

Plaques Bare Tale of Old Persia



Four solid gold and silver plaques, shining as brightly as the day they were laid away, 2400 years ago, and telling of the vast empire over which Darius the Great then reigned—this was the most recent "find" of rare value during excavation of the "Versailles" of an cient Persia—the Great Palace at Persepolis—by scientists of the Oriental Institute of the Univer-

sity of Chicago. These pictures were taken by the institute, the upper one showing the scene of the find. In the pit, in foreground, a stone covers one of the two limestone boxes, believed cornerstone deposits, housing the plaques, inscriptions on which were incised in three languages: Old Persian, Elamite, and Babylonian.




