entered in the contest and placed first, second, third, fifth and sixth. A team from Missouri placed seventh.

James Childress, a member of the junior Ozona 4-H team, also competed in the contest and was fourth highest individual, scoring 186.

About 500 individuals participated in the contests. Other members of the second team were Childress, Bill Jacoby, and Billy Troy Williams, alternate.

In addition to Jacoby and Hoffman, adult leaders James Childress and Troy Williams accompanied the team and Pleas Childress, flew up in time to attend presentation of awards.

The team and their sponsors were here in cars. They met Mr. Childress at the party on the balance trip to Oklahoma City. The mileage of the trip was 1,225, Jacoby reported.

## Texita Completes Crockett Extender

The newly opened three-well southeast area of the Shannon (San Andres) field of Crockett County gained a 1/2-mile north extension with completion of Texita Oil Co. and Carson Reiner No. 1 Charles H. Bishop, in 3-FF-B&B, 30 miles northwest of Ozona. It was finaled for a daily pumping potential of 65.12 barrels of 30 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio 150-1.

Production was through perforations between 2,471-481 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing set at 2,550 feet.

Top of pay was picked at 2,471 feet on ground elevation of 2,175 feet.

## Continental Finals Crockett Producer For 141 Barrels Daily

The Ranch (Strawn) field of Crockett County has been extended 3/4-mile southwest with completion of Continental Oil Co. No. 1-C C. T. Harris, in 4-BB2-A. J. Barfield survey, 12.5 miles south of Texon.

It was completed for a daily flowing potential of 141 barrels of 62 gravity oil, plus 2 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio 8,204-1.

Production was through perforations between 8,070-115 feet in 7-inch casing set at 8,300 feet on total depth of 9,210 feet. Plugged back total depth is 8,265 feet. Pay section was acidized with 4,500 gallons.

Top of pay was picked at 8,070 feet on kelly bushing elevation of 2,905 feet.

Tubing pressure was 800 pounds, casing pressure, 1,125 pounds.

Brown & Thorp Oil Co. of McCamey has filed application to drill the No. 1-38 Gulf-Tippett Estate as a 3/4-mile southwest offset to lower Clearfork production in the Tippett multipay field of Crockett County, nine miles south of McCamey.

It will be drilled to 5,000 feet with rotary. Elevation is 2,250 feet. Location, on a 200-acre lease, is 3,644 feet from the southwest and 1,019 feet from the northwest lines of 38-31-H&TC.

There are two lower Clearfork producers in the field.

## Turn First Dirt On Construction Of Johnson Dams

### Contract To Be Awarded May 27 On Third Dam of Series

While dates have been set for award of contracts for construction of the second and third dams in the series of flood retardation structures which will harness the sometimes rampaging flood waters of Johnson Draw, the first dirt was turned on Site No. 1 yesterday in the program which will see the final construction of seven flood control dams on the watershed.

Notice to contractors was released this week announcing the award of contract for construction of the dam at Site No. 2. Bids will be received by the Crockett County Commissioners Court up to 2 p. m. on May 27 when they will be opened and read. Site No. 2, about five miles north of Ozona, is mostly on the W. R. Baggett ranch land and a part on the Martin Harvick ranch. The dam will be approximately 1500 feet long and 45 feet high. Contract specifications call for its completion in 286 calendar days.

Contract for construction of the first dam, that at site No. 1, on the Boyd Baker ranch, was awarded April 15 to Concrete Contractors, Inc., of Pasadena, Texas, on their low bid of \$93,921.40. Eight bidders submitted bids on this project. The successful contractor has 242 calendar days in which to complete the project.

Two bulldozers and a crew of brush cutters were put to work at the site Wednesday morning, clearing brush and readying the terrain to begin the dam construction job.

The second contract, for Dam No. 3, on the Jack Holt ranch, is expected to be awarded here on May 20. Bids have been advertised to be received at 2 p. m. on May 20, the third contract award set one week later.

The idea for construction of the chapel was suggested several years ago by George Skeete, a Water Valley ranchman. A Fort Stockton architect Lee Hunter, has drawn plans and specifications for the chapel free of charge and the Santa Fe railroad presented an engraved bell for the chapel belfry at Easter.

State law requires that sufficient funds to complete the project be in escrow before construction can start and the chapel committee from the Volunteer Council plans to launch an intensive campaign next week to build the fund so that construction can start by August 1. Several memorial contributions have already been made, backers report.

In addition to the actual sanctuary, which will seat 200, the building will include studies for Catholic and Protestant chaplains rest rooms, air conditioning and heating. The plan also includes the installation of a program distribution system so that patients throughout the hospital may attend church services although bedridden.

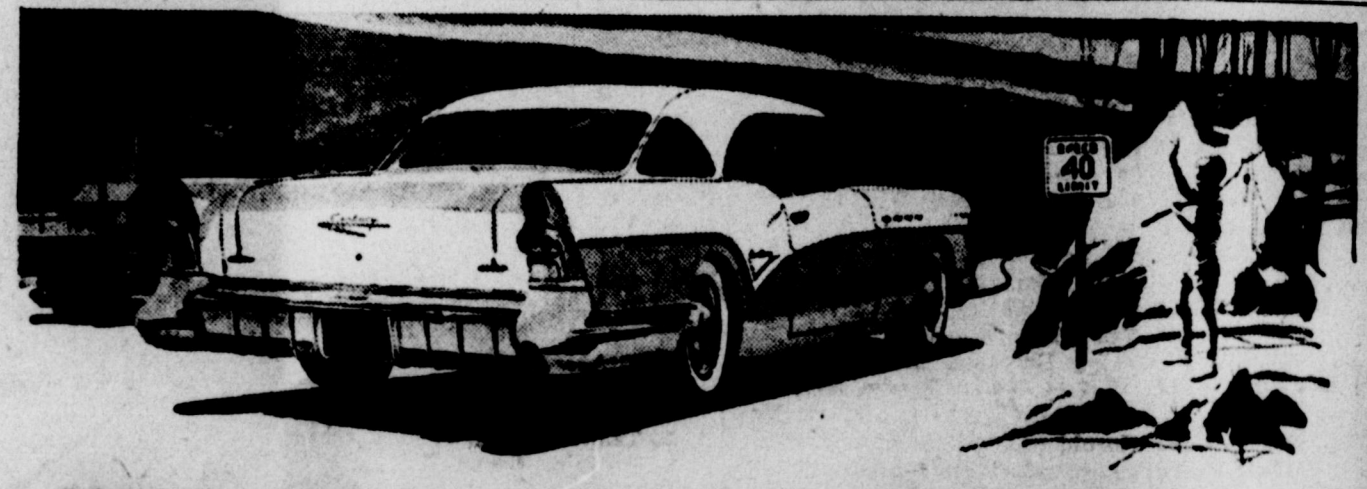

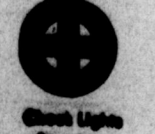

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**The News Reel**

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, May 10, 1928

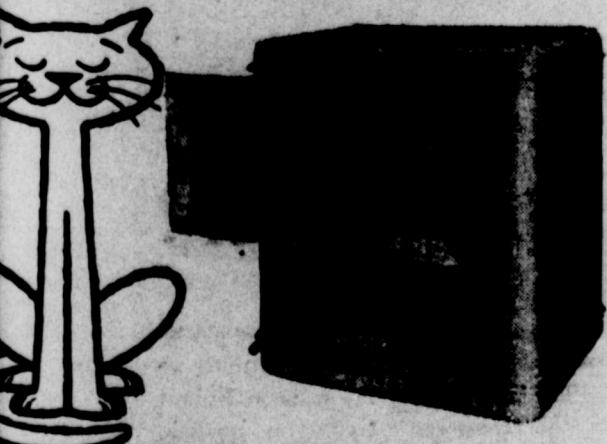

"Many honors have come my way. My year books and scrap books have won prizes both District and State...

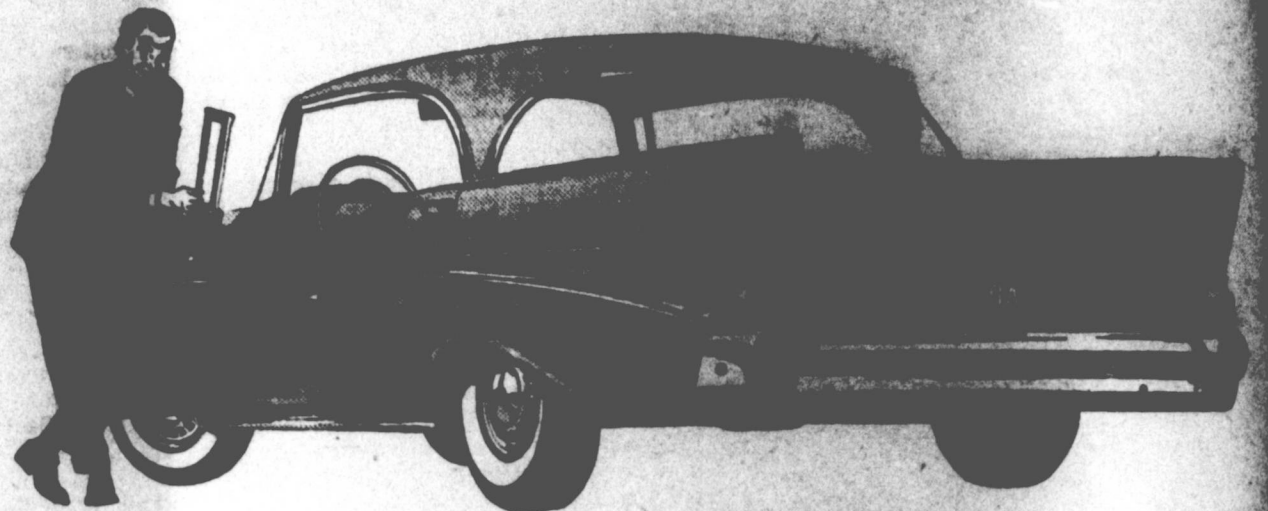
